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

The Ronald Reagan Center for Public Affairs will encourage and facilitate the advanced study of public affairs in the United States, focusing on the major national and international policy issues this country will face in the years ahead. To support this program, the Foundation seeks to build and operate the finest research center in the world.





The Ronald Reagan Center for Public Affairs

hen President Ronald Reagan concludes his second term, his Presidential papers will be shipped to the Ronald Reagan Presidential Library which will become a preeminent resource for scholarly research.

The Boards of Trustees of The Ronald Reagan Presidential Foundation and Stanford University have chosen a twenty-acre hillside site on the Stanford campus with views of the San Francisco Bay and the coastal mountain range. The building is expected to project a Western ambiance with extensive use of redwood, Spanish tile, adobe tile, functional patios, roof overhangs, frequent and easy access to the out-of-doors and the sound of moving water. Once constructed by the Foundation, the Library will be turned over to the Federal government for maintenance and operation.

The interior will accommodate the unprecedented volume of Presidential documents while providing easy access for researchers as well as meeting their functional needs. The Library will contain extensive archives (an estimated 60,000 linear feet) of the nation's first full two-term Presidency in nearly 30 years, including the personal and White House papers of the President and his associates, as well as photographs, motion pictures, sound and video tapes. An exhibition area will provide a vivid educational experience for both students and the general public by showing the formulation of public policy, the operation of government, and the record of the Reagan Presidency. Additional library programs will include documentary publications and an oral history project.

The Library will require extensive storage space to protect thousands of documents from deterioration and theft. Stateof-the-art audio-visual and computer equipment will facilitate access to and use of the historic material.

Reading rooms, conference and seminar rooms, and an auditorium for films and scholarly lectures will be necessary in addition to basic facilities and amenities found in other research libraries and public buildings.

President Reagan's association with Stanford University dates from 1975, when he placed his gubernatorial papers at the Hoover Institution. He has continued to deposit his non-Presidential papers there and is also an Honorary Fellow of the Institution.

resident Reagan's distinguished public career has been devoted to achieving and maintaining peace and economic prosperity while protecting and expanding our individual liberties. The Center for Public Affairs will facilitate advanced study in these areas and provide the resources for objective research and analysis upon which sound public policy must be based.

The Center will sponsor small conferences enabling the world's leading experts to meet heads of state and other distinguished leaders in order to discuss and analyze the most important public affairs issues of the time. Residential units for key conference participants will create a congenial setting for the exchange of ideas.


A group of visiting fellows, for whom the Center will provide residential units as well as offices and research support, will constitute the major portion of the research effort. The visiting fellows, appointed for specific terms, are expected to come from colleges and universities, other research institutions, government, the media, business, and the professions. Interacting in a scholarly, interdisciplinary environment, they will pursue independent inquiries and publish works on public policy issues.

The Board of Trustees of the Foundation is actively seeking a site for the Center in the San Francisco Peninsula area near the Reagan Presidential Library. The Center will consist of a state-of-the-art conference facility with audio-visual and computer capabilities, simultaneous translation equipment and television and recording studios. Seminar rooms, meeting rooms and a small auditorium will be available to meet the Center's conference requirements. Offices for the staff and resident scholars of the Center, as well as a small library, will be included.

Through the activities of its fellows and conference program, the Center will attract worldwide attention and make a substantial contribution to the nation's continued prosperity and to the preservation of its freedom.

Stanford University is providing the land for the Library (20 acres estimated to be worth \$15 million). Major building gifts will be recognized on appropriate plaques naming specific areas of the building.

- Exhibition Pavilion will serve the Library's exhibit program. Original Presidential documents, photographs, and videotapes will show how government policy is formulated and document the themes and events of the Reagan Presidency.

Fellows Residences will be offered to Visiting Fellows who need long-term living accommodations.

Multi-media and Communications Center will house state-of-the-art audio-visual equipment, including television and communications via satellite, a motion picture and video projection facility, a simultaneous translation capability, and computer services with network linkages.

Seminar Rooms will be used by Fellows, visiting scholars and other guests.

Senior Commons Lounge will be an informal area for impromptu discussion and communication among the Fellows.

The Endowment Fund

In endowment, supporting the programs of the Center for Public Affairs, will offer additional opportunities for recognizing major gifts.

Endowed Chairs will be established at the Center.

The Center will award fellowships to individuals for various periods of residence from a few months to a year or more.

Special Programs of the Center are not funded by the government. Gift opportunities may include named endowment funds for grants-in-aid to scholars, prizes for publications based on the papers, publication grants, conferences, and exhibitions.

The Foundation invites the general public to participate in the project. Both facilities will be built with private funds contributed by thousands of individuals and organizations from across the country and around the world.

Other types of useful gifts include:







Dear Dutch:

Just a quek long note to say hello.

Well, another of our good friends from days gone by has passed away.

Jean and I were away for a week, knocking around one of your old stomping grounds - Des Moines, and didn't know about Light's passing until we returned on Wednesday - the day after his Memorial Service. Jean called Juanita to talk to her, and she said he just slept away sitting in a chair. She said someone from down there had called the White House to let you know.

