SUBJECT: SOVIET ABSENCE FROM INTERNATIONAL ECONOMIC DIAEOGUE

DURING HIS OCTOBER 15 ADDRESS TO THE PHILADELPHIA WORLD AFFAIRS COUNCIL PRESIDENT REAGAN MADE FOLLOWING COMMENT ON SOVIET NON-PARTICIPATION AT CANCUN SUMMIT:

BEGIN TEXT

PERHAPS THE BEST PROOF THAT DEVELOPMENT AND ECONOMIC FREEDOM GO HAND-IN-HAND CAN BE FOUND IN A COUNTRY WHICH DENIES FREEDOM TO ITS PEOPLE--THE SOVIET UNION. FOR THE RECORD, THE SOVIETS WILL NOT ATTEND THE CONFERENCE AT CANCILL. THEY SIMPLY WASH THEIR HANDS OF ANY RESPONSIBILITY. INSISTING ALL THE ECONOMIC PROBLEMS OF THE WORLD RESULT FROM CAPITALISM AND ALL THE SOLUTIONS LIE WITH SOCIALISM.

THE REAL REASON THEY'RE NOT COMING IS THEY HAVE NOTHING TO OFFER. IN FACT, WE HAVE JUST ONE QUESTION FOR THEM: WHO'S FEEDING WHOM? I CAN HARDLY REMEMBER A YEAR WHEN SOVIET HARVESTS HAVE NOT BEEN BLAMED ON "BAD WEATHER." AND I'VE SEEN A LOT OF HARVEST SEASONS. AS THE PRESS KEEPS REMINDING ME. THEY'VE HAD QUITE A LONG LOSING STREAK FOR A

GOVERNMENT WHICH STILL INSISTS THE TIDES OF HISTORY ARE RUNNING IN ITS FAVOR. ...

  TIME NATIONAL TV AND RADIO INTERVIEWS HELPED ENORMOUSLY
  TO ALLAY LOCAL FEARS AND APPREHENSIONS ABOUT U.S.
  POLICIES. THERE IS NO SUBSTITUTE FOR PERSONAL EXPOSURE.
  IT SHOWS WHAT A PRESIDENTIAL VISIT COULD DO. END SUMMARY.
- 2. (LOU) SECRETARY WEINBERGER'S VISIT TO LONDON FOLLOWING THE NPG MINISTERIAL MEETING WAS A RESOUNDING PUBLIC RELATIONS SUCCESS. IN HIS THREE SEMI-PUBLIC APPEARANCES -- A MAJOR DEFENSE POLICY ADDRESS TO CHATHAM HOUSE, INFORMAL MEETING WITH MEMBERS OF PARLIAMENT, AND A LUNCH WITH BRITISH LEADERS -- HE EMPHASIZED THE SOVIET CHALLENGE, PREACHED PEACE THROUGH STRENGTH AND EXTOLLED ALLIANCE UNITY. OTHER THEMES INCLUDED THE NEED TO REDRESS THE MILITARY IMBALANCE, THE DETERRENCE ROLE OF STRATEGIC, THE, AND OTHER MODERNIZATION PROGRAMS, AND OUR SUPPORT FOR THE NEED TO ENGAGE SIMULTANEOUSLY IN MEANINGFUL ARMS REDUCTION TALKS.

LEN DOWNEY OF THE WASHINGTON POST,

DAVID FAIRHALL OF THE GUARDIAN AND BILL TUDHY OF THE L.A. TIMES WERE ALSO LAVISH IN THEIR PRAISE, AS WAS LORD HARLECH, FORMER BRITISH AMBASSADOR TO WASHINGTON, WHO INTRODUCED THE SECRETARY'S ADDRESS. DEFENSE SECRETARY JOHN NOTT, WHO WAS PRESENT, ALSO TOLD THE DCM THE SPEECH WAS "FIRST RATE".

- 2. WE HAVE RECEIVED A NUMBER OF SUGGESTIONS (REFTELS) CONCERNING OUR PACKAGE OF MATERIALS ON THE SOVIET THREAT, THE PUBLIC POLICY AND THE NATO WHITE PAPER. BASED ON THESE SUGGESTIONS, WE HAVE MADE THE FOLLOWING DECISIONS CONCERNING THESE VARIOUS PROJECTS:
- A. FORCE BALANCE PAPER: WE HAVE DECIDED TO ELIMINATE OUR FORCE BALANCE PAPER FROM THE PACKAGE OF UNCLASSIFIED THREAT MATERIALS (REF B). INSTEAD. WE WISH TO SEE MATERIAL FROM THIS PAPER INCORPORATED IN THE NATO WHITE PAPER BEING PREPARED BY THE DRC. WE HAVE THUS PROVIDED ASG NICHOLLS WITH COPIES OF THE CHARTS AND OTHER MATERIALS USED IN OUR FORCE BALANCE PAPER, AS WELL AS WITH THE PACKET OF CIA SUPPLEMENTARY GRAPHICS. WE WOULD INTEND FOR ASG NICHOLLS TO USE THESE MATERIALS AS NEEDED IN THE NATO WHITE PAPER.
- B. NATO WHITE PAPER: WE HAVE CONSIDERED THE OPTIONS

PRESENTED IN REF (G) CONCERNING THE TIMING AND MANNER OF RELEASE FOR THIS PAPER. ALTHOUGH WE WOULD STILL HOPE FOR MINISTERIAL APPROVAL OF THE WHITE PAPER IN DECEMBER, WE HAVE CONCLUDED THAT, FOR PRESENTATIONAL REASONS, IT WOULD BE PREFERABLE TO RELEASE A HIGH-QUALITY, UNCLASSIFIED GLOSSY BROCHURE AROUND THE END OF FEBRUARY; SELECTED, HIGHLY NEWSWORTHY FORCE COMPARISON FIGURES COULD BE INCLUDED IN THE DECEMBER DPC COMMUNIQUE TO DRAW ATTENTION TO THIS EFFORT AND CREATE ANTICIPATION. WE BELIEVE IT WOULD BE A MISTAKE TO PUBLISH A LOWER QUALITY ADVANCE PAPER IN DECEMBER. SINCE IT WOULD DETRACT FROM THE IMPACT OF THE FINAL BROCHURE AND WOULD NOT RECEIVE ADEQUATE ATTENTION IN VIEW OF THE JUST-INITIATED THE NEGOTIATIONS AND OTHER MATTERS OF HIGH INTEREST TO BE DISCUSSED IN THE MINISTERIALS. ON A RELATED POINT, WE HOPE THE UK WILL NOT OPPOSE THE TERM "WHITE PAPER" SINCE, DESPITE ITS SPECIAL MEANING IN THE UK, THE TERM CLEARLY SIGNIFIES FOR MOST PEOPLE THAT THE DOCUMENT IN QUESTION HAS BEEN SANCTIONED AT THE HIGHEST LEVELS AND REPRESENTS AN OFFICIAL POSITION ON QUESTIONS OF HIGH POLICY AND

C. THE PUBLIC POLICY: WE DO NOT BELIEVE IT WOULD BE PHYSICALLY POSSIBLE TO PRODUCE A THE BALANCE PAPER (BROCHURE) WITHIN THE TIMEFRAME INDICATED IN REF (E). SUCH A BROCHURE SHOULD INCLUDE THE THE BALANCE IN OUR TERMS -- AND THUS MUST AWAIT COMPLETE DEVELOPMENT OF OUR NEGOTIATING APPROACH. (AS NOTED BELOW, WE DO HAVE A PAPER REFUTING SOVIET CLAIMS.) WE DO BELIEVE, HOWEVER, THAT IT WOULD BE VERY HELPFUL FOR INFORMATION ON THE THE BALANCE AND THE SOVIET THE THREAT TO BE AVAILABLE TO THE PUBLIC PRIOR TO THE OPENING OF THE THE NEGOTIATIONS. IN THIS REGARD, WE WILL MAKE AVAILABLE

TO THE ALLIES THROUGH THE SCG AN UNCLASSIFIED PAPER REFUTING SOVIET CLAIMS ON THE THE BALANCE AND AN UNCLASSIFIED VERSION OF THE HLG THREAT ASSESSMENT WITH ASSOCIATED GRAPHICS. WE ARE WORKING ON A PUBLIC PRESENTATION PAPER ON U.S. NEGOTIATING OBJECTIVES WHICH WILL ALSO BE WORKED WITH THE ALLIES THROUGH THE SCG. AND THEN BE MADE PUBLIC AT AN APPROPRIATE TIME. WE MAY ALSO PROVIDE THE SCG APPROPRIATE GRAPHICS FROM THE CIA PACKET (MENTIONED IN PARA A ABOVE) AND OTHER U.S. MATERIALS AS THEY MAY BE AVAILABLE. WE BELIEVE THIS APPROACH OFFERS THE BEST MEANS OF PROVIDING TIMELY INFORMATION TO THE PUBLIC IN A WAY WHICH DOES NOT ATTACH A "MADE-IN-USA" LABEL TO THE PROGRAM OR OVERLY INVOLVE NATO (COMMENT: WE WOULD PREFER TO SEE NATO'S ORGANIZATIONAL WEIGHT SAVED FOR THE WHITE PAPER). FURTHERMORE, THIS PARTICULAR EFFORT WILL HELP MAINTAIN THE MOMENTUM OF THIS PART OF THE WESTERN POLITICAL OFFENSIVE; IT FOLLOWS RELEASE OF THE SECDEF BOOKLET AND WILL SERVE AS A GOOD PREFACE TO THE MINISTERIALS AND THE FEBRUARY RELEASE OF THE NATO WHITE PAPER. LASTLY. THIS APPROACH WILL PLACE HAXIMUM DISCRETION IN THE HANDS OF SCG MEMBERS TO UNDERTAKE PUBLIC AFFAIRS EFFORTS TAILORED TO THEIR NATIONAL NEEDS AS WELL AS TO THE CREATION OF AN APPROPRIATE PUBLIC SETTING FOR THE OPENING OF THE THE NEGOTIATIONS.

