2. AMBASSADOR HARTMAN SHOULD DELIVER FOLLOWING LETTER FROM PRESIDENT REAGAN TO PRESIDENT BREZHNEV TO FOREIGN MINISTER GROMYKO. THE LETTER IS KEYED TO A SPEECH WHICH THE PRESIDENT IS SCHEDULED TO DELIVER NOVEMBER 18 IN WASHINGTON. TALKING POINTS FOR AMBASSADOR'S DEMARCHE FOLLOW SEPTEL.

3. BEGIN TEXT. DEAR PRESIDENT BREZHNEV: YOUR LETTER OF OCTOBER 15 MAKES IT CLEAR ONCE AGAIN HOW PROFOUND ARE THE DIFFERENCES IN OUR RESPECTIVE ASSESSMENTS OF THE CAUSES OF THE MAJOR SOURCES OF TENSION IN THE WORLD. I FIND IT DIFFICULT TO ACCEPT YOUR DECLARATION THAT SOVIET ACTIONS IN OTHER PARTS OF THE WORLD MUST HAVE NO BEARING ON OUR RELATIONS. SOVIET ACTIONS ARE HAVING A DIRECT AND ADVERSE IMPACT ON AMERICAN INTERESTS IN MANY PARTS OF THE WORLD. AS I SAID IN MY LETTER TO YOU OF SEPTEMBER 22, SOVIET RESORT TO

MESSAGE (CONTINUED) :

DIRECT AND INDIRECT USE OF FORCE IN REGIONAL CONFLICTS IS A MATTER OF DEEP CONCERN TO US, AS IS THE CONTINUED BUILDUP OF MILITARY STRENGTH BEYOND THE NEED FOR SELF-DEFENSE. DESPITE THESE DIFFERENCES, HOWEVER, WE SHOULD STRIVE TO FIND A COMMON GROUND FOR AGREEMENT ON MATTERS OF VITAL INTEREST TO OUR TWO COUNTRIES AND THE REST OF THE WORLD. THE CAUSE OF PEACE, AND PARTICULARLY THE THREAT OF NUCLEAR DESTRUCTION HANGING OVER MANKIND, REQUIRE THAT OUR TWO COUNTRIES MAKE AN EFFORT, TOGETHER WITH OUR PARTNERS, TO RESOLVE OUR DIFFERENCES PEACEFULLY. I ASSURE YOU THE UNITED STATES IS COMMITTED TO SUCH A PROCESS. I THEREFORE WELCOME AN OPPORTUNITY FOR BUSINESSLIKE COOPERATION IN ADDRESSING WORLD PROBLEMS. I BELIEVE THAT OUR EXCHANGES, AND THE DISCUSSIONS IN NEW YORK BETWEEN SECRETARY HAIG AND FOREIGN MINISTER GROMYKO,

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HAVE LAID THE ESSENTIAL GROUNDWORK FOR SUCH AN EFFORT. THE KEY QUESTION NOW IS HOW WE CAN TRANSLATE THESE BEGINNINGS INTO CONCRETE RESULTS. WE ARE READY TO ADVANCE SPECIFIC SOLUTIONS AND TO HEAR OUR SOVIET PROPOSALS AIMED AT RELIEVING THE DANGERS, AS WELL AS THE CURRENT HUMAN SUFFERING, IN PROBLEM AREAS AROUND THE WORLD.

I AM CONVINCED, MR. PRESIDENT, THAT WE CAN ACHIEVE RESULTS IN THE COMING YEAR IF THERE IS GENUINE GOOD WILL AND SERIOUS INTEREST ON BOTH SIDES. AFGHANISTAN REMAINS A MAJOR OBSTACLE TO PROGRESS. BECLOUDING THE INTERNATIONAL ATMOSPHERE. IT APPEARS FROM RECENT COMMUNICATIONS THAT WE BOTH AGREE ON THE NEED FOR PROGRESS TOWARD AN INTERNATIONALLY ACCEPTABLE SOLUTION OF THIS ISSUE. WE APPEAR TO AGREE ON BASIC GOALS: A NON-ALIGNED, INDEPENDENT AFGHANISTAN, FREE OF ANY FOREIGN MILITARY PRESENCE AND GUARANTEED AGAINST ANY OUTSIDE INTERFERENCE. THIS CALLS FOR A COMPLETE WITHDRAWAL SOVIET FORCES FROM AFGHANISTAN AT THE EARLIEST POSSIBLE DATE. THE UNITED STATES IS PREPARED TO CONTINUE THE EXCHANGE OF VIEWS ON QUESTIONS THAT BEAR ON A POLITICAL SETTLEMENT IN AFGHANISTAN. AMBASSADOR HARTMAN WILL BE IN TOUCH WITH FOREIGN MINISTER GROMYKO TO DETERMINE WHETHER THERE IS THE BASIS FOR A SERIOUS DIALOGUE. NOW LET ME ADDRESS YOUR ASSERTIONS REGARDING US POLICY TOWARDS CUBA. WE DO NOT SEEK TO INTERFERE WITH CUBA'S INDEPENDENCE NOR ARE WE INTERFERING IN CUBA'S INTERNAL AFFAIRS. HOWEVER.

MESSAGE (CONTINUED) :

WE DO FIND ENTIRELY UNACCEPTABLE CUBA'S UNREMITTING EFFORTS TO EXPORT ITS REVOLUTION BY FOMENTING VIOLENT INSURGENCIES AND TERRORISM AGAINST LEGITIMATE GOVERNMENTS IN CENTRAL AMERICA.

