SUBJECT: STATE VISIT OF HRH ELIZABETH II

I have spoken with Steve Wall at the British Embassy and he has informed me that the Queen is now planning to arrive in the United States on February 26 and will be departing March 7 enroute British Columbia. Steve also informed me that Her Majesty would like this visit to be an official visit to the United States.

A few things to keep in mind are that the Queen refuses to fly on helicopters and that she wishes to remain on her yacht as often as possible.

Attached you will find a draft schedule that incorporates suggestions from Steve Wall, Chuck Tyson and the Queen's staff. The times in the schedule are tentative and their are periods I have purposely left blank not knowing how intense the Queen's schedule is normally kept.

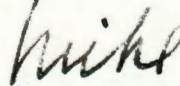

LOS ANGELES

Los Angeles is the major city in the West and the second largest metropolitan area in the nation. It is considered cosmopolitan and takes pride in its Spanish Heritage. The Los Angeles Center for the Performing Arts displays the best in theater, opera, symphony and ballet. A trip to Hollywood is a must where tours of movie studios and television centers are offered. Just south of Los Angeles are the famous Golden Coast beaches and the excitement of Disneyland.

The climate of Los Angeles is best described as dry sub-tropical with very little rain and low humidity.

SACRAMENTO

Sacramento, once a gold boomtown, is the state capital, located in the heart of Northern California.

Sacramento's major attractions are historical and are found within a three mile radius of the downtown area. Old Sacramento is the largest authentic historic preservation project in the world and dates back to the California Goldrush.

Sacramento enjoys a year-round mild climate and an abundance of sunshine.

SANTA BARBARA

Santa Barbara named after the patron saint of mariners, St. Barbara, is located on the southern edge of the Central Coast. Because of its excellent location and broad cultural atmosphere, Santa Barbara is a popular vacation spot.

Santa Barbara enjoys a near-perfect year-round climate. The average winter temperature is about sixty six degrees, rising in the summer to an average of seventy five degrees. Nights are cool.

YOSEMITE

Yosemite, the oldest national park in the United States, was set aside in 1890 to preserve a portion of the Sierra Nevada Mountains.

Unlike many contemporary attractions in California, Yosemite is a work of nature formed by glaciers many thousands of years ago.

Normally temperatures in Yosemite Valley are quite mild.

SAN DIEGO

San Diego, the second largest city and the birthplace of the state of California, is located on San Diego Bay in the southwest corner of southern California.

San Diego Harbor, one of the most beautiful natural harbors in the world has been an important Navy Center for years and headquarters to the 11th Fleet.

The San Diego Zoo is world famous for its many kinds of animals including some of the rarest on the earth. With an animal population of over 5,000 this collection is also the largest in the world.

San Diego voted by meteorologists as the "only area in the United States with perfect weather." The average annual temperature is seventy degrees with low humidity.

SAN FRANCISCO

San Francisco, the major city in Northern California, is situated on the tip of a narrow peninsula surrounded by three sides of water.

San Francisco, is one of the world's most cosmopolitan urban areas, offering a multitude of attractions. The city (which is a scant seven miles from one edge of the city to the other), is characterized by its legendary beauty, its cross section of cultures and its famed cable car system.

San Francisco has an almost perpetual spring, with temperatures seldom rising above seventy degrees or falling below forty degrees.

February / March Climatology

San Diego/Los Angeles/Santa Barbara - An interesting feature of southern California's climate is the sometimes sharp variation in weather, particularly temperatures, over rather short distances. Temperatures along the coast typically range from lows in the mid 40's to highs in the mid 60's. However, a short distance inland, days are likely to be 5 degrees warmer and nights 5 - 10 degrees cooler. Eventhough up to 85% of annual precipitation falls during the winter months, rainfall amounts remain rather meager. Considerable fog occurs along the coast but usually dissipates during the morning leaving afternoons generally clear.

Palm Springs - Expect warm days and chilly nights at this desert resort. Afternoon highs average in the mid to upper 70's while overnight lows typically fall into the mid 40's. Skies are frequently clear and the likelihood of rain is slight.

San Francisco/Sacramento/Santa Clara - Locales both within and adjacent to the San Francisco Bay area share a mostly cloudy and relatively cool climate with moderate precipitation and occasional gusty winds. Daily temperatures vary from the mid 40's near daybreak to the low 60's during the afternoon. Measurable precipitation occurs on an average of 5 - 9 days during February and March.

Seattle - Late winter is characterized by cloudy skies and periodic light rain. Temperatures range from lows in the upper 30's to highs near 50F. Precipitation, while not excessive, occurs frequently with over a 50% probability of occurrence. Snow is highly variable and very often melts before accumulating measurable depth.

Yosemite - The high Sierras endure frigid nights and cool days with precipitation almost exclusively falling as snow particularly over higher mountain peaks. Temperatures, generally in the low 40's during the day, fall to near 20F overnight. Snowfalls can be rather heavy at favorably exposed locations while partly to mostly cloudy skies prevail elsewhere.

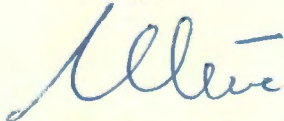
Yesterday the visit of The Queen and Prince Philip to California from February 26 until March 7 was reported in the Los Angeles Times.

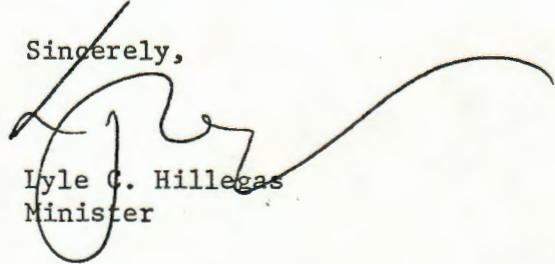

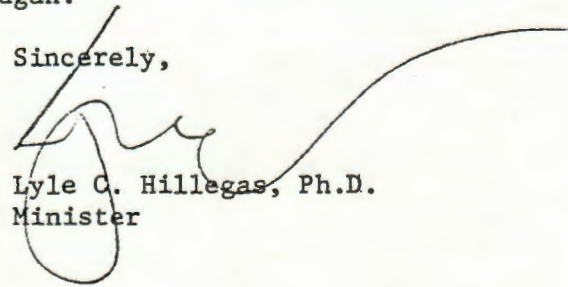
