I have really hesitated to bother you concerning the enclosed matter, but I sincerely feel I must, as the matter is very meritorious and valid from every standpoint.

The attached memorandum was prepared by me and sent to the Social Office of the White House because Pen James, on practically his last day at the White House, had indicated that he thought the Greenbergs could be invited to the White House dinner honoring President and Mrs. Marcos. This was due to the fact that Mr. Greenberg, through his company, Philippine American Life Insurance Company, has made such a great contribution to the Philippines and, also, because of his loyalty and devotion to the Reagan Administration.

MEMORANDUM RE M. R. GREENBERG

1. M. R. Greenberg is Chairman of the Board, President and Chief Executive Officer of the American International Group, Inc.

2. The American International Group (AIG) was founded in 1931 in Shanghai, China and moved to New York in 1939. It is truly the only U. S. based global insurance organization in operation today and consists of 238 companies and agencies and 24 joint ventures operating in 138 countries and territories throughout the world. It has 23,000 employees headed by M. R. Greenberg.

3. Mr. Greenberg is now and for a number of years has been a member of the Eagles Club. Recently, he was requested by Peter Grace to assist him and a group of executives in instituting a search for a more economical policy involving the operation of various Governmental agencies. Mr. Greenberg was asked to make such a study of the Department of the Navy and has been busily engaged in compiling a report which is due to be delivered to the President in October.

4. In 1947, Cornelius V. Starr, now deceased, who had founded the American International Group, founded the Philippine American Life Insurance Company, which has been highly successful. This company has contributed immeasurably

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Dear Mr. President:

We are concerned that your decision to welcome President Marcos of the Philippines for a state visit to the United States will be misinterpreted as a sign that your Administration condones the repression of the Marcos Government in the Philippines and its continuing violations of basic human rights.

We share the warm feelings of friendship by the overwhelming majority of Americans for the Filipino people. Americans and Filipinos fought side-byside with great courage in World War II, and our shared dedication to freedom and human rights led to full independence and democracy for the Philippines after the war.

Unfortunately, there is convincing evidence, confirmed by the Department of State, that the government of President Marcos has been far from faithful to these ideals. Martial law, imposed ten years ago this month, endured for nearly a decade, only to be replaced in January 1981 with equally repressive national security measures. Throughout this period, the Marcos Government has engaged in persistent persecution of the press, labor, church, students and business leaders. There have been numerous reports of arbitrary detention, torture and disappearances; current instances of these cruel practices are described this week in the U.S. press.

The visit of President Marcos is an opportunity for you and your Administration to demonstrate America's support for the brave citizens of the Philippines in their struggle for true democracy and against the serious violations of human rights by the Marcos Government. We believe that this message is an essential reflection of the fundamental values of our nation -- and is necessary to neutralize the unfortunate impression of indifference to repression created by the visits to Manila last year by Vice President Bush and Secretary of State Haig.

We strongly agree that an important element of our national security is the stability of nations that are our allies. But our allies are ultimately the peoples in those countries. It is their pleas we must hear and their rights we must heed when their government becomes their oppressor instead of their protector. The security of the United States does not require our support for the repression of the Filipino people. The President September 13, 1982 Page two

We hope, therefore, that you will make the Marcos visit an occasion to enhance the cause of human rights in the Philippines. This visit can be an important signal to all peoples who look to the United States for leadership and hope, but who all too often see only the news reports of American officials embracing and toasting their oppressors.



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
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

Dear Bill:

Mike Armacost told us that you have a Philippine request for a restructuring of the financing for the Philippine nuclear power plant under consideration. He appreciated your willingness to take a look at it in the context of the EXIM mandate to promote U.S. exports, the special focus added by the President Marcos State Visit September 16-17 and the ensuing 1983 review of our Philippine Military Bases Agreement.

Prime Minster Virata contends that our policies added costs, particularly financial costs, to their first nuclear plant that have aggravated the country's weakening payments position. That position can perhaps be debated, but clearly the events surrounding the Three Mile Island incident resulted in a reevaluation of plant and component safety both here and in the Philippines. The ensuing delays during a period of rising interest rates increased Philippine costs.

In the short term, Philippine stability will be primarily influenced by economic prospects. Clear recognition of this and appreciation of the liberalizing of the Philippine trade regime and welcoming their interest in American investment will help give a positive cast to President Marcos' visit.

We recognize, of course, that your decision on Prime Minister Virata's three part financial proposal must be made within the general policy guidelines of the bank; but a positive response on the request for \$126.2 million in guarantees, if within those guidelines, would appear to provide a gesture supporting our interests in the Philippines.

I understand that Secretary Shultz has asked that you consider this request positively, if at all possible, and that you will be seeing Prime Minister Virata on it soon. Recognizing your restraints that follow from the President's budget program, this may hopefully assist in establishing your priorities. I join Secretary Shultz in asking that you give this matter your urgent and serious attention.

