



TRIBUTE YEAR TO MARTHA GRAHAM AND THE RITE OF SPRING

Martha Graham when asked what tribute she would like as she entered her 90th year replied, "the performances of my company during this year and the stimulus to the future it represents." And so, the Martha Graham Tribute Year Committee was formed to direct the performances and events of the Martha Graham Tribute Year, from appearances in Italy and France, to Los Angeles at UCLA Royce Hall, from Copenhagen, to San Francisco-Berkeley, Phoenix-Tempe Arizona, to the establishment of Martha Graham Institutes at UCLA and in Florence, Italy.

The Martha Graham Tribute Year will begin with the appearance of the Martha Graham Dance Company at the Paris Opera, the only American Dance Company so honoured, and with the debut there of Rudolf Nureyev in Martha Graham's ballet, Phaedra's Dream.



Opera Gala Honors Work Of Dancer

ARIS, Jan. 25 - Martha Graham was applauded, then cheered, then honored Monday night during a gala at the Paris Opera that was at once a celebration of her work and a gathering of France's wealthy, powerful and

The gala also was a harbinger of what Rudolf Nureyev intends to do as the Paris Opera's new director of bal-let, a post he took over last September. Miss Graham's company was the first American dance troupe ever to appear on stage at the Opera, Charles Garnier's noble Second Empire palace in the heart of Paris, "This is the great opening of the Garnier Palace to the international world of dance," said Jack Lang, France's Minister Delegate to the Prime Minister in

Delegate to the Prime Minister in Charge of Culture.
Miss Graham, the 89-year-old dancer and choreographer whose revolutionary work helped create modern dance, appeared on stage after a performance that offered a look across nearly four decades of her work. The audience, which also in-cluded many of Miss Graham's American admirers, rose to its feet and then shouted its appreciation of a woman whose emphasis on passion and emotion had once scandalized the dance world.

In a ceremony held backstage at her request — she wanted to avoid a public spectacle — Miss Graham was named a Knight of the French Legion of Honor by Mr. Lang. "This is first of all a recognition, athough a tardy one, of one of the great creative talents of the 20th century," he declared. "Setting aside the well-known choreographic writings, she endowed her-self with an entirely personal tech-nique. In her dances, the gesture and

nique. In her dances, the gesture and the idea are in absolute harmony."
Miss Graham, who was surrounded by her dancers, well-wishers and photographers, replied in English. "I do not speak your beautiful language," she said. "And I do not want to desecrate it." She said she was proud to be homored as a pioneer, and to have this homes. to have this happen in Paris, "a city that is a dream of ours."

Many in the French dance world have long worried about the state of their art at the Opera. The situation was summed up most cruelly by Mau-rice Béjart, who called the Opera "the tomb of the unknown dancer."

Mr. Nureyev has said that his goal is to seduce dancers by "creating an exciting working atmosphere."

Mr. Nureyev himself tried to put his words into practice on Monday night, dancing the principal male role in Miss Graham's most recent work, "Phaedra's Dream," a reworking of her "Phaedra," whose powerful eroticism created a public stir in the early 1960's — the sort of reaction Miss Graham's dances have provoked all her life. Mr. Nureyev ofvoked all her life. Mr. Nureyev of-fered a representation of Hippolytus, the mythological character who repulsed the advances of his stepmother and was put to death.

"All the time I choreographed 'Phaedra's Dream,' I had Nureyev in the back of my mind," Miss Graham said afterward. "I did not think at the time it would be possible that his per-formance would become a reality."

The evening's program began with Miss Graham's 1956 work "Seraphic Dialogue," inspired by Joan of Arc. For the piece, Miss Graham's design-er, Halston, created a series of ornate er, Haiston, created a series of ornate new costumes in striking primary colors. This was followed by "Errand Into the Maze," which was first danced in 1947, and "Phaedra's Dream." The program concluded with "Acts of Light," Miss Graham's pantheistic celebration that was inspired by a letter written by one of her favorite noets Emily Dickinson. her favorite poets, Emily Dickinson.
The event itself inspired an out-

ouring of tribute and commentary from French dance critics. Nearly all emphasized Miss Graham's role as a emphasized miss Granam's role as a courageous innovator who, despite sharp attacks on her work in the United States at the beginning of her career, is a singularly American fig-ure. Le Monde's dance writer, Marcelle Michel, said that Miss Graham

cene Michel, said that Miss Graham had "entered into the American myth in the same way as the Empire State Building, or Hollywood." The fight Miss Graham fought, Mrs. Michel wrote, was nothing less than one against "the colonization of America by European classical dance." The magazine Le Nouvel Observation of the Miss of the Mi servateur summed up Miss Gra-ham's lifework under the headline; "Freud enters into dance."

Though France has long been inter-Indugn France has long been inter-ested in American dance, Miss Gra-ham's appearance here was yet an-other indication of a warming of cul-tural relations between France and the United States. These relations reached a low point in July 1982, when Mr. Lang attacked "the financial and intellectual imperialism" of the United States. The remark produced a storm of protest and France's Socialist Government has steadily backed away from cultural anti-Americanism ever since.

Perhaps the best symbol of this cul-tural détente was the fact that Mr. Lang had shared the center box at the performance with the American Am-bassador to France, Evan Galbraith,

and Mr. Galbraith's wife.

The event was also a premier social occasion, and both the theater and a reception afterward in the Opera's regal Grand Foyer bristled with

nobility and wealth.
Even in that crowd, however, it was Miss Graham who remained the center of attention as Mr. Galbraith of-

Frank is a pillar of ethnic Republican life, having served most recently as the Chairman of the National Republican Heritage Groups Council. He is also one of the top leaders of the Italian American community, and currently serves as President of the National Italian American Foundation.

New Detroit, Inc., Renaissance Board, is present Chairman of the Greater Detroit Chamber of Commerce. He is chairman of Orchestra Hall and on the board of trustees of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra and the Michigan Opera Theatre. He serves as chairman of the City of Detroit Income Tax Board of Review, and served on two high level Commission appointed by Governor Milliken, Presidents Nixon and Ford, and was recently appointed by President Reagan to serve on the Presidential Commission for White House Fellows. He serves on high level national and state Republican committees - - the Republican National Committee, Executive Committee, as well as past chairman and present honorary chairman of the National Republican Heritage Groups Council, Washington, D. C. - also, is finance chairman for the Michigan Republican Committee. He is on the board of trustees of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception, Washington, D. C. He also is president of The National Italian American Foundation in Washington, D. C., which organization is considered the spokesman for the Italian-American community in the United States. He is connected and has chaired many charitable events for many local and national charities too numerous to mention.
