SUBJECT: U.S.-German Tricentennial Commission

Attached at Tab A is Ron Mann's memo to you and Helene von Damm with nominations for the U.S.-German Tricentennial Commission. Ron's memo is accurate with small exceptions: he underestimates the demands on the time of the director (at least during the startup period, there will be substantial time demands to energize the many potential activities and participants); second, the trip by President Carstens will not include stops in Washington and Germantown (as with the Mitterrand visit, there will be one event attended by both presidents - the celebration in Germantown).

I am not sure of the rationale for the nomination of Mr. Evans as director. Ken Rush has two very important advantages: he enjoys great prestige in Germany, and he is willing to devote full time to the project. One other possibility is co-chairmen. With Rush in Washington, and Evans in Detroit, it is one way to cover more territory.

I am sure that you and Helene von Damm will want to discuss your choices for the commission. When you have decided on a list, I have letters ready to go for signature by the President so that we can catch up on the backlog of work this commission has to do.

Additional Background on 1983
U.S.-German Tricentennial Commission

This memorandum was prepared in response to your request of 4 August 1982. It outlines the nature of the proposed US/FRG Tricentennial Commission; describes its genesis, and makes recommendations relative to the commission structure and membership.

### BACKGROUND

The U.S.-German Tricentennial Year will commemorate the 300th anniversary of German immigrant settlement in the United States. The first immigrant German settlement is Germantown, Pennsylvania, a suburb of Philadelphia. In the light of the current strain in U.S.-German relations, the Department of State has suggested making a sizable effort at commemorating this historical occasion. The suggested celebrations include the following:

- --A celebration in Germantown, Philadelphia, similar to one held last year in Yorktown, celebrating the bicentennial of that revolutionary battle. The actual celebration activities could thus be handled by the Interior Department, as was the case at Yorktown.
- --Inviting FRG President Carstens to the United States to participate on the commemoration festivities. A suggested itinerary for President Carstens would include a trip to Washington as well as Philadelphia-Germantown for the festivities there. The FRG President is largely a ceremonial post, thus it would be proper to extend an invitation to President Carstens.

-- The establishment of a Presidential Commission to oversee the commemoration festivities.

### ADDITIONAL POINTS OF IMPORTANCE

- --This proposed commemoration has the full support of FRG Chancellor Helmutt Schmidt as a way of resolidifying U.S.-German ties in a public forum at a time of political strain. In fact, at their last meeting in the United States, the President and Chancellor Schmidt pledged to increase cultural ties between the two nations.
- --The proposed commemoration is strongly supported by the Department of State. Indeed, the genesis of the proposal came from the DOS. Additionally, the USIA has been brought into the planning of the commemoration, specifically, with the USIA Director Charles Wick. Thus, the commission could count on the full cooperation and support of Director Wick and the USIA.
- -- The chairman of the commission (and indeed any spot on the commission itself) must be considered a real political plum.

### THE PRESIDENTIAL COMMISSION

We recommend appointing a commission of not more than eight U.S. members. All members should serve at the pleasure of the President, per diem but no salary. We believe four members, including the chairman, should be public members. Additionally, we should have one representative from the Departments of State, Interior, USIA, and Commerce. U.S. Ambassador to the Federal Republic of Germany, Arthur Burns, should be an ex-officio member. Service on the Commission would be part-time, with a schedule of work sessions probably lasting no more than a week at any one time. It should be noted that they will probably have to travel to the FRG - initially for unofficial work sessions, and later as an official U.S. Delegation. Eventually we may need a full time executive director.

We believe it is important for all members of the Commission, especially the Chairman, to be fluent in German.

In order to ensure a successful commemoration activity, quarterly reports should be prepared on the status as well as plans for the future and should be submitted to the NSC for approval.

# BIOGRAPHY OF ROBERT BEVERLEY EVANS

Robert Beverley Evans, Detroit industrialist and investor, is <u>Chairman of the Board of Evans Industries</u>, <u>Inc.</u> of Detroit. He is also former Chairman and Director of American Motors Corporation, retiring in February, 1980, after serving fourteen years on the Board.