BUT TO GET TO THE REAL PURPOSE OF MY LETTER, ARMS CONTROL IS A VITAL AREA WHERE PROGRESS CAN BE MADE TOWARD WORLD PEACE. THE UNITED STATES IS PREPARED TO ACCEPT EQUALITY IN CONVENTIONAL, INTERMEDIATE-RANGE NUCLEAR AND STRATEGIC FORCES AT THE LOWEST POSSIBLE LEVEL OF SUCH WE ARE ALSO PREPARED TO TAKE OTHER STEPS TO FORCES. ENHANCE GENERAL PEACE AND INTERNATIONAL SECURITY. LET ME BEGIN WITH STRATEGIC FORCES. THE UNITED STATES WILL BE PREPARED TO OPEN NEGOTIATIONS ON STRATEGIC ARMS REDUCTION AS SOON AS POSSIBLE IN THE NEW YEAR. IN APPROACHING THESE TALKS WE SHOULD LEARN FROM PST EXPERIENCES. IN MY VIEW HOWEVER, THE NEGOTIATIONS ALSO WILL REQUIRE FRESH IDEAS - TO WHICH BOTH SIDES SHOULD DEVOTE URGENT AND SERIOUS ATTENTION - IN ORDER THAT WE CAN ACHIEVE GENUINE REDUCTIONS IN STRATEGIC FORCES. THIS WILL DEMAND POLITICAL WILL AND A READINESS ON BOTH SIDES TO ACCEPT A HIGHER DEGREE OF OPENNESS IN ORDER TO ENHANCE MUTUAL CONFIDENCE. IN THIS CONNECTION, I WELCOME YOUR IMPORTANT PUBLIC STATEMENT THAT VERIFICATION MEASURES GOING BEYOND NATIONAL TECHNICAL MEANS MIGHT BE POSSIBLE. CONCERNING INTERMEDIATE-RANGE NUCLEAR FORCES, THE AGREEMENT TO BEGIN TALKS ON THESE SYSTEMS ON NOVEMBER 30 IN GENEVA MARKS AN IMPORTANT BEGINNING IN DEALING WITH THE DIFFICULT ISSUE OF THE MILITARY IMBALANCE IN THESE WE ARE READY TO REACH AN AGREEMENT WITH THE FORCES. SOVIET UNION WHICH WE BELIEVE IS STRAIGHTFORWARD AND WE ARE PREPARED TO CANCEL OUR PLAN TO DEPLOY FAIR. PERSHING II AND GROUND-LAUNCHED CRUISE MISSILES ON THE CONDITION THAT THE SOVIET UNION IN TURN DISMANTLES ALL OF ITS SS-20 MISSILES, RETIRES AND DISMANTLES ITS SS-4 AND SS-5 MISSILES, AND DESISTS FROM FURTHER DEPLOYMENTS OF THESE OR COMPARABLE SYSTEMS. OPPORTUNITIES ALSO EXIST FOR REDUCTIONS IN CONVENTIONAL FORCES IN EUROPE. YOUR OFFENSIVE FORCES

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HAVE BECOME INCREASINGLY CAPABLE. THE SOVIET UNION COULD MAKE NO MORE CONVINCING CONTRIBUTION TO PEACE IN EUROPE THAN BY SUBSTANTIALLY REDUCING ITS CONVENTIONAL FORCES. NOW IS THE TIME TO TAKE ACTIONS TO ACHIEVE EQUALITY AT A LOWER LEVEL OF CONVENTIONAL FORCES IN EUROPE. THE CONFERENCE ON SECURITY AND COOPERATION IN EUROPE

MESSAGE (CONTINUED) :

OFFERS ANOTHER PRACTICAL POSSIBILITY FOR INCREASING CONFIDENCE AND REDUCING THE RISKS OF WAR. AT THE MADRID MEETING, THE WESTERN COUNTRIES HAVE ADVANCED PROPOSALS FOR A CONFERENCE ON DISARMAMENT IN EUROPE THAT COULD NEGOTIATE MEASURES AIMED AT REDUCING CONCERNS ABOUT SURPRISE ATTACK. AT THE SAME TIME, I WOULD HOPE WE COULD MOVE THE HELSINKI PROCESS FORWARD IN A BALANCED WAY IN ALL AREAS, TAKING FAVORABLE ACTION TO RESOLVE CERTAIN HUMANITARIAN MATTERS, SUCH AS THE REUNIFICATION OF DIVIDED FAMILIES AND THE INDIVIDUAL CASES RAISED DURING THE RECENT DISCUSSIONS BETWEEN OUR FOREIGN MINISTERS IN SUCH ACTION I HAVE NO DOUBT WOULD HAVE A NEW YORK. FAVORABLE EFFECT ON DELIBERATIONS IN MADRID, AND ON RELATIONS BETWEEN OUR TWO COUNTRIES. I FEEL I MUST TELL YOU I AM PERSONALLY CONCERNED WITH THE PARTICULAR CASES UNDER DISCUSSION BETWEEN SECRETARY HAIG AND YOUR REPRESENTATIVES. THERE IS NO SHORTAGE, MR. PRESIDENT, OF OPPORTUNITIES FOR EASING WORLD TENSIONS. IF THE SOVIET UNION IS PREPARED TO MOVE FORWARD IN THESE AREAS OF GENUINE CONCERN TO THE UNITED STATES AND ITS ALLIES, YOU WILL FIND ME A READY PARTNER. SINCERELY. RONALD REAGAN HAIG

2. SUMMARY: AMBASSADOR HARTMAN CALLED ON FOREIGN MINISTER GROMYKO NOVEMBER 18 TO DELIVER THE PRESIDENT'S LETTER TO BREZHNEV AND DISCUSS POINTS IN REFTEL B. GROMYKO DID NOT COMMENT DIRECTLY ON THE LETTER, NOTING THAT HE HAD JUST RECEIVED TRANSLATION FROM THE SOVIET EMBASSY IN WASHINGTON. HE DID, HOWEVER, ADDRESS THE ISSUES RAISED IN OUR TALKING POINTS, IN VINTAGE GROMYKO FASHION, FOR SOMETHING OVER TWO HOURS. HE BASICALLY ACCEPTED THE ESSENTIAL REALITY OF LINKAGE WHILE ARGUING AGAINST IMPOSING PRE-CONDITIONS ON OUR RELATIONSHIP, FLATLY DENIED THAT ARMS OR ARMED PERSONNEL ARE BEING SENT TO LATIN AMERICA BY CUBA, TOOK A HARD AND UNYIELDING STANCE ON AFGHANISTAN, PROFESSED SOVIET DESIRE FOR PROGRESS AT THE INF TALKS WHILE REFERRING TO "EQUALITY AND EQUAL SECURITY" AS THE BEDROCK

MESSAGE (CONTINUED) :

FOUNDATION OF ANY ARMS AGREEMENT, AND LECTURED ON THE NEED TO LOWER OUR VOICES ON NUCLEAR WAR. THE AMBASSADOR EMPHASIZED THE IMPORTANCE OF THE PRESIDENT'S LETTER AND SPEECH, THE ROLE OF THE SOVIET MILITARY BUILDUP IN ERODING U.S. -SOVIET RELATIONS, AND PROBED FOR ANY NEW SOVIET APPROACH ON AFGHANISTAN. END SUMMARY.

