



Attached are copies of the files maintained by this Agency on two nationals of the PRC.

In both cases the Pederal Bureau of Investigation has requested, as an interested government agency, that the USIA recommend that each of the aliens be given a waiver. Such a recommendation by this Agency is authorized by law and will lead to the Immigration and Haturalization Service granting the waiver. The net effect would be that neither alien would return to the PRC.

Requests for waivers of the two-year home country residency requirements from sister government agencies are normally handled on a routine basis by the Office of the General Counsel. There are no legal problems with these requests although we will ensure that the request has been cleared by the Director of the FBI.

We are submitting the cases to you for a determination of the political issues involved. To our knowledge there has been no publicity concerning these two aliens. You are aware, of course, that the granting of asiyum to the Chinese tennis player, Hu Na, last year provoked the PRC to cancel cultural exchanges under our Agreement with It (although it did not cancel the Agreement itself) A favorable recommendation by this Agency on the waivers could have unfavorable consequences on the President's proposed trip to China and the pending renegotiation of the Agency's Implementing Accord with the PRC.

We would appreciate your recommendations.

THE ALL CHINA SPORTS FEDERATION ALSO ANNOUNCED THAT PRO CONTECTANTS WOULD NOT PARTICIPATE IN ANY SPORTS ACTIVITIES IN THE U.S. IN 1983. STUDENT EXCHAIGES AND COMEDULED VISITS OF AMPARTS WERE NOT MENTIONED AND FFFSUMFCLY WILL BE ALLOWED TO CONTUBUE

AT THE HOON EPIEFING, A STATE DEPIRTMENT SPOKESMAN SAID THAT THE UNITED STATES REGRETS THE UNITESE UNILATERAL DECISION AND CONSIDERS IT HIAPPROPRIATE AND AH OVER-PEASTICH TO THE SITUATION. THE DECISION TO GRANT ASYLUM WAS WEIGHED AND MADE IN ACCORDANCE WITH U.S. LAW AND SECULD BE VIEWED AS A SPECIFIC CASE WITHIN THE LARGER FRAMENORK OF U.S. -CHINA RELATIONS. THE DEPARTMENT HAS BEEN CAREFUL TO STRESS THAT THE HU NA DECISION DOES NOT CONSTITUTE A JUGGEMENT OF CHINA'S POLITICAL SYSTEM NOR DOES THIS DEGISION CREATE A PRECEDENT FOR FUTURE ASYLUM APPLICATIONS FROM PRC NATIONALS.
- 3. THE U.S. REGRETS THE CHINECE UNILATERAL DECISION. WE ACTED IN ACCORDANCE WITH OUR LAWS AND REGULATIONS WHICH ARE APPLIED ON A CASE BY CASE BASIS.
- 4 THE U.S. ACTED IN ACCORDANCE WITH OUR GENERAL SUPPORT FOR THE HUMAN RIGHTS OF ALL INDIVIDUALS. ROBINSON, ACTING

NEARLY NINE MONTHS AGO ON JULY 26, 1982, HU NA, CHINA'S
TOP-RANKING WOMAN TENNIS PLAYER, FORMALLY REQUESTED POLITICAL
ASYLUM IN THE UNITED STATES. MS. HU WAS IN THE U.S. TO
GOMPETE IN THE FEDERATION CUP TENNIS TOURNAMENT. SHE WALKED
OUT OF HER HOTEL ROOM LEAVING ALL HER LUGGAGE BEHIND AND
RETAINED SAN FRANCISCO LAWYER, EDWARD Y. LAU, TO REPRESENT
HER REFORE THE IMMIGRATION AND NATURALIZATION SERVICE.
HU NA BASED HER REQUEST FOR POLITICAL ASYLUM ON HER FEAR OF

PERSOCUTION ONCE SHE RETURNED "O CHINA. SHE STATED THAT SHE HAD RECEIVED INCREASINGLY URGENT "INVITATIONS" TO JOIN THE COMMUNIST PARTY AND DID NOT WISH TO DO SO. SHE BELIEVED THAT IF SHE WERE TO JOIN, SHE WOULD THEN HE IDENTIFIED WITH THE PROVINCIAL PARTY LEADER AND WOULD INEVITABLY BE CAUGHT UP IN FASTIONAL STRIFE. SHOULD THE PROVINCIAL LEADER FALL INTO DISFAVOR, HU NA BELIEVED SHE WOULD BE PERSECUTED. SHE CITED THE CASE OF ZHUANG ZEDUNG, FORMER WORLD CHAMPION PING-PONG PLAYER AND PROTEGE OF JIANG QUIEG, MAO'S WIDOW. HE WAS SENT TO A LABOR CAMP WHEN JIANG WAS STEIPPED OF HER POLITICAL