PLANNED TO INCLUDE IN THE PACKAGE HAVE NOW BEEN SUBSUMED INTO OTHER PROGRAMS AS NOTED ABOVE. THE CONTENTS OF THE COVER MEMORANDUM, IT SHOULD BE NOTED HOWEVER, ARE VALID FOR ALL PUBLIC AFFAIRS ASPECTS OF THE WESTERN POLITICAL OFFENSIVE, AND WE WOULD EXPECT TO SEE EMBASSIES USE IT AS APPROPRIATE TO ASSIST HOST GOVERNMENTS IN PROMOTING NATIONAL CAMPAIGNS.

- E. ROLE OF NATO: WE MAY NOT HAVE MADE OURSELVES CLEAR IN THE COVER MEMORANDUM CONCERNING THE ROLE OF NATO IN THIS PROGRAM. WE FULLY AGREE THAT NATO SHOULD NOT GO FORMALLY BEYOND THE ROLE OUTLINED IN REF (D).
- 3. IN ADDITION TO THE SPECIFIC GUIDANCE PROVIDED

ABOVE, THERE ARE SOME GENERAL POINTS WE WISH TO MAKE ABOUT THE WESTERN POLITICAL OFFENSIVE AND ITS ROLE IN EDUCATING THE PUBLIC ON THE SOVIET THREAT:

- A. WE WISH TO SEE A SUSTAINED EFFORT OVER A PERIOD OF SEVERAL MONTHS TO EDUCATE THE GENERAL PUBLIC IN EUROPEAN COUNTRIES ON THE NATURE OF THE SOVIET THREAT. THE SECDEF BOOKLET, THE VARIOUS TNF THREAT MATERIALS, AND THE FORTHCOMING NATO WHITE PAPER ARE TO BE MAJOR "TOOLS." THE TIMING FOR RELEASE OF THESE ITEMS IS GEARED TO CREATE A GROWING BODY OF PUBLIC KNOWLEDGE ON THIS SUBJECT AND TO SUSTAIN MOMENTUM FOR THIS PART OF THE WESTERN POLITICAL OFFENSIVE.
- B. WE FULLY RECOGNIZE THAT FOR SOME ALLIED COUNTRIES
  THE CONDUCT OF A NATIONAL PUBLIC AFFAIRS CAMPAIGN ON
  THE SOVIET THREAT MAY BE POLITICALLY DIFFICULT, IF NOT
  UNPALATABLE. IN THIS CASE, WE WILL LOOK TO EMBASSIES
  TOMELP PROMOTE WHATEVER PROGRAM MIGHT BE FEASIBLE
  THROUGH CONTACTS IN THE PRIVATE SECTOR (JOURNALISTS,
  UNIVERSITY PROFESSORS, POLITICAL GROUPS, ETC.). WE
  CANNOT EMPHASIZE STRONGLY ENOUGH THAT AN EDUCATIONAL
  EFFORT OF SOME SORT MUST BE MADE. EMBASSIES SHOULD GET

  THE HOST GOVERNMENT AND DO NOT RELIEVE PRESSURE ON THE

- C. NATO CAN SERVE AS A LOCUS FOR PLACING PRESSURE ON HESITANT ALLIES TO FOLLOW UP WITH THEIR OWN CAMPAIGNS. In a German television interview today, the chancellor said the Soviets are not easy but rather crafty negotiating partners and would naturally exploit any loopholes in treaties and agreements. "But negotiations and results are possible." He said both the nuclear test-ban treaty and the nuclear weapon nonproliferation treaty had been carefully adhered to by the Soviet Union. The chancellor, who will also speak with Leonid Brezhnev about disarmament matters in Bonn at the end of November, criticized Moscow for arming with SS-20 medium-range missiles and Backfire bombers. This arming posed a considerable threat to the balance and thus also a political threat. Schmidt added that the Soviet leaders knew this to be his stand-Schmidt again called for cooperation and military balance between East and West as common factors for the safeguarding of peace. He was, and would remain, a supporter of the philosophy of military balance, which one could also call "the balance of mutual deterrence". In the area of medium-range missiles, Schmidt again urged renunciation by both sides on the lines of the zero option. DIE ZEIT CRITICAL OF U.S. FOREIGN POLICY PROCESS DW051429 Hamburg DIE ZEIT in German 6 Nov 81 p 3 [Theo Sommer article: "No Concept for Geneva Yet"] [Text] Together with the autumn leaves, the first illusions of the new team in Washington are also falling 9 months after Ronald Reagan's inauguration. The colorfulness of the Indian summer is fading in nature and politics alike. Gusts of reality's wind are sweeping yellowed leaves and withered ideas through Pennsylvania Avenue. The initial enthusiasm of the conservative economists has yielded to softer tones. Budget Director Stockman and Secretary of the Treasury Reagan have lately been putting strong doubts on record that the supreme goal of the administration -- a balanced budget by 1984 -- can really be attained. What continues to be valid in military policy is that the United States must become number one again in the world: the financial dilemma, however, has Reagan's procurement decisions not going dramatically beyond the plans left by Jimmy Carter. In foreign policy the election campaign rhetoric of strength and uncompromising attitude are still reverberating, yet flexible and much more undogmatic than anybody would have dreamed 6 months ago. The European visitor looking around in the U.S. capital a year after Ronald Reagan's election vistory returns home with highly mixed feelings. There are three major impressions: First and positive: The influence of the extreme right has declined and the weight of the center-right group is increasing. Second and unpleasant: Europe is not particularly highly valued in Reagan's Washington. Nobody is particularly favorably disposed toward the overseas allies. The peace movement in the old world finds little understanding. Pacifism is equated with defeatism, and anybody advocating European interests is quickly suspected of neutralism. Third and negative: The foreign policy decision-making mechanism in President Reagan's government apparatus is still the weakest link. From the very beginning the Reagan administration had a dual spirit. One side was that of the California conservatives, the other that of the internationalist conservatives.

#### PARTIES STILL HAGGLING OVER TAXES, SPENDING

[Text] The Hague -- Informateurs De Galan and Halberstadt are attempting to make their proposals for repairing the split in the second Van Agt cabinet acceptable to the ministers most closely involved. They are doing so on the basis of new suggestions they received on Monday [2 November] from outgoing Prime Minister Van Agt, Minister Van der Stee (finance) and Democrats '66 [D'66] parliamentary group leader Brinkhorst.

The crux of the matter is now that Christian Democratic Appeal [CDA] ministers Van Agt and Van der Stee are now raising objections to the informateurs' idea of financing a job creation policy by means of a temporary tax measure. The informateurs are calling it a "solidarity levy," which would be raised in the last 9 months of next year and would precede the proposed investment levy.

Through the levy the national authorities would have 1 billion guilders to use to create a program for job creation. At the end of next year funds yielded by the investment levy, through which a small fraction of employees' wages would be withheld in order to pay for investments, would then be sufficient to pay also for the specific job creation program.

The CDA ministers had been considering an increase in the value added tax to bring in more money, rather than the arrangement proposed by the informateurs. The solidarity levy would come to the government via taxation on wages and income, whereas value added tax increases would be paid by the consumer in higher prices for food and consumer goods.

Labor Party [PVDA] circles are pointing out that there now seems to be political agreement on the necessity of a job creation program, for which at least 1 billion guilders will be necessary next year. This is seen as a gain. Today Minister den Uyl (Social Affairs and Employment) and Interior Minister van Thijn will again meet with their party colleagues, PVDA informateurs De Galan and Halberstadt. D'66 Economic Affairs Minister Terlouw will also have talks with the informateurs today.

D'66 parliamentary group leader Brinkhorst made the proposal to De Galan and Halberstadt on Monday that only half of the solidarity levy should be raised and that the other 500 million guilders should come from cutting some of the expenditure on the wet [as published] investment account and the remainder borrowed in the money markets. The government is already doing this in order to make up the difference between income and expenditure.

After his 2-hour talks with the informateurs, Brinkhorst said that "the chances that this cabinet will reach its full potential have grown." He expected that they would make final proposals either today or tomorrow. They had now received all the objections and counterproposals to their own plan, Brinkhorst said. The D'66 parliamentary group leader thought that the final proposals from De Galan and Halberstadt should first go to the ministers involved and that the parliamentary groups should be involved only if it seemed that the government accord was being "stretched."

The chance that the parliamentary parties of the government coalition would again be asked for their views has grown in the last few days, since at least two of the three coalition parties have adopted the position that the government accord is being changed. Some CDA members have already been insisting that this is the case. Today the parliamentary groups will be meeting again, after Monday's short consultations between informateurs, ministers and parliamentary group leaders. On Monday, People's Party for Freedom and Democracy parliamentary group leader Wiegel stressed in a reaction to the informateurs' proposals that the CDA and D'66 must stand their ground and must consign any tax increases to the waste basket.

The Californians wanted an America that was strong militarily; and they brought along with them a fear of negotiating with the Soviet Union. The reluctance to get involved in remote conflicts also extended to their own allies, who were supposed to submit or, if they refuse to do so, get lost. The United States would in any event survive in a strong fortress America.

This reflects a high-spirited and even arrogant Asolationism, an attitude which today rather is referred to as unilateralism, though it is the same thing. To paraphrase Schiller — both are rooted in the conviction that the might is strongest when all by himself. Thus no time-consuming consultations with the allies, and certainly no negotiations with the communist antagonist because one always is outsmarted — as in Vietnam where Kissinger's diplomacy of negotiations procured international legitimacy for the infernal regime in Hanoi; or as in the SALT talks, which lulled both Nixon and Carter into feeling secure even though the Soviets simultaneously implemented the greatest armament program in their history.

The internationalists also believed that the United States must restore its military strength. But unlike the Californians, they were not convinced that the world-political problems could be solved by military means alone. But above all they were not afraid of negotiations with the Soviets. They wanted to talk with Moscow patiently, persistently and with determination so as to promote their own concepts of world political order.

