Sultan's Wealth Is Vast; His Power, Greater Still

BANDAR SERI BEGAWAN, Brunei, July 12 — Multicolored tri-imphal arches are being erected throughout this capital and across the roads leading to it. Garlsh signs are going up on grandiose Government buildings, raw, new office towers and shoddy Chinese shops, and chains of Christmas-tree bulbs illuminate them.

The theme of the décor is the number 42, because Paduka Seri Baginda Sultan Haji Hassanal Bolkiah Mulz-zaddin Waddaulah, the 29th in his line of rulers of Brunei, will celebrate his

42d birthday on Friday,
Four parades in the capital, where
about one-quarter of the country's
population of 227,000 lives, will be the highlights of 10 days of celebrations. Perhaps, as in most years, some of the prison inmates will be set free.

A Dwindling Breed

Last March, the Sultan announced the detention of two conservative businessmen who had served as president and secretary general of a small party that had been formed at official instigation but had, surprisingly, adopted critical views.

At a meeting in New Zealand, Abdul Latif Chuchu, the secretary general, had criticized the Sultan's absolutism and called for parliamen-

absolutism and called for parliamentary democracy and urged the United Nations Human Rights Commission to hear his complaints.

The Sultan dissolved the party. Its two officials remain imprisoned without trial. Politically interested Bruneians said they did not know how many people are detained for political of-lenses, nor whether some of those arrested in 1962 were still imprisoned. Diplomats' estimates range from fewer than 10 to about 40.

Much of the criticism that reaches here comes from exiles who enjoy a measure of tolerance in Malaysia and smuggle leaflets into Brunel. The criticism centers on the great wealth and conspicuous use of it by the Sultan and other family members.

Gorbachev Plays It Safe—and Makes No Gains—in Polish Visit

WARSAW, July 14-Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev today ended a four-day bilateral visit to Poland that in its lack of substance and highly orthodox style underlined the Kremlin's concern with avoiding upheaval in its volatile neighbor.

In a series of speeches to the Polish parliament, shipyard workers, intellectuals and youth, Gorbachev broke no new ground in Polish-Soviet relations and scrupulously avoided the controversial themes of Polish domestic politics. To the dismay of hopeful intellectuals, he made no effort to reach out to Polish society or spur the political elite out of its longstanding torpor.

Instead, Gorbachev stood before small crowds assembled by police and party officials and blandly repeated the formulation that Poland and the Soviet Union are pursuing the same goals of economic and political change. He allowed nervous Polish authorities to or-

chestrate every "spontaneous" encounter on his tour with a heavy hand that evoked the repudiated techniques of Leonid Brezhnev or even Joseph Stalin.

Finally, Gorbachev embraced the beleaguered Polish leader, Gen. Wojciech Jaruzelski, with an enthusiasm that seemed calculated to bolster a regime battered by runaway inflation, strikes and an increas-

ingly hostile public mood. "I will tell it dianalysis rectly to you Poles," he said last night on television. "You were lucky at this stage of history

there has appeared a man" like Jaruzelski.

For the millions of Poles who have hoped Gorbachev's rule would open the way for real change in their chronically troubled country, the lackluster, cautious performance must be at once disappointing and puzzling. How, Jaruzelski's many opponents are asking, can a dynamic reformer like Gorbachev really believe that after seven years of staunation and failure, the general

Gorbachev's schedule contained the kind of small political gestures that are the hallmark of Jaruzelski, real but so modest as to be virtually meaningless: an "unscheduled" stop at a private farm, for example, and a brief visit with a bishop in Krakow's St. Mary's Church.

Remarkably, the politician who ignited the wide-open debate of the recent Soviet party conference deliberately ducked the issues that most concern Poles. Though he directly addressed the "lessons" of Poland's experiment with the free trade union Solidarity during his 1986 viet. Gorbachev avoided the word "solidarity" in speaking to a

Dear Colin:

I understand Secretary Baker is considering action to stop imports of tea and certain candy from the Soviet Union because of some information indicating they may have been made with convict labor. I also understand that you will be talking with Secretary Shultz on this topic next week and thought our opinion on the subject might be helpful to you.

It goes without saying that Section 307 of the Trade Act of 1930, which prohibits imports of products made with forced labor, should be enforced.

As we are in the midst of intensive efforts to improve our trade relations with the Soviets, it seems to me equally true that such trade action be taken only after we are quite sure of the current facts. It is also important that the same procedures be followed for imports from the Soviet Union as would be followed in investigating allegations related to other countries. This includes any "de minimus" or other standards that would apply to other countries.

We hope there will be a chance for further airing of the subject before action is taken. I hope that you will add my concerns to those of others in ensuring fair and careful action in enforcing this provision of our trade laws.

I plan to share my concerns also with Secretary Baker upon his return.

- In response to the request by General Powell in Tuesday's briefing, on the Airborne Reconnaissance Support System and Advanced Airborne Intelligence Collection System (AAICS), to engage the DCI/DDCI on the topic of "earnest seed money" for FY 1990 from the DCI and NFIP, I did so and provide the following:
 - General Powell should sign the memorandum as revised.
 - The DCI will begin review of the issues of the FY 1990 National Foreign Intelligence Program (NFIP), including funding of airborne reconnaissance, as part of the summer review cycle beginning on Tuesday, 19 July, at a meeting of the National Foreign Intelligence Council (NFIC). Another meeting of the NFIC likely will occur in August. This topic of funding has been a DCI decision issue in the past and almost surely will be again this year.
 - The DCI and NFIP have put a modest amount of money into advanced airborne collection over the years, because the DCI has believed it important, and this appears likely again.
 - The funding issue should be addressed jointly with the other key 0 issues, such as management.
 - Whatever the substantive and fiscal outcomes, the DCI and the Secretary of Defense need to be able to say that the right squares were checked en route to a joint decision.