THE PRO IMMEDIATELY WARRED THE UNITED STATES THAT CULTURAL EXCHANGES BETWEEN THE TWO COUNTRIES "WOULD SUFFER" IF HU HA WERE GRANTED POLITICAL ASYLUM. ACCORDING TO THE PROFINS, HU HAD NO NEED TO FEAR PERSECUTION AND WOULD BE ALLOWED TO TRAVEL ABROAD AGAIN IF SHE RETURNED TO SHINA. THE CASE REMAINED PENDING UNTIL RECENTLY. MS. HU WAS REPORTEDLY LIVING IN SECLUSION IN CALIFORNIA WITH A CHINESE-AMERICAN FAMILY WHILE LAWYERS WERE WORKING VOLUNTARILY ON HER BEHALF. THE DECISION TO GRANT POLITICAL ACYLUM IS THE REPORTEDING FINS ACTING WITH ADVICE FROM THE STATE DEPARTMENT. (FYI) ACCORDING TO INS, SINCE THE NEW IMMIGRATION LAW OF 1988, 27 APPLICATIONS FOR ASYLUM HAVE BEEN GRANTED AND 167 REJECTED.) ON APRIL 4, A SPOKESMAN FOR THE DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE (OF WHICH INS IS A PART) ANNOUNCED THE DECISION TO GRANT MS. HU ASYLUM.

A SPOKESMAN FOR THE CHINESE FOREIGH MINISTRY IS QUOTED AS SAYING "THE DECISION IS A GRAVE HICIDENT PREMEDITATED AND DELIBERATELY CREATED BY THE U.S. THE U.S. HAS NO GROUNDS FOR GIVING HU NA POLITICAL ASYLUM AND THE MOVE WILL IMPAIR CULTURAL AND SPORTS EXCHANGES AND ADVERSELY AFFECT BILATERAL RELATIONS."

THIS STATEMENT WAS FOLLOWED UP ON APRIL 7 BY AN ANNOUNCEMENT FROM THE PRC THAT EIGHT PROVIS ONS OF THE IMPLEMENTING ACCORD FOR CULTURAL EXCHANGE IN 1982 AND 1983 (SIGNED SEPT. 5, 1981) WOULD BE CANCELLED. ONE PROJECT REMAINING FROM THE 1980"81 ACCORD WOULD ALSO BE CANCELLED. THE CANCELLED EXCHANGES ARE:

1. A CHINESE ART EXHIBIT REMAINING FROM THE 1980-81 ACCORD WILL NOT BE SENT.

- 2. AN OFFICIAL CHINESE CULTURAL DELEGATION SCHEDULED TO VISIT THE UNITED STATES.
- 3. THE TWO COUNTRIES HAD AGREED THAT EACH WOULD SEND ONE HIGH QUALITY SMALL SCALE PERFORMING ARTS GROUP TO THE OTHER COUNTRY FOR VISITS AND PERFORMINGES. THE U.S. HAD PLANNED TO SEND THE JULLIARD STRING QUARTET IN MAY.
- 4. THE UNITED STATES AND CHINA HAD AGREED THAT EACH WOULD HOLD ONE HIGH QUALITY SMALL SCALE ART EXHIBIT IN THE OTHER COUNTRY. AN EXHIBITION FROM THE ERCOKLYN MUSEUM WAS SCHEDULED TO GO TO CHINA IN SEPTEMBER.

Stakes High, Chinese Tennis Defector Speaks Out

SAN FRANCISCO, March 19 - Hu Na, a 19-year-old Chinese tennis player who defected here last summer, says one of the reasons she decided to act was her feeling that Chinese officials were trying to coerce her into joining the Communist Party.

Miss Hu, who spoke in her first inter-

view since seeking political asylum last July, also said she feared becoming caught up in a factional political struggle in China

She recalled that on one occasion she became particularly upset when her team captain told her that whenever

team captain told ner that whenever she lost a tennis match it would be a sign "I had not sufficiently studied Marxist-Leninist thought."

Until this week Miss Hu had re-mained in seclusion in San Francisco since her defection during the 32-nation Federation Cup tournament in Santa Clara, Calif.

Leader Demands That She Return

In the interview, which was con-ducted in Washington, Miss Hu ex-pressed frustration over what she said was the Reagan Administration's delay in deciding whether to grant her asy-lum, and indicated she was worried that the Government might bow to pressure

from Peking to block her request.

Miss Hu's case has become a serious issue in United States-Chinese relations, which have already been strained by Peking's unhappiness over United States are called to the state of the state States arms sales to Taiwan, quotas on Chinese textile imports and restrictions on the sale of American technology to China. China's paramount leader, Deng Kiaoping, has taken the unusual step of personally demanding Miss Hu's return in meetings with several United States officials, according to a ranking St. Department official, and the Chin Foreign Ministry has warned that cultural exchanges between the two countries could be adversely affected if she is granted asylum.