During the past few months, a compromise gradually took shape; military strength -- yes (to the extent it can be financed), but at the same time negotiations with the Kremlin and coordination with the allies. Much of what sounded shrill in the beginning now sounds comparably moderate. The administration has proven that it is capable of learning. If this is not yet appreciated everywhere, then it is probably due to the fact that relapses into rhetoric and the language of absoluteness repeatedly drown out what has manifested itself in daily life regarding the readiness to assimilate and the ability for self-correction. The list of problems in which the Americans have done some relearning during the past year is long and impressive.

El Salvador, submitted at the beginning of the year as a test case for East-West relations and as the litmus paper of Atlantic solidarity, has disappeared from the list of priorities.

The initial statements of sympathy for the regime of white supremacy in the South African union threatened to stall the Namibia solution sought by the Western group of five. They have nearly died down by now, and Washington again fully backs the Western mediation attempt.

The original neglect of, and even disregard for, the Third World has yielded to new efforts toward understanding — even if with a fundamental reserve. Reagan participated in the Cancun North-South summit meeting; he agreed to a continuation of the dialogue; and he has ceased to cast suspicious glances at the International Monetary Fund. In this respect, too, the Reagan administration has come closer to the European position — perhaps only because of the irrefutable realization that the United States is dependent on the Third World for many important raw materials and this cannot just cold-shoulder the Third World. But even this is something.

The Reagan team originally wanted to agree to arms-control talks and disarmament negotiations only after the military strength of the United States was restored. Later they said after the measures necessary for restoring the military strength have been initiated. In the meantime the Americans have yielded to the European urging for an early opening of the negotiations on nuclear medium-range weapons in Europe. The U.S.-Soviet talks on this subject will start in Geneva on 30 November. Meanwhile, Washington is also seriously preparing for the resumption of the SALT talks. They are scheduled to begin in the spring of 1982 — without any preconditions; without any linkage of Afghanistan or Soviet good behavior in Africa, Asia and Latin America; and also without any reluctance. Eugene Rostow, the head of the Disarmament Agency and a declared hawk, recently put it this way: The Soviet-American relationship currently is so tense that, if we wish to remain true to ourselves, we must seize every opportunity to negotiate in favor of peace, no matter how slight the chances might be.

For a time it looked as though Reagan did not want to talk with the Soviets at all. For 8 months the U.S. Embassy in Moscow was deserted. Then the President began writing letters to Brezhnev, and last week Arthur Hartman, the new ambassador in Moscow, declared when presenting his credentials: We are against unproductive confrontation, against the arms race and against silence between our governments. We will work for a constructive East-West relationship, for true arms control and for the solution of disputes through negotiations. Granted, the Reagan people insist on strict mutuality, yet they no longer create the impression that they prefer confrontation to cooperation (this is why, despite resistance in the beginning, they ultimately did not place any obstacles in the way of the West Europe-Soviet barter deal of natural gas for pipes).

Reagan's people no longer talk so loudly about the Russian danger and about the great window of vulnerability through which the Soviets could move into world domination with one single, disarming surprise strike against U.S. intercontinental missiles. Nor do they like to talk about concepts that would have to be interpreted as meaning that the Pentagon is aiming at making nuclear wars wageable and ultimately even winnable. Lately they are plainly saying that what matters to them is the endurance and ability to survive of their nuclear weapons systems, their communications systems and their chains of command. We are not striving for strategic superiority, I was told in the Pentagon, and we do not want to catch up with the Russians weapon by weapon. We also do not want an arsenal with which nuclear wars could be waged, but rather we want to shift nuclear war into the sphere of our foreign policy. All we want is to prevent any conceivable Soviet option of a first strike against us; besides nobody is thinking of localizing nuclear arms conflicts to Europe. In that respect Reagan's feelings are in no way different from Brezhnev's -- or from those of Desmond Ball who just proved in a publication by the London International Institute for Strategic Studies that the limitableness or controllability of any conflict using nuclear weapons is pure illusion.

All this may calm the European visitor in Washington. He is bound to be alarmed, however, when he realizes how little Europe counts in the United States at the moment. The advocate of the European allies in Reagan's Washington is Secretary of State Alexander Haig. Nevertheless, one is told in no uncertain terms in the upper floors in the State Department that it is becoming increasingly difficult to stand as a champion of the trans-Atlantic allies.

A high-ranking U.S. diplomat told me that nobody in Washington is now influenced by the argument that this or that is not so popular in Europe, that this displeases the French, irritates the Germans and irks the Dutch. The argument rather had the opposite effect for some time now.

In what way?

Too many people here advocate the view that the Europeans want to gradually get out of their responsibility and out of the alliance. This applies above all to the Federal Republic. Isn't it moving away? Doesn't it dream of a new German nationalism? Does it not make itself believe that there is a German alternative, a German solution, to the European security problem?

I cannot help saying that what is sprouting here is the rotten seed sown time and again by correspondents like John Voncour of the New York TIMES in their reports, which naturally are carefully read in Washington. What the Americans feel is European and specifically German nagging has an additionally irritating effect; events such as Helmut Schmidt's talks in which he frankly explained to a dozen U.S. correspondents what he thinks is wrong with U.S. policy. We don't need any hectoring or lecturing, is what they say in Washington -- no sermons or reproof, please.

What about the peace movement in West Europe? Most Americans consider it to be staged by the communists. Only a few people consider it so profoundly as Henry Kissinger, who said the other day: Current strategies are so horrible that the evolvement of pacifism is not at all irrational. If your own defense is coupled with the chance of suicide, even if this theoretically involves a probability of a mere 10 percent, this causes despair and loss of confidence in the governments which base their policies on such probability ratings. Less complicated thinkers only see Soviet wirepullers and European cowardice. Their outrage quite often expresses itself in the pained cry: then they should go it alone.



Brilliant conservative columnist William Safire expressed these feelings in a startling way: A wave of isolationism is sweeping across Europe, he wrote. The idea is gaining a foothold that Europe can indeed manage along ...many Europeans do not want Europe to be defended in Europe. Safire bitterly asks: Can we defend a Europe which does not want to be defended? He recalls that about 332,000 U.S. soldiers are stationed in the Old World —as the tripwire which is supposed to guarantee the automatic participation of the United States in the defense of Europe. His question: But is the Europeans do not wish any serious defense — what do we need the tripwire for?

Unless the responsible people in Europe give signals to the contrary soon, William Safire says, people in the Unitei States will soon consider ideas which hitherto had been absolutely inconceivable. The hint is clear that there is a possibility that the American right will now adopt the old idea of leftist-liberal Senator Mansfield of bringing the boys home from Europe.

Safire reports that a prominent senator was recently asked why a new motion a la Mansfield had not been submitted in the Senate long ago — at least as a threat to the Europeans. The senator replied: This would not work as a threat. The damn motion probably would find a majority.

Question: Have the Europeans, including the Federal Government, done enough to convincingly counteract such notions?

The real question is much more difficult to answer. Can U.S. foreign policy be influenced at all from outside, considering its personnel staffing and administrative organization today.

Doubts are premissible. The foreign policy decision-making mechanism is the weakest link in Ronald Reagan's government apparatus. The National Security Council of the White House is weakly staffed intellectually. This begins with Richard Allen, the chief, and continues down the line to the lower echelons. The council has failed in the task of preparing clear options and alternatives for the President. Just as before, prior to the establishment of the National Security Council, Washington's foreign policy again has become a matter of conflict between the State Department and the Department of Defense.

The Pentagon -- Caspar Weinberger, his deputy Carlucci -- at the top is staffed with technicians who only gradually develop political tact. To go by the judgment of a U.S. diplomat, Weinberger is a simplistic unilaterialist. Allen is only playing a secondary role: His staff is rather hard up. Al Haig in the State Department is an Atlantic advocate but he is not considered a team player; either out of ambition or as a result of stress, he time and again shows vulnerable spots. His style does not earn him just friends. A crisis around him erupts every 4 weeks; because, when Reagan was shot and wounded he was stupid enough to cry "I'm giving the orders now"; because he publicly criticizes decisions of the President (such as the one on the production of neutron weapons); because he publicly laments the guerrilla campaign waged against him in the White House. The latter complaint, by the way, is just a few days old -- the reaction to the rumor that Weinberger was slated to become Secretary of State. Reagan denied it, fortunately enough; otherwise the Europeans would not have been very happy.

The upshot of it all: The gearwheels in the foreign policy decision-making mechanism are not meshing. This is particularly evident in the preparations for the U.S.-Soviet negotiations on the limitation of nuclear medium-range weapons in Europe. A clear and American concept was still nonexistent just 4 weeks prior to the opening of the Geneva talks.

The Pentagon supported the idea that an American draft treaty in favor of the zero solution be submitted right after the opening of negotiations — suggesting the scrapping of all SS-20 missiles in exchange for reuniciation of the NATO decision. A clever consideration is behind it: In doing this, one would chime in with the European leftists, while being rather certain that the Soviets would immediately reject the suggestion as unacceptable; thus the deployment of 572 counterarmament weapons could go on unhindered. "We must keep the matter plain and simple", says the Pentagon. "We must keep the imagination of the broad public busy. We must help Schmidt, Van Agt, Spadolini and Maragaret Thatcher. If the Soviets will remove their entire potential, the SS-20 as well as the SS-22 short-range missile (which can hit 85 percent of the NATO targets also within reach of the SS-20), plus the SS-23 — why not?"



The State Department is of a completely different opinion. It fears that such a suggestion about a zero solution will lead negotiations right away into a dead end street, condemning them to failure. Washington's diplomats would rather prefer a gradual or phased plan. They know that if they don't negotiate seriously, the counterarmament arms will never be deployed. They consider "seriously negotiating" not the making of a suggestion they consider it making a suggestion which would reduce the Soviet threat. They fear that the suggestion of a zero solution would not lead to such an agreement. The Soviets would say yes, but then they would begin the horse trading, zero for what systems? Or they could pretend to agree while extending negotiations — how could Western counterparmament then make progress in 1983-84? Or they could say, zero, okay, but in such a case a European zone free of nuclear arms would be the better solution...

