

The General Accounting Office request for information on General Noriega asks for a broad range of sensitive intelligence material, information from open law enforcement files, and material reflecting the deliberative decisionmaking process of the Executive branch. Administration officials met with the GAO in an effort to narrow the request, which GAO declined to do.

Because the request involves extremely sensitive intelligence and law enforcement information, and because the attempt to inquire into the deliberative process of the Executive branch raises serious constitutional concerns, we informed GAO on July 13, 1988, that we would need to complete a legal review of the issues raised by their request before responding. The Justice Department has just completed that review and has concluded that the subject matter of the request is beyond GAO's statutory authority. The Justice Department has also concluded that, even were the request within GAO's legal authority, there are statutory and constitutional objections to providing various specific categories of information requested.

Consistent with the legal advice we have now received from the Justice Department, we will be to informing GAO that we cannot participate in the study as currently designed. The Administration is prepared to meet with GAO to discuss the legal issues involved. Moreover, if GAO reformulates its request in a manner consistent with its statutory authority and the legal principles involved, we will respond to any such new request in an appropriate manner. WASHINGTON, Aug. 17 — The White House has ordered the State Depart-ment the Defense Department and the Central Intelligence Agency not to cooperate with a Congressional investi-gation of possible illegal activities by Gen. Manuel Antonio Noriega of Pana-ma, Administration officials said to-day

day. The investigators, from the General Accounting Office, an arm of Congress, are studying the ways that information about drug trafficking by foreign offi-cials influences decisions by the United States on foreign policy. They are focusing on Panama as "a case study."

General Norlega, the Panamanian strongman, was indicted in February on drug trafficking charges by two Federal grand juries in Florida. The Reagan Administration offered to drop the charges if the general would resign and leave Panama, but he refused.

The investigation by the accounting office could touch on politically sensi-tive matters, like the question of when Vice President Bush learned that Gen-eral Noriega might be involved in drug traffiching trafficking.

Years of Praise

For years, General Noriega provided political intelligence to the United States Government. From 1982 to 1987, American law-enforcement officials wrote six letters warmly praising the Panamanian leader for his aid in fighting the international traffic in narcot ics. John C. Lawn, head of the Federal Drug Enforcement Administration, said he had written such letters be-cause he was "left out of the loop" by

American intelligence agencies. Roger B. Feldman, the State Depart-ment Comptroller, said "all executive branch agencies have been instructed by the White House" not to provide any of the requested information or docu-ments to the G.A.O. until further notice.

Defense Department officials provided information from June 1 through July 12, when they said they had been instructed by the White House to suspend cooperation.

Nicholas Rostow, legal adviser to the National Security Council, said the in-vestigation "raises important statu-tory and constitutional issues" involving access to sensitive law-enforce-ment and intelligence data. In a letter to the G.A.O. on July 13, he said the Ad-ministration was analyzing those issues

White House Move Is Unusual

A White House official said today that the issues were still being re-viewed. He said the White House might issue guidelines for G.A.O. access to in-formation, but he could not say when documents might actually be disclosed. Representative Bill Alexander,

Democrat of Arkansas, said the White House was "stonewalling" in an appar-ent effort to withhold evidence that Federal agencies were "working at cross purposes."

Congressional auditors often haggle with individual agencies over access to specific documents. But it is unusual for the White House to issue a blanket policy suspending cooperation while it tries to decide how to respond.

Nancy R. Kingsbury, the G.A.O. offi-cial supervising the project, said, "We have, by letter and telephone discus-sions, continued trying to obtain infor-mation and schedule meetings with the Departments of State. Defense and Departments of State, Defense and Justice, but these efforts have been refused, with each agency citing the National Security Council's direction as the reason for refusal."

For example, she said, a drug-en-forcement official at the Justice De-partment "told us that the National Security Council gave instructions not to meet with us until N.S.C. gives the go-ahead."

Under Federal law, each agency is required to give the General Account-ing Office the information it requires for investigations. The Comptroller General of the United States, as head of

the G.A.O., may file suft in Federal court to get access to Government documents. But the President may withhold records of foreign intelligence activities. Mr. Alexander said he would soon in-

Dear Mr. Rostow:

As you are aware, Senator John Kerry, Chairman of the Subcommittee on Terrorism, Narcotics, and International Operations and Representative Bill Alexander, are concerned that information about illegal activities by high-level officials of other nations may not be adequately considered in U.S. foreign policy decisions. At their request, the General Accounting Office is undertaking an initial case study of how information about General Noriega was developed by various government agencies, and what role such information played in policy decisions regarding Panama.

To satisfy this request, we will:

(1) Obtain an agency overview. At each agency that develops relevant information on General Noriega or his possible involvement in illegal activities, we will receive a briefing that outlines the general organizational structure and the operational procedures related to the agency's data collection, analysis, and dissemination systems.

(2) Interview relevant personnel. Once we understand the basic organizational structure, we will then interview key personnel responsible for (1) defining agency information needs with regard to Noriega and Panama, (2) implementing the information collection process, (3) collecting and reporting raw data, and (4) analyzing and disseminating data on Panama and Noriega.

