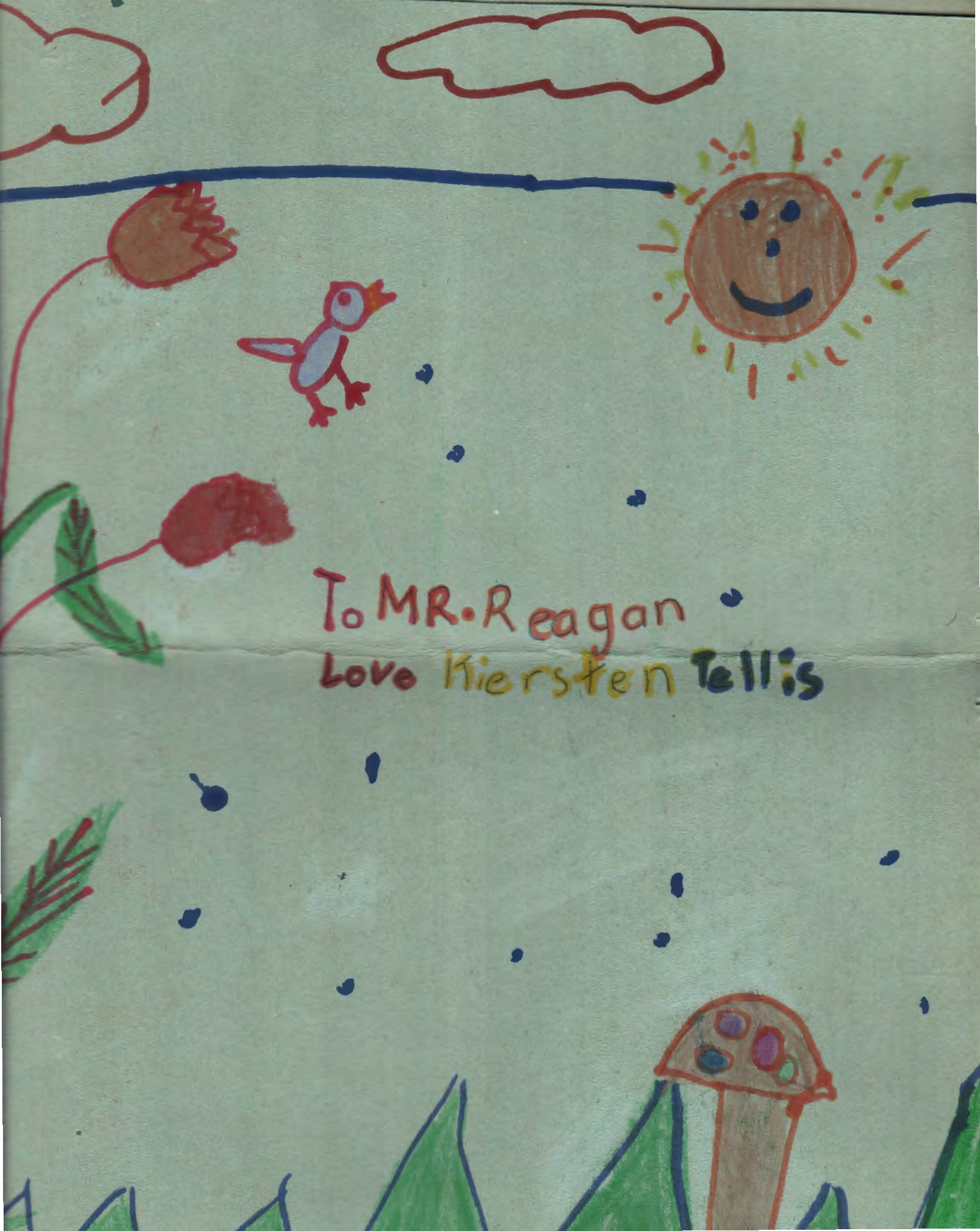



NOT RESPONSIBLE FOR ACCIDENTS

This is what it takes to make One Gallon of Pure Wakarusa Maple Syrup

1.

It takes four maple trees, at least 40 years old, growing in the maple "sugarbush" to yield enough sap in six weeks to produce one gallon of maple syrup.



2.

It takes a "gathering crew" to walk the woods daily during February and March to collect the dripping sap and haul it down to the "sugarhouse."

3.

It takes 40 gallons of sap, boiled down in the "evaporator," to concentrate the sweet sap-water into one gallon of maple syrup.



4.

It takes a four foot log, sawed, split, dried and burned in the raging fire in the "arch" under the evaporator for each gallon of syrup produced.



5.

It takes the whole sugarmaker's family to continually fire the arch, operate the evaporator and sterilize, filter, grade, and pack each gallon of syrup.

