


Dear President Reagan:




Dear Susan:





It has come to our attention that former U.S. Senator James Buckley is under consideration to replace James Watt as Secretary of the Interior. Our organization strongly concurs with this choice.

We are a citizen taxpayer group that has been concerned about the nation's water policy since 1973. While our major concern is economics, it is obvious that environmental issues are involved. Thus we have frequently dealt with the environmental community, and believe they would welcome the Senator over other proposed choices.

As a conservative Republican, may I suggest that Senator Buckley's appointment could go a long way towards healing the rift between ourselves and the environmental community. I would add that many members of that community share my political persuasion.
