Dear Mr. President:

Within the last several years, the Department of Justice, through the Office of Special Investigations, has intensified its efforts in "uprooting" and "bringing to justice" alleged "Nazi war criminals" presently residing within the United States.

Such an effort, albeit noble in motive, nevertheless, by the very admission of the Office of Special Investigations, has been fueled almost exclusively by the Soviet Union's willingness to cooperate. Thus, evidence admitted at trials against American citizens invariably consists of several video tapes taken within the Soviet Union in accordance with Soviet law (or within any one of its satellites) or "ancient documents" from Soviet archives, the authenticity of which is certified by Soviet officials and accepted on its face by OSI attorneys. The Office of Special Investigations has in fact confirmed that cases under investigation are initiated predominantly on the basis of some evidence furnished by the ever helpful Soviet procurators. In a recent interview, the former director of the OSI, Allan A. Ryan, Jr., when asked how cooperative the Russians have been, replied, "Very cooperative. We've spent hundreds of hours there getting witness depositions. Imagine! We were importing American legal procedure into Russia".

In effect the Soviet Union and specifically its KGB agents garnering evidence against innocent Ukrainian-Americans have become investigators for the United States of America. Their remuneration is the virtual obliteration of "hateful bourgeois Ukrainian nationalists" presently residing in the United States. Incredibly, American justice seems impervious to Soviet disregard for human life and Soviet propensity for fabrication so evident in the recent Korean airliner massacre, certainly not an isolated event. Would a system which deems it appropriate to murder 269 innocent men, women and children with one push of a button hesitate on moral or other grounds to fabricate evidence for use in American courts!

The gamut of allegations against individuals stretches from the incredible to the ridiculous. Perhaps the most ridiculous is the OSI's position with respect to the Organization of Ukrainian Nationalists. We shudder at the implications of OSI attorneys' assertion that membership or cooperation with the Organization of Ukrainian Nationalists eonstitutes grounds for denaturalization. The Ukrainian Congress Committee of America, as the representative of the Ukrainian ethnic community in America, is cognizant of its consitutent makeup as well as of the historical circumstances surrounding the Ukrainian immigration into the United States following World War II and has little doubt but that a large majority of Ukrainians entering the United States in the post World War II period were supportive of the Organization of Ukrainian Nationalists. For that movement represented the hopes and aspirations of the Ukrainian people during the war. Consequently, for OSI justice to be accomplished, a significant portion of the Ukrainian ethnic community in the United States would be threatened with denaturalization and subsequent deportation.

In the recent past, Mr. President, this organization has contacted the United States Department of Justice, specifically the Attorney General's office, requesting a forum for scholarly dialogue both in history and in the law, regarding the aforesaid problems. Unfortunately, to date, the Attorney General has not been receptive to our requests. We feel that further dialogue is absolutely necessary. Unwittingly, America has forged a new dimension to Soviet expansionism - one within its own borders.

Your consideration of this problem, Mr. President, is practically indispensible.

Dear Mr. President:

In January 1982 you and Chancellor Helmut Schmidt of the Federal Republic of Germany launched an initiative to strengthen bilateral ties through increased contacts.

In 1983 the centerpiece of the Contacts Initiative was the Tricentennial of German immigration to America. The anniversary gave us an opportunity to emphasize shared values and heritage at a time when German-American relations were under severe stress.

Now that the year is over, we can see that the Tricentennial was a success. It had four important results:

- increased knowledge of German contributions to America
- greater awareness of American contributions to rebuilding and protecting Germany in the postwar period and today
- a heightened sense of shared values, challenges, and opportunities
- creation of permanent structures to strengthen bilateral contacts.

The Contacts Initiative will continue beyond the Tricentennial. Our mechanism to carry on the momentum is the Steering Committee for U.S.-German Contacts. The Committee staff will continue to design exchanges, encourage bilateral activities of government agencies, organize press briefings for German journalists, publicize public and private contacts programs, and facilitate completion of the Friendship Garden. We are confident that the Steering Committee can build on the success of the Tricentennial and continue to strengthen this crucial relationship.

For your perusal I have attached a brief wrap-up of the Tricentennial year.

The story as told by the President differs from the newspaper account. President Reagan has stated he never left the country during the war. Have You Heard the One About Reagan and the Nazi Death Camps?

hen Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir visited the White House last Nov. 29, he was impressed by a previously undisclosed remembrance of President Reagan about the Nazi extermination of Jews during World War II.

Repeating it to his Israeli Cabinet five days later, Shamir said Reagan had told him that he had served as a photographer in a U.S. Army unit assigned to film Nazi death camps. Shamir said Reagan also informed him that he had saved a copy of the film because he believed that, in time, people would question what had happened. Many years later, as Shamir recalled being told, Reagan was asked by a member of his family whether the Holocaust occurred.

