

BRIEFING PAPER

Visit of Shintaro Abe, Japanese Minister of International Trade and Industry, January 18, 1982I. SETTING

Minister of Trade and International Industry Shintaro Abe, the first representative of Suzuki's recently reorganized cabinet to visit Washington, will want to gauge the strength of U. S. resolve in restructuring the U. S. economy and in insisting that Japan open its markets. He will have just attended quadripartite trade talks in Florida (EC, Canada, U. S. and Japan), hosted by Ambassador Brock. Unlike his predecessor, who was often at odds with the Minister of Foreign Affairs, Abe works smoothly with Foreign Minister Sakurauchi, who supports Abe's Washington visit. Moreover, as heir apparent to the faction of former Prime Minister Fukuda (crucial to PM Suzuki's survival) and son-in-law of another former Prime Minister, Kishi, he carries considerable political weight of his own and is commonly regarded as a likely Prime Minister.

Your meeting, in concert with those of the Vice President and Secretary, is intended to emphasize in an authoritative manner, the need the Administration sees for the Japanese government to move promptly to open Japan's markets to imports of goods and services and to ensure that the Japanese business community and public understand that imports are in Japan's best interest as a responsible participant in an open world economic system.

II. OBJECTIVES

1. Persuade Abe that the U. S. is serious that Japan open its markets, and reinforce the USG position that short-terms palliatives such as export restraints or emergency imports are not what we seek.

2. Stimulate sustained improvements in Japan's defense effort and cooperation in sharing defense technology.

III. ISSUES1. Opening Japan's Market

While the Japanese have significantly reduced tariffs and non-tariff barriers since the 1960's, Japan still has a very low level of manufactured imports, and Japanese businessmen and traders prefer to buy from domestic sources. We

have often, in the past, gone to the Japanese in a trade crisis looking for a "deal" to demonstrate a successful negotiation or consultation. Such an approach has momentarily reduced pressures but has only deferred action on market-access issues. Although we continue to press Japan in regard to tariffs and official quotas that still hinder imports of beef, citrus, tobacco products, etc., we have just about run out of meaningful short term actions. Our emphasis is on access to the Japanese market equivalent to Japanese access to the U. S. market.

2. Japanese Defense Efforts

Japan has just approved an increase in its defense budget for the coming year of 7.75%, the first time in twenty-six years that the defense budget has grown faster than the general-account budget. The President and Secretaries Haig and Weinberger have expressed appreciation for PM Suzuki's leadership in overcoming strong Finance Ministry objections to bring about this politically controversial result. We recognize the criticism being levelled at Suzuki for moving ahead on defense at the expense of social-welfare and public-works programs, but we have noted that the United States faces similar problems and that further Japanese effort will be required for the next several years if we are to work together to counter growing Soviet military power. Abe is aligned with factions favoring greater defense effort and is also a key figure in firming up Japanese policy, now in the making, to share with us Japanese defense related technology. The GOJ anticipates that we will touch on this issue during Abe's visit.

BACKGROUND

Ambassador Mansfield has just returned to the United States for home leave. Before leaving Tokyo, he met with Prime Minister Suzuki, the Foreign Minister, and other Japanese leaders. To all of them he stressed the need for Japan to open its market more fully to American products. The Ambassador also gave a speech in Tokyo in which he strongly called for the Japanese to allow American goods to flow into Japan more freely. The Ambassador is pleased by the recent increase in Japanese defense spending (7.75% over last year) which has been put into the 1982 defense budget. He remains concerned, however, that unless there is a real effort on the part of the Japanese to remove their non-tariff barriers and to continue their defense build-up, resentment in the United States Congress may lead to agitation for protectionism in the United States.

SUGGESTED TALKING POINTS

- Express appreciation for the Ambassador's skillful stewardship in Tokyo, and in particular for his recent urging of Japan to open its markets to American goods.
- Request the Ambassador to give you his appraisal of the current state of United States-Japan relations.

