In recent discussions with senior State Department officials, it has come to my attention that it has been a number of years since the last official state visit by the President of Gabon. I understand an opening exists for a visit in July, and I strongly recommend that President Omar Bongo of Gabon be extended this invitation.

Gabon has been very receptive to U.S. business interests and, although traditionally French in influence, has been trying to expand its horizons to encourage American investment. President Bongo's pro-U.S. stance has made him a valuable ally in southwest Africa, and it would be most appropriate to encourage his continued friendship.

I realize many considerations enter into a decision such as this, but I urge that serious consideration be given to tendering an invitation to President Bongo. Such a visit would certainly solidify and stimulate the good relationship now existing between the Gabonese people and the people of the United States.



I. PURPOSE

> To underscore the traditional bonds of friendship between Gabon and the United States; to pay tribute to President Bongo's successful economic management of his country, especially his encouragement of foreign investment and support for a vigorous private sector.

II. BACKGROUND

> This will be President Bongo's second visit to the Oval Office. He was invited previously in 1981 as President of the Organization of African Unity. His main objective for this bilateral visit is to enhance his international status and prestige within Africa by demonstrating that he is taken seriously by the President of the United States.

> Bongo deserves to be taken seriously. He has been particularly helpful in support of U.S. foreign policy objectives, and his domestic economic policies tend to follow our prescriptions for successful development. Gabon's main source of political, military, and economic support continues to be France which is a normal and desirable situation. However, Bongo has been sufficiently self-confident to break out of French constraints and bring in significant American private investment and take foreign policy initiatives not always to France's liking. He clearly does not want all of his eggs in one basket.

In foreign policy, Bongo has been one of the strongest defenders of the Afghan freedom fighters, and a major voice in condemning Soviet aggression in the United Nations. In general, Gabon's voting record at the UN is among the most pro-American within the African group.

Gabon has been especially helpful in the fight against Libyan aggression in Chad. As head of the OAU Committee on the Chad/Libya border dispute, Bongo was instrumental in moving the majority of African states off the fence and into the pro-Habre anti-Libya column. He also did not hesitate to allow French military forces to utilize Gabonese facilities as staging bases for their movements into Chad.

In southern Africa, Bongo has been a regular supporter of the American policy of promoting non-violent negotiations leading to an end to apartheid.

In the economic area, Bongo has brought in over \$700 million in American private investments, which is not bad for a country with only a million people. Most of this investment is in oil production, but there are also U.S. private interests in telecommunications, computers, heavy equipment, and hotels. His enlightened policies have given Gabon a per capita income of \$3,300, the highest in Africa. Recent declines in oil prices as well as the value of the dollar have made it necessary for Gabon to institute an IMF austerity program, but experts feel the country can weather the storm.

During the visit, Bongo is likely to focus on economic issues and he will probably ask for more U.S. investment and official U.S. assistance beyond the 80 Peace Corps volunteers there now. The latter is not possible because Gabon is a relatively wealthy OPEC country, but we have every reason to encourage additional American business interests to look seriously at Gabon.

Bongo will also have attended the annual OAU summit conference a few days before his visit to Washington. That will give you an opportunity to explore the mainstream of African thinking, especially on issues such as Libya/Chad, southern Africa, and the debt problem.

President Bongo is self-confident, ebullient, and unusually direct for an African leader. It should be relatively easy to get down to basics and have some frank discussions on a number of African subjects.

I. WHERE DOES OUR RELATIONSHIP STAND?

- o Excellent bilateral relations. Bongo has wanted this visit for years. He was delighted to receive the invitation from your daughter, and will use this trip to dramatize his close relationship with the U.S.
- o Bongo has steered a moderate, pro-Western foreign policy since coming to power twenty years ago.
 - -- Played important role in Chadian national reconciliation, helped shift African opinion against Qadhafi, allowed French to use Gabon in support of military assistance to Chad.
 - -- Quietly supports our policy in southern Africa.

