Brandt Commission Report

The Brandt Commission, formed in 1978 at the suggestion of Robert McNamara, consisted of 18 members including four former heads of government (Brandt, Frei of Chile, Heath of Britain, and Palme of Sweden) and prominent citizens of the United States (Peter Peterson, Chairman of Lehman Brothers, Kuhn-Loeb and Katherine Graham, Chairman of the Washington Post), Canada, France, Japan, Kuwait, India, Indonesia, Algeria and Tanzania.

The report issued in February 1980 called for:


- a large scale increase in official development aid to developing countries totaling 0.7% of GNP in industrial countries or \$50 billion per year by 1985 (compared to \$20 billion in 1980)
- massive increases in resource transfers from other sources totaling another \$30 billion per year by 1985
- automatic revenue transfers to developing countries through an international tax on trade, arms production or exports, international travel and global resources such as seabed minerals
- conclusion of international codes of conduct or regulatory schemes for investment and technology transfer and international price stabilization schemes for commodities and oil
- replacement of the dollar as the international reserve currency by an improved Special Drawing Right - SDR
- creation of new international institutions such as the World Development Fund and reform of existing institutions to give developing countries a greater role in international decision-making
- convening of occasional summits of a limited number (20-25) of heads of governments from the North and the South. (This is the origins of the Mexico Summit idea)

The Report generally downplayed the role of military or security factors in world development, citing the dangers posed by the arms race, the burdens it imposes on national economies and the resources it diverts from peaceful purposes.

Talking Points

Meeting with FRG Chancellor Office Chief

Manfred Lahnstein

1. Explain the President's economic policies: It is worthwhile to convey what the President is trying to accomplish with the economy. Lahnstein is a trained economist and should be receptive to this information. Emphasize that unless the US is economically strong, it cannot play the active role it should in foreign affairs.
2. Strong relationship with Germany: There has been some speculation in Germany that the early Washington visits of French and British officials signaled a decrease in German prestige within the Alliance. You as the President's Chief of Staff can emphasize to Lahnstein that the scheduling does not have significance; it is simply the way the calendar worked out.
3. El Salvador: In his meetings at State, Lahnstein was briefed on our policy toward El Salvador and the importance of German support and cooperation. Emphasize again that while our military assistance received most of the press attention, we share German concerns for political and economic development there.
4. Consultations: As the President's Chief of Staff and personal friend, you are in a position to assure Lahnstein that the President does not surprise his friends.
5. Schmidt Visit: It is worth probing Lahnstein on what Chancellor Schmidt's specific objectives will be when he visits. President Reagan's objectives are clear -- he is interested in taking the measure of the Chancellor and in a frank exchange of views.

State's memo (Tab A) recommends that Messrs. Meese, Anderson, and Weidenbaum agree to meet with FRG Economics Minister Count Otto Lambsdorff during the latter's visit here March 16-18.

Frankly, I see no compelling reason why Lambsdorff should meet with three senior White House people. I suspect he is interested in adding as many notches as possible to his holster at an early point in the new Administration; from a substantive point of view he would be better off dealing with his counterpart (Secretary Regan).

In line with the above reasoning I favor sending a memo to Meese giving him first refusal rights but offering the options of Anderson and Weidenbaum. Given your own German expertise and the substantive matters Lambsdorff has on his mind, you may also want to consider joining whatever meeting shapes up, a possibility covered in your memo to Meese at Tab I.

FRG Economics Minister Count Otto Lambsdorff (FDP) is visiting Washington March 16-18 for meetings with American officials. He is a key policy maker in developing German international economic policy and has requested meetings with Edwin Meese, Martin Anderson, and Murray Weidenbaum. He will also meet Secretaries Haig, Regan, Edwards and Baldrige, US Trade Representative Brock and FED Chairman Volcker. He has requested appointments with OMB Director Stockman and a number of Senators and Congressmen.

Lambsdorff visits the United States frequently and is sensitive to the impact of US domestic policy on the economies of Europe. He has played a very strong role in the development of German policy during the past year especially in regard to energy policy and export control and export credit policy. 