BACKGROUND

Mr. Abe (pronounced "Ah-Beh") is a figure of rising importance in Japan. He is the son-in-law of former Prime Minister Kishi, and the heir apparent to the Fukuda faction of the Liberal Democratic Party. He is among the leading candidates to replace Suzuki as Prime Minister. Abe has just been appointed to his MITI post, and is the first emissary of the new Suzuki Cabinet to visit Washington. Abe needs to hear your personal view of the need for Japan to open its markets more fully to American products, so that he can convey your thoughts to Suzuki and other key officials.

SUGGESTED TALKING POINTS

- Welcome Mr. Abe, as Prime Minister Suzuki's emissary and MITI Minister.
- Express concern for the health of his father-in-law, Former Prime Minister Kishi, who is 90 years old and in failing health.
- Express appreciation for the recent increase in Japan's defense budget, 7.75% over last year.
- Voice your belief in free trade, but stress that Japan must do more to open its market to American goods if a potential turn toward protectionism is to be avoided in this country. (This should be the point given most stress.)
- Ask Mr. Abe what he feels can be done to give greater access to American goods in Japan.

Ambassador Brock asked me to prepare the attached briefing paper for the President's meeting at 1:30 p.m. on January 18 with the Japanese Minister of International Trade and Industry, Shintaro Abe.

Given the brief time allotted for the meeting, the talking points address one major point and avoid getting into specific industry problems. It is critical that Abe hear the President emphasize the importance of Japan opening its markets. Abe will be listening carefully for whether the President emphasizes this point.

The talking points are consistent with the position we took at the trade talks in Tokyo December 9-10. Our chances of succeeding with the Japanese will be greatly enhanced by the President emphasizing the importance of reciprocal access.

I. Background

Shintaro Abe (Ahbay), Japanese Minister of International Trade and Industry, is in Washington to gauge the strength of U.S. resolve in dealing with the trade imbalance. He is on his way back to Tokyo from Florida where he attended the ministerial trade talks between the EC, Japan, Canada, and the United States hosted by Ambassador Brock.

Abe is heir apparent to the Fukuda faction and, therefore, a future contender for prime minister. He is also the son-in-law of former prime minister Kishi. Abe would be flattered by your asking about Kishi.

The Japanese know they have trade problems with the EC and the United States but are uncertain how serious those problems are. Several groups in the government, majority party, and private sector have been formed to clarify the dimensions of the problem and propose solutions. Abe is a member of a special Cabinet Council on Economic Measures which is addressing the trade problem.

There is a fundamental difference in U.S. and Japanese perceptions of the problem. The Japanese tend to see the issue as the magnitude of the trade imbalance (estimated \$18 billion in 1981). Thus, short-term emergency measures such as temporary export restraints or stockpiling raw material imports are seen as appropriate remedies. The U.S. view, on the other hand, is that, while the trade imbalance is a political problem, it is only a symptom of the fundamental problem which is denial of access to U.S. producers, particularly of manufactured products, to Japanese markets in which we are competitive.

The Japanese are concerned that the United States is not serious about following through with domestic programs necessary to revitalize the U.S. economy. They are also reluctant to undertake significant structural and procedural reforms if the United States and EC are themselves going to fail to take the necessary steps to improve their competitiveness in world markets. The Japanese have announced several measures to address the problem. We have responded that while these initiatives are steps in the right direction, a great deal more must be done.

There is a growing constituency of U.S. businessmen who are increasingly frustrated in being denied access to Japan's markets while Japan has relatively free access to U.S. markets. These frustrations are manifested in increasing Congressional support for measures to enforce reciprocity in market access.

At the December 9-10 trade meetings in Tokyo, the United States attempted to convince the Japanese that they must give the United States equal access to Japanese markets if they wanted to continue enjoying their current access to U.S. markets. If we are to successfully contain protectionist forces in the United States, we must convince the Japanese of the seriousness of the situation and, therefore, of the necessity for opening Japanese markets. It is essential that Abe hear directly from you a firm statement about the importance of Japan opening its markets significantly.