The State Department does not want to insist on any unfruitful zero solution. It would rather negotiate for a few weeks -- six weeks seem to be envisaged for the time being -- with the Russians on partial solutions; it wants to deal with the issue bit by bit so that successes will become visible bit by bit, thus forcing the Russians to take part in a serious dialogue.

The National Security Council has not considered this issue so far. It is still unclear what Ronald Reagan will decide in the end.

This is not a satisfactory situation. The Western alliance is one again lacking leadership. As always, it is now important that the November storms will not blow away long-term projects, ideas and suggestions of the Reagan administration together with the early spring dreams and the later leaves of autumn.

#### PAPER SUPPORTS HAIG ON NUCLEAR STRATEGY

[Text] If Haig says something about nuclear strategy, the general knows what he is talking about. It ought to be basically welcomed by the Europeans when he points out some aspects of nuclear deterrence to the Foreign Relations Committee, thus stressing the doctrine of deterrence once again. The public realizes with interest that the "flexible response" concept contains a botton step which was so far unknown: In the event of an overwhelming conventional attack, NATO is supposed to fire a nuclear warning shot —— such as letting the nuclear warhead of a medium—range weapon explode at a great altitude. You can imagine this to be a somewhat ghastly successor to the shot across the bow. Haig did not add what material effects this explosion should have, we could imagine a blackout of communications and electronic networks. The Secretary of State obviously wanted to use an extreme example to disprove the Soviet denial of the flexible response concept and the Soviet statement that once nuclear war has been opened, there will be no limitation of its escalation. However, this attempt by Haig could confuse Western opinion.

- 2. THE ANTI-NUCLEAR MOVEMENT HERE REPRESENTS A COMPLEX SURGE OF EMOTION, REASON, AND CHATTER. WHILE HOST ACTIVISTS ARE DRAWN FROM THE CONVINCED LEFT, THEY ARE MAKING INROADS ON THE CONCERNED PUBLIC AT LARGE (REFTEL A).
- 2. WE BELIEVE THAT IN ALL THIS THERE REMAINS A RESERVOIR OF MODERATE OPINION OPEN TO REASONED ARGUMENT. THUS, AN EFFECTIVE U.S. COUNTER CAMPAIGN MEANS GETTING U.S. VIEWS TO THE BROADEST POSSIBLE AUDIENCE, AND VISITING U.S. OFFICIALS CAN PLAY A SIGNIFICANT ROLE. WE SEEK TO EXPLOIT SUCH VISITS FOR THE WIDEST POSSIBLE MEDIA EXPOSURE, COMBINED WITH BOTH LARGE AND SHALL GROUP DISCUSSIONS OF OFFICIALS, MEDIA REPRESENTATIVES AND PARLIAMENTARIANS. DURING THE EAGLEBURGER VISIT LATER THIS MONTH WE HAVE ARRANGED SEVERAL DINNER/DISCUSSION MEETINGS WITH A WIDE RANGE OF POLITICAL AND OPINION LEADERS. AND WE PLAN FOR GENE ROSTOW, WHO WILL BE HERE TO GIVE A CHURCHILL LECTURE TO THE ENGLISH SPEAKING UNION, TO MEET WITH THE PARLIAMENTARY SELECT COMMITTEE ON DEFENSE, AND GIVE INTERVIEWS FOR BOTH BBC AND ITV. SECRETARY WEINBERGER, ALAN HOLMES, AND OTHERS HAVE ALSO GIVEN GENEROUSLY OF THEIR TIME.
- 4. FOR OUR PART, WE ARE INCREASING OUR CONTACTS WITH ANTI-NUCLEAR GROUPS (REF B), LIKE THE CAMPAIGN FOR NUCLEAR DISARMAMENT, THE NATIONAL PEACE COUNCIL, STUDENT AND RELIGIOUS ORGANIZATIONS. SUCH CONTACTS ARE USEFUL FOR INSIGHTS INTO THE ANTI-NUCLEAR MOVEMENT, BUT WE ARE CONSCIOUS THAT 1) NO MINDS WILL BE CHANGED AND 2) THAT THE FACT OF HEETINGS OR QUOTATIONS OUT OF CONTEXT CAN BE USED AGAINST US.
- 4. FINALLY, WE ARE TAKING OUR MESSAGE DIRECTLY TO THE PUBLIC. THE AMBASSADOR GAVE HIS FIRST MAJOR PUBLIC ADDRESS OCTOBER 29 ON DEFENSE AND NUCLEAR ISSUES TO A CROWDED MEETING OF THE EUROPEAN ATLANTIC GROUP. TWO FURTHER SPEECHES ARE PLANNED.

  MEANWHILE, WE HAVE MET WITH STUDENT GROUPS IN LONDON, BRIGHTON AND SCOTLAND, WITH THE CONSERVATIVE MONDAY CLUB AND VARIOUS PROFESSIONAL GROUPS, VIZ, THE ROYAL INSTITUTE OF INTERNATIONAL AFFAIRS, THE ARMY AND NAVY STAFF COLLEGES AND THE INTERNATIONAL INSTITUTE OF STRATEGIC STUDIES (IISS). THE IISS WAS ALSO VENUE FOR A WELL-RECEIVED ADDRESS ON THE PRESIDENT'S STRATEGIC PROGRAMS BY THE P.M. DEPUTY DIRECTOR BOB BLACKWILL.
- 5. WE PLAN TO CONTINUE THESE PROGRAMS THROUGH THE NEW YEAR, CONCENTRATING AGAIN ON PROGRAMING U.S. OFFICIALS FOR THE BROADEST POSSIBLE CONTACTS AND MEDIA

6. THE BRITISH HAVE ALSO UNDERTAKEN A MAJOR PUBLIC AFFAIRS CAMPAIGN. LORO CARRINGTON'S CHURCHILL MEMORIAL LECTURE OCTOBER 27 WAS THE LATEST STEP IN THE BRITISH COUNTER CAMPAIGN. LONDON 18465 GAVE A WRAP-UP OF BRITISH EFFORTS TO BOLSTER PUBLIC SUPPORT FOR DEFENSE AND THEREBY STRENGTHEN WESTERN RESOLVE. STREATOR

- 1. (S ENTIRE TEXT)
- 2. WE BELIEVE THAT THE FORTHCOMING NATO MINISTERIAL IN BRUSSELS PRESENTS A GOOD OPPORTUNITY TO BRING TO THE ATTENTION OF THE ALLIES INTELLIGENCE REPORTS WHICH SHOW HOW THE SOVIET UNION IS EXPLOITING THE EUROPEAN PEACE MOVEMENT. THESE REPORTS SUGGEST A PATTERN OF SOVIET INVOLVEMENT. WE WOULD ACCORDINGLY LIKE TO POOL THE INFORMATION AVAILABLE TO THE ALLIANCE TO SEE IF IT CAN BE USED TO EXPOSE AND BLUNT SOVIET ACTIVE MEASURES TO UNDERMINE THE LRTNF MODERNIZATION PROGRAM.
- 3. TO BUILD POLITICAL SUPPORT FOR EXPOSING AND RESTRICTING SOVIET ACTIVE MEASURES, WE BELIEVE IT WOULD FIRST BE USEFUL

TO EXPRESS OUR VIEW TO NATO PERMREPS AND OTHER SENIOR EUROPEAN OFFICIALS THAT THE RECENT DANISH CASE IS NOT AN EXCEPTION BUT PART OF A PATTERN OF SOVIET ACTIVE MEASURES. WE HAVE THEREFORE PREPARED POINTS ON SOME OTHER SPECIFIC CASES WHICH CAN BE USED ON CLASSIFIED BASIS. WE SUGGEST THESE POINTS BE MADE AT THE PERMREPS RESTRICTED SESSION. THIS WILL SET THE STAGE FOR LANGUAGE IN THE NATO MINISTERIAL COMMUNIQUE. OTHER POSTS SHOULD USE POINTS WITH KEY POLITICAL FIGURES. POINTS ARE DIVIDED INTO CATEGORIES, THOSE WHICH CAN BE USED NATO-WIDE; OTHERS WHICH CAN ONLY BE USED WITH SPECIFIED COUNTRIES.

4. WE REALIZE THAT THE SPATE OF ANTI-NUCLEAR DEMONSTRATIONS WHICH HAVE TAKEN PLACE DURING THE PAST SEVERAL WEEKS CANNOT BE ATTRIBUTED TO SOVIET MACHINATIONS. WE RECOGNIZE THAT ATTEMPTS TO ASCRIBE THE PEACE PROTESTS SIMPLY TO SOVIET INSPIRATION WOULD BOTH -WEAKEN THE CREDIBILITY OF ALLIED POLITICAL LEADERS IN THEIR RESPECTIVE COUNTRIES AND CONVEY UNINTENDED INSENSITIVITY ON OUR PART TO THE GENUINE CONCERNS OF EUROPEAN PUBLICS.

5. BY THE SAME TOKEN, WE CANNOT DISMISS THE FACT THAT KMOSCOW CONTINUES TO TRY TO MANIPULATE ANTI-NUCLEAR SENTIMENT IN EUROPE THROUGH LOCAL COMMUNIST PARTIES, THE SOVIET-DOMINATED WORLD PEACE COUNCIL (WPC) AND OTHER MEANS. THE PROPAGANDA CAMPAIGN AGAINST LRTNF WAS ONE OF THE MAIN TOPICS ON THE AGENDA OF THE WPC PRESIDENTIAL COMMITTEE MEETING IN HAVANA IN APRIL. IN ADDITION TO A RELIABLE REPORT DISCUSSING WPC PLANS FOR THIS FALL'S ANTI-THE OFFENSIVE, THERE IS EVIDENCE THAT IT IS ALLOCATING SEED MONEY FOR ANOTHER WAVE OF EUROPEAN PROTEST RALLIES IN 1982. WHILE IT HAS BEEN DISPENSING MONIES TO CERTAIN GROUPS, MOSCOW HAS PROVIDED SUPPORT TO THE PEACE DEMONSTRATIONS BY PROVIDING RENTAL SPACE FOR MEETINGS AND BY OFFERING PRINTING FACILITIES FOR THE PREPARATION OF PROPAGANDA MATERIALS. IN THIS CONTEXT, THE EXPULSION OF THE SOVIET DIPLOMAT FROM DENMARK SHOULD NOT BE VIEWED AS AN UNRELATED DEVELOPMENT, BUT AS THE MOST VISIBLE MANIFESTATION OF A CONCERTED EFFORT TO INFILTRATE AND EXPLOIT THE EUROPEAN ANTI-NUCLEAR MOVEMENT.