Mr. Evans attended the University of Michigan, where he first became interested in gliding, and attended the University of Lausanne, Switzerland, for engineering studies. While at Michigan, he formed the first glider club of America, helped design the present-day American gliders as we know them, and taught over 225 students, who later became our World War II glider pilots, how to glide.

After college he turned his interest to company management, managing two Detroit firms before joining his family business -- Evans Products Company -- becoming Vice President of Operations and a Director. He left Evans Products Company in 1962 to manage his own interests.

Mr. Evans has had a remarkable background of business reorganization, having reorganized with great success over forty companies that were faltering and in serious trouble. He has done this solely on his own, without syndicating any of his holdings.

He is owner and director of many manufacturing firms, and has large real estate holdings in Florida, including a resort hotel, land development, construction and building supply companies. He also has vast interests in oil and gas fields.

For many years Mr. Evans designed and raced power boats on the Detroit River as a hobby. He designed and introduced the first high-speed hydrofoil boat in America, racing it in Detroit in 1936 under the name of Miss U.S. III, breaking the unofficial world's record by exceeding 100 miles per hour with only 650 HP in the trials at the Detrit Yacht Club. He built the first jet-powered boat in America, which exceeded a speed of 280 miles per hours, an unofficial world's record.

The President-elect today announced that he will appoint Richard V. Allen as Assistant to the President for National Security Affairs. Mr. Allen, who served as senior adviser in the 1980 Presidential campaign and serves as a senior adviser to the transition, will coordinate liaison with the National Security Council and staff. He is a member of the President-elect's Interim Foreign Policy Advisory Board.

Allen received his B.A. Degree in 1957 from the University of Notre Dame and his M.A. Degree in 1958 from Notre Dame. He studied in Germany. He has been a Senior Staff member of the Center for Strategic and International Studies of Georgetown University (1962-66) and of the Hoover Institution on War, Revolution and Peace at Stanford University (1966-1969).

After serving as Foreign Policy Advisor in the 1968 Nixon Presidential Campaign, Mr. Allen was appointed by President Nixon as Senior Staff member of the National Security Council and later served on the White House staff as Deputy Assistant to the President for International Economic Affairs and Deputy Executive Director of the Council on International Economic Policy. Since 1972, he has been President of Potomac International Corporation, a Washington, D.C. consulting firm.

Mr. Allen has been a member of the President's Commission on International Trade and Investment Policy, a member of the Executive Committee, Committee on the Present Danger, a member of the Advisory Committee on International Affairs and National Security, Republican National Committee and a member of the Advisory Board, the Center for Strategic and International Studies.

Mr. Allen is married to the former Patricia Ann Mason of Indianapolis. They and their seven children, ages 5 to 22, reside in Arlington, Virginia and Brant Beach, New Jersey.

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# AMBASSADOR KENNETH RUSH BIOGRAPHIC INFORMATION

Ambassador Rush was born in Walla Walla, Washington on January 17, 1910. He graduated from the University of Tennessee in 1930 and received a JD degree from Yale in 1932.

He worked for Union Carbide Corporation from 1937 to 1969, serving as President from 1966 to 1969. From 1969 to 1972, Rush was Ambassador to the Federal Republic of Germany. He also was the Principal American Negotiator for the Quadripartite Agreement on Berlin. He was Deputy Secretary of Defense from 1972 to 1973 and Deputy Secretary of State from 1973 to 1974. He served as a member of both President Nixon's and Ford's Cabinets as Counsellor for Economic Policy. From 1974 to 1977, he was US Ambassador to France.

We have conducted a thorough review of potential nominees for Chairman of the White House Planning Committee for the 1983 US-German Tricentennial Year. We believe that former Ambassador Kenneth Rush would be an excellent choice for that position. ICA Director Wick concurs in this recommendation.

