Dear Mr. Friedersdorf:

On Thursday, I received a letter from Congressman Rousselot stating he had relayed my offer of two of my paintings, one for the White House Collection and one as a Gift of State and that he had also given you my brochures and other information. First of all, I want to thank you personally for taking your precious time to consider my offer.

This would truly be one of the highlights of my life Mr. Friedersdorf; and especially so after the experiences of the past fourteen months. I will not go into detail but think it will suffice to tell you I had five rather serious accidents starting with December 28, 1979. One of them involved the breaking of my right hand and tearing all the ligaments and tendons in my left foot and ankle. After four months in a wheel chair - and a doctor who said I would be a hopeless eripple; after the loss of my precious father, a dear uncle and aunt I was so despondent I contemplated suicide. An artist without a right hand is enough but together with everything else, it was unbearable.

Instead I turned to Dr. Schuller's saying...."...inch by inch, anything's a cinch." I started to paint left handed, used my own therapy and positive thinking and as you can see, I can once again use my right hand; and although I am still on crutches, I am determined that I shall walk again and can already walk a little without them.

I also had to eancel four important gallery shows which did not help my morale. So you can see, I am desperate to get my life going again and what better way than to "go right to the top"; ask for your help and at the same time feel that I am helping my country (economically) and help President Reagan (perhaps he will not be quite so homesick if he can see cactus flowers across the room!)

I am enclosing another article that is quite informative. I will appreciate your help and your consideration from the bottom of my heart and hope you will accept my offer. John Wayne truly admired my work and when I spoke to him at the Grand Opening of Petrick's Gallery, Newport Beach, he promised to attend my reception. However, fate again was cruel and he was much too ill to attend and passed away about a week or two after.

Anxiously awaiting your reply, and hoping to meet you and our President and his lovely first lady, I remain,



Artistic people have a unique opportunity, or perhaps a sort of moral obligation, to make others aware of some of the iniquities, acts or practices which demean the quality of life, or cause environmental destruction at the hands of society. This is as it should be. For nothing can hit home more deeply nor serve to alert us to dangers and injustices more poignantly than books such as Rachel Carson's Silent Spring, or paintings such as Morten Solberg's "They Raped Our Land and Gave Us Beads," April 22, 1977 WestArt, or the horrifying graphic images of early 20th century German artist Kathe Kollwitz. On my recent gallery rounds I ran across another striking artist's interpretation of the rape of our beautiful desert land. In her painting "The Wreckreation of The Desert," Florence Rowlett gets the message across in blazing color. The eye is drawn first to the gorgeous red cactus bloom under which carelessly discarded, partially crushed beer cans and crumpled brightly colored birthday wrappings have been tossed to spoil the view. You may see this painting through August at the San Bernardino County Museum.





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