- 6. IN ADDITION TO POINTS IN PARAS 4 AND 5 ABOVE, THE FOLLOWING ADDITIONAL SPECIFICS CAN BE CITED IN A NATO-WIDE CONTEXT AT THE RESTRICTED SESSION.
- -- FRG: THE CPSU HAS PLACED THE HIGHEST PRIORITY

ON ERODING GERMAN SUPPORT FOR NATO'S MODERNIZATION PROGRAM. GERMAN COMMUNIST PARTY (DKP) MEMBERS HAVE BEEN INSTRUCTED TO USE STATEMENTS PY HIGH-LEVEL US OFFICIALS TO IMPRESS UPON THE GERMAN PUBLIC THAT WE ARE NOT INTERESTED IN PRESERVING PEACE. THEY HAVE ALSO PROVIDED VARIOUS FORMS OF LOGISTICAL SUPPORT FOR THE LOCAL PEACE

MOVEMENT INCLUDING MEETING HALLS, PRINTING FACILITIES, AND LOUDSPEAKER VANS.

- -- THE NETHERLANDS: LEADERS OF THE COMMUNIST PARTY OF NETHERLANDS (CPN) WENT TO MOSCOW AND EAST BERLIN, FREQUENTED THE SOVIET AND DDR EMBASSIES, AND RECEIVED MANY SOVIET AND EAST GERMAN EXPERTS IN DISARMAMENT PROPAGANDA. LEADERS OF THE PROTESTANT INTERCHURCH PEACE COUNCIL AND THE CATHOLIC PAX CHRISTI HAVE ESTABLISHED TIES TO RELIGIOUS FRONT GROUPS IN THE GDR, CZECHOSLOVAKIA, POLAND, AND THE USSR. THE CHRISTIANS FOR SOCIALISM, WHICH HAS A MEMBERSHIP THAT IS 85 PERCENT COMMUNIST, IS AFFILIATED WITH THE INTERCHURCH PEACE COUNCIL.
- -- ITALY: THE PCI, UNDER HEAVY PRESSURE FROM THE SOVIETS, INSTRUCTED ITS REGIONAL SECRETARIES TO INITIATE DEMONSTRATIONS AND MARCHES AGAINST THE THE BASING IN COMISO, SICILY.
- -- BELGIUM: OFFICERS OF THE NATIONAL ACTION COMMITTEE FOR PEACE AND DEVELOPMENT, THE BELGIAN AFFILIATE OF THE WPC, AND THE BELGAIN COMMUNIST PARTY DISCUSSED PLANS TO ORGANIZE THE OCTOBER 25 RALLY AS EARLY AS LAST MARCH AND REPORTED ON THE STATUS OF THEIR PREPARATIONS TO GDR PARTY OFFICIALS IN EAST BERLIN AND TO A GDR EMBASSY OFFICER IN BRUSSELS.
- 7. THE FOLLOWING INFORMATION IS RELEASABLE ONLY TO THE COUNTRIES DESCRIBED:

1. (C) SUMMARY: THE PROPOSAL ON INF MADE BY BREZHNEV IN HIS NOVEMBER 23 TOAST HERE (SEPTEL) WAS GREETED BY THE MEDIA WITH PROBING QUESTIONS IN A PRESS CONFERENCE THE FOLLOWING DAY. SOVIET SPOKESHAN ZAMYATIN PROVOKED SOME OVERT HOSTILITY FROM PRESS REPRESENTATIVES THROUGH HIS OFTEN-INTEMPERATE PRESENTATION, WHICH INCLUDED AN ATTACK ON FRG SPOKESHAN BECKER. WE SEE THE SIGNIFICANCE OF THE PRESS CONFERENCE AS BASICALLY TWOFOLD: FIRST, MEDIA REPRESENTATIVES HERE ARE IN NO SENSE SWALLOWING THE LATEST BREZHNEV PROPOSALS HOOK, LINE AND SINKER. SECONDLY, IN THE CRUCIAL BATTLE FOR FRG PUBLIC OPINION ON INF, ZAMYATIN HAS INFLICTED A CLEAR REVERSE ON HIS OWN SIDE. END SUMMARY.

2. (U) FRG PRESS SPOKESMAN BECKER OPENED A PRESS CONFERENCE NOVEMBER 24 ON THE FIRST UNDER-FOUR-EYES

MEETING BETWEEN BREZHNEV AND SCHMIDT BY STATING
THAT: BOTH MEN HAD EXPRESSED THEIR OPINIONS FRANKLY,
AND REGARDED THIS FRANKNESS AS A POSITIVE FACTOR;
THE PERSONAL RAPPORT WAS EXTREMELY GODD; SCHMIDT HAD
SOUGHT TO MAKE CLEAR TO BREZHNEV THAT BREZHNEV DID NOT
UNDERSTAND THE AMERICAN WILLINGNESS TO NEGOTIATE IN
GOOD FAITH, AND SCHMIDT HAD SOUGHT TO PLAY AN "INTERPRETER ROLE" IN THIS RESPECT; SCHMIDT HAD "TAKEN
NOTE" OF THE OFFER MADE BY BREZHNEV IN HIS DINNER TOAST
THE NIGHT BEFORE TO REMOVE "SEVERAL HUNDRED" MEDIUMRANGE MISSILES IF INF TALKS WERE SUCCESSFUL; AND
SCHMIDT HAD STATED THAT WHAT WAS NEEDED BY THE
WORLD WAS A "PARTNERSHIP FOR PEACE."

3. (LOU) BECKER'S CAREFUL PRESENTATION WAS FOLLOWED BY A TIRADE BY ZAMYATIN WHICH CLEARLY TOOK THE ASSEMBLY BY SURPRISE. THE SOVIET UNION UNDERSTOOD THE INTENTIONS OF THE U.S. LEADERSHIP ALL TOO WELL ZAMYATIN SAID; NEVER HAD ZAMYATIN SEEN AN AMERICAN ADMINISTRATION WHICH SO OVERTLY DECLARED THE SOVIET UNION WAS ITS ENEMY; BECKER'S STATEMENT THAT THE SOVIETS DID NOT UNDERSTAND THE INTENTIONS OF THE U.S. WAS "INACCURATE."

4. (U) THIS LAST STATEMENT WAS GREETED BY A MUFFLED BUT UNMISTAKABLE CHORUS OF BOOS FROM THE MEDIA REPRESENTATIVES, WHO CLEARLY INTERPRETED IT AS AN UNWARRANTED ATTACK ON BECKER AND A VIOLATION OF THE MORMAL STANDARDS OF BEHAVIOR FOR SUCH PRESS CONFERENCES. BECKER, IN REPLY, STRESSED HIS GOOD WORKING RELATIONSHIP WITH ZAMYATIM, BUT ALSO STATED THAT THE PURPOSE OF THE CONFERENCE WAS TO ALLOW BOTH SIDES TO EXPRESS THEIR VIEWS; THEREFORE, HE SAID, IT WAS INAPPROPRIATE FOR EITHER SPOKESMAN TO DESCRIBE THE VIEWS OF THE OTHER AS "INACCURATE."

HIS MOUTH, ZAMYATIN PROCEEDED TO RAM THE OTHER IN BY MISINTERPRETING A COMPLIMENT REGARDING BREZHNEY'S HEALTH AS A BACKHANDED ATTACK ON HIS CHIEF. THE NEGATIVE EFFECT OF THE INAPPROPRIATE TIRADE -- WHICH NOT MERELY EMPHASIZED BREZHNEY'S GOOD HEALTH BUT IMPLIED THAT OFFENSE HAD BEEN OFFERED BY BECKER IN EVEN RAISING THE TOPIC -- WAS OBVIOUS. BECKER QUIETLY REPLIED THAT THE REMARK HAD BEEN INTENDED AS A COMPLIMENT. WITH THAT, BT

6. (LOU) THE QUESTION PERIOD FOLLOWED, WITH ALL QUES-TIONS BUT ONE DEVOTED TO ARMS CONTROL, AND MOST OF THEM DIRECTED AT LAMPATIN. THE QUESTIONING WAS PROBING IN NATURE, WITH THE CORRESPONDENTS CLEARLY TRYING TO SEE JUST WHAT BREZHNEV WAS REALLY OFFERING IN HIS LATEST PROPOSAL. ONE REPORTER ASKED WHAT WOULD BE DONE WITH THE SS-20'S WHICH BREZHNEY OFFERED TO WITHDRAW UPON ACCEPTANCE OF HIS MORATORIUM PROPOSAL. WOULD THEY BE DESTROYED, OR JUST "PUT IN THE ICEBOX?" ZAMYATIN'S REPLY OF "NOT IN YOUR ICEBOX, ANYWAY" RECEIVED NONE OF THE APPARENTLY-INTENDED LAUGHTER. THE QUESTION WAS ASKED AGAIN BY ANOTHER REPORTER. ZAMYATIN'S REPLY WAS EVASIVE. WHEN ZAMYATIN LAUNCHED INTO THE STANDARD SOVIET PRESENTATION ON THE NEED TO INCLUDE ALL EUROPE-BASED SYSTEMS IN THE INF CALCULATION, HE CITED THE SIX POLARIS SUBMARINES COMMITTED TO NATO. BECKER REPLIED THAT HE, FOR ONE, COULD NOT SEE HOW THE SUBMARINES COULD BE INCLUDED IN THE EQUATION. SINCE IN THE SALT TREATIES THE SOVIETS HAD THEMSELVES AGREED THAT THESE SUBMARINES WERE PART OF THE U.S. STRATEGIC FORCES. ZAMYATIN'S REPLY WAS THAT HE WOULD "HAVE TO LOOK INTO THAT."