3. FOLLOWING PLEASANTRIES, AMBASSADOR HARTMAN OPENED THE MEETING BY HANDING OVER THE PRESIDENT'S LETTER AND MAKING A TWENTY MINUTE PRESENTATION OF THE POINTS IN HIS INSTRUCTIONS, INCLUDING THE BILATERAL INSTRUCTIONS. GROMYKO RESPONDED WITH A LONG MONOLOGUE MAKING THE FOLLOWING POINTS:

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A. U.S. - SOVIET RELATIONS: NO ONE CAN DENY THAT

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U. S. -SOVIET RELATIONS ARE AFFECTED BY ISSUES ELSEWHERE IN OTHER AREAS OF THE WORLD AND THAT THE STATE OF SOVIET-U. S. RELATIONS SOMETIMES ARFECTS ISSUES IN OTHER AREAS OF THE WORLD. HOWEVER, THE USSR DOES NOT ACCEPT THAT IMPROVEMENTS IN SOVIET-U. S. RELATIONS MUST AWAIT THE RESOLUTION OF PROBLEMS IN OTHER AREAS. IT IS UNREALISTIC TO EXPECT THAT THE SITUATION IN ALL AREAS OF THE WORLD COULD BE TO THE LIKING OF BOTH OF US AT ANY PARTICULAR TIME AND THE USSR WILL NOT ACCEPT ANY PRE-CONDITIONS ON IMPROVEMENTS IN SOVIET-U. S. RELATIONS. WE MUST DEAL WITH EVENTS ON THEIR MERITS AND WHEN THE ARISE. THERE CAN BE SEVERAL ISSUES BEFORE US AT ONCE, BUT TO TRY TO DEAL WITH EVERYTHING WILL ONLY BRING ABOUT AN IMPASSE.

CUBA: THE U.S. SHOULD LEAVE CUBA ALONE, EVEN Β. THOUGH YOU DISLIKE ITS SOCIALIST SYSTEM. YOUR STATEMENTS THAT THE CUBANS ARE SENDING ARMS AND ARMED PERSONNEL TO KLATIN AMERICA ARE SIMPLY NOT WE CAN BE SPECIFIC BECAUSE WE KNOW THAT THIS TRUE. THE U.S. IS CORRECT. YOUR SOURCES ARE WRONG. IS EITHER BEING MISLED OR INTENTIONALLY MAKING FALSE CUBAN LEADERS HAVE TOLD STATEMENTS ON THIS ISSUE. US THEY WANT BETTER RELATIONS WITH THE UNITED STATES DESPITE THE CONTINUED U.S. PRESENCE AT GUANTANAMO AND THE TOUGH APPROACH FROM THE U.S. WE HOPE THE U. S. WILL TAKE A MORE SENSIBLE POSITION ON CUBA.

AFGHANISTAN: WE HAVE NOTHING NEW ON AFGHANISTAN. D. STRATEGIC ARMS AND INF: THE USSR WANTS TO FIND COMMON LANGUAGE WITH THE U.S. IN THE INF TALKS AND TO HAVE A SUCCESSFUL OUTCOME, BUT IT FEELS THAT THE U.S. HAS NOT TAKEN A PATH CONDUCIVE TO FINDING SOLUTIONS. THE BEDROCK FOUNDATION OF THE SOVIET POSITION IS THAT ARMS AGREEMENTS MUST BE BASED ON EQUALITY AND EQUAL SECURITY. IF WASHINGTON SEEKS PREDOMINANCE, THERE CAN BE NO PROGRESS IN ARMS NEGOTIATIONS. ON MBFR, WE BELIEVE THAT THE U.S. AND ITS ALLIES HAVE DECIDED THAT THERE SHOULD BE NO POSITIVE END. THE WEST IS ONLY KEEPING THEM GOING FOR "CONSIDERATIONS OF A TRANSIENT NATURE". THE USSR HAS SOUGHT TO MEET THE WEST HALFWAY AND EVEN WITHDREW TANKS AND TROOPS FROM THE GDR. THE WEST DID NOT EVEN THANK US FOR THAT BUT INSTEAD HOLDS FAST TO ITS POSITIONS.

WE HOPE THE WEST WILL TAKE A MORE OBJECTIVE AND REASONABLE STAND. FOR OUR PART, WE HOPE THE MEETING WILL BE A SUCCESS. F. TALK OF NUCLEAR WAR: A LARGE MEASURE OF TENSION HAS BEEN GENERATED BY WASHINGTON THROUGH STATEMENTS

AND ACTIONS OF ITS LEADING PERSONALITIES. THERE ARE MANY STATEMENTS ON NUCLEAR WAR OR A LIMITED NUCLEAR WAR WITH THE THEATER FOR THEIR USE BEING EUROPE. WHY ARE YOU PUTTING THESE IDEAS IN PEOPLES' HEADS? ON NUCLEAR ISSUES, THE U.S. AND THE USSR ARE IN THE SAME BOAT. THERE SHOULD BE A STATEMENT FROM WASHINGTON, FROM THE PRESIDENT, RESPONDING TO MR. BREZHNEV AND COMMITTING THE U.S. TO A NUCLEAR NON-FIRST USE POLICY. THE SOVIET LEADERSHIP HAS BEEN PURSUING AND WILL CONTINUE TO PURSUE A POLICY OF PEACE, AND WE WANT GOOD AND BUSINESSLIKE RELATIONS WITH THE UNITED STATES AS PRESIDENT BREZHNEV HAS NOTED IN REPEATED STATEMENTS.

MISUNDERSTANDING IN THE FOREIGN MINISTER'S PERCEPTION OF THE U.S. -SOVIET RELATIONSHIP. THE REASON FOR THE DEBATE IN THE U.S. ON U.S. - SOVIET RELATIONS WAS DUE TO THE PERCEPTION OF THE AMERICAN PUBLIC OF A TREMENDOUS BUILDUP IN SOVIET MILITARY STRENGTH BEYOND WHAT COULD LEGITIMATELY BE NEEDED FOR DEFENSE. IN A PERIOD WHEN U.S. DEFENSE EXPENDITURES DECLINED OR LEVELED OFF, SOVIET DEFENSE SPENDING HAD GROWN RAPIDLY. HE NOTED THAT THE SOVIET STATEMENT ON AFGHANISTAN LEFT OUT THE CRITICAL ELEMENT OF THE WISHES OF THE AFGHAN PEOPLE. BABRAK KARMAL IS NOT ACCEPTED BY THE AFGHAN PEOPLE AND HIS GOVERNMENT FACES OVERWHELMING OPPOSITION. PERHAPS THE TWO DEVELOPMENTS COULD GO ON IN PARALLEL.