I thought maybe you would like to see his obituary, and am enclosing a copy.

I hadn't seen Light for a couple months - but talked to him on the phone a week or so ago - he had just had lens implants, and seemed okay. We had planned to get together soon.

I guess it is a good way to go & in Light's case, a blessing, as I'm sure he wouldn't want to be bedridden, he was always too active.

Not many of us left out of the old gang of River Rats at Lowell Park.

Hang in there Dutch - the country needs you!

Dutch - as I have mentioned I think before, Jean and I are working towards the establishing of a Reagan Country Museum here in Dixon, for Ronald Reagan memorabilia over the years to be displayed for posterity, and have the idea that your old grade school. South Central, (the only building left standing where you attended school) would be ideal & make a wonderful museum.

I have talked to the Supt. of Schools & the President of the School Board, and filled them in on what I would like to do. Jean and I have also talked to Ambassador Dan Terra a couple times regarding this project, and he has promised to visit Jean and I, and look over the school to study its possibilities. He thinks it's a great idea & told us that the school must stay as it is & not be destroyed.

Is there any reason why you would object to the idea of using the school as a Reagan Country Museum? If there is, please let me know, before I go too far on this project.

This proposed museum would be a place for people in the Rock River Valley to donate for display, area memorabilia encompassing things out of the past - historical items, vintage clothes, hats, accesories and periodicals from the 1800's to date, etc. (Jean has a wonderful collection I'm sure she would be happy to donate.

I'm sure there are a lot of your Dixon friends who have Reagan memorabilia they would love to donate or loan for such an exhibit in a museum. It also could house things from Charles Walgreen, Louella Parsons, John Deere etc. Great place for area historical items as an extension of the Presidential Exhibit at the Dixon Library.

My idea for the future would be a complete historic site & historic walk, beginning with the Reagan Boyhood Home, visitors center etc., to the South Central School (Reagan Country Museum), to the First Christian Church, where you and Nelle attended, taught Sunday School etc, and also to include the Pres. Memora brisa exhibit in the hibrary.

I would really like to know your feelings on this. Jean and I are scouring the country, trying to find all the old Reagan memorabilia - movie photos - advertising etc. over the years, to place in the museum. This is what we were doing in Davenport & DesMoines. Had pretty good luck - found some old lakentucky Club tobacco cans, Chesterfield cigarette ads, movie ads for Desperate Journey, King's Row, Night Into Night, etc. etc. Having lots of fun! Would you believe some of these old movie ads & cigarette ads out of magazines are selling for \$18.00 - \$25.00 each!

As I mentioned before, I am also collecting Time magazine covers over the past 40 years, contemporaries, dignitaries, prominent figures, friends of yours etc.; sending them to the person to be autographed & returned for framing to hang in our future Reagan Country Museum as an historical part of the exhibit.

I have received over 100 signed, including Man of the Year Covers - all three living Presidents, Tip O'Neil, Warren Burger, Ted Kennedy, Al Haig, Governor Wallace, Bob Hope, Astronauts, Sports figures, movie stars etc. etc. This is great fun & very interesting, and will make a wonderful exhibit when it is completed, and we have 200 or more to display.

As I mentioned in my last note, I still have a few Time covers, First Monday covers & photos of you with movie friends that have been signed by them, and I would like to send these to you for autographing, so I can complete that part of the collection, have them framed and ready for the museum exhibit.

I know you are busy, so if you will just have Kathy let me know when it would be convenient to send these items for your signature, then you can do it at your leusure some weekend at Camp David.

Vice President Bush is doing some for me at present, too.

I am sorry to have made this short note a volume, but I got carried away when I started writing about the proposed Reagan Country Museum. Jean and I will be meeting with Dan Terra on the 10th of August at a reception in Evanston, and will fill him in on our activities at that time, and he may talk to you regarding the museum at a future date.

Dutch - take care of yourself. Good luck on your tax and budget proposals. Stick to your guns!

Jean joins me in sending our love, and best wishes to both you and Nancy. Let us hear from you when you have time.

Dwight Thompson

PRINCETON — Dwight K. Thompson, Sr. 74, Route 2, died Saturday, July 5, in his home after a short illness. He owned and operated Mystic Metal Movers; Inc. for many years.

He was born April 16, 1912 in Chicago to Willard A. and Hazel (Crowfoot) Thompson. He was married to Juanta VanMetre May 9, 1943 in Dixon.

He was a member of Princeton Masonic Lodge AF&AM 587, Order of the Eastern Star Ruth Chapter Mohammed Temple of Peoria, United Sidecar Association, St. John's Alumni Association, graduate of St. John's Military Academy and served with the CBs during World War II.

He was preceded in death by one brother.

Survivors include his wife of Princeton; sons, Kent and Rick, both of Princeton and Todd of Lawrence, Kan.; daughter, Robin Ambrosen of Goshen, Ind., 11 grandchildren; four great-grandchildren.

Memorial services will be 7 p.m. Tuesday in the family home, on Route 2. The body was cremated. Arrangements were completed by Norberg Memorial Home.

Memorials have been established to the Elks Crippled Children Fund or the Shriners Childrens' hospitals.

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