7. (C) COMMENT: THROUGH HIS EVASIVE ANSWERS TO IMPORTANT QUESTIONS ABOUT THE BREZHNEV PROPOSAL, HIS AGGRESSIVE TONE AND HIS ATTACKS ON BECKER, ZAMYATIN CLEARLY INFLICTED A SETBACK ON HIS OWN SIDE IN THE BATTLE FOR FRG PUBLIC OPINION ON INF. IF THE MEDIA REPRESENTATIVES WERE EAGER TO LEARN MORE AROUT THE LATEST SOVIET POSITION, THEIR QUESTIONS SHOWED THAT THEY WERE IN NO WAY READY TO ALLOW THE WOOL TO BE PULLED OVER THEIR EYES. THE IMPRESSION CONVEYED TO US BY ZAMYATIN'S PERFORMANCE WAS THAT THE SOVIETS REALIZE THAT PRESIDENT REAGAN WITH HIS SPEECH HAS GAINED THE INITIATIVE IN THE INF DEBATE AND ARE, RATHER DESPARATELY, UNSURE HOW TO GET IT BACK. 1. THERE FOLLOWS A BRIEF INITIAL STATEMENT/REBUTTAL OF THE JUST-RELEASED SOVIET BOOKLET, "EUROPE IN DANGER." DEPARTMENT SPOKESMAN WILL BE HANDING OUTTHIS STATEMENT ON AN "IF ASKED" BASIS AT NOON BRIEFING NOVEMBER 24 OR AFTER. ALL ACTION -ADDRESSEES SHOULD PROVIDE THIS STATEMENT TO HOST GOVERNMENTS, NOTING THE "IF ASKED" BASIS FOR ITS USAGE. (WE UNDERSTAND THAT, SO FAR, THE BOOKLET HAS NOT RECEIVED EITHER MUCH ATTENTION OR CREDIBILITY, AND WE WOULD NOT WANT TO DRAW FURTHER ATTENTION TO IT.) OUR STATEMENT IS DESIGNED TO COMPLEMENT RATHER THAN SUBSTITUTE FOR REACTIONS BY OTHER GOVERNMENTS (AS THE FRG HAS ALREADY DONE). WE INTEND TO ANALYZE THE BOOKLET MORE CLOSELY AND MAY, IF NECESSARY, PROVIDE MORE DETAILED REBUTTALS TO LESSEN THE IMPACT THE BOOKLET MIGHT HAVE-ON EUROPEAN PUBLIC OPINION, IF ANY. -SO FAR, THE BOOKLET HAS BEEN DISTRIBUTEDONLY IN THE FRG --CLEARLY DESIGNED FOR THE BREZHNEV VISIT -- BUT ADDRESSEES SHOULD BE ALERT TO ITS APPEARANCE INHOST COUNTRIES-AND-NOTIFY US BY IMMEDIATE CABLE.

BY SOVIET STANDARDS, WE FIND THE BOOKLET TO BE A FAIRLY SKILLFUL COMPENDIUM OF ARGUMENTATION ON DEFENSE ISSUES, ALTHOUGH IT IS BASICALLY ONE-SIDED AND SELF-SERVING. WITH ITS EMPHASIS ON RHETORIC RATHER THAN FACTS, IT IS CLEARLY A PROPAGANDA PIECE AND WE WILL TREAT IT AS SUCH.

WE NOTE THAT THE SOVIET UNION HAS PUBLISHED AND DISTRIBUTED IN GERMANY A BOOKLET ENTITLED "EUROPE IN DANGER." THIS BOOKLET WAS OBVIOUSLY PREPARED BEFORE PRESIDENT REAGAN'S SPEECH OF NOVEMBER 18; ITS ARGUMEN-TATION IS LARGELY RHETORICAL, ONE-SIDED AND DEVOID OF MEANINGFUL FACTS AND FIGURES. The President's speech on November 18 marked a high point in our efforts to develop a government-wide program aimed at building a more productive US-European dialogue. With its enthusiastic reception, we have gone a long way toward regaining the political high-ground in Europe. We want now to build on this momentum with further speeches, media appearances, conferences, publications and exchanges.

In planning follow-on activities, however, we are painfully aware of our discouraging lack of resources and the fact that government initiatives alone are not enough. We need to persuade select private-sector organizations and leaders to become fully engaged in our public affairs efforts in Europe.

In encouraging greater private-sector attention to US-European relations, we do not seek to create major new institutions. Rather, we wish to revitalize the whole spectrum of Atlantic links which over the years have been allowed to atrophy and which do not seem relevant to the successor generation. Our goal is to rekindle a broad public consensus for the indivisibility of US-European interests: and the vital role deterrence plays in maintaining peace; and to underline the image of American as a responsible and reliable world power.

Working with ICA, we are undertaking a coordinated program to reach out to select American leaders representing the media,

W

Congress, foreign policy experts and the religious community.

Our key objectives are to harness existing private-sector programs to compliment our own Western Offensive and to generate the additional resources for new efforts.

Your own involvement in revitalizing the Atlantic dialogue is crucial. As our efforts progress, we will ask you to participate in a number of important activities.

#### Recommendations:

As our first step, however, we recommend you approve the following:

- -- Ad Hoc Advisory Group: that you help launch our effort by designating a small, informal team of advisors able to reach out to targeted American and European audiences and to generate needed resources. If you agree, we will give you proposed list and letters to send them, urging that they join us in the effort to revitalize trans-Atlantic ties.
- 2. Conference on Trans-Atlantic Dialogue. that one of the first acts of this core group will be to help the Department organize a major conference in Washington to bring together 500 leaders of American public opinion to focus private-sector attention on this issue. Concurrent to this conference, we will work with members of your ad hoc group to design and carry out a program for improving US-European dialogue among selected audience groups -- e.g. labor, young political leaders,

- 3. Resources: that you agree to support a major fund-raising effort aimed at select US corporations and foundations organized by the US General Advisory Committee on Public Diplomacy. Your involvement would probably be limited to signing personal letters to select individuals and perhaps taking part in one or two small meetings.
- 4. Successor Generation: that you agree to appoint \_\_\_\_\_ as the USG Coordinator for dealing with Europe's successor generation problems. As you know from your meeting with State Minister Hamm-Bruecher, the Germans are particularly concerned with this problem and have asked us to appoint a senior coordinator for US-German exchange. We believe however, that appointing an overall coordinator for US-European Alliance youth affairs would have more impact and encourage other governments as well as to work with us on this problem.
- Once we announce this we propose sending our coordinator to Brussels to raise the issue of the Successor Generation at NATO and to lobby each Allied government to appoint its own coordinator and cooperate on youth programs.
- 5. Research Studies: that available internal research capabilities and funds for outside study be directed at long-term analysis of future political, economic and social trends in Europe and their implictions for US-European relations and NATO.

us to explore ways to promote the development of independent, strategic studies centers throughout the Alliance, particularly in southern Europe.

7. <u>US International Education Efforts</u>. A major stumbling bloc in building stronger US-European ties is the lack of foreign affairs training and language skills of our own citizens. Although a long-term undertaking, we recommend the Department explore ways to promote international education efforts with the Department of Education and relevant domestic non-government organizations (NGO).

### Recommendation

That you authorize us to proceed with these efforts to engage the private-sector in a trans-Atlantic dialogue.



Your Trip to Europe: February 1982

Your European trip can serve several important foreign policy objectives at a difficult stage in our relations with Europe. You could use the trip to underline our commitment to peace and security in Europe, and to serious arms control negotiations, and to reinforce the indivisibility of US-European social, economic and political interests, and to project the image of America as a responsible and reliable world power.

We have shaped a suggested itinerary around our key substantive concerns. For the late February time-frame, we suggest the following itinerary and approach:

Germany: A speech before the Wehrkunde Conference (February 12-14) in Munich could be the primary public event of your German itinerary. This is a prestigious annual meeting of US-European political-military experts and would provide an excellent platform for a major speech on security issues. A visit to Germany also should include a stop in Bonn for meetings with the Federal President. Chancellor and Foreign Minister, and a press conference. A third stop in Germany could be a visit to



Berlin, with a visit to the Berlin Wall and meetings with officials.

At the moment, the atmosphere of German-American relations suffers somewhat from a malaise brought about by many factors, including generational change in the FRG and widespread misconception of U.S. policies. There exists, however, a deep reservoir of good will for the U.S., and the President's November 18 speech has helped us to regain considerable ground. Your trip would provide a major opportunity to focus public attention on the underlying strength of the German-American relationship.

Italy: With your visit to Bonn, you will have completed the round of Paris, London and Bonn. The Italians have traditionally felt that they belong in this elite group and strongly object to any hints of a special 4-power "directorate" within the Alliance. Consequently, a visit to Italy--where you could meet with top Italian officials and the Pope--is desirable. The Italians continue to provide strong support for the NATO INF decision, and their continued involvement is crucial to keeping the Germans on board with modernization. They also have agreed, with other European participants, to a role in the Sinai peacekeeping force. Your visit would indicate our appreciation of their efforts and of their important role in

the Mediterranean and the Alliance.

Belgium vs. the Netherlands: Either country could usefully be included in your schedule, but on balance we strongly recommend that you stop in Belgium. By February, Belgium should have a new government with which we will want to reinforce the importance we attach to the Belgian contribution to NATO, particularly the continuation of Belgium's INF deployment preparations. In addition, Belgium will be the EC President (January-June 1982) and responsible for maintaining the increasingly important US-EC consultative mechanism. Finally, a visit to Belgium will allow you to call at NATO, SHAPE and the EC Commission.

