

Through affiliations with the International Chamber of Commerce, the Business and Industry Advisory Committee to the OECD, and the International Organization of Employers, the Council represents U.S. business in intergovernmental organizations, such as the U.N. and its economic agencies, the OECD and the ILO.

The U.S. Council urges the rapid adoption of the IMF quota increase legislation, preferably without several amendments which have been attached in the Congress that would be counter-productive through constricting the capability of U.S. banks to continue necessary financing of trade and development.

The U.S. Council has expressed and will continue to express its views to the Congress.

U.S. Council for International Business Statement on the IMF Quota Increase

There is a clear and urgent need for the United States to provide its share of the agreed quota increase to the International Monetary Fund. The United States and the other 145 member countries have agreed to act on this issue by the end of November. Any delay would threaten the economic recovery now under way, further stifle world trade, and endanger the stability of international financial markets. At stake are millions of jobs in this country and abroad.

The IMF fulfills a vital and well recognized function in the world economy as a forum for international policy discussions, as a force towards a liberal world trade and financial system, and by providing temporary financial assistance to countries with balance of payments problems. If the institution is to continue to fulfill these functions, there is an immediate need to restore the adequacy of its financial resources in terms of the long-range growth of the world economy. In a dynamic world economy, temporary external financial imbalances will always occur and it is therefore necessary to provide for growth in the IMF's financial resources to parallel the long-term growth of world trade.

The severe economic strains experienced by many countries during the last few years have resulted in increasing requests for financial assistance from the IMF. The commitments made by the organization in support of economic adjustment programs by member countries have so severely strained its liquidity position that recently the IMF negotiations on new commitments had to be suspended temporarily. If the international adjustment process is not to be severely disrupted, additional financial resources must be made available now. The enactment of the IMF quota increase is therefore a matter of the highest urgency.

However, the IMF quota legislation, as passed by the U.S. House of Representatives (H.R. 2957), contains numerous amendments that are counterproductive and should be eliminated from the legislation. These amendments would severely damage the ability of U.S. business to compete in international markets, endanger the U.S. economic recovery now under way, and lead to the loss of numerous American jobs. Already the U.S. is running a trade deficit of about \$70 billion per year. By making it more difficult for American exporters to obtain export financing from U.S. banks, the amendments would impair the capacity of American companies to compete in export markets. In addition, new limitations placed upon banks would impair their capability to finance U.S. investments in projects abroad and would foreclose many earnings opportunities for U.S. business. As passed by the House, the legislation would also provide for the creation of a vast new Federal bureaucracy to monitor the terms and conditions of all foreign loans

made by U.S. banks--loans that are already regularly scrutinized by the bank examiners.

As drafted, the legislation would hamper private foreign investment, trade, and finance while increasing governmental involvement. This runs counter to the spirit of the goals enunciated by the Congress and the Administration as well as the principles embodied in the IMF's charter: namely to work towards increasing the freedom of international trade, investment, and finance in order to enhance global economic productivity and prosperity.

The U.S. Council for International Business therefore urges the swift passage of the IMF quota legislation without the counter-productive amendments that are contrary to the best interests of the United States.



You asked me early this morning about a reported 2 million piece mailing in opposition to a Supplemental Appropriation to the International Monetary Fund.

I did not have to raise this question at a meeting with conservatives this morning. Neal Blair, of "Free the Eagle" a national lobby headed by Howard Ruff spoke at length on this topic.

It was not the Moral Majority, but "Free the Eagle" which has already mailed 2 million letters to generate grass roots opposition to additional International Monetary Fund funding. Howard Ruff sent an additional 200,000 mailgrams out today on this subject.

A diverse coalition including conservative Republican Congressmen Tom Corcoran and Newt Gingrich, liberal Democratic Congressman Henry Gonzales and Ralph Nader are in the coalition against this bill.

Apparently former Treasury Secretary Bill Simon last week described the arguments in favor of the IMF Bill as "absolutely nonsense."

Paul Weyrich told the group that this IMF bail-out is being pushed by the "same crowd that put the President out in front on the withholding tax battle." It appears that there is a pretty solid conservative movement consensus against the proposal.

RESOLUTION SUPPORTING LIMITATION ON INTERNATIONAL MONETARY FUND
LOANS TO DEVELOPING COUNTRIES

WHEREAS, The United States is being asked to increase its contribution to the International Monetary Fund (IMF) by \$8.4 billion as a taxpayer bailout for international banks which have made "imprudent" loans to developing nations already heavily in debt, with sharply different versions having passed the House and the Senate with the Gramm amendment in the House forbidding loans to "communist dictatorships."

WHEREAS, Commercial banks lend four times as much money to developing countries as the IMF does and by the end of 1982 the nine largest U. S. banks, with total capital assets of \$24 billion, had loaned \$60.3 billion to 40 major non-OPEC countries (\$30 billion of this to Mexico, Brazil and Argentina alone), such loans amounting to 222 percent of their total capital, and

WHEREAS, 20 percent of the 1525 employees of IMF make more than \$100,000 per year in salaries and benefits with top grade employees receiving almost \$159,000.

RESOLVED, That the 450 members of the Public Affairs Luncheon Club, this 17th day of October 1983, acting as individuals, oppose any increase of tax funds to IMF and instead support IMF limitation of loans to debtor nations, and

RESOLVED, That copies of this resolution be sent to President Ronald Reagan and the Texas delegation in Congress.
