Gift of Papers and Other Historical Materials

of

Terrel H. Bell

to the

Ronald Reagan Library

1. In accordance with the provisions of Chapter 21 of Title 44, United States Code, and subject to the terms, conditions, and restrictions hereinafter set forth, I, Terrel H. Bell (hereinafter referred to as the Donor), hereby give, donate, and convey to the United States of America, for eventual deposit in the Ronald Reagan Library, my papers and other historical materials (hereinafter referred to as the Materials) which are described in Appendix A, attached hereto.

2. Title to the Materials shall pass to the United States of America upon their delivery to the Archivist of the United States or his delegate (hereinafter referred to as the Archivist).

3. Following delivery, the Materials shall be maintained by the United States of America in a depository administered by the National Archives and Records Service of the General Services Administration until the Ronald Reagan Library is ready to receive them, at which time they shall be deposited in the Ronald Reagan Library and administered in accordance with the pertinent provisions of Chapter 21 of Title 44, United States Code; and, provided, that any time after after delivery and subject to the provisions of paragraph 5, the Donor shall be permitted freely to examine any of the Materials during the regular working hours of the depository where they are preserved.

4. No research access to these materials shall be granted, except with the written authorization of the Donor or his assigns, until October 1, 1994.

After that date, it is the Donor's wish that the Materials be made available for research as soon as possible and to the fullest extent possible. At the same time, he recognizes that the Materials may include information about others the disclosure of which would constitute an unwarranted invasion of personal privacy and information the protection of which is essential to the nation's security. Accordingly, the Archivist shall have the materials reviewed and for a period shall place under seal the following classes of material:

- (a) Papers and other historical materials that are specifically authorized under criteria established by statute or Executive Order to be kept secret in the interest of national defense or foreign policy, and are in fact properly classified pursuant to such statute or Executive Order.
- (b) Papers and other historical materials the disclosure of which would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy or a libel of a living person.

5. Following the completion of the review provided for above, material placed under seal shall not be made available for inspection, reading, or use by anyone, except regular employees of the National Archives and Records Service in performance of normal archival work on such materials, and the Donor, or persons authorized by him in writing to have access to such materials; provided that information which is security-classified pursuant to statute or Executive Order shall be made available only in accordance with procedures established to govern the availability of such information.

6. Materials which have been placed under seal as herein provided shall be reviewed by the Archivist from time to time and the seal removed from any papers which, because of the passage of time or other circumstances, no longer require such restrictions.

7. Subject to the restrictions imposed herein, the Archivist may dispose of any of the Materials which he determines to have no permanent value or historical interest, provided that prior to any such disposal reasonable efforts are made to notify the Donor and offer return of the materials.

8. During the Donor's lifetime, he retains to himself all copyrights in his writings in all papers and other historical materials donated to the United States of America under the terms of this instrument or which may be included in other collections of papers deposited in the national archival system. After the Donor's death, all said rights shall pass to Betty R. Bell, if she survives the Donor, for her lifetime or until the copyright expires, whichever event occurs first. Upon that event all such rights shall pass to the Government.


9. The Archivist may enter into agreements for the temporary deposit of the Materials under his custody and control in a depository administered by the National Archives and Records Service of the General Services Administration or other qualified depository.

10. In the event that the Donor may from time to time hereafter give, donate, and convey to the United States of America, for deposit in the Ronald Reagan Library, additional papers and other historical materials, title to such additional papers and other historical materials shall pass to the United States of America upon their delivery to the Archivist, and all of the foregoing provisions of this instrument of gift shall be applicable to such additional papers and other historical materials. A description of the additional papers and other historical materials so donated and delivered shall be prepared and attached hereto.





STAGE WATCH

THEATER FOR SALE—AND IT'S A JEWEL

Wanna kick off 1985 in style? Have we got a theater for you!

The Los Angeles Metropolitan Community Church building at 1050 S. Hill St. downtown is for sale. In an earlier incarnation, it was none other than the Belasco Theatre—then and now a jewel of a proscenium house.