Rush served as Ambassador to the Federal Republic of Germany from 1969 to 1972 and was Principal American Negotiator of the Quadripartite Agreement on Berlin. He currently is the Chairman of the Atlantic Council of the US, headquartered in Washington. In sum, Ambassador Rush's experience and current involvement in US-German and US-European relations makes him uniquely qualified for the role of Chairman of the White House Tricentennial Planning Committee. We have approached Ambassador Rush informally and he has consented to having his name recommended to the White House for consideration.

We also have ideas for other members of the Committee. Once the Chairman is selected, we will work with him in selecting other candidates for submission to the White House for approval.

# AMBASSADOR KENNETH RUSH BIOGRAPHIC INFORMATION

Ambassador Rush was born in Walla Walla, Washington on January 17, 1910. He graduated from the University of Tennessee in 1930 and received a JD degree from Yale in 1932.

He worked for Union Carbide Corporation from 1937 to 1969, serving as President from 1966 to 1969. From 1969 to 1972, Rush was Ambassador to the Federal Republic of Germany. He also was the Principal American Negotiator for the Quadripartite Agreement on Berlin. He was Deputy Secretary of Defense from 1972 to 1973 and Deputy Secretary of State from 1973 to 1974. He served as a member of both President Nixon's and Ford's Cabinets as Counsellor for Economic Policy. From 1974 to 1977, he was US Ambassador to France.

Currently, Ambassador Rush is Chairman of the Atlantic Council of the United States.

SUBJECT: White House Planning Committee for the 1983 U.S.-German Tricentennial Year

The Department recently recommended that President Reagan invite the President of the Federal Republic of Germany, Karl Carstens, for a state visit in 1983. During that visit, we suggested they participate in Tricentennial ceremonies in Philadelphia and in Washington (Attached).

The Tricentennial of German immigration is a unique opportunity to recognize the contribution made to this country by Americans of German descent. Feedback to Germany, coupled with whatever festivities occur in the Federal Republic, will remind Germans and Americans of the ties that have and must continue to bind both nations. Given current strains in U.S.-German relations, focusing attention on the Tricentennial would also be a useful means of stressing in public the overriding importance of close U.S.-German relations.

The Tricentennial merits national and international recognition. To ensure that it is suitably commemorated, Secretary Haig and ICA Director Wick recommend that the President name a White House Planning Committee whose task would be to coordinate, facilitate, and raise funds for Tricentennial-related projects. The President could announce creation of the committee at the time he invites President Carstens to come here in early October 1983 during President Reagan's forthcoming visit to Europe.

SUBJECT: Possible State Visit of FRG President Karl Carstens for the Tricentennial of German Immigration, October, 1983

FRG President Karl Carstens has wanted for some time to pay a state visit to the United States. The Germans have recently indicated that Carstens would like to come here for the commemoration of the 300th anniversary of German settlement in the U.S., which will take place in Philadelphia in October 1983. The first German immigrants settled in Germantown, a Philadelphia suburb. We are working with Charlie Wick and Senator Heinz to develop a Yorktown-type celebration in Philadelphia.

We recommend that the President invite Carstens for a state visit in October 1983 and that he extend the invitation during his June 9-10 visit to Bonn. This would give the President an opportunity to demonstrate to the German people his personal interest in the U.S.-FRG relationship. This would also show our appreciation to the German people for their great interest and support during our bicentennial celebration. We also recommend that the President plan to join Carstens for part of the Tricentennial commemoration. It would greatly enhance the prestige of the event and demonstrate his personal support for our important initiative on improving U.S.-FRG contacts. On the FRG side, this project has the personal backing of Chancellor Schmidt. You will recall that during Schmidt's visit to Washington in January the President and Chancellor Schmidt announced the appointment of coordinators to improve German-American contacts.

### ISSUES FOR DECISION

Whether to ask former Ambassador Kenneth Rush to serve as Chairman of the White House Planning Committee for the Tricentennial of German Immigration; whether to call Judge Clark recommending that President Reagan invite President Carstens for the October 1983 Tricentennial celebration and a state visit; and whether to sign the letter at Tab F to the Governor of Missouri accepting St. Louis as one of the primary sites of the opening celebrations of the Tricentennial year.

