A LONG-TERM SOLUTION TO THE PROBLEM OF THE PENTE-COSTALS' EMIGRATION AND TO REQUEST SOVIET EMERGENCY AUTHORIZATION TO MEDICALLY EVACUATE AUGUSTINA AND LIDIA VASHCHENKO TO A WESTERN COUNTRY IN THE EVENT THEIR CONDITION SHOULD BECOME SERIOUS. MYSHKOV GAVE NO HOPE THAT HIS GOVERNMENT WOULD AGREE TO A MEDICAL EVACUATION, ALTHOUGH HE DID NOT REJECT IT ON THE SPOT. HE SHOWED SOME INTEREST IN THE PROPOSED LONG-TERM SOLUTION: THEEMIGRATION OF THE PENTECOSTALS' FAMILY MEMBERS FROM CHERNOGORSK TO BE FOLLOWED BY THE DEPARTURE OF THE SEVEN IN THE EMBASSY TO APPLY FOR EXIT PERMISSION IN THEIR LEGAL PLACE OF RESIDENCE. END SUMMARY.

THIS AFTERNOON (JANUARY 7) DCM MADE DEMARCHE з. ON PENTECOSTAL ISSUE TO MYSHKOV, ACTING CHIEF OF MFA USA DIVISION. FOLLOWING INTRODUCTORY COMMENTS DESIGNED TO ESTABLISH THAT THIS WAS AS MUCH A SOVIET AS A U.S. PROBLEM AND TO ASSURE MYSHKOV THAT WE TOOK SERIOUSLY THE SOVIET INSISTENCE THAT THE SEVEN COULD EMIGRATE ONLY FROM CHERNOGORSK, DCM SAID THAT THERE WERE NOW TWO ASPECTS OF THE PROBLEM: A BASIC ASPECT AND AN EMERGENCY ASPECT. TAKING THE BASIC ASPECT FIRST, HE SAID THAT THERE WAS A NEW DEVELOPMENT WHICH OFFERED A COMPREHENSIVE SOLUTION TO THE PROBLEM OF THE SEVEN: AFTER MANY MONTHS OF INTERNAL DISCUSSIONS, THE SEVEN PENTE-COSTALS HAD AGREED TO THE EMBASSY'S OUTLINING TO THE SOVIETS A NEW SUGGESTION. THE DCM HANDED MYSHKOV THE TEXT OF THE SUGGESTION AS A NON-PAPER. THE TEXT IS AS FOLLOWS: BEGIN TEXT: THE PENTECOSTALS WITHIN OUR EMBASSY HAVE ASSURED US THAT IF THEIR FAMILY MEMBERS IN CHERNOGORSK ARE FIRST ALLOWED TO EMIGRATE ACCORDING TO THE PROCEDURES ESTABLISHED BY SOVIET LAW, AND IF THE SEVEN ARE GIVEN ASSURANCES THAT THEY WILL NOT FACE PROSECUTION



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AND THAT THEIR APPLICATIONS FOR EMIGRATION WILL BE FAVORABLY PROCESSED, THEY WILL LEAVE THE EMBASSY. END TEXT.

4. THE DCM SAID THAT SUCH AN APPROACH WOULD PROVIDE AN EFFECTIVE SOLUTION FOR ALL CONCERNED. WITH THE FAMILY MEMBERS IN THE U.S., THE SOVIETS COULD OFFER EMIGRATION TO THE SEVEN ON THE BASIS OF FAMILY REUNIFICATION. THE DCM NOTED A 1978 PRECEDENT FOR THIS: AN ARMENIAN WOMAN (ELIZA OVSEPYAN) WHO HAD BEEN PERSUADED TO LEAVE THE EMBASSY AFTER THREE MONTHS ON RECEIVING ASSURANCES FROM THE SOVIETS THAT HER APPLICATION FOR EMIGRATION WOULD BE LOOKED UPON FAVORABLY; SEVERAL WEEKS LATER SHE DID RECEIVE PERMISSION TO EMIGRATE.

5. THE DCM THEN TURNED TO THE EMERGENCY ASPECT OF THE POBLEM. HE DESCRIBED THE HUNGER STRIKE BY AUGUSTINA AND LIDIA VASHCHENKO AND SAID THAT THE EMBASSY IS NOW PERSUADED THAT THE TWO ARE PREPARED TO DIE. EMBASSY OFFICERS, THE FAMILY'S FRIENDS ABROAD, AND OTHER FAMILY MEMBERS IN THE EMBASSY HAD FAILED TO DISSUADE AUGUSTINA AND LIDIA. THE DCM REMINDED MYSHKOV OF THE TREMENDOUS PUBLICITY IN THE WEST THAT WOULD RESULT IF THE TWO DIED, AND THE INEVITABLE RESPONSIBILITY THAT WOULD BE ASSIGNED TO THE SOVIET UNION. SUBJECT:

Economic Sanctions (Export Controls) Applying to the USSR

As the attached memorandum to me indicates, there is disagreement on the scope of the President's decision to expand the oil and gas controls on exports to the Soviet Union. This was clear at the Commerce meeting last week referred to in the attached memorandum. This memorandum sets out the two issues on extraterritorial application of the controls -- the application of controls to U.S. foreign subsidiaries and application of controls to foreign firms producing products from licensed U.S. technology.

