The meeting opened with discussion of terrorism in Germany. (8)

Minister Lambsdorff said that the terrorists in Germany are not as well-organized as they were three to four years ago and that public sympathy for terrorism has disappeared. (2)

The <u>Vice President</u> in discussing restrictions of Japanese auto imports pointed out that during the campaign he and the President had endorsed voluntary restraints but had stopped short of endorsing tariffs and quotas. He said that Minister Lambsdorff, with his strong views on free trade, was visiting at an opportune time.

Minister Lambsdorff replied that he was indeed well known as a free trader and that Germany had been successful in opposing quotas by the European Community, although some individual countries had taken unilateral action. He said that one of the German arguments in the EC had been that EC quotas would trigger U.S. quotas. The reverse was also true. In his opinion, American restrictions on Japanese automobiles would be "only the beginning." The EC would follow "within two weeks" with their own quotas, other nationalized industries would win quota protection, and the result would be not only an economic but also political disaster.

In discussing the Reagan Administration's economic policy, the <u>Vice President</u> and <u>Minister Lambsdorff</u> agreed on the necessity for a balance among tax cuts, spending reductions, and deregulation measures. (IX)

CONFIDENTIAL Review on March 19, 1987 24

Minister Lambsdorff said that with the timing of tax cuts and spending cuts synchronized, he thought the Administration's economic policy had a good chance of succeeding. He had observed during his current visit support for the policy, not only from businessmen, but from the man on the street.

The <u>Vice President</u> pointed out how important it was to break inflationary expectations. He said as early as 1968 he had noticed the psychology of inflation beginning to take hold.

Minister Lambsdorff agreed, but pointed out that the Administration had not proposed elimination of indexing, for example, of Social Security payments. He gave the example of Belgium, which indexed salaries and taxes, and was in dire straits economically.

The Vice President acknowledged that it had been politically necessary for the Administration to preserve some indexed programs, but that it had resisted proposals for further indexing. He shared Minister Lambsdorff's concern about indexing but thought that inflation could be controlled with the Administration's balanced program. The Vice President reiterated President Reagan's determination to reduce inflation, to reduce the government's share of the GNP and to reduce government regulation of the country. This determination sprang from deep convictions and was reiterated at every Cabinet meeting.

The discussion then turned to energy subjects. (8)

Minister Lambsdorff expressed his personal opinion (acknowledging that others in the government differed with him) that Germany had "turned the corner" on nuclear energy. He pointed to the progress on waste disposal in salt domes, the start of construction of a reprocessing plant, the funding of a fast breeder reactor and recent favorable court decisions. He felt that Germany could not afford to lose any more time in developing nuclear energy.

The <u>Vice President</u> said that Minister Lambsdorff's views were compatible with the President's and his own. He asked for more information on the temporary storage technique for nuclear wastes which the Germans were developing.

Minister Lambsdorff said that he looked forward to more fruitful cooperation with the Reagan Administration in the area of energy than with its predecessor. (2)

He said he liked the approach of Secretaries Haig and Edwards, taking into account not only short term problems but long term solutions and security aspects of energy. (U)

The <u>Vice President</u> asked Minister Lambsdorff what results he would like to see from the Ottawa summit in the area of energy.

CONFIDENTIAL

Minister Lambsdorff replied that first he would like to see a strong endorsement by the heads of state on the necessity for developing alternative sources, with a strong emphasis on nuclear energy. Second, he would like to see a commitment to raise national prices to the world market level. He understood the political difficulties of raising natural gas prices in the U.S. and oil prices in Canada, but he considered it essential.

The Vice President said that he shared Minister Lambsdorff's goals. He pointed out that when the Administration had decontolled oil, American oil companies raised pump prises the following day, even though there had been no well-head price increase. The Vice President had told several oil company presidents personally that this action had been both greedy was were traded and stupid, playing into the hands of those who favored price controls and attacked oil company profits. (I)

Minister Lambsdorff pointed out the success of the German government in publicizing the financial picture of oil companies.

Detailed and accurate financial information had been made available to the media and the public. The opposition to oil companies had diminished and the level of debate had been raised. (U)

Minister Lambsdorff predicted a difficult future of price raises by OPEC, including an indexing policy. He reiterated the conviction that the highest priority for his country and others was to develop alternative sources.

The <u>Vice President</u> agreed, noting the U.S. supplies of coal which could be bought on line in the U.S. (U)

The <u>Vice President</u> ended the conversation by noting that he had been given the job of coordinating the U.S. preparations for the Ottawa summit and that he was very interested in hearing Minister Lambsdorff's expectations for that meeting.

