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



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TALKING POINTS

IMPORTANT TO HAVE GOOD RELATIONS WITH CHINA, BUT BASED ON MUTUAL RESPECT. MUST NOT COMPROMISE PRINCIPLES OR COMMITMENT TO TAIWAN IN DEVELOPING RELATIONS WITH BEIJING. BEIJING MUST LEARN THAT THE STEADFASTNESS OF OUR COMMITMENT TO TAIWAN HAS SIMILAR MESSAGE OF STEADFASTNESS IN WHATEVER COMMITMENTS WE MAKE TO THEM.

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- LONG RANGE OBJECTIVES RE CHINA:

-CONTINUE TO BUILD TRUST, CONFIDENCE AND FRIENDLY RELATIONSHIP;

-DO THINGS WHICH ENCOURAGE CHINESE EFFORTS TO MODERATE COMMUNIST SYSTEM AND EXPAND OPENING TO WEST;

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TALKING POINTS FOR THE PRESIDENT

It is important for us to have good relations with China,
 but it is also important that those be based on mutual respect. We must not compromise our principles or our commitment to the people of Taiwan in the development of our relations with Beijing. And Beijing must learn to see that the very steadfastness of our commitment to Taiwan has in it an inherent message to them of similar steadfastness in whatever commitments we make to them.
 Our long range objectives with respect to China are:

-to continue to develop mutual trust and confidence and build a friendly relationship;


-to continue to do things which will encourage Chinese efforts to moderate the Communist system and expand their opening to the West;

-to continue to try and move China away from any reestablishment of close ties with the USSR, and towards more cooperation with us in checking Soviet power and influence.

-- I see a specific purpose of Cap's trip as trying to determine whether the Chinese are serious in cooperating with us against the USSR or not.

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

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INTRODUCTORY TALKING POINTS

For the September 20, 1983 NSC Meeting

- -- This is the first opportunity we have had in some time to focus on China at an NSC Meeting.
- -- In view of Cap's trip to China and Foreign Minister Wu's visit here (10-15 October) we felt it best to have a broad general review of the overall relationship--and touch on all the major issues--to put both visits in perspective. The agenda reflects this theme.
- -- There are no specific issues that really need a Presidential decision today. There are, however, several important issues that the President needs to be aware of, that we expect you to cover, either in your scheduled remarks, or in the discussion period. I think each of you are aware of what these are for in your area.
- -- Secretary Shultz will cover the reasons for the recent improvement in U.S.-Chinese relations, the prospects for a continuation of this development, and what is going on in Chinese-Soviet relations that affect our relations with both parties. Before he begins, however, I would like to raise several questions which I hope we will rouch on either in the briefings or in our discussion period:

1. What game are the Chinese playing with the Soviets and how can we influence this to our advantage, given for example, the problem we recently had trying to influence Beijing to vote with the U.S. in the U.N. on the Korean Airline tragedy?

2. How will we resist future pressures from the Chinese with respect to Taiwan? They have been quiet on this issue recently, probably because of our technology transfer policy, but we can expect them to raise it again, possibly during Cap's visit.

3. Can we rely on other friends and allies more to help move China in a pro-Western direction--e.g., Japan, our allies in Western Europe, and Canada and Australia?

4. How do we deal with a new generation of Chinese leaders coming into power who have not had much experience with the West and many of whom have had their training in the Soviet Union (incidentally, in most cases this has not redounded to the Soviet's benefit)?

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POTENTIAL TALKING POINTS FOR DISCUSSION PERIOD OR CONCLUSION

SUBJECT: Premier Zhao Ziyang's Visit to the U.S.

Let me touch on the latest development with respect to Premier Zhao's visit to the U.S.

The Chinese have let Ambassador Hummel know that Premier Zhao could come to the U.S. in December, but that January is also feasible if December is not convenient. They would like to make the announcement soon, and at the same time announce that the President would be visiting China in the spring. At the moment we have an outstanding invitation to the King of Nepal to visit here the first part of December. We should have his reply in the next few days. If he comes then we will schedule Premier Zhao for January. If the King does not come then, we'll schedule Zhao for December. I think we should nail this down with the Chinese during Cap's visit. We can either make the announcement then, or during Foreign Minister Wu's visit here two weeks later, depending to some extent on Chinese preferences. At the same time, we can say that the President is planning to visit China some time in the spring. The exact date for that can be worked out this fall and announced during Zhao's visit here.

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POTENTIAL TALKING POINTS FOR USE DURING DISCUSSION PERIOD

1. Issues that need to be covered today (if not done adequately during scheduled remarks):

A. The remaining sticking points in our <u>Nuclear</u> <u>Cooperation Talks</u>. (Shultz)

B. What to do about the probability the Chinese will not be able to meet their commitment under the <u>Grain</u> Agreement to purchase 6 million tons of grain this year. (Lyng and Brock)

C. The significance of the <u>countervailing duty case</u> on <u>Chinese textiles</u>. (Baldrige and Brock)

D. Status and prospects of Chinese membership in <u>Asian</u> <u>Development Bank</u>. (Treasury and State)

- 2. How to deal with new generation of emerging Chinese leaders who have had little exposure to the West.
- 3. Potential agreement or announcements for media play during forthcoming visits:

A. Foreign Minister Wu's visit to U.S.:

- 1. Nuclear Cooperation Agreement (State)
- 2. Industrial Cooperation Agreement (Commerce)
- 3. Consular Agreement on Chicago & Chengdu (State)
- 4. Tourism Agreement (Commerce)
- 5. Announcement of date of Premier Zhao Visit to U.S.
- B. Premier Zhao's visit to U.S.:
 - 1. Space Cooperation (Chinese Astronaut)
 - 2. Consular Agreement on Honolulu and Wuhan (State)
- C. President Reagan's visit to China:
 - 1. Space Cooperation (Chinese Astronaut)

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POTENTIAL TALKING POINTS FOR USE IN CONCLUSION

1. NSSD

-- The NSSD has been on the shelf for a few months for a variety of reasons. The technology transfer issue was pulled out and dealt with separately. I think it will be good to revive the NSSD after the Weinberger and Wu visits, add the useful input from those, and shoot for completing it before Premier Zhao visits the U.S.

SECURITY

-- Everything we do with respect to China and Taiwan has a special political significance and risk of distortion by the media because of its impact on the other party. I want to remind everyone that it is especially important to keep what transpired here today from getting out. Even though it's only classified SECRET, you should treat it with TOP SECRET sensitivity.
