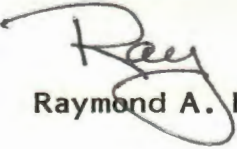

SUBJECT: FURTHER PROTECTION AGAINST THE APPEARANCE
OF CONFLICT OF INTEREST -- in re R. G. Darman

As you know, I submitted financial disclosure reports (SF-278) in 1981 and 1982 as required. Those reports indicated that, for most financial assets over which my wife or I have any direct or indirect control, we established a qualified blind trust.

The reports also indicated that my immediate family has a beneficial interest in four Bank of New York trusts established by a deceased relative. These Bank of New York trusts are the subject of this memorandum.

I provided copies of the trusts with my 1981 disclosure report. I also provided copies of associated instructions and agreements intended to assure that my wife and I were "blinded" from all matters involving particular holdings of or transactions concerning these trusts. And I noted that these blinding arrangements were submitted to the Office of Government Ethics for review.

These exact blinding arrangements had been approved as fully satisfactory by the Department of Justice and the Senate Commerce Committee when, in 1976, I was confirmed as Assistant Secretary of Commerce. Notwithstanding this fact, the Office of Government Ethics concluded that although our discretionary trust is "qualified," the Bank of New York trusts cannot (for technical reasons) be "qualified" or "excepted." Accordingly, I was obliged to acquire and submit a list of the trusts' assets with my May disclosure report -- temporarily breaking the "blind" that had been in effect since I joined the Administration. As it happens, I have not participated in any particular matter relating to the interests in the trusts.

Now, the blinding instructions and agreements are again in effect. Further, it is noteworthy that, whether the blinding provisions were in effect or not, neither my wife nor I could exercise any discretionary control over these trusts. Nonetheless, because the trusts are not deemed to be fully "qualified" as blind, I feel obliged to take one further step to assure that there is no appearance of an actual or potential conflict of interest: I formally note, hereby, that I decline to participate in any particular matters that might preferentially affect assets that I have reason to believe may be held by the Bank of New York trusts. I realize that this may not be required by law, but feel it is the best available procedure to preclude any questions that might otherwise arise.

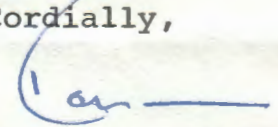
It was good meeting with you and Mike and Lloyd to review the possibility of setting up a White House public affairs advisory group.

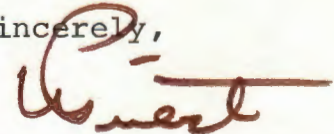

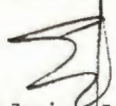

1. El Salvador: Congressional votes to cut aid will send a message to government of El Salvador regarding importance U.S. attaches to land reform program. We have indicated that the President will not certify El Salvador for further aid if the land reform program does not proceed. Clark

2. Interim Arms Restraints: Congressional resolution on compliance with terms of SALT II should be carefully watched to be certain it does not constrain implementation of President's defense decisions. Clark

3. Clean Air: Plans are to meet with Howard Baker on this either today or tomorrow; we need to get commitment to move a bill out of committee soon. VP will speak to Chamber of Commerce today on Clean Air Act. Dubenstein
4. Radio Speech: New draft should be ready today; Darman will check. Gergen

5. Budget: We still expect vote by end of day, though there is chance debate could stretch into weekend. Certain GOP conservatives are expressing concern about voting for large deficit, and effort should be made to reassure them. There is also talk of voting down all 3 plans to force a "better" plan; this is a dangerous idea since Michel-Latta will be voted on first. Dubenstein

Waxman has withdrawn amendment to add Medicare funds to Michel-Latta; it is uncertain whether this makes any difference.
6. Supplementals/Bailouts: Should be completed in Senate tonight, and there is still a chance it could pass without bailout provision. Effort to remove Lugar measure yesterday got 23 votes, which increases possibility of sustaining a veto. Dubenstein
7. Jobs Training: Reported out of committee with most features we wanted except summer jobs provision (though this is in a separate section); bill contains no wages or stipends. Dubenstein