"That moment I thought," Shamir quoted. Reagan as saying, "this is the time for which I saved the film, and I showed it to a group of people who couldn't believe their eyes. From then on, I was concerned for the Jewish people."

Shamir's account appeared Dec. 6 in the Israeli newspaper Maariv. It was confirmed recently to Edward Walsh, The Washington Post correspondent in Jerusalem, by Israeli Cabinet secretary Dan Meridor.

On Feb. 15, famed Nazi-hunter Simon Wiesenthal met with Reagan in the White House and heard a similar story. Wiesenthal told Washington Post reporter Joanne Omang that he and Reagan had held "a very nice meeting," during which the president related "some of his personal remarks from the end of the war."

Rabbi Marvin Hier, dean of the Simon Wiesenthal Center in Los Angeles, also was present.

He told Omang that Reagan said he was "a member of the Signal Corps taking pictures of the camps" and that he had shown a copy of the film a year later to a person who thought the reports were exaggerated.

"He said he was shocked that there would be a need to do that only one year after the war," Hier said.

There is no reason to doubt Reagan's con-

War II. He has spoken out consistently about the horrors of the Holocaust and has supported Israel since its founding.

It is equally indisputable that Reagan never filmed a Nazi death camp. Reagan, who had a commission in the cavalry reserve, was called to active duty in April 1942. After brief service at Fort Mason in San Francisco, he spent the war with the First Motion Picture Unit of the Army Air Corps, making training films in Hollywood and living at home.

Over the years, other dramatic accounts related by Reagan have been questioned. The best known is a story of a pilot who rode down in his B17 bomber with a wounded gunner rather than bail out and save himself.

But a more curious story, which Reagan used to tell about himself, is of a high school football game between his Dixon, Ill., team and rival Mendota. Reagan's account is that Mendota accused Dixon of committing an infraction and that the referee asked Reagan if he had committed it. "I told the truth, the penalty was ruled and Dixon lost the game," Reagan used to say. There are no other known accounts of this incident. The only game that Dixon lost to Mendota when Reagan played was by a 24-0 score.

The White House, ever sensitive to suggestions that Reagan embellishes, did not react lightly to queries about the Shamir and Wiesenthal accounts. Robert Sims, a normally mild-mannered deputy press secretary, said, "There's no story here—the only story is that The Post is out to make Reagan look bad."

Subsequently, White House chief of staff

James A. Baker III asked Reagan about the meetings with Shamir and Wiesenthal. Reagan told him that he "never left the country" during World War II and "never told anyone that he did."

The president's account was that he had seen a film of the death camps while working on a training movie, remembered that World War I atrocities had been questioned and "didn't want atrocities against the Jewish people to be forgotten." So he kept a copy of the film and, when "a Jewish friend" questioned him about it a year or two later, showed him the copy.

ims said that the recollections of Secretary of State George P. Shultz, who was present at the Shamir meeting, and Marshall Breger, an administration official who attended the Wiesenthal meeting, support the president.

How could Shamir and Wiesenthal, fluent in English and known for their grasp of detail, have misunderstood so completely what Reagan said to them in two different meetings more than two months apart? What Jew would doubt the existence of the Holocaust?

The story in any of its versions was new to this reporter, who, in the course of preparing two biographies and interviewing many persons who knew Reagan during his World War II days, had never heard it. There is no reference to it in any other Reagan biography nor in his autobiography. It is a story that no one seems to have heard.

- -- Marshall Breger heard the President tell the story to Simon Weisenthal, consistent with the version outlined above.

Dear General Knowles:

Thank you for your thought-provoking letter to the President of January 14, to which I have been asked to reply.

We agree with you that a divided Germany remains a source of tension in Europe; the U. S. Government continues to support the goal of peaceful German reunification.

The important question is how best to keep the peace for the U.S. and its friends in Western Europe until this peaceful reconciliation can be worked out. We and our allies adhere firmly to NATO as the best way yet conceived to achieve this goal. None of our Allies is in favor of withdrawing US forces from Western Europe, which would place Europe under an unacceptable threat from the Soviet Union. In such an event, U.S. forces would withdraw thousands of miles across the Atlantic while Soviet forces would only withdraw to Soviet territory in Europe. The Western Europeans rightly believe that under such circumstances, the Soviets would consider Western Europe a proper subject for intimidation. It is also doubtful that the Soviets would seriously consider at this time ending their control of Eastern Europe.

