I have just received a heads up from the Department of Defense that the European Bureau of the Department of State sent forward a dissent memorandum to Ken Dam on 29 May. I further understand informally that Bill Schneider is sending forward a more positive statement. DOD advises me that they have been in informal discussion with 7 of the 8 embassies and the reaction is "generally supportive but they need to know more." I state this simply to indicate that we are on solid ground in urging the Department of State to think positively about this proposal. I feel strongly about it and was one of the early sponsors of the idea last year. If you could place a call to Ken Dam within the next two days it would be helpful in insuring that this constructive public diplomacy proposal is given a "positive look" rather than a quick rejection.

Done. Ken did to bound he anything about it. He said he would look into it and that he thought it could be assolved.

DOD-Sponsored Seminar in Europe

The Department of Defense has been using part of its public diplomacy monies to sponsor select seminars in Europe and Asia. These have been competently managed conferences with no flaps. Partially as a result of suggestions from Frank Barnett, of the National Strategy Information Center, and from me, DOD has been seeking to develop one or a series of conferences in Western Europe involving Reserve Officers. It was our contention that Reserve Officers represented an important politically relevant group to reach in terms of NATO, European security, and related arms control issues. The Department of Defense is now working directly with the Reserve Officers Association (ROA) to help develop this program in Europe. President of ROA, General Milner Roberts, met recently with the President, who encouraged him to be active in trying to generate support for the Administration's defense policies. Milner Roberts believes that the seminar programs in Europe could be a very productive step to help carry out the President's wish.

Despite enthusiasm from the NSC and positive reaction from selected embassies, the Department of State in Washington is very negative about the operational proposal. They believe that a series of seminars involving Reserve Officers in Europe may be counterproductive, may be resented by certain defense ministeries in Europe, and is difficult to accomplish because "Reservists" are "politically sensitive groups." DOD has assured all of us that they will conduct no seminars without the approval of the American Embassies and the local authorities. They will also carefully vett the program and the speakers with the Department of State and the American Embassies concerned. I think the hangup is somewhat parochial and institutional and may reflect a bias that DOD cannot do the job. I unofficially understand that State/EUR will be sending a negative memo forward to Ken Dam. I think these State concerns are unwarranted and that DOD should be authorized to proceed forward with the planning.

A conference on "Europe in Soviet Global Strategy and Policy" was held in Rome 15-17 May. The American delegation included: General Stilwell, OSD; Ray Cline and Yonah Alexander from Georgetown University; Roger Kanet from the University of Illinois; Stefan Halper, former Deputy Assistant Secretary for Political-Military Affairs at State; Jim Miller, colleague of Ray Cline; and Ray Warren, OSD. The conference was exceptionally well attended with over 200 persons attending the opening session. Representatives of all political parties, except the Communist Party, attended and participated in the conference. There were excellent substantive contributions from both the Italian and American participants on Soviet strategy, the Soviet connection with and exploitation of terrorism, the economic dimension of Soviet strategy, and the effect of Soviet involvement in the Third World on the resource needs of Europe. We had excellent cooperation from the Italians and were provided with superb facilities. The conference was co-hosted by the Institute of European Studies "Alcide de Gasperi," a prestigious Italian academic institution. While there were some administrative deficiencies, especially with regard to allowing sufficient time for audience participation, this initial effort by Cline in Europe is judged to have been a success.

This is the fifth DoD sponsored conference held this year: A University of Miami conference on Cuban/Soviet Strategy in Central American was held in Costa Rica February 12-14; a Hudson Institute conference on Soviet maritime power was held in London February 16; a Ray Cline conference on Soviet strategy in Asia was held in Tokyo on March 14; and a University of Illinois conference on the India/Pakistan regional security problem was held in Champaign, Illinois on May 7-3.