Alternatively, you could stop in the <u>Netherlands</u>. We have major problems with anti-nuclear sentiment throughout Western Europe, but this is especially pronounced in the Netherlands. You would probably face hostile demonstrations, but this cannot be ruled out in other NATO countries as well. The Dutch Government has postponed a promised decision on INF deployment and is seeking to reduce its other NATO nuclear tasks. We have attempted to show the Dutch that their relationship with us is affected by these actions, primarily by giving more attention to neighboring Belgium which is moving to deploy INF. A visit would fit in with the celebration in 1982 of the Bicentennial of US-Dutch

relations, but is not indispensible in that context since the President already has agreed to host the Queen for a State Visit in April.

European Parliament-Strasbourg, France: Although we have serious trade and economic problems with Europe, these should not overshadow productive politicial relations with the EC. In this context, it would be extremely useful for you as President of the Senate to address the European Parliament (EP) in Strasbourg during February 15-20. This body, reflecting the growing anti-nuclear sentiments of its broad constituency, is increasingly concerned with East/West relations and security issues. A major speech by you highlighting our cooperation on such questions as Poland and Afghanistan, acknowledging the European Parliament's efforts on these issues, and underlining US efforts to promote serious arms control and improved US/Soviet relations--would contribute to US-European cooperation on these issues. Your appearance also would build on a recent series of high-level exchanges including the November US-EC consulations in Washington, the Secretary's December 11 call on President Thorn by the Secretary, Baldrige, Block and Trade Representative Brock, and the upcoming US Congress-EP exchange scheduled for January in Brussels and the Hague -- led on the US side by Congressman Lantos.

Norway: Our relationship with the new Conservative government is off to an excellent start. The President telephoned Prime Minister Willoch soon after he took office, and the Prime Minister instructed Foreign Minister Stray to come to the U.S. immediately thereafter. You received Stray during his visit last month, and a trip by you to Norway would help strengthen the ties we have already developed with the new government of this pivotal NATO country. Further, in the wake of the President's speech and the Soviet Submarine incident in Sweden, this should be a ripe time for a high level visit to Scandinavia.

#### Poland/Romania:

A stop in Eastern Europe would also be important, both in its own right and in terms of its effect on Western European opinion.

We recommend --

We want to work closely with your staff to make this trip a major success. We need your views on the overall schedule and then will help with concrete planning. In particular, we would like to begin work on two major speeches for you to consider delivering in Europe.

ACTIVE HEASURES INFORM CONSULS REF: STATE 28758

- 2. SUMMARY: THIS TELEGRAM SPELLS OUT HOW THE ADMINISTRA-TION PROPOSES TO IMPLEMENT THE DIPLOMATIC AND PUBLIC INFORMATION ASPECTS OF ITS PROGRAM OF COUNTERING SOVIET ACTIVE MEASURES DISCUSSED IN EARLIER MESSAGES. END SUMMARY
- 3. AS ONE IMPORTANT ELEMENT IN THE USG'S CAMPAIGN TO MAINTAIN THE POLITICAL OFFENSIVE IN RELATIONS WITH THE SOVIET UNION. WE WANT TO INTENSIFY EFFORTS TO HEIGHTEN THE AWARENESS OF NATIONS AND PUBLICS REGARDING THE SOVIET UNION'S USE OF "ACTIVE MEASURES" AS A POLICY INSTRUMENT TO UNDERMINE THE RELATIONSHIPS BETWEEN THE US AND ITS FRIENDS AND GENERALLY WEAKEN THE WESTERN SYSTEM.
- 4. THE ADMINISTRATION BELIEVES THAT A VIGOROUS, CREDIBLE DIPLOMATIC AND PUBLIC AFFAIRS EFFORT TO SPOTLIGHT SOVIET MISCONDUCT WHEN IT IS EXPOSED - AS IT OFTEN IS - WILL HELP TO REDUCE THE ADVANTAGE THE SOVIETS CAN GAIN FROM ACTIVE MEASURES CAMPAIGNS.
- 5. IN WASHINGTON, THE INTERAGENCY WORKING GROUP ON ACTIVE MEASURES WITH PARTICIPATION BY STATE, CIA, THE FBI, USICA AND THE NSC HAS OVERALL RESPONSIBILITY FOR COORDI-MATING THE DIPLOMATIC AND PUBLIC INFORMATION COUNTER-OFFENSIVE. EACH GEOGRAPHIC BUREAU IN STATE WILL BE ESTABLISHING A CONTACT POINT ON ACTIVE MEASURES. THE STRATEGY OUTLINED BELOW WAS DEVELOPED ON THE BASIS OF SEVERAL MONTHS EXPERIENCE OF THE WORKING GROUP -HICH INCLUDED THE CLASSIFIED INTELLIGENCE COMMUNITY STUDY ON

ACTIVE MEASURES RELEASED IN AUGUST, THE STATE DEPARTMENT OCTOBER UNCLASSIFIED SPECIAL REPORT, AND DISCUSSIONS IN OCTOBER - NOVEMBER AT NATO AND IN EIGHT WEST EUROPEAN CAPITALS BY AN INTERAGENCY ACTIVE MEASURES TEAM.

- 6. THE STRATEGY SEEKS TO ACCOMPLISH OUR GOALS AS FOLLOWS:
- A. RAPID AND COMPREHENSIVE FIELD REPORTING ON ACTIVE MEASURES INCIDENTS WHEN THEY SURFACE OR APPEAR TO SURFACE (THIS IS DISCUSSED IN GREATER DETAIL BELOW).
- B. FOLLOWING QUICK ANALYSIS OF FIELD REPORTS. A DECISION BY THE WORKING GROUP ON WHETHER TO EXPLOIT THE INCIDENT AS A TARGET OF OPPORTUNITY. NORMALLY IN SUCH CASES. USICA WILL HAVE RESPONSIBILITY FOR PREPARING WIRELESS FILE, USINFO, OR OTHER PRESS MATERIAL, HOPEFULLY WITHIN 48 HOURS OF THE REPORTED ACTIVE MEASURES INCIDENTS. (RECENT EXAMPLES WOULD BE THE EARLY NOVEMBER EXPULSION OF A KGB OFFICER FROM DENMARK FOR UNACCEPTABLE COVERT ACTIVITIES AND THE SURFACING OF A FORGED LETTER FROM PRESIDENT REAGAN TO THE KING OF SPAIN).
- C. RE LONGER-TERM TRENDS. THE WORKING GROUP WILL COORDINATE:
- -- PERIODIC CLASSIFIED TREND REVIEWS OF ACTIVE MEASURES DEVELOPMENTS TO BE PREPARED BY THE INTELLIGENCE COMMUNITY. THESE WILL PROVIDE THE BASIS FOR FURTHER DISCUSSIONS IN NATO AND FRIENDLY GOVERNMENTS IN DIPLOMATIC AND

INTELLIGENCE LIAISON CHANNELS AS APPROPRIATE. (COMMENT: THE RECEPTION TO THE CLASSIFIED STUDY FINISHED IN SEPTEMBER WAS POSITIVE BOTH BILATERALLY AND IN NATO WHERE THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE (INTERNAL SECURITY) IN ITS MID-NOVEMBER SESSION APPROVED THE REPORT WITH MINOR MODIFICA-33 16 TIONS AND - AS THE US URGED - RECOMMENDED THAT THE NATO POLITICAL COMMITTEE FURTHER CONSIDER THE POLITICAL AND PUBLIC AFFAIRS RAMIFICATIONS.)

- -- PERIODIC UNCLASSIFIED USG REPORTS. THESE WILL EITHER REVIEW TRENDS IN ACTIVE MEASURES ACTIVITIES OR FOCUS ON SPECIFIC TOPICS IN GREATER DETAIL, I.E., FORGERIES, FRONT GROUPS, KGB EXPULSIONS, ETC.
- D. FOLLOW-THROUGH WORK, PRIMARILY IN THE FIELD, WILL INVOLVE:
- -- AGGRESSIVE PLACEMENT WORK BY USIA OFFICERS OF WIRELESS FILE, USINFO OR OTHER PRESS ORIENTED MATERIAL AND ANY SPECIAL STUDIES SUPPLIED BY STATE;
- -- BACKGROUNDING BY STATE OF THE US AND FOREIGN PRESS IN WASHINGTON WHEN NEWSWORTHY ITEMS APPEAR;
- -- PERIODIC CONSULTATION IN NATO, WITH FRIENDLY GOVERN-MENTS AND INTELLIGENCE SERVICES TO ENCOURAGE FRIENDLY GOVERNMENTS TO REACT MORE VIGOROUSLY IN PUBLICIZING SOVIET MISDEEDS, AND TO IMPLEMENT THE PRINCIPLE OF RECIPROCITY MORE FIRMLY IN DIPLOMATIC DEALINGS WITH THE SOVIETS. (SEPARATE MESSAGE WILL DEAL WITH THIS QUESTION).
- 7. WE REALIZE THAT THIS STRATEGY IS ONE FOR THE LONGER TERM. WHILE DRAMATIC SPY STORIES ATTRACT HEADLINES, EXPOSING THE NITTY GRITTY OF ACTIVE MEASURES IS LESS EYE-CATCHING BUT STILL, IN OUR VIEW, NEWSWORTHY, PROVIDED WE FOLLOW A PERSISTENT, NON-POLEMIC APPROACH SUPPORTED BY CONTINUING FLOW OF FACTUAL MATERIAL ON WHAT THE SOVIETS AND THEIR PROXIES ARE UP TO. WE RECOGNIZE THAT NOT ALL MANIFESTATIONS OF UNHELPFUL ATTITUDES (I.E., THE

PEACE MOVEMENT IN VARIOUS WEST EUROPEAN GOUNTRIES) ARE SOVIET INSPIRED. MOSCOW NONETHELESS ATTEMPTS TO TAKE ADVANTAGE OF THESE SITUATIONS BY MANIPULATING AND AMPLIFYING ANTI-WESTERN ATTITUDES THROUGH VIGOROUS ACTIVE MEASURES EFFORTS.