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TALKING POINTS FOR VICE PRESIDENT'S MEETING WITH GERMAN ECONOMICS MINISTER LAMBSDORFF (8:00 a.m. March 19, 1981)

Reagan Economic Policies: Lambsdorff will be keenly interested in the Administration's economic initiatives. He is meeting with Congressmen Kemp and Roth, Secretary Regan and Chairman Volcker. You are in a position to discuss the orchestration of the different elements of the campaign to push the President's program through -- keeping the support of the people, dealing with the special interest groups, and balancing fiscal and monetary policy. Lambsdorff's own convictions run strongly to free-market incentives and he is sympathetic with President Reagan's arms.

Japanese Autos: Lambsdorff is a lonely voice in Europe opposing restriction of imports of Japanese automobiles. (Germany is one of the few countries that does not mandate a "market share" for the Japanese.) He is vitally interested in the U.S. decision on this issue, which will have reverberations in Europe. If the decision has been made at the March 18 Cabinet meeting, he will be interested in the factors which influenced it. If the decision has not been made, he will be interested in learning the drift of Administration policy.

Deregulation: Lambsdorff has listed this subject as one he would like to discuss with you in particular. He has always been in favor of freeing private enterprise from over-regulation by government, a theme prominent on this Administration's agenda. Although the economies of the U.S. and Germany are quite different, Lambsdorff would be interested in how the Reagan Administration builds political support for deregulation, in your views concering the success of recent efforts at deregulation, for example, in the airline and trucking industries, and in the Administration's plans to proceed further in these areas.

Energy: At the Tokyo and Venice economic summits, both the U.S. and Germany endorsed numerical targets, including oil import reductions, reduction in energy-to-GNP growth ratios and others. Lambsdorff has consistently opposed numerical targets as too inflexible. This Administration, like Lambsdorff, believes in the superiority of private enterprise to government goals in the area of energy policy. However, we do not want to send the wrong signal by wholesale repudiation of energy conservation targets. In any event, the latest projections show both the U.S. and FRG meeting the Tokyo and Venice goals, driven by high prices.

Siberian Pipeline: Lambsdorff is publicly on record in favor of it. Although the U.S. has not taken a position on the project, we are concerned about the security implications for the Alliance and in the timing of the deal in light of events in Poland.

Subject: Briefing Material for the Vice President's Meeting with Count Otto Lambsdorff, FRG Economics Minister

I. THE SETTING

Lambsdorff's trip to the United States is timed to maximize his impact on our policies in areas of particular importance between the FRG and the United States. Lambsdorff is a champion of free trade and free enterprise and, consequently, is very pleased with the economic policies of the new Administration, which are in accord with his personal preferences. He will be looking for insights into U.S. policies, especially East-West relations. We want to encourage a full discussion on the issues between our two countries and support for U.S. policies. Topics which we would be discussing include Poland, the security aspects of the West Siberian/West Europe natural gas pipeline, FRG aid to Turkey, and U.S. domestic economic policies, especially deregulation.

The FRG economy is suffering its worst decline in the post-war period. High unemployment and inflation, and a decline in real GNP, combined with the growing balance of payments deficit, have put a squeeze on the German budget. Nevertheless, we are encouraging the Germans to increase both defense spending and aid to Turkey, Pakistan, and Poland.

Lambsdorff will be looking for a positive signal that the U.S. will not institute automobile import restrictions and thereby unleash a flood of protectionism. He is personally pleased with the signals received from Washington emphasizing deregulation and stimulating productivity and production through the President's economic plan. These views are very much in harmony with his own, and we can expect him to be receptive to our request for FRG cooperation. Lambsdorff is historically a friend of the United States and is keenly interested in receiving a general policy review from you, especially on how we view East-West relations.


II. OBJECTIVES

-- To make clear that our German friends can expect a consistent and predictable policy from the U.S. in which consultations with our Allies will play a key role.

- -- To exchange views on East-West relations.
- -- To underscore U.S. interests in a peaceful solution without external pressure to the problems in Poland.
- -- To urge deferral of final European action on the West Siberian/West Europe natural gas pipeline project until we can discuss the security issues fully.
- -- To thank the Germans for their continued leadership in organizing aid to Turkey.

