Hearings were held in the Senate Judiciary Committee the week of December 14, and the full Senate voted on the nomination this morning, confirming him by a vote of 97 to 0. As the Chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee, Senator Biden was vital to the success of the nomination. Senator Biden was not present for the vote today, as he wrenched his back last week and when present in the Senate has been wearing a neck brace.

- Kika, I understand the visit of the Soviet agriculture delegation was an unqualified success. Maybe I should put you on our negotiating team in Geneva.
- You and I know that our success in dealing with the Soviets has resulted from our dealing with them from a position of strength. The same principle holds true in Central America.
- -- Daniel Ortega made some last minute concessions at the San Jose summit which were very encouraging.
- These steps were taken only because our policy is working. The Sandinistas have now opened a door to democracy. We must close that door behind them and prompt them to move forward to open the next door.
- -- My request protects the United States' interest in the region and keeps the pressure on the Sandinistas to carry out their obligation to establish democracy.

- -- If we just give them humanitarian aid, all the progress we have made will be lost. The Resistance will have to pull out of their positions in Nicaragua and the pressure will be off the Sandinistas.
- -- Your support is critical.
- -- May I count on your support Wednesday?