In order to carry out the President's decision fully, we request written clarification from the NSC.

- 1. Subsequent to the January 7, 1982, meeting with Olmer, Hormats, Unger, et al., I called Norman Bailey, Director of Planning for the National Security Council, in an attempt to clarify the intent of the Presidential statement on expansion of oil and gas controls. During the meeting it was clear that State interpreted the expansion of oil and gas controls to prevent only <u>U.S.-origin goods</u> from going to the U.S.S.R. My recollection of Presidential intent was to prevent <u>U.S. companies</u> from selling to the U.S.S.R. The other issue that needed clarification was whether products of U.S. technology produced by foreign firms were to be embargoed also.
- 2. During my initial discussion with Bailey, I asked him to coordinate with Jim Nance and/or William Clark. At approximately 5:00 P.M., Bailey called back and said that:
  - a. It was the President's intent to prevent <u>U.S. firms</u> from selling oil and gas equipment to the <u>U.S.S.R.</u> regardless of location of manufacturing.
  - b. The issue of embargoing products of U.S. technology manufactured by foreign firms under license to U.S. firms had to be raised with the President for clarification.

I assume Bailey coordinated with Nance and Clark, but I don't know that for a fact.

- 3. I suggest that we proceed to amend the regulations to include all <u>U.S. persons</u> (including wholly-owned U.S. subsidiaries abroad and U.S. controlled foreign companies). This amendment would prevent foreign subsidiaries of U.S. companies from selling oil and gas equipment to the U.S.S.R. without a validated license. I will coordinate with State to accomplish this.
- 4. When issuing this new regulation, we can credibly argue that the President's intent was to cover U.S. subsidiaries all along, but we needed a legal clarification before implementation.

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3. IT IS NOW CLEAR TO THE SOVIETS THAT EUROPEANS ARE INDIGNANT ABOUT EVENTS IN POLAND. AT FIRST THE SOVIETS THOUGHT U.S. POLICIES OF SANCTIONS WOULD CAUSE A SHARP RIFT IN NATO. THESE SOVIET PERCEPTIONS ARE CHANGING. IF THE CRISIS IN POLAND WORSENS AND THE SOVIETS EXERT A HEAVY HAND, THIS ISOLATION COULD ESCALATE. 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

2. AS YOU KNOW, TWO OF THE SEVEN PENTECOSTALS IN OUR EMBASSY ARE INTO THEIR THIRD WEEK OF A HUNGER STRIKE. THEY ARE TAKING FRUIT JUICE AND OTHER LIQUIDS, AND THE EMBASSY DOCTOR BELIEVES THAT, IF THEY CONTINUE TO DO SO, WE MAY HAVE SEVERAL WEEKS BEFORE WE ARE AT A DANGEROUS POINT. AFTER SEVERAL MONTHS OF DEBATE AMONG THEMSELVES,

IF THAT IS TURNED DOWN (AS IS ALMOST CERTAIN), I WOULD THEN TELL THE SOVIETS (1) THAT WE HAVE NO CHOICE BUT TO HOSPITALIZE THEM IN THE SOVIET UNION AND (2) THAT WE EXPECT THE SOVIETS TO ALLOW THEM TO RETURN TO THE EMBASSY -- IF THEY SO DESIRE -- WHEN THEY ARE WELL. SUBJECT: Poland: One Month Under Martial Law

WILLIAM P. CLARK

As the initial shock of December 13 dissipates, the intentions of Poland's military government are becoming increasingly clear. (8)

The purpose of Jaruzelski's coup was not merely to stamp out the nation-wide opposition that has arisen in 1980-81, but also to ensure, through a complete revamping of the entire system, that Communist authority will never be challenged again. This military dictatorship is the classic embodiment of the counterrevolution. As the counter-reforms are put in place, the junta intends gradually to relax its grip on the country and turn power over to a new, restructured Communist Party. The process is likely to take years rather than months, and its outcome is far from certain. (S)

Judging both by the actions and statements of the Polish junta, its objective is to transform Poland <u>politically on the Czech</u> model and economically on the Hungarian one. This means the restoration of totalitarianism with a certain amount of carefully controlled decentralization and self-management in the economic sphere. (\$)

