Your letter of September 10 has been received, and your interest in maintaining a free and unrestricted policy for agricultural trade is appreciated.

I assure you that the Administration fully intends to pursue the best interests of the United States and our farm sector by maximizing agricultural exports to all foreign buyers. Sales of grain and other agricultural products will in no way be singled out for restriction in any trade embargo that may be imposed by this Administration.

In view of our current abundant supplies of corn and wheat, and prospects for record harvests this year, the Administration intends to offer a large additional amount of grain for sale to the Soviet Union when consultations are held September 30, on the one-year extension of the U.S./U.S.S.R. Grains Agreement. These quantities will be in addition to the specified minimum and maximum levels.

I trust that this letter serves to clarify our policy regarding agricultural trade and to express the Administration's wholehearted support for this wital part of the Nation's economy.

Dear Mr. President:

There has been considerable question in recent months over the nature and direction of our agricultural trade policy, particularly with regard to grain sales to the Soviet Union. The Secretary of Agriculture has indicated that the Administration may be willing to offer an additional ten million metric tons of wheat and corn when negotiations with the Soviets are resumed at the end of September, but there has yet to be a firm expression of Administration commitment. As a result, farm prices have fallen sharply in the face of record harvest prospects, contributing to the serious economic conditions in our rural sector.

Congress is preparing to consider four-year farm legislation starting next week, including reductions in major commodity support programs requested by Secretary Block. I believe we can meet these reductions more than halfway if signals point to a recovery in farm prices and relief from growing surpluses of agricultural products.

I intend to make a strong statement on behalf of the Adminstration's farm and agricultural trade policy when the Senate farm bill is introduced early next week. I would like to confirm that the Administration is working to overcome the effects of the recent grain embargo, and that we will again offer surplus quantities of corn, wheat and other farm products for sale to the Soviet Union.

I would, therefore, appreciate your favorable consideration of my proposal to put the Administration on record in support of a free and unrestricted agricultural trade policy.
