GOP women join Reagan for lunch

WASHINGTON - President Reagan and Republican Party officials began their election-year attack on the "gender gap" yesterday by inviting a friendly crowd of female elected officials - all Republicans:- to the White House for a day of briefings from top-level officials and lunch with Reagan himself.

The guests — greeted by the President's daughter Maureen, who works for the Republican National Commit-tee — included Sen. Paula Hawkins (R., Fla.) and various state senators and representatives, mayors and GOP officials.

Reagan used his after-lunch speech to defend his administration's record on issues important to women. Among other things, he cited his appointments of Sandra Day O'Connor to the Supreme Court, Elizabeth Hanford Dole and Margaret M. Heckler to his cabinet and Jeanne J. Kirkpatrick to the United Nations as evidence of his commitment to women.

He also said that his economic program had benefited homemakers, who see cheaper food prices as a result of lower inflation, and women who choose to work outside the home, who can find jobs more easily because of lower unemployment and start businesses thanks to cheaper interest rates.

He praised the women officials drawn from 14 states - for achiev-

ing things "not through gloss and glitter, but through effort and determination.... You yourselves demonstrate the Republican Party's commitment to women."

Reagan said he was proud of Hawkins and Nancy Landon Kassebaum of Kansas for serving in the Senate. At one point during his speech, Reagan turned to Hawkins and said: "I must ask, Paula, wouldn't you like to have more company?" Hawkins smiled and nodded.

. The women said later they enjoyed meeting Reagan - each got to pose with him for a picture - and appreciated briefings from the likes of Vice President Bush and officials of the Agriculture and Labor Departs

"I told the President that he's our national treasure, and that a lot of people in my district support him a lot of Democrats, too," said state Rep. Debby Sanderson of Fort Lauderdale, Fla.





I have checked with legal counsel at State and with State protocol concerning subject gift. The law provides for the State Department to be the recipient of tangible personal property, which the Secretary may then use for "the operation of the Department of State (including the Foreign Service) and the performance of its functions" -- 22 U.S.C. 2697 (Tab A). This would include the making of gifts to heads of state.

Congress has acknowledged this need of the Secretary to have the benefit of using gifts acquired other than by use of appropriated funds and has set up a reporting process for accountability (Tab B).

Legally, there is no obstacle to making a gift of the jeeps. Once Mr. Deaver approves the transaction, the gift can be made to the State Department. State protocol can then arrange for the President to take the items with him for presentation to the PRC.

§ 2697. Acceptance of gifts on behalf of United States

Unconditional and conditional gifts

(a) The Secretary of State may accept on behalf of the United States gifts made unconditionally by will or otherwise for the benefit of the Department of State (including the Foreign Service) or for the carrying out of any of its functions. Conditional gifts may be so accepted at the discretion of the Secretary, and the principal of and income from any such conditional gift shall be held, invested, reinvested, and used in accordance with its conditions, except that no gift shall be accepted which is conditioned upon any expenditure which will not be met by the gift or the income from the gift unless such expenditure has been approved by Act of Congress.

Disposition

(b) Any unconditional gift of money accepted under subsection (a) of this section, the income from any gift property held under subsection (c) or (d) of this section (except income made available for expenditure under subsection (d)(2) of this section), the net proceeds from the liquidation of gift property under subsection (c) or (d) of this section, and the proceeds of insurance on any gift property which are not used for its restoration, shall be deposited in the Treasury of the United States. Such funds are hereby appropriated and shall be held in trust by the Secretary of the Treasury for the benefit of the Department of State (including the Foreign Service). The Secretary of the Treasury may invest and reinvest such funds in interest-bearing obligations of the United States or in obligations guaranteed as to both principal and interest by the United States. Such funds and the income from such investments shall be available for expenditure in the operation of the Department of State (including the Foreign Service) and the performance of its functions, subject to the same examination and audit as is provided for appropriations made for the Foreign Service by the Congress.

Evidences of unconditional gift of intangible personal property

(c) The evidences of any unconditional gift of intangible personal property (other than money) accepted under subsection (a) of this section, shall be deposited with the Secretary of the Treasury who may hold or liquidate them, except that they shall be liquidated upon the request of the Secretary of State whenever necessary to meet payments required in the operation of the Department of State (including the Foreign Service) or the performance of its functions.

Use of real property or tangible personal property received unconditionally

(d) (1) The Secretary of State shall hold any real property or any tangible personal property accepted unconditionally pursuant to subsection (a) of this section and shall either use such property for the operation of the Department of State (including the Foreign Service) and the performance of its functions or lease or hire such property, except that any such property not required for the operation of the Department of State (including the Foreign Service) or the performance of its functions may be liquidated by the Secretary of State whenever in the judgment of the Secretary of State the purposes of the gift will be served thereby. The Secretary of State may insure any property held under this subsection. Except as provided in paragraph (2), the Secretary shall deposit the income from any property held under this subsection with the Secretary of the Treasury as provided in subsection (b) of this section.