We appreciate your excellent points about the heavy cost of maintaining U.S. troops in Europe, and we do not underrate the political irritations that can arise over time from this situation. The simple fact is that the alternative would be much more damaging to U.S. national interests.

Dear President Reagan:

It has been almost forty years since the end of the war in Europe. In spite of the many accomplishments in progress since that struggle, one overriding failure mags at all of us: the political division of Eastern and Western Europe, culminating in a prolonged anxiety that eventually something foolish may happen to trigger a devastating nuclear war. In general, we have hoped that the status quo would in some way take care of itself in time, so that we could all go back to enjoying the peace that we all pray for. This problem will not go away as long as the communists control Russia. Unless we are willing to wait indefinitely, we must make a strong, positive effort to resolve it peacefully, realizing that we cannot get something for nothing, especially peace. My proposal is offered to you as a loyal citizen to a respected President, not as a pasteurized retiree to his commander-in-chief. It probably will stir much controversy during analysis, but that prospect never stopped Americans in the past who wanted to do what they felt was right. With prejudice toward none and with apologies to those who may misunderstand my motives and react accordingly, here is my thesis.

If we are to until our Gordian knot differently from Alexander the Great, who was definitely not a peacemaker, we must examine all the little ties to find out where to start. Europe is half slave and half free- fact not rhetoric. We cannot relieve the plight of any of the satellite countries without gambling that we may help create a nearwar crisis, with one obvious exception: Germany. If we could somehow reunite the two Germanys, we would be starting to loosen the knot, which has been more like a tourniquet. There have been many discussions in many countries, none of which has resulted in the bold offer needed to overcome this impasse.

You have been working diligently to reduce the threat to peace while not making us vulnerable to an aggressor. Like your predecessors, you face a stand-off with no relief in sight. Arms control is a wonderful theory, if we are dealing with honorable adversaries, but the days of chivalry are over. If we truly want something, we should be willing to pay any honorable and reasonable price short of war. Ay suggestion is to propose to Russia that we withdraw all our armed forces from Europe and that Russia withdraw their forces in Europe to Mother Russia, leaving the satellites without military oppression. This is not an original idea. I believe that Russia made a similar suggestion many years ago. In addition, we would withdraw Allied and Russian control of Berlin, the inescapable key to this puzzle.

we may receive flak from many expected areas, especially from those who say we are abandoning our allies, but in light of our past history, they echo the motives of people whose slants are basically negative. not constructive. For example, time has made most of us forget that the French asked us to leave their soil in the 1950's and even withdrew their armed forces from NATO control. Their motives, primarily nationalistic pride, were honorable, but their timing was definitely questionable. If we had not had Germany and England to rely on for hosting our troops, we could have lost more of Europe by now to communist aggression. Today, modern technology has shrunk our world to the extent that we do not need to be physically in surope to show force, provided russia likewise stays home. There are many military solutions to such an arrangement, and you have many dedicated advisors to help you find them. It sure beats starting a war. Speaking of our allies, they really do not want us in their countries any more than the satellites want the Russians, but they need us there as long as Russia stays too. Your most favorable rapport with the Prime Minister of the United Kingdom and with the Chancellor of West Germany should give you two strong endorsements among our friends. Germany, particularly, would welcome a solution that would ultimately reunite Germany. In fact, the anticipated delays with Russia would give the two Germanys more than ample time to straighten out their

affairs. They would probably be ready before we are.

One final consideration should not be overlooked. As has been our custom after each war, we reduced our armed forces but were forced to reverse ourselves later because of the Russian threat. We have now a permanent active force much larger than any peaceful nation could ever imagine. It has cost us money, time, friendships, and respect, because we are now equated with the bad guys, unfortunately. Our military budget is prohibitive for the long pull. We have needed to retain an adequate defense because we have not resolved the European problem (I defer to your many other advisors how to do the same in the Orient, where Korea is really the only thorn in everyone's side). If our armed forces were stationed at home, we could devise appropriate strategies and plans to ensure adequate defense with less expense. Thank you for your indulgence and for the great service you have been providing to our country. I hope that my candid comments are accepted in the same sincere spirit in which they have been written. Good luck. May God bless you.

LETTER OF INTEND

To whom it may concern

It is intended, with this type of effort, to advance and excel the speed of economic development of developing countries beyond the present acceleration towards a new economic order in the world, and to secure income for European and North-American investors from the developing world in the distant future, in order that they may pay from this future income: rawmaterials, products and services required from the developing world, among them the services of the tourist industry.

You, that is the readers of this letter of intend, are hereby invited to join the effort with money- and/or mind- and/or moral-support and to make this known to the world in general, and us in particular in order that we may co-ordinate potentials and forces towards a better and new economic order for the world.