III. ISSUES

1. The U.S.-FRG Bilateral Relationship and Consultations

Our bilateral relationship with the Federal Republic plays a role in development and implementation of all U.S. policies in virtually all parts of the world. FRG support for our policies makes their achievement much easier, and in some cases, possible. Neutrality, or opposition to our policies, undermines them, especially in the East-West and intra-European context, but also in the economic realm and in the North/South relationship. It is, therefore, imperative that we assure German support and understanding. Maintaining our commitment to full and frank consultations as decisions evolve is a key element.

The state of the U.S.-FRG bilateral relationship also plays a major role within the German political system. Although his well-publicized disagreements with former President Carter did not hurt Chancellor Schmidt, no German government can long survive a severe deterioration in that relationship. Thus, both sides benefit from a highly cooperative consultative mechanism. We will continue to consult early and closely, both bilaterally and in other fora.

TALKING POINTS

- -- THIS ADMINISTRATION IS KEENLY AWARE OF THE PROBLEMS WHICH AROSE IN THE PAST BETWEEN THE U.S. AND THE FRG AS A RESULT OF INADEQUATE CONSULTATIONS AND SURPRISES. WE ARE DETERMINED THAT THIS WILL NOT BE REPEATED.

2. East-West Relations

The FRG has followed an uncertain course on post-Afghanistan economic sanctions against the USSR which reflects the conflict between Chancellor Schmidt's view, which Lambsdorff shares, that sanctions do not work and the German desire to avoid problems with us. Although the German government approved last year a project to supply equipment for a Soviet aluminum plant, questionable in terms of post-Afghanistan sanctions, they have tacitly supported our no-exceptions policy in COCOM.

In the case of Poland, our common economic concerns focused on the Polish debt problem and the possibility of a massive default on debts to the West. The FRG's private and official credit to Poland, \$4.5 billion, is the largest of all Western countries. We are in general agreement with the FRG on the need for a sound Polish economic stabilization plan. We do differ with the FRG on terms of rescheduling; the FRG wants a longer consolidation period and a lower percentage of rescheduling than we find acceptable. Overall we want to urge continued close cooperation on problems and develop a long-term approach to Poland's debt problem.

TALKING POINTS

 ON HOW TO ASSIST THE POLES WHILE PROMOTING INTERNAL STABILITY
 AND ENSURING THAT THE SOVIETS CARRY THEIR SHARE OF THE BURDEN.
 - 3. West Siberian/West Europe Natural Gas Pipeline Project

The FRG is a strong supporter of the natural gas pipeline project. Both Foreign Minister Genscher and Count Lambsdorff have told us that Bonn has analyzed the question of dependence





on Soviet gas and concluded that the degree of dependence is acceptable and tolerable. We have, during the past year, expressed our concerns about the project as regards its security impact on the Western Alliance, diversification of energy supplies away from oil, pricing of the gas and financing for the project. As the Europeans move toward their decision to go ahead with the project, we want to discuss with them in more detail the strategic risks involved in the completion of the project and its political impact on East-West relations.

4. Aid to Turkey

We are pleased with the FRG willingness to take a leading role in the 1981 assistance program to Turkey. We share the sense of the importance of Turkey in our strategic relations and urge continued support for aid to Turkey as we move through this year's pledging sessions.

TALKING POINTS FOR RICHARD V. ALLEN'S MEETING WITH GERMAN ECONOMICS MINISTER LAMBSDORFF

(11:30 a.m., March 19, 1981)

East-West Trade and Siberian Pipeline: Lambsdorff believes that East-West trade is mutually beneficial and can be conducted without damage to Western interests. He has come out publicly for the Siberian pipeline deal and has told the press that he will be discussing his views with the Americans. We recognize the decision as Germany's to make, however, we are concerned with the implications of the deal for Alliance security and we would like to review these with the Germans. In addition, we regard the timing of the deal as crucial, especially in the context of events in Poland.

Minister Lambsdorff should have some interesting ideas about a unified Western approach to trade with the East. He is predisposed to favor a minimal government role since he believes the private sector needs flexibility. How would he guard against technology transfer? How would he ensure the Soviets do not play Western companies and countries off against each other?

Energy: At the Tokyo and Venice economic summits, both the U.S. and Germany endorsed numerical targets, including oil import reductions, reduction in energy-to-GNP growth ratios and others. Lambsdorff has consistently opposed numerical targets as too inflexible. This Administration, like Lambsdorff, believes in the superiority of private enterprise to government goals in the area of energy policy. However, we do not want to send the wrong signal by wholesale repudiation of energy conservation targets. In any event, the latest projections show both the U.S. and FRG meeting the Tokyo and Venice goals, driven by high prices.