TWO MEXICAN ACADEMICIANS EXPOUNDED THE MEXICAN VIEW OF CENTRAL AMERICA; WHILE THE AUDIENCE WAS UNSYMPATHETIC. THEIR PARTICI-PATION AND THE DEBATE CONTRIBUTED TO THE SEMINAR. THE MOST IMPRESSIVE PRESENTATION -- ENTHUSIASTICALLY
PRAISED BY DOMINICANS ATTENDING THE SEMINAR -- WAS BY COLOMBIAN GENERAL ALVARO VALENCIA TOVAR, DESCRIBING COMMUNIST REVOLUTIONARY TACTICS IN DIRECT, VICID DETAIL. THE PRESENTATION OF GEORGETOWN PROFESSOR LUIS AGUILAR ON CUBA'S REVOLUTIONARY STRATEGY ALSO WON SPECIAL PRAISE. BT

1. (U) SUMMARY: ORGANIZED AND SPONSORED BY THE INSTITUTE OF INTERAMERICAN STUDIES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF MIAMI, A SEMINAR ON "STRATEGIC CHALLENGES TO REGIONAL SECURITY" WAS HELD IN SANTO DOMINGO SEPTEMBER 5-7. THE PRINCIPAL THEME OF THE SEMINAR WAS SOVIET AND CUBAN POLICIES AND ACTIVITIES IN THE CARIBBEAN AND IN CENTRAL AMERICA. MOST OF THE SPEAKERS WERE PROMINENT GOVERNMENT OR ACADEMIC FIGURES FROM OUTSIDE THE DOMINICAN REPUBLIC. SOME 20-30 FOREIGN GUESTS ATTENDED THE SEMINAR. ILONG WITH WELL OVER 100 INVITED DOMINICAN PARTICIPANTS. MEDIA COVERAGE OF THE SEMINAR WAS HEAVY; A SMALLO PORTION OF PRESS COMMENTARY WAS CRITICAL. BUT IN GENEOAL THE SEMINAR WAS WELL TREATED IN THE PRESS. PARTICIPANT REACTION WAS STRONGLY FAVORABLE. THE SEMINAR WAS MOTEWORTHY LOCALLY AS THE FIRST SUCH PUBLIC EVENT TO EXPOUND FACTUAL, COGENT CRITICISM OF COMMUNIST REVOLUTIONARY ACTIVITIES IN THE REGION. WE JUDGE THE SEMINAR A SUCCESS IN EDUCATING AN INTERESTED DOMINICAN AUDIENCE AND THROUGH THE IMPACT OF ITS MEDIA COVERAGEPM FOLLOW-UP ACTIVITY -- USE OF VIDEO TAPES AND PUBLICATION OF THE SEMINAR PROCEEDINGS -- WILL REINFORCE ITS EFFECT. END SUMMARY.

2. (U) THE SEMINAR'S TONE WAS SET BY THE KEYNOTE ADDRESS OF GONZALO FACIG. THE FORMER FOREIGN MINISTER OF COSTA RICA. SPEAKING AT THE OPENING DINNER SEPTEMBER 5. FACIO MADE A HARD-HITTING EXPOSITION OF SOVIET STRATEGIC INTEREST IN THE CENTRAL AMERICAN CONFLICT. HE TOOK THE OCCASION TO SHARPLY CRITICIZE THE SOCIALIST INTERNATIONAL (SI) FOR ITS SUPPORT OF THE SANDINISTA REGIME AND THE SALVADORAN GUERRILLAS THOSE REMARKS IN PARTICULAR PROMPTED SUBSEQUENT PUBLIC (AND PRIVATE) CRITICISM, IN LIGHT OF THE ACTIVE MEMBERSHIP OF THE GOVERNMENT PARTY (PRO) IN THE SOCIALIST INTERNATIONAL. SI VICE PRESIDENT JOSE FRANCISCO PENA GOMEZ PUBLICLY ATTACKED FACIO FOR ALLEGED LACK OF COURTESY AS WELL AS MISREPRESENTATION OF THE SI'S POSITION. THE MINOR CONTROVERSY OVER THIS POINT SERVED TO ASSURE EVEN FULLER MEDIA COVERAGE OF SUBSEQUENT SEMINAR PRESENTATIONS AND DEBATE.

