Identical letter Jacentical JAB When the Supplemental Appropriations bill is considered by the full Senate tomorrow, I intend to offer an amendment to add \$5 million for "Grants for construction of academic facilities" under part B of title VII of the Higher Education Act of 1965. Once the Congress has allocated this \$5 million, Secretary of Education Bell has advised that he will use this funding to complete a transaction under which the Provident Mutual Insurance Company will make a gift of properties worth approximately \$40 million to Lincoln University and Cheyney University which are two black universities located in southeastern Pennsylvania.

It is indispensable that the \$5 million appropriation be made immediately as a precondition of the \$40 million gift from Provident Mutual to Chevney or Lincoln. If the transaction is not completed immediately, then Provident Mutual must make an alternative gift for the end of the calendar year.

The late availability of this potential gift prevented the U.S. Department of Education from processing this appropriation request in normal course. Secretary Bell placed the call to me on September 27 while the Appropriations Committee was marking up the Labor, Health, Human Services and Education appropriations bill. These buildings are located at 46th and Market Streets in Philadelphia which is approximately 10 blocks from the University of Pennsylvania, Drexel University and the University Science Center. I am personally familiar with the buildings and can attest to their tremendous value for these two distinguished colleges.

These buildings would be available for a full range of technology courses for all eligible students and would be heavily utilized by minorities. Considering the high rate of unemployment among minorities, especially in the 16 to 19 year old category and especially in large metropolitan areas like Philadelphia, it is obvious that these facilities could make a tremendous contribution to the nation as well as the immediate area which they serve.

Dave, when Ted Bell contacted me about the Administration's interest in the Lincoln-Cheyney project, he informed me that he had just 'now received the okay from OMB to request the funds." I would like your verification in writing immediately that OMB does indeed approve the \$5 million funding for this project and will not object to this expenditure.

This is in response to your letter to the President of March 21, 1984, in which you expressed your concern that the American commitment to Lebanon and the entire Middle East be reaffirmed by assuring the long term future of the American University in Beirut ("AUB"). You suggested that one way to do so would be to increase aid to AUB by establishing a trust fund within the Treasury to assist AUB, and you requested that the Administration consider such a proposal. The White House has asked Treasury to respond to you directly.

The vehicle for providing increased assistance to AUB proposed in your letter and in the International Security and Development Cooperation Act of 1984 (S. 2582) is a trust fund. Section 214 of S. 2582 would create an "American University of Beirut Trust Fund" in the Treasury, and divert \$50 million from Economic Support Fund assistance for Lebanon to this trust fund. The bill would also determine how Treasury is to invest the funds and when Treasury should disburse interest and other earnings from the fund to AUB.

While Treasury has no first-hand knowledge concerning AUB's financial requirements, it is our understanding that the State Department is trying to determine AUB's financial needs, its ability to absorb aid, and the means for providing U.S. assistance to this institution. We have contacted the State Department concerning this matter and have been advised that State believes that any trust fund for AUB should not draw on any Lebanon reconstruction program appropriations, since State wants to ensure that these appropriations remain available for relief, repair, and reconstruction purposes in Lebanon. Diversion of funds, in State's view, will not be understood by the Government of Lebanon, and may encourage other educational institutions abroad to seek similar, preferential treatment.

Finally, your letter states that other organizations have utilized trust funds similar to that proposed for AUB. We believe, however, that the proposed AUB fund differs markedly from the funding mechanisms of the three organizations mentioned in your letter. While the Japan-U.S. Friendship Commission utilizes a trust fund in Treasury, the Commission's fund was established with cash which Japan owed to the U.S., rather than an initial appropriation. The East-West Center in Hawaii is a private, nonprofit corporation receiving annual congressional appropriations, but has no trust fund to receive these appropriations. The Israeli-American foundations do not operate with a governmental trust fund, but instead are funded by money Israel owes to the U.S. and which is paid into and held by Israeli financial institutions.

Although Treasury is opposed to the trust fund mechanism as described in your letter and the Senate bill, we would be pleased to work with your committee and provide whatever assistance we can. We believe the best mechanism for providing the assistance you propose is through the normal budget and appropriations process.

Dear Mr. President:

When the American University of Beirut's president, Dr. Malcolm H. Kerr, was assassinated last January, you expressed a sentiment that we all shared -- this tragic death must strengthen our resolve not to allow terrorism "to take control of the lives or actions or future of ourselves and our friends." Nowhere is this resolve more important than in our commitment to the American University itself. Now in its 118th year of serving the Middle East, AUB has profoundly influenced the acceptance within Lebanon and throughout the region of the values of free inquiry and individual enterprise that the American people so cherish.

The future of peace in the Middle East rests ultimately upon the ability of the people in the region to understand and work with one another. American policy always aims to encourage and facilitate actions which broaden and strengthen regional dialogue. That means our success in assuring security and peace for all people of the Middle East is dependent upon our prior success in preserving within the region a commitment to reason and tolerance. To the people of the Middle East AUB is the very symbol of these high ideals. For them, its mission of teaching and healing is a concrete demonstration of the good intentions of the American people.

We are writing you now because of our concern that AUB's ability to continue serving as a seminal force for American ideas and values is threatened as never before in this institution's long history. AUB has seen not only the slaying of its president, but also the kidnapping of its acting president and one of its professors. It has suffered major financial losses from damaged facilities, lost tuition, and war-time costs at its hospital, which serves as a lifeline to the many casualties on all sides of the fighting. But most serious of all, the perception is growing both in Lebanon and elsewhere that these acts of violence and terrorism are weakening the U.S. commitment to continue working for moderation in the region.

We cannot allow the American University of Beirut to succumb to these forces. To do so would seriously dishearten those who still look to the United States for leadership, while at the same time encouraging those who would like nothing better than to sweep the region clear of every American influence. With this in mind we are exploring ways in which the continued American commitment to constructive engagement in Lebanon and the entire Middle East can be reaffirmed by assuring the long-term future of AUB. One way of doing this is to establish a trust fund within the United States Treasury, the annual earnings from which would be dedicated to supporting the university. This idea was employed previously in establishing the Japan-United States Friendship Commission, which supports cultural and educational activities between the two countries. Similar approaches with somewhat different structures were used to fund the East-West Center in Hawaii and the Israeli-American foundations for industry, science, agriculture, and education. We believe creation of a U.S. Government trust fund for AUB would have the merit of enhancing the university's ability to attract financial backing from both U.S. private sources and governments in the Middle East.

The AUB trust could be funded by utilizing a portion of the monies previously appropriated for Lebanon reconstruction. These monies could be reprogrammed to the fund.

We offer these ideas for your consideration in the hope that you will join us in guaranteeing AUB's future. We are convinced that by giving priority to the university's mission of healing and understanding we will reassure our friends in the Middle East of our determination to remain constructively involved in working for peace.