World Trade and Economic Development: Lambsdorff consistently opposes trade barriers among the developed nations. He is therefore vitally interested in the U.S. decision on restrictions of Japanese auto imports. The decision to be taken at the Cabinet meeting tomorrow will have reverberations throughout Europe and in Germany in particular, one of the few European countries without automobile trade restrictions. Lambsdorff will be interested in the positions we will be taking in the Ottawa summit regarding trade among developed countries.

Concerning economic development of LDC's, Lambsdorff favors approaches like the Energy Facility of the World Bank. The Energy Facility uses Western and OPEC funds to capitalize energy projects in lesser developed countries. This type of project is in line with Lambsdorff's view of self-help projects for LDC's. It is the sort of approach he will push for the North-South summit. The U.S. has not yet taken a position on the Energy Facility.

Aid to Turkey: Lambsdorff is one of the key officials making decisions on German aid to Turkey. For example, last week he was in London talking to the British about their contributions to support Turkey. We and Germany contribute roughly equal amounts of economic assistance to Turkey, with other countries making smaller contributions. We are emphasizing to the Germans the importance of continuining support of Turkey, that the Turks are making the hard choices necessary to get their economy back in shape, that the Turkish army is committed to a return to a democractic form of government, and that we would expect Germany to continue to play a leading role in these efforts. Germany is doing well in this area and Lambsdorff deserves personal kudos for his efforts.

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TALKING POINTS FOR VICE PRESIDENT'S MEETING WITH GERMAN ECONOMICS MINISTER LAMBSDORFF (8:00 a.m. March 19, 1981)

Reagan Economic Policies: Lambsdorff will be keenly interested in the Administration's economic initiatives. He is meeting with Congressmen Kemp and Roth, Secretary Regan and Chairman Volcker. You are in a position to discuss the orchestration of the different elements of the campaign to push the President's program through -- keeping the support of the people, dealing with the special interest groups, and balancing fiscal and monetary policy. Lambsdorff's own convictions run strongly to free-market incentives and he is sympathetic with President Reagan's arms.

Japanese Autos: Lambsdorff is a lonely voice in Europe opposing restriction of imports of Japanese automobiles. (Germany is one of the few countries that does not mandate a "market share" for the Japanese.) He is vitally interested in the U.S. decision on this issue, which will have reverberations in Europe. If the decision has been made at the March 18 Cabinet meeting, he will be interested in the factors which influenced it. If the decision has not been made, he will be interested in learning the drift of Administration policy. (W)

Deregulation: Lambsdorff has listed this subject as one he would like to discuss with you in particular. He has always been in favor of freeing private enterprise from over-regulation by government, a theme prominent on this Administration's agenda. Although the economies of the U.S. and Germany are quite different, Lambsdorff would be interested in how the Reagan Administration builds political support for deregulation, in your views concering the success of recent efforts at deregulation, for example, in the airline and trucking industries, and in the Administration's plans to proceed further in these areas.

Energy: At the Tokyo and Venice economic summits, both the U.S. and Germany endorsed numerical targets, including oil import reductions, reduction in energy-to-GNP growth ratios and others. Lambsdorff has consistently opposed numerical targets as too inflexible. This Administration, like Lambsdorff, believes in the superiority of private enterprise to government goals in the area of energy policy. However, we do not want to send the wrong signal by wholesale repudiation of energy conservation targets. In any event, the latest projections show both the U.S. and FRG meeting the Tokyo and Venice goals, driven by high prices.

Siberian Pipeline: Lambsdorff is publicly on record in favor of it. Although the U.S. has not taken a position on the project, we are concerned about the security implications for the Alliance and in the timing of the deal in light of events in Poland.

Minister Lambsdorff, a member of the Free Democratic coalition ministry, has requested to meet with you during his visit to Washington, March 16 to 19. He is keenly interested in the US experience with deregulation of industry and would like your insights. (C)

He met with the President in November 1978 (I was on that trip). In addition, while he will undoubtedly take soundings concerning our attitude toward the proposed \$6 billion German financing for a Soviet natural gas pipeline from Siberia (in my view, we should be worried about it, and even hint at opposition).

Lambsdorff is meeting with a wide range of high level officials in both the Executive and Legislative branches: Secretaries Haig, Watt and Baldwin; Congressman Kemp, Senator Mathias and others. In the White House he is meeting with Murray Weidenbaum and possibly Ed Meese and Marty Anderson. I see no pressing reason for you to meet with him, but I believe you would find him an interesting interlocutor.