II. WHAT DO WE WANT?

- o Underscore that moderate, pro-Western policies pay dividends by showing U.S. recognition of Bongo's record of political stability and economic prosperity.
- o Express appreciation for the role Bongo has played to encourage national reconciliation in Chad and promote peace in the region.
- o Accord Bongo respectful public treatment as an international statesman to enhance his prestige and maintain his quiet support for our policies.



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

This will not be a visit with major problems such as Kenya's human rights violations or Chad's request for STINGERS. Thanks to oil, manganese, and a pro-free enterprise policy, Gabon is the richest country in Africa on a per capita basis. Bongo has taken care of his people fairly well and has invested wisely. On the other hand, oil prices and the dollar are currently both down which is producing austerity in Gabon and rightly causing Bongo to worry about the future.

Bongo's main objective is to gain the prestige of a White House visit with the President. We can take advantage of that to thank him for his backing on several foreign policy issues, such as Chad, to probe him on African questions immediately after this week's OAU summit conference, and to support his quest for more U.S. private investment.

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THE PRESIDENT'S MEETING WITH PRESIDENT BONGO OF GABON

TALKING POINTS

RECOGNIZE A LONG-STANDING FRIEND IN AFRICA

- This visit symbolizes the traditional friendship between Gabon and the U.S., and underscores our esteem for you.
- For twenty years, you have presided over political stability and economic prosperity in Gabon - this is a remarkable tribute to your ability to govern.
- The wise and prudent course you have charted at home and abroad sets an encouraging example for other nations which wish to pursue their economic and social development in peace.
- We respect and appreciate the important role you are playing in behalf of national reconciliation in Chad, and your promotion of peace throughout the region through your bilateral relationships and in multilateral councils, including the OAU.

CONTINUED SUPPORT FOR U.S. POLICY IN AFRICA

- Gabon and the U.S. clearly share a basic interest in and commitment to peace and economic progress in Africa.
- We have been heartened by the similarity of views between Gabon and the U.S., including the need for a peaceful resolution of the great problems of South and southern Africa.
- -- We look forward to continued consultation and political cooperation with you in the future.
- You have been deeply involved in Chadian national reconciliation and, as chairman of the OAU Ad Hoc Committee on the Chad-Libya Border Dispute, you recently hosted a meeting of the Ad Hoc Committee in Libreville. How do you think Qadhafi will pursue his political and territorial ambitions in the aftermath of his defeat? What steps do you think the Chadians will take in regard to the Aozou Strip?
- You have just come from the OAU Summit in Addis Ababa, what is your analysis of current African views on the situation in southern Africa, especially Angola and South Africa?

THE ECONOMIC CHALLENGE

- -- Congratulations on the determined, responsible fashion in which Gabon has faced up to its recent economic challenges.
- -- For Gabon to maintain the economic prosperity which has made it the envy of Africa, it must stick to its economic adjustment program and diversify its economy.
- -- We support your efforts to attract U.S. investment to Gabon. A stable, favorable investment climate with minimal government intervention in the economy will encourage American businessmen to invest in Gabon.
- -- Africa's economic crisis has been an issue of concern and discussion within the OAU. How was the issue addressed during the OAU Summit, and what steps will African nations be taking to cope with the crisis?

U.S. ECONOMIC AND MILITARY ASSISTANCE (IF RAISED)

- -- We are sympathetic to your desire to strengthen your defense capabilities and to begin a development assistance program in Gabon.
- -- Because of our own budgetary constraints, we cannot promise a renewal of foreign military sales credits; however, we are talking to Congress in this regard.
- -- Besides our budget limitations, Gabon's per capita income is still so high that we cannot begin a USAID assistance program. Nevertheless, we do want to be helpful, as shown by the long history of Peace Corps activity in Gabon.
- -- In addition, I am pleased that we are able now to sign our Bilateral Debt Rescheduling Agreement and initial a Bilateral Investment Treaty (BIT).