6. GROMYKO THEN LAUNCHED INTO AN IMPASSIONED DENIAL THAT THE INTERNAL SITUATION IN AFGHANISTAN MIGHT BE AN ISSUE FOR DISCUSSION. THERE IS A REGIME IN AFGHANISTAN THAT GOVERNS THE COUNTRY AND THERE IS NO GROUND TO SAY THAT IT IS NOT SUPPORTED INTERNALLY. 2. THIS CABLE CONTAINS INSTRUCTIONS FOR AMBASSADOR HARTMAN'S APPOINTMENT WITH GROMYKO NOVEMBER 18 MOSCOW TIME. PURPOSES OF THE MEETING WILL BE TO DELIVER A COPY OF THE LETTER FROM PRESIDENT REAGAN TO BREZHNEV, TO INFORM SOVIETS ABOUT THE PRESIDENT'S FOREIGN POLICY SPEECH, AND TO CONTINUE OUR EXCHANGES WITH THE SOVIETS ON A NUMBER OF OUTSTANDING BILATERAL ISSUES. (FYI: PRESIDENT'S LETTER TO BREZHNEV WAS DELIVERED TO SOVIET AMBASSADOR DOBRYNIN HERE EVENING NOVEMBER 17).

3. AMBASSADOR HARTMAN SHOULD DRAW UPON FOLLOWING TALKING POINTS DURING DISCUSSION OF TOPICS INCLUDED IN THE PRESIDENT'S SPEECH AND LETTER:

A. U.S. -SOVIET RELATIONS: --I HAVE BEEN INSTRUCTED TO INFORM YOU THAT TODAY IN WASHINGTON PRESIDENT REAGAN WILL MAKE A MAJOR FOREIGN POLICY SPEECH, WHICH WILL ADDRESS OUR OVERALL APPROACH TO PEACE AND SECURITY, INCLUDING ARMS CONTROL AND KEY REGIONAL ISSUES. WE BELIEVE THAT YOU WILL FIND IT A

MESSAGE (CONTINUED) :

BALANCED AND CONSTRUCTIVE STATEMENT OF OUR APPROACH. --IN ADDITION, I HAVE BEEN INSTRUCTED TO DELIVER TODAY PRESIDENT REAGAN'S REPLY TO PRESIDENT BREZHNEV'S LETTER OF OCTOBER 15, A COPY OF WHICH WAS ALSO DELIVERED TO YOUR AMBASSADOR IN WASHINGTON. (TEXT OF LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT TO BREZHNEV IS BEING TRANSMITTED TO YOU BY SEPTEL). NEEDLESS TO SAY, WE HOPE THAT BOTH THE PRESIDENT'S SPEECH AND HIS LETTER WILL BE CAREFULLY CONSIDERED BY THE SOVIET LEADERSHIP AS AUTHORITATIVE STATEMENTS OF OUR POLICY.

--PRESIDENT REAGAN'S LETTER MAKES CLEAR THAT WE CANNOT ACCEPT THE ASSERTION THAT SOVIET ACTIONS IN OTHER PARTS OF THE WORLD HAVE NO BEARING ON OUR RELATIONS. SOVIET RESORT TO DIRECT AND INDIRECT USE OF FORCE IN REGIONAL CONFLICTS AND THE CONTINUING BUILD-UP OF SOVIET MILITARY FORCES ARE MATTERS OF DEEP COCNCERN TO US.

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--DESPITE OUR DIFFERENCES ON THESE ISSUES, OUR TWO CO NTRIES SHOULD MAKE A CONCERTED EFFORT TO RESOLVE OUTSTANDING PROBLEMS PEACEFULLY. THE US IS COMMITTED TO SUCH A PROCESS AND WE WELCOME THE EXPRESSED SOVIET DESIRE FOR BUSINESSLIKE COOPERATION IN ADDRESSING WORLD PROBLEMS.

--THE HAIG/GROMYKO MEETINGS IN NEW YORK HAVE PROVIDED A USEFUL BEGINNING FOR WHAT WE HOPE WILL BE A BROAD AND CONSTRUCTIVE U.S. -SOVIET DIALOGUE. BUT NOW WE MUST TRANSLATE THESE BEGINNINGS INTO CONCRETE RESULTS. WE HAVE ALREADY BEGUN INTENSIVE PREPARATIONS FOR THE, GENEVA MEETING IN JANUARY.

B. AFGHANISTAN:

--AS PRESIDENT REAGAN'S LETTER TO PRESIDENT BREZHNEV STATES, WE REMAIN DEDICATED TO THE SEARCH FOR A SOLUTION TO THE AFGHANISTAN PROBLEM WHICH WOULD ACHIEVE THE OBJECTIVES OF A NON-ALIGNED, INDEPENDENT AFGHANISTAN, FREE OF FOREIGN MILITARY PRESENCE AND GUARANTEED AGAINST OUTSIDE INTERFERENCE.

WE HAVE NOTED THE ABSENCE FROM DOBRYNIN'S DEMARCHE OF FORMULAS FOR A SETTLEMENT WHICH THE SOVIET SIDE KNOWS ARE UNACCEPTABLE TO US AND TO THE INTERNATIONAL COMMUNITY.

--WE WILL SHORTLY HAVE A CONSIDERED REPLY TO AMBASSADOR

DOBRYNIN'S DEMARCHE.

C. CUBA:

--I WISH NOW TO TURN TO THE SUBJECT OF CUBA AND AMBASSADOR DOBRYNIN'S DEMARCHE TO THE SECRETARY OF OCTOBER 31 WHICH CONTAINS A NUMBER OF INACCURACIES AND DISTORTIONS. I EXPECT TO HAVE MORE TO SAY ON CUBA AT A LATER MEETING, BUT MY AUTHORITIES BELIEVE IT IMPORTANT TO MAKE U.S. VIEWS ON THESE INACCURACIES CLEAR AT THIS TIME.