(2) The income from any real property or tangible personal property held under this subsection shall be available for expenditure at the discretion of the Secretary of State for the maintenance, preservation, or repair and insurance of such property and any proceeds from insurance may be used to restore the property insured.

Russell Train, President of the World Wildlife Fund, has written the NSC (Tab A) requesting White House help in the Fund's project to assist China in saving the Giant Pandas from extinction.

American Motor Corporation (AMC) has donated two jeeps to the project. The jeeps would be used by the Chinese to transport the Pandas from their present location, where their food supply (bamboo) is dwindling, to a better location. The World Wildlife Fund is asking us if the President could transport the jeeps to China on his upcoming trip.

We have checked out the proposition with the Military Office and the Gift Unit. Ed Hickey believes the jeeps could be transported aboard the C-5A with Presidential cargo going to China, if the project is approved. John Hilboldt provided the memo at Tab B. I believe the letter from Train at Tab A meets Hilboldt's requirement for a formal proposal. If you think the proposal has merit, I will request the Legal Counsel's opinion and give the Fund an answer.

In addition to the jeeps, the Fund, which is a well-regarded conservation group, has pledged \$200,000 to support the Chinese effort. The Fund says that this Chinese effort is the first nationwide Chinese voluntary contribution to a philanthropic endeavor. Judge Clark and the Department of the Interior believe that the Fund's project to assist the Chinese is worthwhile.

RECOMMENDATION:

That you respond favorably to the World Wildlife Fund proposal to transport two jeeps to China.

Dear Mr. Laux,

I would like to express my sincere appreciation to you for taking interest in the World Wildlife Fund's Project Panda in the People's Republic of China. I would also like to thank you for your continued efforts in researching the possibility of transporting two much needed vehicles to the project when the President visits China in April. This kind of support is vital to our efforts to understand and preserve this magnificent animal.

As you may already know, forest clearance and agricultural expansion have endangered the panda in China — its only remaining habitat in the wild. Much of the arrow bamboo forest upon which pandas depend for survival has disappeared. The remaining bamboo has entered a unique flowering cycle during which entire populations of the plant flower simultaneously over vast regions, seed, and die off. New growth takes place only after several years. In the Sichuan Province, where 30-50 percent of the wild panda population currently lives, arrow bamboo is now flowering, endangering up to 500 of the 1,000 remaining pandas in the wild.

The Chinese government, through its Ministry of Forestry, has begun an emergency rescue project to save the panda from this perilous phenomenon. Dr. George Schaller, Director of World Wildlife Fund's Project Panda, is currently assisting the Ministry of Forestry with these emergency procedures. World Wildlife Fund-U.S. has pledged \$200,000 to support the emergency plan.

The rugged terrain of the Sichuan Province, where the problem is most severe, demands the use of four-wheel drive vehicles. Dirt roads that wind through steep valleys, deep snow in winter, and thick mud in summer, make it impossible to conduct an effective rescue effort with conventional vehicles. Furthermore, according to Dr. Schaller, this winter represents the begining of a crisis that will become more serious next autumn and will continue until the bamboo has had time to regenerate. Thus, the need for the four-wheel drive vehicles is immediate.

American Motors Corporation, through World Wildlife Fund-U.S., has generously donated two four-wheel drive trucks to the Chinese government to aid in the emergency procedures. Present plans include searching for starving pandas, transporting the animals to holding stations for feeding and care, and transferring pandas to new habitats. The trucks are assembled and ready for use but are in need of transportation from the U.S. to China.

As Tony Giedt has explained to you, the World Wildlife Fund-U.S. wishes to request the help of the President in transporting the two trucks to China and presenting them as a gift to the Chinese government for use in its panda rescue efforts. Certainly the President's trip to China in April would provide a fitting opportunity for presentation of these trucks. Perhaps the preparation for transport of the President's motorcade might incorporate plans for transport of these much needed and anticipated vehicles. I feel confident that the Chinese government would warmly welcome such an expression of U.S. government support for the preservation of a national treasure, the panada.

I have enclosed information concerning the trucks as well as several of latest reports on the problems facing the pandas in China and the efforts to save them. If you have any questions concerning the threats to the pandas or this request please feel free to call upon me or Tony Giedt.

Again, on behalf of the Board of Directors and the staff of the World Wildlife Fund-U.S., thank you for taking an interest in this matter. We look forward to hearing from you soon.

In regard to our telephone conversation earlier today, I would make the following suggestions.

First, the gift by American Motors should not be given to the President; it would only cause more problems than we can deal with at the present time.

American Motors and/or the World Wildlife Fund should make a formal written offer to give the Jeep vehicles to the People's Republic of China in connection with the President's trip. Mr. Deaver's office should be notified upon receipt of the official offer; they can then review it. Mr. Deaver's office would then coordinate matters with the Office of Protocol for proper handling.

I have also been advised by the Counsel's Office that they should review the final proposal with regard to this matter since it will involve the White House directly. That would be a normal review of which all parties should be aware.

Since the President will not be personally receiving this gift, my office will not be involved.