President's Draft Departure Statement (Rose Garden Remarks)

President El Hadj Omar Bongo has been a very welcome guest at the White House, a long overdue visitor who has given us a chance to return the generous hospitality he has personally accorded to so many representatives of this and earlier administrations.

For twenty years, President Bongo has led his country in an era of stability and progress. Under his leadership, Gabon has consistently encouraged the peaceful settlement of regional disputes through reason, dialogue and moderation. Fittingly, President Bongo was asked by the Organization of African Unity (OAU) to chair its ad hoc committee for a resolution of the situation in Chad. He has carried out his responsibilities with distinction and has spared no effort to facilitate a peaceful end to the dispute. In the United Nations and the OAU, Gabon has sought to have us all remember that the fundamental goal of Africa today is development for the welfare of its peoples, and that a fundamental challenge for Africa's friends and partners is to cooperate towards that goal.

The United States and Gabon concur profoundly in those views. That is why we have enjoyed a relationship of unbroken friendship and cooperation for the past two decades. This

relationship has served our country well. It has provided us the continuing counsel of a greatly experienced international statesman. Equally important, it has helped underscore the value of America's political, economic and development ties with Africa.

President Bongo and I found ourselves in harmony on the key issues that confront Africa today. Economic policy reform, which is the best hope for growth, self-sufficiency and full economic sovereignty, must proceed. The U.S. has encouraged this new trend in Africa concretely through special aid funds and increased contributions to the international financial institutions that are heavily engaged in Africa. Gabon is contributing as well by setting an example in taking difficult reform steps on its own and in coordination with the IMF. We admire this effort and wish President Bongo great success in its implementation. For our own part, we have just brought to conclusion a bilateral debt rescheduling agreement with Gabon. We have also taken steps to promote increased U.S. investment in Gabon.

President Bongo and I reviewed the situation in southern

Africa from the perspective of our deeply shared conviction

that negotiated, peaceful solutions to the disputes that afflict that region -- and to the atrocity known as apartheid -- are urgently needed and clearly possible. We are committed to nurturing among all those involved the political will to set the region on a corrected course.

Much of Africa is coming to the end of a decade of decision, a period in which it will have made fundamental choices which will determine whether it can look to the future with confidence about its economic, political and social prospects, and even about the health of its peoples. The U.S. must stand unequivocally by the side of Africa, with our counsel, our friendship and our assistance, as those choices are made. I will make every effort to see that we do so, and am heartened that the U.S. has the cooperative encouragement of a friend like President Bongo.

I. PURPOSE

To underscore the traditional bonds of friendship between Gabon and the United States; to pay tribute to President Bongo's successful economic management of his country, especially his encouragement of foreign investment and support for a vigorous private sector.

II. BACKGROUND

This will be President Bongo's second visit to the Oval Office. He was invited previously in 1981 as President of the Organization of African Unity. His main objective for this bilateral visit is to enhance his international status and prestige within Africa by demonstrating that he is taken seriously by the President of the United States.

Bongo deserves to be taken seriously. He has been particularly helpful in support of U.S. foreign policy objectives, and his domestic economic policies tend to follow our prescriptions for successful development. Gabon's main source of political, military, and economic support continues to be France which is a normal and desirable situation. However, Bongo has been sufficiently self-confident to break out of French constraints and bring in significant American private investment and take foreign policy initiatives not always to France's liking. He clearly does not want all of his eggs in one basket.

In foreign policy, Bongo has been one of the strongest defenders of the Afghan freedom fighters, and a major voice in condemning Soviet aggression in the United Nations. In general, Gabon's voting record at the UN is among the most pro-American within the African group.