II. Objectives

Convince Abe that:

- 1) the United States is serious in its request that Japan grant equal access to its markets;
- 2) short-term emergency measures will not be adequate;

SUBJECT: Meeting with Minister Abe

Last week (January 11-14) Deputy Secretary Trent chaired the U.S.-Japan bilateral civil aviation negotiations in Tokyo. He indicated he was leading the U.S. Delegation to underline the determination of President Reagan to reach a mutually acceptable understanding as quickly as possible. Our Delegation was increasingly concerned that the continued failure to resolve U.S.-Japanese differences in respect of aviation would adversely affect the aviation industries of both countries, and that this could have broader repercussions for U.S.-Japanese relations. The negotiations concluded without significant progress being made, leaving significant differences on major issues.

This was the fifth round of unproductive aviation talks over a year with the Japanese. They have long asserted that the present (1952) Agreement is imbalanced in favor of the United States. The Japanese view of the Agreement is inaccurate and self serving. Revenues for scheduled airlines under the agreement are U.S. carriers \$772.2 million; Japan Air Lines (JAL) \$826.9 million, (almost 52%, for JAL). Nonetheless, the U.S. has offered the Japanese a very generous package of new rights in exchange for improved opportunities for the U.S. airlines.

The most important irritant is that the U.S. firmly believes it has rights under the existing bilateral agreement that we are not being permitted to exercise by the Japanese. They have refused to grant operating authority to United Airlines for Seattle Portland-Tokyo service in accordance with the present Agreement. Subsequently, United filed a complaint with the CAB against the Japanese CAB seeking sanctions against JAL. The Board's decision was released in December, and in a confidential communication to the President the Board recommended that JAL frequencies between Tokyo and Los Angeles be cut back from the present fourteen (14) to seven (7). During last week's negotiations both sides agreed to delay the implementation of any further sanctions until after the conclusion of the next round of negotiations scheduled for March 3, 1982. .85 12

Deputy Secretary Trent is disappointed by the lack of flexibility of the Japanese throughout these negotiations and particularly in this most recent round. We would like you to reinforce the importance of getting some flexibility on the part of the Japanese, by briefly touching on this subject in your meeting with Minister Abe on Monday. This could be done by making the following points:

1. I am very distressed the Japanese talks did not produce results.
2. I understand your position (Japanese) does not recognize the realities of the U.S. marketplace.
3. International aviation is so important to our joint economies that it cannot be separated from the other economic problems between our two countries.
4. The final negotiating session is scheduled for March. We must have some flexibility from Japan so that U.S. carriers will be able to compete with the Japanese airlines.
5. JAL now has more total revenue than all four U.S. airlines combined in our joint traffic and the situation is getting worse.

Please advise if there is anything I can do to further our cause.

Japanese Foreign Minister Yoshio Sakurauchi will visit Washington March 21 - 24, with appointments to be scheduled March 22 and 23. This will be Sakurauchi's first trip to the United States since he became Foreign Minister late last year. As a senior leader of our foremost Pacific ally he wants very much to call on the President, Vice President, Secretary of State and several other Cabinet officers, following the pattern of his predecessors.

Sakurauchi has strong party credentials, and has established close working relationships with other key government officials. From the U.S. point of view, he has regularly said and done the right things. He is committed to ameliorating US-Japanese differences on trade, supports a greater defense effort, has taken significant initiatives on aid to strategic areas such as Pakistan, Egypt, and Sudan and has worked hard toward all these ends both in Party and government councils.

The Sakurauchi meetings provide us with an excellent opportunity authoritatively to communicate our views on major international issues where Japanese and American interests intersect or where we seek Japanese cooperation, e.g., the Soviet Union, Poland, China, Southwest Asia, the Middle East, the Caribbean and the North-South dialogue. Of prime importance, a meeting with the President provides an opportunity to demonstrate continuing high level interest in persistent, highly visible and intrinsically vital bilateral trade and defense issues.

We recommend that the President agree to meet Sakurachi for a short but substantive discussion sometime on March 22 or 23.