4. (U) THE SEMINAR'S IMPACT ON DOMINICAN ATTITUDES HAS BEEN SUBSTANTIAL. PROMINENT DOMINICANS SERVED AS MODERATORS AND TWO OF THE FIFTEEN PRESENTATIONS WERE MADE BY DOMINICANS. WELL OVER ONE HUNDRED DOMINICANS ATTENDED THE SEMINAR AS INVITED GUESTS, ALONG WITH 20-30 MEMBERS OF THE AUDIENCE FROM OUTSIDE THE COUNTRY. WHILE THE MAJLUTA-FACTION OF THE PRD SENT A HANDFUL OF TOP FIGURES, OTHER ELEMENTS IN THE PRO AND GOVERNMENT OFFICIALT NEITHER ATTENDED SEMINAR SESSIONS NOR THE EVENING SOCIAL FUNCTIONS. THE SEMINAR THUS SERVED TO EDUCATE AND STIMULATE A GENERALLY SYMPATHETIC DOMINICAN AUDIENCE, WHO CAN BE EXPECTED TO REPEAT AND EXPOUND ON THE SEMINAR'S MATERIAL.

5. (U) THIS DIRECT EFFECT WAS MULTIPLIED BY THE HEAVY MEDIA COVERAGE THE SEMINAR PRESENTATIONS RECEIVED. THE NUMBER OF NEWS STORIES, COMMENTARIES AND REACTION REPORTS RAN FROM FIVE TO TEN DAILY DURING THE SEMINAR AND FOR SEVERAL DAYS AFTERWARDS. PRESS ACCOUNTS WHICH INCLUDED FRONT PAGE AND PHOTO COVERAGE, WERE SYMPATHETIC. ALTHOUGH ON OCCASION GIVING SPECIAL PLAY TO CONTROVERSIAL SIDE COMMENTS IC THE DEBATES. LEFTIST COMMENTATORS AND SOME PRESS COMMENT DENIGRATED THE SEMINAR'S ANTI-COMMUNISM, OUT OTHER COMMENTATORS DEFENDED THE RIGHT OF ALL VIEWS, NOT JUST CRO-REVOLUTIONARY, TO BE EXPRESSED OPENLY AND

6. (U) WE EXPECT THAT THE SEMINAR WILL HAVE A FURTHER LOCAL IMPACT THROUGH BORADCAST OF THE VIDEO TAPES AND EVENTUAL DISTRIBUTION TO ALL PARTICIPANTS AND OTHERS OF THE BOOK CONTAINING THE PRESENTATIONS AND DEBATES.

7. (C) IN HIS LETTER OF INVITATION TO PROSPECTIVE PARTICIPANTS, SEMINAR ORGANIZER PROFESSOR JAIME SUCHLICKI INCLUDED THE STATEMENT, "THE DEPARTMENT OF DEFENSE OF THE UNITED STATES HAS GIVEN FINANCIAL SUPPORT TO THIS PROJECT..." WHILE THIS WAS REPEATED IN AN EARLY PRESS STORY ON THE SEMINAR, USG SUPPORT FOR THE EVENT NEVER BECAME A CONTROVERSIAL MATTE. IN THE DOMINICAN CONTEXT, SPONSORSHIP BY A U.S. UNIVERSITY AND THE AMBASSADOR'S RECEPTION FOR ALL PARTICIPANTS IMPLIED A USG BENEVOLENCE WITHOUT A DIRECTING HAND. USIS ACTIVELY SUPPORTED THE CONFERENCE AND WITH THE EMBASSY PROVIDED ASSISTANCE IN CONTACTS WITH DOMINICAN SPEAKERS, MODERATORS AND PARTICIPANTS AND IN SOME LOGISTICAL ASPECTS.
