Dr. Khan has also called me. I will look forward to having a chance to visit with him on May 14.


Your kind invitation to visit Pakistan brought back fond memories and also created a desire to acquire more knowledge about your country, its people, and its gorgeous scenery.



U.S.-Pakistan Joint Commission
Second Meeting of the Subcommittee on
Economic and Commercial Affairs

November 18-19, 1985
Islamabad, Pakistan

The Subcommittee meeting, co-chaired by Allen Wallis, Under Secretary of State for Economic Affairs, and Ejaz Naik, Secretary General for Economic Affairs, Economic Affairs Division, Ministry of Finance, focussed on economic trends in our two countries and issues of mutual concern regarding trade, investment and narcotics control.

Under Secretary Wallis noted that during the past five years, the competitive and creative spirit in the U.S. has been unleashed with remarkable results. The robust growth of the U.S. economy in recent years has stemmed from the President's guiding policy of deregulation at home and free and fair trade abroad. It is an example developing countries like Pakistan can draw from in launching their own long-term growth efforts.

The Under Secretary stressed that the U.S. also seeks new opportunities for mutually beneficial trade. The President is strongly opposed to any move toward protectionism, and has proposed a new round of international trade negotiations designed to open markets, reduce trade barriers, and strengthen the rules under which trade in goods and services is conducted. The Under Secretary urged the Pakistan Government to support establishment of a preparatory committee for a new GATT round and to participate in a new round.

The Pakistani side promised to look more closely at the proposed new round and stated it would reconsider its previous decision to back hard-line LDC's opposing the round.

The Pakistani side further noted Pakistan's own gradual but steady efforts over the past few years to move away from statist economic policies and to unfetter the private sector. In the past six months, government commissions have been formed to address deregulation of industries, taxation reform, and the foreign exchange rate. The results of the work of these commissions should be translated into specific measures soon. This should remove inefficiencies in key sectors while creating an environment more attractive to foreign and domestic private investors.

The Under Secretary stressed that economic liberalization is indeed the key to attracting private capital and will result in the best allocation of Pakistan's scarce resources.

In working group sessions at the Subcommittee meeting, the two sides discussed specific concerns regarding trade, investment and narcotics.

On trade, the Pakistani side stressed the importance to them of greater U.S. flexibility regarding the imposition of textile import quotas, and expressed concern over the potential effects of proposed U.S. textile legislation. The U.S. side assured the Pakistanis that the President stands opposed to protectionist legislation, and noted our hope that our respective problems on textile imports can be addressed to our mutual satisfaction.

The U.S. side raised specific trade concerns involving U.S. soft drink companies, shipping companies, the motion picture industry, and protection of intellectual property. The Pakistani side explained their stand on these issues, but offered no solutions.

On investment, the U.S. side emphasized that Pakistan needed to implement an investment approval process that is consistent, speedy, simple and predictable. Bureaucratic obstacles and unnecessary controls should be removed. The Pakistani side responded that they are taking steps to improve the investment climate, but that dismantling of a long established system of controls and government intervention is difficult and will take time. Progress is taking place, however, and will continue.

On the specific U.S. concern regarding price controls on a U.S. tractor investment in Pakistan, the Pakistani side took immediate action to resolve the problem.

On narcotics control, both sides noted their satisfaction with efforts to date to eradicate opium production, but added their concern that efforts needed to be stepped up to combat processing and trafficking. Agreement was reached on what needed to be addressed in the near and medium term future to advance these efforts.

Before adjourning the Subcommittee meeting, follow-up actions were announced as follows:

- o The Pakistanis would send a mission of Pakistani firms to the U.S. in early April seeking U.S. investment.
- o Both sides would examine all issues raised at the Subcommittee meeting requiring further action.
- o The Working Group on Business Affairs would meet before February 1986 to review these outstanding issues.