--THE SOVIET DEMARCHE ALLEGES THAT THE U.S. IS MOUNTING A "CAMPAIGN OF HATRED AND THREATS" AGAINST CUBA BECAUSE THE U.S. DOES NOT LIKE CUBA'S SOCIAL SYSTEM. PRESIDENT REAGAN'S LETTER MAKES CLEAR THAT WE ARE NOT ATTEMPTING TO OVERTURN CUBA'S POLITICAL OR ECONOMIC SYSTEM, NOR ARE WE INTERFERING IN CUBA'S INTERNAL AFFAIRS. --AS WE HAVE REPEATEDLY STATED, WE HAVE PROBLEMS WITH CUBA NOT BECAUSE OF ITS SOCIAL SYSTEM BUT BECAUSE OF ITS EFFORTS TO EXPORT THAT SYSTEM TO OTHER COUNTRIES IN LATIN AMERICA BY PROVIDING ARMS AND OTHER SUPPORT TO VIOLENT INSURGENCIES AGAINST LEGITIMATE GOVERNMENTS. IT IS THIS ASPECT OF CUBAN BEHAVIOR WHICH WE WILL NOT ACCEPT. --WE HAVE NOT INITIATED A CAMPAIGN OF ANY KIND AGAINST RATHER IT IS THE CUBAN CAMPAIGN OF CUBA. INTERVENTIONISM WHICH HAS FORCED US TO RESPOND. D. SECURITY AND ARMS CONTROL: --PRESIDENT REAGAN'S LETTER MAKES CLEAR THAT WE ARE PREPARED TO ACCEPT EQUALITY IN CONVENTIONAL, INTERMEDIATE-RANGE, AND STRATEGIC FORCES AT THE LOWEST

POSSIBLE LEVEL OF SUCH FORCES. 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THEREFORE, WE WELCOME PRESIDENT BREZHNEV'S RECENT PUBLIC STATEMENT THAT THE SOVIET UNION WOULD BE WILLING TO CONSIDER MEANS OF VERIFICATION GOING BEYOND NATIONAL TECHNICAL MEANS. --CONCERNING INTERMEDIATE-RANGE NUCLEAR FORCES, PRESIDENT REAGAN'S LETTER MAKES CLEAR THAT OUR APPROACH

MESSAGE (CONTINUED) :

TO THE NEGOTIATIONS BEGINNING IN GENEVA NOVEMBER 30 IS SERIOUS AND AMBITIOUS. WE ARE PREPARED TO CANCEL OUR PLAN TO DEPLOY PERSHING II AND GROUND-LAUNCHED CRUISE MISSILES IF THE SOVIET UNION IN TURN DISMANTLES ALL OF ITS SS-20 MISSILES, RETIRES AND DISMANTLES ITS SS-4 AND SS-5 MISSILES, AND DESISTS FROM FURTHER DEPLOYMENTS OF THESE OR COMPARABLE SYSTEMS. WE LOOK FORWARD TO YOUR RESPONSE TO THIS APPROACH AND WILL, OF COURSE, CONSIDER IN GOOD FAITH CONSTRUCTIVE SOVIET PROPOSALS. --PRESIDENT REAGAN'S LETTER ALSO STATES OUR CONVICTION THAT POSSIBILITIES EXIST FOR REDUCTION OF CONVENTIONAL FORCES IN EUROPE. THE SOVIET UNION COULD MAKE NO MORE CONVINCING CONTRIBUTION TO PEACE IN EUROPE THAN SUBSTANTIAL REDUCTIONS IN ITS CONVENTIONAL FORCES. WE BELIEVE THAT NOW IS THE TIME TO TAKE ACTIONS TO ACHIEVE EQUALITY AT A LOWER LEVEL OF CONVENTIONAL FORCES IN FUROPE.

--WITH REGARD TO THE CSCE PROCESS AND THE MADRID MEETING, THE PRESIDENT'S LETTER RECALLS THAT THE WESTERN SIDE HAS ADVANCED PROPOSALS FOR A CONFERENCE ON DISARMAMENT IN EUROPE THAT COULD NEGOTIATE MEASURES AIMED AT REDUCING CONCERNS ABOUT SURPRISE ATTACK. --ROMANIA IS IN AN ESPECIALLY DIFFICULT PERIOD RIGHT NOW, AND NEEDS AMERICAN ASSISTANCE;

--THE INTEREST RATE ON CCC CREDITS IS SO HIGH THAT THE GOR PROBABLY WILL NOT ACCEPT THAT TYPE OF ASSISTANCE;

--OTHERS (E.G., SAUDI ARABIA) HAVE OFFERED HELP, BUT CEAUSESCU PREFERS TO SEEK US HELP;

--THE GOR HAD NOTED THE USG'S WILLINGNESS TO SUPPORT IN PRINCIPLE ROMANIA IN THE IMF;

--GIVEN THE USG'S INABILITY TO LEND \$1 BILLION, ROMANIA NOW NEEDS EITHER A BILLION DOLLAR LOAN FROM THE IMF OR A \$4500 MILLION TRANCHE OUT OF NEXT YEAR'S PORTION OF THE \$1.5 BILLION IMF LOAN ALREADY NEGOTIATED; EITHER WAY, THESE FUNDS ARE NEEDED BY 12/31/81;

2. THE EMBASSY URGES THAT WE OPPOSE ON THE FOLLOWING GROUNDS THE BRITISH REQUEST TO CONVENE A SEPARATE MEETING IN WARSAW TO REVIEW THE YUGOSLAV FINANCIAL SITUATION:

--ALTHOUGH THE BALANCE-OF-PAYMENTS SITUATION HERE AND THE LEVEL OF INDEBTEDNESS ARE WORRISOME, YUGOSLAVIA'S FINANCIAL PROBLEMS ARE CLEARLY NOT OF THE SAME MAGNITUDE AS ROMANIA'S AND POLAND'S. WE SHOULD AVOID THE APPEARANCE OF IMPLYING THAT THE FINANCIAL SITUATIONS OF THESE THREE STATES ARE ANAL AGOUS.

-- NOT ONLY ARE THE FINANCIAL SITUATIONS DIFFERENT, BUT THE WARSAW MEETING WOULD UNDERMINE OUR LONGSTANDING POLICY OF SHARPLY DISTINGUISHING BETWZEN YUGOSLAVIA AND MEM-BERS OF THE WARSAW PACT. A WARSAW MEETING DEVOTED TO A DISCUSSION OF FINANCIAL PROBLEMS OF POLAND, ROMANIA -- AND YUGOSLAVIA -- WOULD NOT BE HELPFUL IN OUR BILATERAL RELATIONSHIP WITH THE YUGOSLAVS. -- THE PROPOSED MEETING MIGHT WELL BECOME KNOWN TO THE YUGOSLAVS AND -- MORE IMPORTANTLY -- TO U.S. AND WESTERN BANKERS. COMBINING YUGOSLAVIA WITH POLAND AND ROMANIA WOULD GIVE PRECISELY THE OPPOSITE MESSAGE THAT THE EMBASSY UNDER BOTH AMBASSADORS EAGLEBURGER AND ANDERSON HAS SOUGHT TO CONVEY TO U.S. BANKERS OVER THE LAST SEVERAL YEARS, I.E., THAT POST-TITO YUGOSLAVIA IS GRAPPLING WITH THE COMPLEX FINANCIAL ISSUES OF A DEVELOPING COUNTRY AND DESPITE ONGOING, SERIOUS ECONOMIC PORBLEMS, IS NOT IN THE SAME CATEGORY OF NEAR-CRISIS AS POLAND AND ROMANIA.

