Events in China

In accordance with your request to David Laux, here is the joint NSC/State recommendation on who should participate in the President's meetings with Chinese leaders, for the proper accomplishment of our foreign policy objectives. In general, with the exception of the small meeting with Deng Xiaoping and possibly some restrictions on the meeting with Hu Yaobang, we believe we can be reasonably generous, because the Chinese tend to bring large numbers of their own to these meetings and, for the most part, large attendance does not materially affect what they have to say.

TALKING POINTS FOR USE WITH MINISTER HU

- I want to thank you for the extraordinary efforts your government has made to accommodate all our requests in connection with my trip to China. I know that we ask for a lot in the way of logistical support—when we bring our own limousine, our own helicopter, and a large press corps and many people to handle logistical and other matters on Presidential trips.