### ESSENTIAL FACTORS

We have made good progress on our preparations for the 1983 Tricentennial of German Immigration: ICA has given one officer full-time responsibility for coordinating the Tricentennial; the White House has approved the formation of a Planning Committee (Tab A); we have talked with groups around the United States interested in organizing events during 1983; and we have established a working group of State and ICA officers which meets periodically to review progress and coordinate planning.

As our next step, we have been asked by the White House to suggest members of the Planning Committee. We believe it would be prudent to name a Chairman first, and get him involved in recruiting other members of the Commission. We believe former Ambassador to Germany, Kenneth Rush, would be an excellent choice for that position. He is widely respected in the U.S. and the FRG and has a continuing interest in German affairs. He lives in Washington, which would be an advantage. ICA recommends that you call Charles Wick first to discuss Rush's candidacy and we concur in this recommendation. Talking points are at Tab B for your use in a telephone call to Rush if you and Director Wick agree with this suggestion.

Secondly, we need a decision out of the White House about our suggestion that the President invite FRG President Carstens to the Tricentennial celebration in Philadelphia and a state visit (Tab D). We understand from the NSC that they are favorably disposed to the idea and believe the President will agree. We need final word so the announcement of the invitation and state visit can be made during the President's visit to Bonn in June. We suggest that you telephone Judge Clark using the talking points at Tab C.

Finally, you received letters from Governor Bond of Missouri (Tab E) asking that St. Louis be named the "kick-off point" of the official celebrations for the Tricentennial year. We have been in touch with the organizers and are impressed with their plans and have no problems in principle. We also are aware that other cities are planning events and 'celebrations for the Tricentennial throughout the year, including: Southern California, Cincinnati, Houston, Atlanta, New York, and of course Philadelphia. We recommend that the St. Louis celebration be given USG blessing, but that we do not assure them they will be the "kick-off" event since other cities, including Philadelphia, may have events earlier in the year. A suggested reply letter is at Tab F.

The Committee will also be responsible for developing a plan for federal level participation and commemoration of the Tricentennial. The task of this Committee will be to work closely with both American and German governmental and private organizations to coordinate an overall program for the celebration, and to raise funds to help support the effort. I ask that you appoint an appropriate number of additional members to the committee and that you establish whichever contacts you deem most useful with local Tricentennial Committees which have already begun their work. I am directing all agencies of the Executive Branch to cooperate in this effort to the extent their participation is desirable and will contribute to the success

of the US-German Tricentennial year.

I am sure that you will agree that successful celebration of the Tricentennial is important both as a demonstration of our national heritage and in support of close German-American relations in the present and the future. I hope that you will be able to accept this important assignment.

SUBJECT: Request for Office Call: Dr. Willfred Penner

The West Germany Embassy has requested that Dr. Willfred Penner, Parliamentary State Secretary in the Ministry of Defense, be given an appointment to see Judge Clark on the afternoon of September 23. Considering the precedent that would be set should the Judge see an important though second level official, recommend that the request be denied. However, Penner is an important and influential member of the West German defense community and you should consider seeing him. State feels he would be worthwhile to receive.

His position roughly equates to our Deputy Secretary of Defense. He is very close to Hans Apel, and together with Apel, constitute the political leadership of the defense ministry. Penner is 45 years old, holds a Doctor of Law, represents North Rhine Westphalia in Parliament, and is a member of the center wing of the SPD.

Dr. Penner will be in the U.S. on official business. He will meet with high level officials at State, DoD, and on the Hill. At State, he will meet with Amb Eagleburger, Richard Burt, and Adm Howe. State would have probably scheduled a meeting with Dr. Dam if he had been on the job longer. At DoD, he will meet with Mr. Carlucci, General Vessey, Dr. Ikle, and Dr. Korb. His Hill visits will include calls on Senators Tower, Cohen and Levin and Rep Price and Nichols. Given the status of US-German relations and the number of pressing bilateral defense issues (master restationing plan, discrimination against our troops by various businesses, arms control issues, among others), Penner's visit is a good opportunity to press our positions.