SUBJECT:

Exim Bank Financing - Philippine Nuclear Power Plant

We face several intractable economic issues with the Philippines. The one that holds any reasonable hope of our being forthcoming is the request for \$126.2 million in guarantees for their nuclear power plant. It is very important that we show some progress on the economic front for the Marcos State Visit September 16-17. It would undoubtedly have a spin-off effect on the upcoming base review as well.

Secretary Shultz has forwarded the Philippine aide-memoire on the subject to Bill Draper with a request for favorable action (Tab II).

Ambassador Armacost met with Gaston Sigur and I on his recent visit and emphasized the importance of this matter to President Marcos. In addition, it has been highlighted to me in two separate meetings with Minister Syjuco of the Philippine Embassy.

Gaston Sigur and Henry Nau concur.

I understand that the Export-Import Bank is currently considering a request by the Philippines to restructure payments under your financing for the Westinghouse nuclear plant on Bataan Peninsula. It strikes me that this proposal, particularly to the extent it can be accommodated with loan guarantees, could well have considerable merit.

In the context of the state visit by President Marcos in September, the announcement of your decision on their request would take on added significance. If this proposal, contained in President Marcos' aide-memoire, falls within the general policy guidelines of the Bank, I would greatly appreciate it if you would give this matter your serious and urgent consideration.

NUCLEAR POWER PLANT Requirement for Additional Financing

The first Philippine Nuclear Power Plant currently undergoing construction in Bagac, Bataan is estimated to be in operation by January 1985 or nine (9) years from the time construction was started in 1976. This revised completion date represents an eighteen-month delay from the original target date of July 1983. A major contributory factor was the delay in the issuance of the export licenses for the necessary equipment by the U.S. N.R.C.

As a result of this substantial delay, the plant is now estimated to cost \$1953.8 million or an increase of \$844.4 million over the original estimated cost of \$1109.5 million. Foreign currency costs account for \$609.5 million of this increase, while the balance of \$234.9 million represent peso counterpart costs. Of the \$609.5 million increase in foreign currency costs, \$125.5 million represent cost of additional equipment to be installed in order to enhance the plant safety. The balance of \$484.0 million represents additional cost due to the delay in the project timetable like increased cost escalations and interest charges during construction.

The U.S. Eximbank has accepted as eligible for financing only \$122.6 million of the \$609.5 million increased foreign currency costs and they have agreed to guarantee only 85% thereof or \$104.2 million. In the meantime we have oyndicated a commercial loan amounting to \$43.1 million to partially cover funding requirements in 1982. With these additional loans considered we still need to raise \$462.2 million in order to fully cover the foreign currency requirements of this project.

The 620 MW nuclear power plant which will represent more than 15% of our generating capacity when it comes on stream in 1985 is one of the major projects under our country's program to lessen our overdependence on imported foreign oil. The operation of the plant by mid 1983, as originally envisioned, would have helped solve our serious problems of power interruption in Luzon as a result of the unreliability of some of our thermal plants. It is therefore imperative that this project encounter no further delay.

In view of the utmost importance we have placed on this project, President Marcos personally discussed the matter of additional U.S. financing assistance with President Reagan during the last Cancun Summit Meetings. Our Prime Minister, Mr. Virata, followed this up with your Treasury Secretary Regan in November 1981. Unfortunately Secretary Regan replied that, in view of budgetary constraints, it was not possible for the U.S. Eximbank to offer additional financial support for the nuclear plant.

Mindful of this constraint, Philippine authorities concerned have been formulating various schemes wherein Eximbank support can be accessed with minimal repercussions on the bank's limited budgetary resources. Accordingly, the Philippines would now like to propose for urgent consideration by the United States Government the following:

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Requested Action

- Capitalization of interest payment due on the \$277.2 million U.S. Eximbank direct loan from Dec. 10, 1982 to June 10, 1985.
- 2. Capitalization of additional interest payments due on the \$277.2 million U.S. Eximbank direct loan to an amount approximately equal to the unfunded U.S. goods and services of \$65.6 million. This would mean capitalization of interest payments due from December 10, 1985 to December 10, 1987.
- 3. Extension of additional U.S. Eximbank 126 guarantee amounting to \$125.8 million to allow the Philippine government to raise the necessary funding to cover the interest payments due from Dec. 10, 1982 to June 1985 on the \$377.2 million U.S. guaranteed bond issue and the additional \$104.2 million guaranteed loan.

It is further requested that the interest charges so capitalized under the foregoing scheme be charged the same interest rate and the amortized pro-rata following the amortization schedule of the original U.S. Eximbank direct loan of \$277.2 million. The request for capitalization of interest charges is not unique since the original Eximbank loans covering the project provided for such capitalization of interest charges

during construction up to the extent of \$90.0 million.

Since Philippine current funding problems are due not to its own fault but are a direct result of actions of various U.S. government agencies, it is earnestly requested that this proposal be given favorable consideration and action by the United States government. Approval of this request would ensure the completion of this very critical energy project without any additional delays.

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The details of the proposal are contained in the attached memorandum.

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