--WE UNDERSTAND FROM THE BRITISH EMBASSY HERE THAT THE PORPOSAL IS A BRITISH INITIATIVE. IT IS NOT CLEAR, HOWEVER, WHY THE REVIEW OF YUGOSLAVIA HAS BEEN REQUESTED AT THIS TIME AND WHY IN WARSAW. -- WE WOULD PREFER THAT IF ANY COMPREHENSIVE REVIEW OF YUGOSLAVIA'S FINANCIAL SITUATION IS TO TAKE PLACE. IT SHOULD FOLLOW THE NOVEMBER 16 GATT FULL BALANCE-

OF-PAYMENTS' REVIEW AND BE HELD IN EITHER PARIS OR LONDON.

3. SHOULD THE DEPARTMENT DECIDE THAT, GIVEN THE ABOVE DISADVANTAGES, SOME KIND OF MEETING ON YUGOSLAVIA MUST AFTER ALL BE HELD, THE EMBASSY SHOULD HAVE THE OPPOR-TUNITY TO COMMENT ON ANY USG VIEW OR PAPER PRESENTED. ANDERSON BT

1. SUMMARY: THE RATE OF SOVIET ECONOMIC GROWTH IS CONTINUING TO DECELERATE DURING 1981, AS INDICATED IN OUTFUT STATISTICS PUBLISHED OCTOBER 24. THE RATES OF GROWTH OF INDUSTRIAL OUTPUT AND LABOR PRODUCTIVITY REMAIN BELOW THOSE PLANNED FOR THE YEAR AND EVEN BELOW RATES ACHIEVED IN 1980 AND THE FIRST HALF OF 1981. IN THE ENERGY SECTOR, BOTH GAS AND OIL OUTPUT SEEMS LIKELY TO ACHIEVE, AND PERHAPS EVEN EXCEED, ANNUAL PRODUCTION TARGETS. HOWEVER, PRODUCTION OF A NUMBER OF OTHER BASIC INDUSTRIAL INPUTS, INCLUDING STEEL AND COAL, MERELY KEPT PACE WITH, OR WAS ACTUALLY LOWER THAN, OUTPUT LEVELS REACHED IN THE SAME PERIOD LAST YEAR. DESPITE CONTINUING RHETORICAL EMPHASIS ON PROVIDING ADDITIONAL CONSUMER GOODS FOR THE SOVIET PEOPLE, THE INCREASE IN OUTPUT BY GROUP "B" (LIGHT) INDUSTRY WAS WELL BELOW THE GROWTH OF ACHIEVED BY SOVIET INDUSTRY AS A WHOLE. WHILE FOOD AVAILABILITY REMAINS A SERIOUS PROBLEM FOR SOVIET CONSUMERS. THE RECENTLY RELEASED DATA INDICATES THAT THE SOVIETS HAVE BEEN ABLE TO MAINTAIN PRODUCTION OF MEAT, SAUSAGE AND WHOLE MILK AT ABOUT LAST YEAR'S LOW LEVELS. END SUMMARY.

2. OUTPUT STATISTICS FOR THE FIRST NINE MONTHS OF 1981, PUBLISHED OCTOBER 24 IN THE CENTRAL PRESS, INDICATE A CONTINUING DECELERATION OF THE RATE OF SOVIET ECONOMIC GROWTH. INDUSTRIAL OUTPUT HAS GROWN BY 3.3 PERCENT THUS FAR IN 1981, WELL BELOW THE 4.1 PERCENT INCREASE PLANNED FOR THIS YEAR AND THE 3.9 PERCENT INCREASE PLANNED FOR THIS YEAR AND THE 3.9 PERCENT INCREASE ACTUALLY ACHIEVED DURING THE SAME PERIOD IN 1980. LABOR PRODUCTIVITY HAS GROWN BY 2.6 PERCENT THUS FAR IN 1921, BELOW THE 2.9 PERCENT GROWTH RATE OBTAINED IN THE SAME PERIOD LAST YEAR. SOVIET LEADERS HAVE BEEN COUNTING HEAVILY ON A SUBSTANTIAL ACCELERATION IN THE RATE OF PRODUCTIVITY GROWTH TO COUNTER THE LOOMING LABOR SHORTAGE THE USSR WILL EXPERIENCE DURING THIS DECADE.

3. OUTPUT OF SEVERAL BASIC INDUSTRIAL PRODUCTS WHICH SERVE AS IMPORTANT INPUTS FOR OTHER SECTORS OF THE ECONOMY CONTINUE TO CAUSE CONCERN. "TRUD'S" "ECONOMIC OBSERVER" COLUMN OCTOBER 25 NOTES THAT "SERIOUS SHORTCOMINGS HAVE BEEN PERMITTED IN FERROUS METALLURGY." WHILE ROLLED STEEL PRODUCTION THUS FAR IN 1981 HAS MATCHED OUTPUT DURING THE SAME PERIOD LAST YEAR, STEEL PIPE PRODUCTION