- 8. AS EXPLAINED ABOVE, THE SUCCESS OF OUR STRATEGY WILL DEPEND HEAVILY ON FIELD REPORTING. IN MANY CASES WE WILL NOT KNOW WHAT HAS HAPPENED UNLESS YOU TELL US AND IN CONSIDERABLE DETAIL. SPOT REPORTING ON SPECIFIC ACTIVE MEASURES INCIDENTS IS ESSENTIAL TO THE EFFORT. PERIODIC ANALYSIS OF HOW SOVIET FOREIGN POLICY GOALS ARE SUPPORTED BY ACTIVE MEASURES TECHNIQUES IS ALSO OF GREAT INTEREST.
- COUNTRY TEAM RESPONSIBILITY WITH EACH MISSION UNDER YOUR LEADERSHIP DEVELOPING AN APPROPRIATE MECHANISM TO COORDINATE REPORTING AND TO ASSURE A DIVISION OF LABOR AMONG COUNTRY TEAM ELEMENTS. TO FACILITATE WASHINGTON DISTRIBUTION OF REPORTING ON ACTIVE MEASURES, IT IS ESSENTIAL THAT MESSAGES ARE PROPERLY TAGGED (PROP, AND UR AT A MINIMUM) AND THAT THE SUBJECT LINE ON ALL REPEAT ALL MESSAGES BEGIN: SOVIET (OR SOVIET PROXY) ACTIVE MEASURES: ... MESSAGES ON ACTIVE MEASURES WHETHER PREPARED BY USIA OR STATE OFFICERS SHOULD BE TRANSMITTED AS STATE TELEGRAMS WITH USIA AS AN INFO ADDRESSEE AND SLUGGED: ATTN PMG/G. THIS IS NECESSARY TO ENSURE FULL AND RAPID DISTRIBUTION IN WASHINGTON.
- 18. THE FOLLOWING TOPICS ILLUSTRATE WHAT TYPE OF RE-PORTING WE WOULD FIND USEFUL:

FORGERIES: FORGED DOCUMENTS ARE A STAPLE ELEMENT OF SOVIET DIRTY TRICKS. WE ARE AWARE OF AT LEAST & EFFORTS WHICH HAVE SURFACED IN THE LAST TWO MONTHS. SOME LIKE THE SO-CALLED HOLOCAUST DOCUMENT AND FIELD MANUAL 38-318 HAVE BEEN USED REPEAR; TEDLY, AND WE PLAN TO PROVIDE BACKGROUND MATERIAL AND GUIDANCE FOR HANDLING THESE RECURRENT FRAUDS. WHEN AN APPARENT NEW FORGERY SURFACES, WE NEED COMPLETE REPORTING INCLUDING ITS TEXT AND CIRCUMSTANCES SURROUNDING ITS SURFACING SO THAT WE CAN PROMPTLY PROVIDE INSTRUCTIONS FOR AUTHORI: ATIVEDENTAL ANDINSOME CASES IDENTIFICATION OF ITS PROBABLE SOURCE. AFTER THE INITIAL CABLE REPORT, THE FORGERY ITSELF OR A COPY TOGETHER WITH THE ENVELOPE OR RELATED MATERIALS SHOULD BE SENT TO WASHINGTON VIA PARS OR ADDRESSED TO INR/INC FOR TRANSMISSION TO PARS TO ASSURE PROPER TECHNICAL ANALYSIS.

DISINFORMATION: DISINFORMATION IS ANOTHER ACTIVE MEASURES STAPLE AND CAN TAKE MANY FORMS. A TYPICAL EX-AMPLE WAS A REPORT ON RADIO MOSCOW OF "MASS PROTEST DEMONSTRATIONS" ON THE OCCASION OF THE VISIT OF THE NAMIBIA CONTACT GROUP TO LUANDA, ANGOLA IN OCTOBER 1981. NO SUCH DEMONSTRATIONS OCCURRED. WE NEED PROMPT REPORTING WHEN INSTANCES OF POSSIBLE DISINFORMATION OCCUR. OF SPECIAL INTEREST ARE CASES WHEN THIS TYPE OF ACTIVE MEASURE FIRST SURFACES IN NOMINALLY NON-COMMUNIST MEDIA. THE CIRCUMSTANCES UNDER WHICH DISINFORMATION FIRST APPEARS AND ANY INDICATIONS OF ITS PROBABLE ORIGINARE OF SPECIAL INTEREST. RUMOR CAMPAIGNS AND MEDIA REFERENCES TO DOCUMENTS WHICH ARE NOT AVAILABLE FOR EXAMINATION ARE TYPICAL VARIANTS OF DISINFORMATION TECHNIQUES. REPORTING ON THE CREDIBILITY ACCORDED SPECIFIC DISINFORMATION EFFORTS IS ALSO IMPORTANT. EXPULSIONS OF BLOC OFFICIALS: THE CIRCUMSTANCES SURROUNDING THE EXPULSION OF SOVIET BLOC OFFICIALS OFTEN SHED SIGNIFICANT LIGHT ON ACTIVE MEASURES OPERATIONS. THE FREQUENCY OF THESE OCCURRENCES -- 161 PUBLICIZED EXPULSIONS OF SOVIET OFFICIALS BETWEEN JANUARY 1988 AND SEPTEMBER 1981, FOR EXAMPLE -- IS A GRAPHIC. MEASURE OF THE SCOPE OF SOVIET MISCONDUCT, MUCH OF IT IN THE ACTIVE MEASURES AREA. IF QUIET EXPULSIONS AND UNPUBLICIZED PREMATURE DEPARTURES ARE INCLUDED THE NUMBER WOULD BE MUCH LARGER. MOREOVER, THESE EVENTS AND FREQUENTLY RELATED ARREST OF LOCAL COLLABORATORS ARE A PRIME SOURCE OF INFORMATION ON "AGENT OF INFLUENCE" OPERATIONS, MEDIA MANIPULATIONS, FRONT OPERATIONS AND OTHER DIFFICULT TO TRACK TYPES OF ACTIVE MEASURES. AN EXAMPLE IS THE RECENT DANISH EXPULSION OF A SOVIET "DIPLOMAT" FOR TRYING TO SUBORN MEDIA AND FUND FRONT ORGANIZATIONS TO SPUR THE DANISH PEACE MOVEMENT.

MEDIA MANIPULATIONS: IT WOULD BE HELPFUL TO HAVE MORE INFORMATION -- BIOGRAPHIC INFORMATION ON EDITORS, FINANCES, ETC., -- ON OSTENSIBLY NON-COMMUNIST PUBLICATIONS THAT LEND THEMSELVES, WITTINGLY OR UNWITTINGLY, TO PASSING SOVIET DISINFORMATION. WE WOULD LIKE TO WORK TOGETHER WITH FIELD MISSIONS TO DEVELOP BETTER METHODS TO PUBLICIZE THESE VEHICLES OF ACTIVE MEASURES OPERATIONS.

FRONT GROUPS: THE SOVIET UNION, AS A STANDARD PRACTICE, USE INDIGENOUS ORGANIZATIONS TO CARRY OUT ACTIVITIES ON ITS BEHALF. THE MEANS USED TO INFLUENCE THESE FRONTS RANGE FROM STRAIGHT-FORWARD, IF UNADMITTED,

CONTROL TO SUBTLE MANIPULATION OF UNWITTING LEGITIMATE NON-COMMUNIST ORGANIZATIONS. WE HAVE ADEQUATE INFORMATION ON MAJOR SOVIET-DOMINATED MASTER FRONTS SUCH AS THE WORLD PEACE COUNCIL AND THE INTERNATIONAL ORGANIZATION OF JOURNALISTS, AND WILL PROVIDE MORE BACK-GROUND TO THE FIELD. WE LACK, HOWEVER, A FULL UNDERSTANDING IN MOST COUNTRIES OF NATIONAL ORGANIZATIONS THAT ARE INDIRECTLY CONTROLLED BY THE SOVIET UNION OR ARE FREQUENTLY SUSCEPTIBLE TO MOSCOM'S INFLUENCE. REPORTING THAT ILLUMINATES THE STRUCTURE OF THESE ORGANIZATIONS. THEIR CONTRIBUTION TO SOVIET INFLUENCE IN THE

HOST COUNTRY, AND HOW THE SOVIETS MANIPULATE THEM IS NEEDED.

- 11. OUR ANALYSIS OF THE ACTIVE MEASURE PHENOMENA SHOWS THAT CONTROL IS USUALLY BY THE SOVIET UNION. THE PRIMARY FOCUS IN OUR EFFORTS TO COUNTER THESE ACTIVITIES IS THEREFORE ON THE SOVIETS. NEVERTHELESS, EASTERN EUROPEAN COUNTRIES AND CUBA PLAY A CLOSELY ORCHESTRATED ROLE IN MANY ACTIVE MEASURES CAMPAIGNS. CUBA HAS A LEADING ROLE IN ACTIVE MEASURES DIRECTED AT THE NON-ALIGNED MOVEMENT AND LATIN AMERICA. IT WOULD BE INAPPROPRIATE, THEREFORE, TO IGNORE THESE PROXY EFFORTS. ESPECIALLY IN LATIN AMERICA, REPORTING ON ACTIVE MEASURES SHOULD HIGHLIGHT THE CUBAN ROLE FOLLOWING THE PROCEDURES NOTED ABOVE.
- 12. ACTIVITIES DESCRIBED IN THIS MESSAGE FOR COUNTERING SOVIET ACTIVE MEASURES ARE COMPLEMENTARY TO THOSE UNDERTAKEN BY THE INTERAGENCY WORKING GROUP ON PROJECT TRUTH HEADED BY USICA. THE SOVIET PROPAGANDA ALERT AND FAST RESPONSE ALERT SERVICE PROVIDED BY USICA WILL DEAL WITH PUBLIC ANTI-US CHARGES AND PROPAGANOA. THE ACTIVITIES COVERED IN THIS MESSAGE WILL DEAL WITH SOVIET ACTIVE MEASURES WHICH ARE OFTEN COVERT IN CHARACTER. OUR PUBLIC RESPONSE TO SOME SOVIET ACTIVE