Built in 1926 (a very good year for new theaters), it was described by Times Theater Critic Edwin Schallert on its opening night as "architecturally satisfying . . . rich and replete with an old gold luxuriance . . ." and having "an ample breadth and an adequate degree of intimacy. Nothing ostentatious, though with quality bedecked."


The quality still bedecks.

The theater also can seat 1,000 between its orchestra and sharply banked balcony. It has excellent sight lines; a high, full stage; ornate dome ceiling (richly old gold); orchestra pit; greenroom; a flexible third-floor space (for a potential other theater); a spacious lobby (with the original carpeting still in excellent condition), and an assortment of dressing rooms, rehearsal halls and offices. The price: \$2.1 million.

"We've shown it to a couple of people, but no theater people yet," said Marcia Robbins, who is handling the sale for R. B. Augustine & Co.

1984 were a number of other real-estate exchanges and renovations, some still awaiting consummation.

The Center Theatre Group and UCLA, for instance, are "very close" to closing escrow on the Huntington Hartford.

"There are only one or two residual hurdles still to be overcome," the Taper's William Wingate said. "It should happen by the end of the month." The venerable Vine Street house will be renamed the James A. Doolittle Theatre, after its current owner, and Doolittle will retain a five-year option to fill the theater for seven weeks a year.

As for the close of escrow on the Pasadena Playhouse, "It's mechanical at this point," developer David Houk said, "about a week away—two at the most." Houk is committed to opening the Playhouse doors before the end of 1985.

Renovation on the new Henry Fonda Theatre (formerly the Pix) on Hollywood Boulevard is proceeding with only slight delays. The new name goes up in a week and formal dedication—a dinner on the premises with many Fonda friends—is targeted for Feb. 10.

The Plumstead Theatre Society, which has leased the Fonda in eight-week increments from Forman/Nederlanders (who are doing the renovating), hopes to open its first show later that month: Reginald Rose's "Twelve Angry Men," a well-known Fonda favorite.

"We've started casting," Plumstead's Martha Scott said, "and we're working on

Dear Ed:

Thanks very much for the opportunity of talking with you about several problems and thanks also for the advice and counsel you gave.

In accordance with your suggestions, we shall in February give you a call to receive your further advice on whom to approach as a possible speaker for our ICS-General Electric conference on May 16 in San Francisco, on the subject of barriers to economic progress in the U.S.

After that date, again in accordance with your suggestion, we shall be in touch with you to discuss the possibilities of collaboration with the Reagan Center for Public Policy to be established in conjunction with the Reagan Library at Stanford. I still feel, Ed, that such collaboration would be in the best interests of both organizations, otherwise we will have two public policy centers competing with each other for funds from the same sources, and those funds are neither that generous nor that sizeable.

Again, in accordance with your suggestion, I shall write the President inviting him to speak at our Annual Conference in 1986. I was very pleased to note that you said this might be a real possibility in terms of his schedule, and I say again--this would be the greatest thing that could possibly happen to ICS, considering that the President was really one of those who helped to found it. I think it is most timely that, at this stage of its development, he would give us the privilege of personally addressing us and our constituents. We could promise him, as you know, a good audience and a well organized program.

I also mentioned to you the problems of the alternate tax and also of the 2% suggestion in Mr. Regan's tax proposal. In connection with support of 501C-3 non-profit organizations, I know you and the President would much prefer to have private philanthropy undertake many of the tasks that in past administrations have been turned over to government, but these tax provisions are working against that

objective. I would hope very much that you and your colleagues might take a close look at the effect of some of these provisions on 501C-3 organizations, otherwise we will be in a most difficult situation, and there will be an inevitable increase in pressure upon public funds, which I would regret.

I mentioned also to you the hopes and aspirations of Peter Diamandopoulos, our former president at Sonoma State University and Col. Milton Frank, my former PR man in the California State University system. Both of these individuals are interested in serving a Republican administration and I know would do a good job in whatever they were assigned.

Ed, thanks again for the talk, and we are looking forward to seeing you on March 1.