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WAS ACTUALLY LOWER THROUGH NINE MONTHS OF 1981 THAN LAST YEAR. "TRUD" ALSO COMMENTS THAT. DESPITE SUBSTANTIAL INCREASES IN OUTPUT OF SEVERAL BASIC CHEMICAL PRODUCTS (SUCH AS CHEMICAL FERTILIZER) THIS YEAR, OUTPUT STILL LAGS BEHIND PLAN TARGETS. TRANSPORTATION CONTINUES TO RANK AS A SERIOUS BOTTLENECK TO THE SMOOTH FUNCTIONING OF THE SOVIET ECONOMY. DESPITE THIS, OUTPUT OF DIESEL LOCOMOTIVES, ROLLING STOCK, AND TRUCKS THUS FAR IN 1981 ARE ALL BELOW 1980 PRODUCTION LEVELS FOR THE SAME PERIOD. RHETORICAL EMPHASIS ON IMPROVING THE MATERIAL WELL-BEING OF SOVIET CONSUMERS NOTWITH-STANDING, "TRUD" NOTES THAT OUTPUT GROWTH BY GROUP "B (LIGHT, OR CONSUMER-GOODS INDUSTRIES) WAS UP ONLY TWO PERCENT IN THE FIRST NINE MONTHS OF THIS YEAR. SUBSTANTIALLY BELOW THE RATE OF GROWTH OF TOTAL INDUSTRIAL OUTPUT. SOVIET OFFICIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE PAST YEAR HAVE EMPHASIZED THAT GROUP "B" OUT-PUT WAS STATED TO EXCEED THAT OF GROUP "A" (HEAVY) INDUSTRIES THIS YEAR. PROCESSED FOOD STATISTICS SHOW THAT MEAT. SAUSAGE AND WHOLE MILK OUTPUT REMAINED AT ABOUT THE LEVELS PRODUCED IN THE CORRESPONDING PERIOD LAST YEAR, WHILE PRODUCTION OF BUTTER AND VEGETABLE OILS REMAINED FIVE PERCENT LOWER THAN IN THE FIRST NINE MONTHS OF 1980.

4. NATURAL GAS: THIS REMAINS THE BRIGHTEST SPOT IN THE SOVIET ENERGY PICTURE. LAST MONTH'S OUTPUT, AT 39 BILLION CUBIC METERS, WAS THE THIRD HIGHEST MONTHLY PRODUCTION TOTAL ATTAINED THIS YEAR. GAS PRODUCTION HAS NOW RISEN FOR FOUR CONSECUTIVE MONTHS, AND THE DAILY EXTRACTION RATES IN SEPTEMBER WAS 1.3 BILLION CUBIC METERS,

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MARKLARG A RETURN TO THE RATE ACHIEVED IN THE FIRST THIRD OF THIS YEAR. OUR PROJECTIONS CONTINUE TO FORECAST THAT SOVIET NATURAL GAS PRODUCTION THIS YEAR WILL EXCEED THE PLAN TARGET OF 458 BILLION CUBIC METERS. IF PRESENT TRENDS CONTINUE, WE NOW EXPECT TOTAL OUTPUT FOR THE YEAR IN THE 460-465 BILLION CUBIC METER RANGE.

5. OIL: SOVIET PRODUCTION OF CRUDE OIL AND GAS CONDENSATES ALSO APPEARS TO BE ON TARGET THUS FAR IN 1981. HOWEVER, SOVIET PRESS COVERAGE OF THIS INDUSTRY'S ACHIEVEMENTS CONTINUES TO BE RESTRAINED. FOR EXAMPLE, "TRUD" COMMENTS THAT WHILE OIL OUTPUT IS UP SLIGHTLY OVER THE SAME PERIOD LAST YEAR. THE INDUSTRY FAILED TO FULFILL ITS ABOVE-PLAN PRODUCTION GOALS. STILL, DAILY EXTRACTION RATES FOR OIL THROUGH SEPTEMBER HAVE HELD STEADY AT THE LEVEL PREVAILING SINCE 1980, IN CONTRAST TO THE SUMMER SLUMP IN EXTRACTION RATES FOR NATURAL GAS. OUR PROJECTION CONTINUES TO SHOW THAT. IF PRESENT TRENDS CONTINUE, OIL OUTPUT THIS YEAR WILL REACH OR PERHAPS EVEN SLIGHTLY EXCEED THE PLAN TARGET OF 610 MILLION METRIC TONS; OUR PROJECTIONS NOW SHOW TOTAL 1981 PRODUCTION OF 61Ø TO 612 MMTS.

6. COAL: THE COAL INDUSTRY, THE BENEFICIARY OF A SUBSTANTIAL WAGE INCREASE IN SEPTEMBER AND OF A MAJOR PARTY/GOVERNMENT DECREE EARLIER THIS MONTH, CONTINUES ITS DISAPPOINTING PERFORMANCE. COAL OUTPUT LAST MONTH, AT 56 MILLION METRIC TONS. WAS TWO PERCENT LOWER THAN IN SEPTEMBER. 1980, AND THE CUMULATIVE OUTPUT TOTAL FOR THE FIRST NINE MONTHS OF 1981 ALSO LAGS BEHIND THE LEVEL PRODUCED IN THE CORRESPONDING PERIOD LAST YEAR. AN OCTOBER 25 EDITORIAL IN "SOTSIALISTICHESKAYA INDUSTRIYA" BLAMES THE DECLINE ON SHAFT MINERS IN THE DONETSK, KUZNETS AND KARAGANDA COAL BASINS. THIS IS CONSISTENT WITH. THE OCTOBER DECREE'S EMPHASIS ON SPEEDING DEVELOPMENT OF SOVIET OPEN-CAST MINES. SLUMPING OUTPUT OF COKING COAL (WHICH IS PRODUCED MAINLY IN DONBAS AND KUZBAS SHAFT MINES) IS CONTINUED TO BE SINGLED OUT AS A MAJOR BOTTLENECK FOR THE SOVIET STEEL INDUSTRY. OUR PROJECTIONS CONTINUE TO FORECAST THAT TOTAL 1981 COAL PRODUCTION WILL NOT ONLY FAIL TO FULFILL THE PLAN, BUT WILL BE LOWER THAN 1980 OUTPUT, MARKING A THIRD CONSECUTIVE YEAR OF DECLINING COAL OUTPUT. WE CURRENTLY ESTIMATE THAT 1981 COAL PRODUCTION WILL BE IN THE 783-706 MILLION METRIC TON RANGE.

7. ELECTRICITY: THE SOVIET POWER GRID GENERATED

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101 BILLION KILOWATT HOURS LAST MONTH, UP TWO PERCENT OVER SEPTEMBER, 1980. AS WE HAVE NOTED EARLIER, ELECTRICITY OUTPUT IS PRIMARILY A FUNCTION OF DEMAND, AS THE SOVIET POWER INDUSTRY IS CAPABLE OF GENERATING FAR HIGHER WATTAGES IF NECESSARY. THE CONTINUING FAILURE OF DEMAND FOR ELECTRICITY BY SOVIET INDUSTRY TO GROW AS FAST AS OVERALL INDUSTRIAL PRODUCTION IS PUZZLING, SINCE IT IS COMMONLY ESTIMATED THAT AT LEAST ONE PERCENT GROWTH IN SOVIET ENERGY CONSUMPTION IS REQUIRED IN ORDER TO ACHIEVE A ONE PERCENT GROWTH IN GNP.

