I am writing to you in reference to an article that appeared in the Washington Times on Wednesday, December 16, 1987, which cites that you have agreed to end support to the Afghan mujahideen at the same time as the Soviet troops begin to withdraw from Afghanistan. 

Dear Ms. Ordynsky:

The President has asked me to respond to your letter of January 13th in which you expressed concern about the fate of Soviet soldiers held by the Mujaheddin and asked about the course of U.S. policy regarding support to the Afghan resistance should the Soviets finally initiate a troop withdrawal.

We are deeply concerned, as you are, about all persons who have been captured during the Afghan conflict, and this includes the Soviet soldiers who have defected to the Mujaheddin. We have made it clear that we are prepared to cooperate in resettling defectors who want to come to the West, and, in fact, we have helped about a dozen of them over the course of the Afghan War.
P Once the conflict has ended, we will do everything possible to make sure the captured individuals are treated in accordance with established international procedures, most particularly, that they are granted the choice to be repatriated or to seek asylum in a third country. The United States will attempt to ensure that these principles are observed as part of a comprehensive settlement of the conflict.

With respect to support for the Mujaheddin following the onset of a Soviet withdrawal, I hope this letter will help allay some of your concerns about U.S. policies regarding the tragic war in Afghanistan.

I have been asked to respond to your letter of April 11, 1988 to President Reagan concerning our Afghanistan policy. I welcome the opportunity to explain our goals and our efforts in support of the Afghan people.

As you know, the Geneva Accords on Afghanistan were concluded on April 14. This agreement constitutes the first step toward realizing our goals in Afghanistan. These objectives are to secure a rapid and complete withdrawal of Soviet troops, to facilitate the return of the refugees to their homes in safety and honor, to restore Afghanistan's status as an independent and non-aligned country, and to allow the Afghan people to exercise genuine self-determination. On the latter point, UN negotiator Diego Cordovez has agreed to pursue efforts at establishing a broad-based interim government in Kabul.

In your letter you raise the question of continued U.S. military support to the Afghan resistance. In agreeing to be a guarantor of the accords, we have made clear that the rights and obligations of the United States and the Soviet Union are symmetrical. This means that we will continue U.S. assistance to the resistance as long as the Soviet Union continues to arm the Kabul regime.

This Administration remains committed to the cause of a free Afghanistan and our support for the Afghan people will not falter as they near their goal of freedom.

Dear Mr. President:

Throughout your administration, you have sought two goals in Afghanistan: that all Soviet military and occupation personnel withdraw completely; and, that an independent, non-communist government be established with full participation by the brave Resistance forces. You have pledged U.S. assistance until these goals are fulfilled.

Unfortunately, I must conclude that the reported draft Geneva agreement between the governments of Afghanistan and Pakistan, which the Soviet Union intends to guarantee, is dangerously defective. As you know Pakistan reluctantly accepted this agreement only under strong pressure, and the agreement is strongly opposed by the Afghan Freedom Fighters -- the Afghan Mujahedeen Alliance.

I strongly urge you not to authorize the United States becoming a co-guarantor of this unsound agreement. In my judgement, the agreement contains three fundamental flaws:

1. It leaves the Communist Afghanistan government in place, rather than achieving an independent, non-communist government.

2. It permits the Soviet Union to continue providing the Afghanistan Communist government with full secret police and military support; while it prohibits Pakistan from participating in the theoretical "symmetry" whereby Free-world countries, most notably the United States, would supposedly be able to continue military support to the Resistance.

3. It rejects the lessons of past history. As you yourself once explained in your 1984 letter to the democratic Central American Presidents, and as documented in a 1986 Defense Department report, in four war-termination agreements since 1953, the Communist side systematically violated each of the agreements. The international verification organizations failed to guarantee the Communist side's compliance, and in three of the four cases the Free-world side was defeated by the Communists (Indochina, 1955; Laos, 1962; Vietnam 1973). Also, the 1979 OASnegotiated settlement for Nicaragua -- as you have often reminded us -- has been violated by the Communist Sandinistas. They still remain in power there contrary to their pledges for full democracy under that international agreement.

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I urge you to hold firmly to your policy goals and pledges on Afghanistan. Otherwise, at the very time the Resistance is meeting with increasing success on the battlefield, the results of the reported Geneva agreement could well lead to the victory of Communist regime in Afghanistan, to the serious risk that Pakistan will be increasingly destabilized and to the greatly expanded danger of Soviet-supported radical groups taking power in the fragile Persian Gulf oil states.

Mr. President, the stakes are high for the people of Afghanistan, for the region and for United States foreign policy. I am confident that the Congress and the American people will support vigorous U.S. military and economic assistance to the Afghan Freedom Fighters until the conditions of total Soviet withdrawal and an independent non-communist Afghan government are fully met and that they will strongly oppose any diplomatic agreement which would undercut this U.S. objective.