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Gabon has been especially helpful in the fight against Libyan aggression in Chad. As head of the OAU Committee on the Chad/Libya border dispute, Bongo was instrumental in moving the majority of African states off the fence and into the pro-Habre anti-Libya column. He also did not hesitate to allow French military forces to utilize Gabonese facilities as staging bases for their movements into Chad.


In southern Africa, Bongo has been a regular supporter of the American policy of promoting non-violent negotiations leading to an end to apartheid.

In the economic area, Bongo has brought in over \$700 million in American private investments, which is not bad for a country with only a million people. Most of this investment is in oil production, but there are also U.S. private interests in telecommunications, computers, heavy equipment, and hotels. His enlightened policies have given Gabon a per capita income of \$3,300, the highest in Africa. Recent declines in oil prices as well as the value of the dollar have made it necessary for Gabon to institute an IMF austerity program, but experts feel the country can weather the storm.

During the visit, Bongo is likely to focus on economic issues and he will probably ask for more U.S. investment and official U.S. assistance beyond the 80 Peace Corps volunteers there now. The latter is not possible because Gabon is a relatively wealthy OPEC country, but we have every reason to encourage additional American business interests to look seriously at Gabon.

Bongo will also have attended the annual OAU summit conference a few days before his visit to Washington. That will give you an opportunity to explore the mainstream of African thinking, especially on issues such as Libya/Chad, southern Africa, and the debt problem.

President Bongo is self-confident, ebullient, and unusually direct for an African leader. It should be relatively easy to get down to basics and have some frank discussions on a number of African subjects.

TALKING POINTS FOR FIRST LADY'S COFFEE FOR DAUGHTERS AND DAUGHTER-IN-LAW OF PRESIDENT BONGO OF GABON

Background

President Bongo is married, but Mrs. Bongo will not be accompanying him on this visit. Pascaline and Albertine Bongo, who are well acquainted with the U.S., are sophisticated, highly educated young women; Pascaline in fact is a well-qualified financial consultant. The Bongo sisters are thus almost completely atypical of their generation in Africa. However, they are well suited by background, experience, and the prominence of their position to be an example for women in contributing to the political, social, and economic development of their country. Even in relatively wealthy Gabon, where French and European influence is very strong, women remain by and large confined to traditional responsibilities and, at best, a supporting role in national life.

It would be interesting to explore with these young ladies how they envision the prospects for women taking a larger part in Gabonese commercial, professional, and public life. They will be interested to have our First Lady's views on these issues, and may be open to suggestions about volunteerism, consciousness-raising about alcohol and drug abuse, and more generally how women of prominent position can be of service to their people.

Both ladies have spent considerable time in the Beverly Hills area of Los Angeles, where the Bongo family owns a home. Pascaline graduated from the University of Southern California; Albertine studied there.

TALKING POINTS

ROLE OF FIRST LADY

- -- In the United States, the First Lady can influence major public/social issues, such as drug abuse. My predecessors have been involved in other areas, such as the arts, conservation, mental illness. The President's daughter Maureen is active in domestic politics and travels widely abroad on the President's behalf (she met Pascaline Bongo on her recent trip to Gabon).
- -- What about in Gabon? What is expected of the President's family? What opportunities do they have for leadership?
- -- Volunteerism is the source of a great deal of U.S. social progress, especially in areas where government cannot or should not reach. Our government encourages it. Does the concept have significance in Gabon? What can be done to foster its growth?

ROLE OF WOMEN IN GABONESE SOCIETY

- -- In the longer term, as Gabon diversifies into an ever more complex society and economy, will women have access to opportunities in business and the professions? Will they have educational opportunities to prepare themselves?
- -- How about politics? Will the Gabonese accept women in political positions? Are women active in the political party structure?

U.S. GABON COOPERATION

-- Gabon and the United States enjoy excellent political and economic relations. You (daughters) have lived in both places. From your perspective, are there other areas in which we can work to strengthen understanding between our two countries? We encourage you to keep us in mind and think about ways in which we can cooperate.