Subject: Recommendation for Renewal of US-USSR Agreement on Cooperation in Studies of the World Ocean

The US-USSR Agreement on Cooperation in Studies of the World Ocean expires December 15, 1981, and can be renewed by mutual agreement of both sides.

As the attached report indicates, the lead agency, the National Oceanographic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), believes that the Agreement has resulted in concrete benefits to the U.S. and that, while it is now operating at a reduced level of activity, should be renewed for an additional three year period.

The Committee on Exchanges (COMEX) concluded that activities under the Agreement have resulted in benefits to the U.S., and that, overall, Agreement activities appear to be well balanced. COMEX concurs in NOAA's recommendation that the Agreement be renewed.

The lead agency report has also been reviewed by members of the Interagency Coordinating Committee on U.S.-Soviet Affairs (ICCUSA). All either concurred in the recommendation that the Agreement be renewed, or offered no comment.

The Department of State favors renewing the Agreement for three years. Although we have substantially cut back on exchange activities in the wake of the Afghanistan invasion, we have tried to leave the structure of cooperation intact. We are continuing with certain routine exchanges which are of benefit to us. We feel this approach gives us the flexibility to adjust the tightening or relaxing of our exchanges policy to future shifts in the political situation. Consistent with this approach, we permitted the automatic extension in May, 1980 of the Transportation Agreement, the first



agreement to come up for renewal after the Afghanistan invasion. We also recommended in a recent memorandum to the NSC that the Health and Environmental Agreements be extended.

The Soviets, for their part, have informally expressed their readiness to renew the Oceans Agreement.

Extension of the Agreement can be achieved by a simple exchange of diplomatic notes.

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EUR/IG REPORT ON THE RENEWAL OF THE US-USSR AGREEMENT ON COOPERATION IN STUDIES OF THE WORLD OCEAN

The US-USSR Agreement on Cooperation in Studies of the World Oceans will expire December 15, 1981. An explicit action -- signature of a new agreement or exchange of diplomatic notes -- is required in order to renew the Agreement.

The Oceans Agreement was first signed in Washington in June, 1973 by Secretary of State Rogers and Soviet Foreign Minister Gromyko. The Agreement was renewed on its own terms for six months in June, 1978, and subsequently amended and further renewed for three years on December 15, 1978. The modification of four of the articles from the original Agreement served largely to update the list of areas of cooperation and to specify the "equal, reciprocal, and mutually beneficial basis" of access to technology, institutes, organizations and scientists participating in joint cooperative activity as well as scientific and technical data.

Since the last renewal of the Oceans Agreement in December, 1978, US-Soviet relations have cooled and funding for activities in many areas has been reduced. Overall, as a consequence, the National Oceanographic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) estimates that activities under this agreement have declined by one-half since the invasion of Afghanistan in December, 1979.

NOAA has been the lead agency for the Agreement, with additional participation from the U.S. Navy, the National Science Foundation, U.S. Geological Survey, and the National Academy of Sciences. The Academy of Sciences of the USSR coordinates the activities on the Soviet side.

Activities under the Agreement cover five areas: air/sea interaction, ocean dynamics, marine geology and geophysics, instrumentation, and biological productivity and biochemistry. Attached is NOAA's report which provides a description of progress and benefits in these areas. Forms of cooperation range from exchanges of delegations or information to extensive joint research studies, often aboard oceanographic vessels and to remote regions of the world (e.g. Antarctica). Agreement activities range from minimal to extensive and generally do not involve sensitive technology



or linkage to bilateral issues outside the Agreement framework.

Soviet interest in U.S. technology in Ocean studies is quite high, and the Agreement does facilitate their access. Overall, however, NOAA believes benefits are about equal, with the degree of usefulness and balance of benefits varying from activity to activity and over time. Technology transfer risks are carefully monitored by the U.S. side.

SUMMARY CONCLUSIONS AND AGENCY RECOMMENDATIONS

NOAA's evaluation comments indicate:

-- Benefits to the U.S. from the Agreement include opportunities for U.S. scientists to gain access to research facilities in various locations in the USSR, and in waters off the Soviet coast, aboard both US and Soviet research ships. Soviet participation aboard the research vessel Glomar Challenger has enhanced and helped finance the overall international effort in the Deep Sea Drilling Project (DSDP). The Agreement has also facilitated considerable exchange of data from cooperative cruises in the area of biological productivity and biochemistry.

-- Balance and reciprocity were specifically included in the amendment text at the time of the previous renewal of the Agreement in 1978. These factors continue to apply.

Agency Recommendations

NOAA recommends the Oceans Agreement be renewed by its terms for an additional three-year period effective December 15, 1981, as set forth in their report (attached).

State recommends the Agreement be renewed for three years.

DOD made no separate recommendation on the renewal of the Agreement, although <u>Navy</u>, as a participating technical agency, did concur in the NOAA report.

Committee on Exchanges (COMEX) concurs in NOAA's recommendation to renew the Agreement. Its report is attached.

The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) concurs in NOAA's recommendation. Its report is attached.

Other Agencies offered no comment or concurred.

We have reviewed the report prepared by NCAA recommending renewal of the US-USSR Agreement on Cooperation in Studies of the World Ocean. The relevant U.S. Government agencies involved in cooperation with the Soviet Union under the Environmental Agreement have no objection to renewal of the World Ocean Agreement.

We note mention (p. 7) of greater emphasis to come on chemical oceanographic parameters, and interest in Soviet capabilities with regard to measurement of pollutants. It should be pointed out that EPA has been working with the Soviets on such problems, albeit with a focus on coastal and estuarine waters, for several years under Area VI of the Environmental Agreement. We would welcome greater participation in this effort from NOAA laboratories in Seattle, Washington, and Sandy Hook, New Jersey. Additionally, our Soviet counterpart organizations have long demonstrated a concern for blue-water pollution, something for which EPA has no regulatory responsibility. We would be happy to facilitate contact between NOAA and cooperating Soviet institutes in support of joint ocean pollution studies. 76

One other area of interest common to both the Oceans and Environmental Agreements is aquaculture (p. 6). Preliminary consideration has already been given to expanding US-Soviet aquaculture work under the Environmental Agreement to include salt water studies. We would hope to coordinate with NOAA so as to avoid duplication of effort in this regard.