- -- The Polish Government is moving quickly and ruthlessly to destroy all vestiges of political reforms introduced in 1980-81. The democratic processes introduced into the party in July 1981 have been abrogated and strict centralism is being restored. Trade union activity has been outlawed. Statutes ensuring university autonomy have been abolished. In short, all independent associations and democratic procedures are being done away with.
- -- The Polish Communist party, which in the first days of the new regime disappeared from view, is energetically reconstituting itself. The party is, for all practical purposes, a skeletal organization and must begin from scratch. Widespread purges are conducted to eliminate both ordinary bureaucratic profiteers and ideological "revisionists". The party that will emerge from this purge will be leaner and more pliant. (SY)

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These political moves point toward the ultimate objective of a totalitarian state of the kind now in place in Czechoslovakia. However, the Polish economy is in such ruin that it cannot be reconstituted by Stalinist methods. For this reason, the junta has committed itself to the adoption of the Hungarian "New Economic Mechanism". State enterprises will be required to show profitability instead of meeting preordained production quotas; marginal sectors of the economy will be transferred into private hands; and limited trade union activity, under strict party supervision, will be allowed. (\$\$)

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For this economic plan to work, Jaruzelski requires help from foreign lenders as well as from the mass of Polish workers and peasants, neither of which he is likely to obtain. (8)

- -- According to a statement by a Polish Deputy Prime Minister on January 9, Poland will require in the coming year a rescheduling of \$10 billion in foreign obligations (principal and interest) as well as an "absolute minimum" of \$6.0 billion in additional hard currency credits with which to buy essential raw materials and components for its industries. Lacking that new capital, he warned, Poland will be forced to "shut down factories".
- -- The industrial working class is overwhelmingly hostile to the new regime: not a single senior Solidarity leader has defected to it. All indications are that workers are engaging in passive resistance. Farmers are refusing to deliver food and slaughter livestock. (St

The Government thus faces a very bleak economic prospect: the looming economic catastrophe may well undermine its entire ambitious political plan. It is difficult to see how the Soviet Union, with its own economic and financial problems, can rescue its Polish client. The junta hangs in the air, uncertain what to do and how to get out of its economic predicament, for repression has its limits. A firm Western stand may well in time compel a change of course in Poland. (8)



2. IMMEDIATELY ON RECEIPT OF REFTEL, DCM DELIVERED PRESIDENT'S LETTER TO MFA USA DIVISION CHIEF KOMPLEKTOV WITH REQUEST THAT IT BE IMMEDIATELY PASSED ON TO PRESIDENT BREZHNEV. DCM EMPHASIZED THAT THE LETTER WAS COUCHED IN HUMANITARIAN TERMS, THAT IT CONTAINED NO POLEMICS OF ANY SORT, AND THAT IT DESCRIBED A PROPOSAL WHICH OFFERED A WAY OUT OF THE PROBLEM. KOMPLEKTOV SAID HE WOULD DO SO AND WOULD NOT COMMENT ON THE LETTER ITSELF. BUT HE DID HAVE SOME REMARKS TO MAKE ON THE PENTECOSTAL ISSUE. KOMPLEKTOV THEN, IN A TONE WHICH WAS INSENSITIVE EVEN FOR HIM, SAID THAT THE PENTECOSTALS WERE ENTIRELY A RESPONSIBILITY OF THE U.S. EMBASSY AND THE SOVIET GOVERNMENT HAD NO RESPONSIBILITY IN HE CALLED THE PROPOSAL OFFERED IN THE ANY WAY. PRESIDENT'S LETTER ~- WHICH THE DCM HAD DISCUSSED WITH HIS DEPUTY THE WEEK BEFORE -- "NOT A PROPOSAL,

MESSAGE (CONTINUED) :

BUT A CONDITION. " THE DCM DISAGREED, SAYING THAT IT HAD TAKEN THE FAMILIES SEVERAL MONTHS TO AGREE ON SUCH A PLAN AND THAT IT OFFERED A GOOD POSSIBILITY FOR SOLVING THE PROBLEM. RETURNING TO THE ATTACK, KOMPLEKTOV SAID THAT THE PRIOR EMIGRATION OF THE FAMILY MEMBERS WAS CERTAINLY A PRE-CONDITION. HE SAID THAT THE SOVIET POSITION WAS CLEAR AND CONSISTENT: THE FAMILIES SHOULD GO BACK TO CHERNOGORSK AND APPLY FOR EMIGRATION PERMISSION THERE. IN CLOSING HE ASKED SARCASTICALLY WHAT WERE OUR PLANS FOR RELEASING THE PRESIDENT'S LETTER. DCM ASSURED HIM THAT THE LETTER WOULD NOT BE RELEASED BECAUSE WE WANTED TO PROVIDE THE BEST POSSIBILITY FOR RESOLVING THIS CASE. DISBELIEVING, KOMPLEKTOV SAID "WE WILL SEE WHETHER THE U.S. SIDE LEAKS THE LETTER." IN CLOSING, HE REITERATED THAT HE WAS NOT
