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VOA/RFE/RL RADIO RELAY IN ISRAEL

BACKGROUND

On June 18, the U.S. and Israel signed agreements to construct and operate a new VOA/RFE/RL radio relay station in Israel. The relay is part of a modernization program for U.S. international broadcasting set in motion in 1982 to bring our broadcast capabilities up to levels maintained by others including the USSR, France, West Germany and Great Britain. Since the start of the program agreements have been signed to construct new relay stations in eight countries and negotiations are underway to construct several others.

Signals from the relay in Israel will be beamed to Eastern Europe, the Soviet Union, South Asia, Central and East Africa. Site preparation and construction will take about five years from the date work begins; start up is dependent on Congressional approval of funding.

There is no special political significance to the relay's location in Israel. With the exception of arrangements regarding the amount of work that will go to Israeli contractors and the responsibilities of a GOI entity, TOMER, the agreement is essentially the same as relay agreements with the countries including Morocco, Thailand, Sri Lanka and Botswana.

o Talking Points (only if subject is raised)

- No special political significance should be inferred by our decision to construct and operate a VOA/RFE/RL relay station in Israel: we have similar projects underway in countries in Central and North Africa, Asia, and the Americas.
- Modernization of our international broadcast capability reflects our commitment to providing listeners throughout the world with an objective picture of American society and a clear statement of American policies and positions on major world issues.
- Countries agreeing to establishment of our relay stations share our conviction that the fewer barriers to communication in the world, the better the chance for success in international relations.

SUBJECT: Latest Figures on Jewish Emigration from the USSR

The number of Soviet Jewish emigrants who arrived in Vienna in the month of June was 790, less than the figure for May arrivals. The drop may, however, not be of special significance. For the last three months, the monthly totals have been in the 700-900 range, as shown by the following tabulation:

If the present pattern of exit permit issuance holds, the total number of Jewish emigrants from the USSR in 1987 will be around 8000. This will be a figure greater than the total for the five-year period 1982-1986, but still far below the annual average of about 25,000 during the period 1971-1980.

The great bulk of present arrivals continue to be Refuseniks. The June arrivals did, however, include a small number of families whose applications were approved on their first try.
