I. Purpose

To comply with the request of Senator Edward (Ted) Kennedy (D-MA) that you meet privately with the two children of the late President John F. Kennedy, Caroline and John, Jr.

II. Background

Senator Kennedy spoke to the Vice President about his desire that his niece and nephew be allowed to meet privately with you to discuss the John F. Kennedy Library.

Although the Senator elaborated no further, be advised that last June Caroline Kennedy was named to the library board of directors as the museum and exhibits chairperson. She is in charge of an effort to raise an \$8 million endowment to update the library's exhibits. The library is operated by the Federal Government, under the auspices of the National Archives. While Federal funds pay for library operations and salaries, there is no endowment. The goal announced last June is to raise \$8 million over 5 years. At the time of the announcement the library had \$2.4 million already in hand and hoped to raise an additional \$2.6 million by the end of this year. If the Kennedy children are here to ask for your assistance in this fundraising effort, you should make no commitment, but tell them you will seriously consider their request.

V. Sequence of Events

Caroline and John, Jr. arrive thru the west basement and are escorted to the Oval Office. The President greets his guests and they are seated in front of the fireplace for an informal discussion.


SUGGESTED TALKING POINTS FOR THE MEETING WITH CAROLINE KENNEDY AND JOHN KENNEDY, JR.