To add to the pressure, this week the

Chinese Consulate here made public the texts of two letters from Miss Hu's parents pleading for her return. One was addressed to Miss Hu, the other to Secretary of State George P. Shultz. Both were originally delivered to Mr. Shultz while he was in Peking last month for

talks.

Miss Hu, a tall, graceful woman, suggested in the interview that one reason for Peking's intense efforts to obtain her return was that she had often played tennis with Wan Li, a member of the Standing Committee of the Chinese Communist Politburo and a close ascommunist reliables and a close as-sociate of Mr. Deng. Mr. Wan, she said, liked to play doubles with her and had often lectured her on Communist ideology after their matches

Effect on Family Feared

Edward C. Y. Lau, Miss Hu's lawyer in San Francisco, said Miss Hu did not want to burt relations between China and the United States and was worried about the effect her actions would have on her family. Her father is an army basketball coach and her younger brother is a star junior tennis player.

But Mr. Lau said that because of the Government's procrastination over her efforts to gain asylum, he had decided to let Miss Hu end her seclusion and tell her story. Last weekend he took her to Washington, where she met with sev-eral senators and representatives who have expressed interest in her plight.
These included Representative Stephen
J. Solarz, Democrat of Brooklyn, chairman of the House Foreign Affairs Subcommittee on Asian and Pacific Affairs, who invited her to play tennis at his house with Zbigniew Brzezinski, Provident Carter's national security ad-

to school since she began playing tennis full time at the age of 14.

In the interview Miss Hu said she had decided to defect after the Communist Party leader of the tennis camp where she had trained wrote her a letter virtually demanding she join the party. She said he had frequently advised her, "The Communist Party has raised you and you owe your success to the party.'

"I Didn't Fee! Safe"

But she was afraid he only wanted to use her as a model for other young Chi-nese and as a pawn in his own factional battles in the party. She recalled that China's world champion table tennis player, Zhuang Zedong, who had risen player, Zimang Zectong, who had result to be Minister of Sports during the Cultural Revolution, was sent to a labor camp after the downfall of his sponsor, Jiang Qing, Mao Zedong's widow, in 1978.

"So I didn't feel safe;" Miss Hu said. "You never know when one faction is going to be replaced by another."

Miss Hu's case presents an embar-rassing situation for the Reagan Ad-ministration, which risks offending either the Chinese or the President's conservative supporters in the United States. Her application for asylum also raises the question of whether the United States has one standard for dealing with defectors from the Soviet Union and another for those from

China.

A State Department official familiar with Miss Hu's case said it had touched off prolonged wrangling between the China desk, which opposed the request, and the Bureau of Human Rights and Humanitarian Affairs, which favored it. The Human Rights Bureau won the argument and made a favorable recom-

mendation to the Immigration and Naturalization Service last November, But some officers on the China desk have continued to lobby out of channels with the Immigration Service, the official said. By law, the Immigration Service makes the final determination on requests for asylum, though it usually follows the recommendation of the State Department.

Mr. Lau said the Immigration Service had repeatedly assured him since assured him since early January that a decision on Miss Hu's request was imminent. But last week, Mr. Lau said, the Immigration Service submitted further questions to the State Department about Miss Hu, and the State Department official said the Immigration Service itself was now divided over whet to do. divided over what to do.

Other Requests Pending

The Immigration Service appears to be worried that granting Miss Hu asylum would set a precedent that could af-fect the more than 1,000 pending appli-cations from other Chinese citizens now in this country. That figure is about 10 percent of the 10,000 or so Chinese on extended visits here, mostly students and

scholars. So far fewer that than a dozen of these requests have been approved.

Last July, at a hearing before an Immigration Service judge in San Francisco for a Chinese meteorologist; Xia Yuren, a State Department official advised the judge that the Chinese scientist would not be in danger of persecu-tion if he was deported to China. Mr. Xia, who had come to the United States to conduct research at the New Mexico Institute of Mining and Technology, had applied for asyium after jumping out of a window at the Chinese Consulate in

a window at the Chinese Consulate in San Francisco, where he had been taken by the Chinese authorities. The State Department official, Law-rence L. Arthur, chief of the Asylum-Division of the Bureau of Human Rightsand Humanitarian Affairs, said in written testimony that he was sure Mr. Xia was in no danger because the State De-partment had checked with the Chinese

partment had checked with the Chinese Embassy in Washington. In response, Chalmers Johnson, a professor of political science at the University of California at Berkeley and a specialist on China, told the judge that if a Foreign Service officer gave similar assurances about a Soviet defector after getting in touch with the Soviet. Embassy he would probably be "fired on the spot."

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