(3) Review documents. As we learn more about each agency's collection and reporting processes, we will request relevant documents. We anticipate that these will include: specific directives, instructions, or taskings to collect data on Noriega or alleged illegal activities involving Noriega, cables and reports from field offices regarding Noriega's involvement in or toleration of illegal activities, analyses or summaries of field reporting on Noriega, and geographic/subject-area studies discussing the role or suspected role of Noriega in illegal activities.

(4) Examine the use of information about Noriega in the foreign policy process. After completing a systematic review at each agency, we will attempt to determine how agency reporting on Noriega may have influenced foreign policy decisions on Panama. We will first identify the agencies, organizations, and individuals who play a role in deciding national security and foreign policy issues with regard to Panama. Through interviews and a review of relevant documents, we will determine whether information about Noriega reached them, and how that information was used in making decisions.

As part of our review, we will contact appropriate officials of the National Security Council who are now or were in the past involved in policy decisions regarding Panama. We intend to discuss their knowledge and utilization of information concerning General Noriega's illegal activities.

We understand that this review will involve potentially sensitive material that may require special controls and safeguards. We are willing to discuss this issue with you and take appropriate precautions.

Mr. Levin indicated that you would handle this request expeditiously, and I look forward to hearing from you early next week. If you have any additional questions about our review, please contact Mr. Patton at 275-1898 or Mr. Benone at 275-7487.



So that we may fulfill our obligation to the Senate, we ask that if President Reagan has any evidence of an unauthorized disclosure made by a Member or employee of the Senate Intelligence Committee that we be made aware of the information in a timely fashion.



They are at your disposition. Their analysis of the need is thorough and persuasive.



RE: Day One Financial Requirements in Panama

When Noriega is driven from power, it will be the result of the financial firestorm created by the closing of the Panamanian financial system. That firestorm must be extinguished on the day of his overthrow or it will consume the successor Delvalle regime as well. This means the immediate restoration of confidence in the banking system of Panama, so that salary checks can be cashed, ordinary commercial life begin again and the economy quickly revived. This is the most urgent task for Day One.

Restoration of financial confidence will be quickly followed by a longer term economic reconstruction effort, to institute an economic program of reforms designed to balance the budget, open the economy, stimulate investment and eliminate corruption. But the task at the moment is the restoration of financial confidence which is an absolute precondition to the longer-term effort. -

President Reagan's statement made clear that the United States was dedicated not only to getting rid of Noriega but also to cooperating with the successor regime in restoring Panama's economic health. Secretary of State Shultz at his press conference on March 11 stated that the United States would do "everything possible" to that end.

Concretely, to insure that the banking system reopens the day Noriega is overthrown, the United States should immediately establish a safety net for the Panamanian banks in the public and private sectors in the amount of \$400 million -- 15% of total deposits. This should be done in the form of a contingent line of credit to be drawn down if and as required by the Panamanian banks. The loan agreement should be with the Banco Nacional de Panama as the central government's financial agent and should be administered in a segregated account of the Banco Nacional under the direction of new, specially-appointed administrators drawn from the private financial community. Disbursements would be made into the Banco Nacional account as and to the extent required by the liquidity demands of the Panamanian banks.

Public knowledge of such a safety net, combined with other immediate measures undertaken by the new Delvalle Government of National Reconciliation, will demonstrate that the financial crisis is over.

Confidence will be restored. Withdrawals will be minimized, and drawdowns of the line of credit therefore be in the end modest. But without the assurance of such a safety net, the banking system of Panama -- and therefore the economy of Panama -- will collapse and make academic any longer-term economic efforts.



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I. PURPOSE

To demonstrate your continued support and assure President Delvalle that we are actively working for Noriega's removal from power.

II. BACKGROUND

President Delvalle remains in hiding in Panama and is depressed over the failure of Panamanian and U.S. efforts to remove Noriega. The lack of strong pressures on the regime from any quarter has led Delvalle to question his personal sacrifice. Delvalle is planning to resign, but not immediately.

Delvalle's resignation would complicate our sanctions and recognition policy. He is seeking a public demonstration of continued U.S. commitment to democracy in Panama and support for the Panamanian opposition. He wants your assurance of continued U.S. support for his strategy of negotiating with Noriega. Delvalle will have met with Secretary Shultz on December 21.

ERIC ARTURO DELVALLE

Addressed as Mr. President, Eric Arturo Delvalle has been the President of the Republic of Panama since September 26, 1985, when Nicolas Ardito Barletta resigned under pressure from the military and party and cabinet leaders. Delvalle was illegally removed from office on February 25, 1988 but remains recognized by the U.S. as Panama's legitimate President.

Delvalle comes from a family that has long been prominent in business and politics. His father was the founder of the Republican Party, and his uncle was Vice President of Panama during 1964-1968. He has been President of the Republican Party since 1983. The party is a minor one, however, deriving most of its power from its membership in the ruling coalition.

Delvalle has close contacts with the business community and for many years has been the General Manager of the Delvalle family sugar mill, Azucarera Nacional. He is also a prominent member of Panama City's Jewish community. Delvalle, 51, had coronary and heart surgery about 13 years ago, but his health now seems good, and has not visibly affected his functioning as President.

Delvalle studied agriculture at Louisiana State University. He speaks fluent English. His wife, the former Mariela Diaz, 50, is the daughter of a formal Liberal Party leader and a graduate of Immaculate College in Philadelphia. She too speaks English. The Delvalles have three children, all married. CONFIDENTIAL

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