*In short it takes a whole lot of hard work.
But once you've tasted pure Wakarusa
maple syrup, you know it's worth it.*

Wakarusa History

Before 1850 this area was known simply as Olive Township. The census of that year counted 337 people in Olive Township in 55 families: about 6 people per family.

These people decided they needed a community center, so three people plotted a square block each — on the northeast, northwest and southeast corners — creating a town square. They named the village Salem.

Unfortunately, the villagers didn't know there was another Salem, Indiana, at this time. But after seven years, confusion between the two communities caused the local villagers to change the name to Wakarusa, an Indian word meaning "knee-deep-in-mud."

The village was incorporated in 1897.

In the mid-1850's a Mr. Thomas Harris started the Salem Bank, which moved to Goshen ten years later. The Exchange State Bank opened in 1890 and the Citizens Bank in 1907. In 1975 the Exchange State Bank merged with Salem Bank of Goshen and remains in the same building now as a branch office.

The first church services were held in homes and schoolhouses. The first church building was the Holde-

man Mennonite Church, constructed in 1854. Subsequent church buildings were the Baptist Church in 1868, the Christian Church in 1869, the Methodist in 1872, the United Missionary in 1887 and the Church of the Brethren in 1896.

Wakarusans built a one-room schoolhouse for their children. In 1877 they built a new, brick schoolhouse east of the square which was later added to and became their high school. In 1924 a grade school/high school was built north of the square; this building is still in use as an elementary school.

In 1875 a newspaper called the Wakarusa Sun began. It was followed by the Wakarusa Tribune in 1893 and the Citizen in 1907. The Wakarusa Tribune is still published.

The Wabash railroad came to Wakarusa in 1892; it is now the Norfolk & Western.

Wayne Feed Supply opened in 1893 and the Wakarusa Feed Center in 1937.

A disastrous fire leveled the southeast part of the town square in 1899. However, hard-working and dedicated Wakarusans have built the town up into the attractive community you see today.

The first physicians here were Doctors Myers and Robison. In the 1890's there were Doctors Sensenich, Wagner and Knepple and in the 1920's Doctors Amick, Eicher and Hannah. Today Doctors Abel, Guttman and Miller practice in the Wakarusa Clinic.

Today Wakarusa continues to prosper and grow through industry and development, enjoying a pleasant, refreshing "All-American" atmosphere.

About the Maple Syrup Festival

The Wakarusa Maple Syrup Festival was begun by the Chamber of Progress — now the Chamber of Commerce — in 1968 with the first event being held in March of 1969 to stimulate interest in the Town of Wakarusa and the surrounding community.

Original festival co-chairmen were Lester Yoder, who provided uninterrupted, dedicated leadership for the event until his untimely death in the fall of 1980, and Eldon Martin who found it necessary to resign due to professional obligations. Jay Klein has since shared the chairmanship with Mr. Yoder and now directs the festival. He is being assisted by Harold Mumaw and they enjoy the help of the Chamber Board of Directors and many friends and neighbors. They have built the festival into a project involving scores of Wakarusans which attracts visitors from all corners of the country. Festival time is now filled with fun, great food, special events and historical attractions.

For starters, festival goers will see sap water being boiled down to maple syrup right in the town square. The sap is gathered right in Wakarusa by local residents.

Maple syrup made by local farmers is sold to help defray the cost of the festival. And is it ever delicious!

Good eating abounds. Enjoy maple syrup with pancakes and sausage from the Lion Clubs of Wakarusa and Madison Township. A hog roast is put on by the Wakarusa PTO.

Popcorn is being popped in an open kettle in the Town Square. Have a sack for free!



There's a chicken bar-b-que put on by the North-Wood High School Music Boosters, and homebaked pastries from church and 4-H groups.

A terrific antique show takes place in the Wakarusa School Gymnasium.

Educational days draw busloads of school children from Indiana and Michigan to the festival. This year they'll see how maple syrup is made at a real sugar camp on the farm of Howard Moyer and tour the dairy operations at the Kenneth Zimmerman, Wayne Harter, Daniel Hershberger or Lowell Weaver farms. The children also will tour an 85-foot Railway Safety Instruction railroad car provided for the festival by Norfolk & Western and a caboose as well.



Other special attractions are sheep shearing under the direction of Floyd and Lola Hahn assisted by Forrest Yoder and Scott Troyer, and the art of horse-shoeing. Alpha Mae Mumaw and Rosemary Martin head up the Educational Days program.



The Queen of the Maple Syrup Festival will be an eighth-grade girl elected by the students of Wakarusa Middle School. This contest is organized by Gail Rogers.

On Saturday there will be a parade at 10 a.m.

A free shuttle service takes festival goers to points of interest in Wakarusa. Visitors may park in designated areas and "hitch a ride" to the Square.

It seems like everyone who comes to our festival winds up saying, "We're glad we came to Wakarusa."

The Wakarusa Maple Syrup Festival Board of Directors thanks you for visiting with us and invites you to return again and again.
