I. PURPOSE

To maintain dialogue with Genscher on INF and general economic problems.

II. BACKGROUND

In meeting with you at this time, Genscher--mindful of candidate Vogel's recent visit -- hopes to gain positive public exposure to improve his party's (FDP) badly faltering electoral prospects. Two broad topics will be on Genscher's mind: INF and the German economy. On the former, Genscher will attempt a delicate balancing act--pressing for U.S. flexibility while seeking to maintain his bona fides as a dual-track supporter. On the economy, Genscher will want to be able to say he has discussed Germany's critical problems with you. In turn, you will want (1) to shore up Genscher's increasingly shakey INF position, and (2) to emphasize the importance of a continuing US-FRG dialogue on economic problems, as well as our commitment to growth and free trade.

Several important developments have occurred since Genscher moved away from Kohl by suggesting an interim solution on INF. First, the Soviets undercut Genscher by stridently rejecting an interim solution. Second, Franz Josef Strauss, Genscher's principal rival, attacked the zero option from the right. And, third, SPD leader Vogel became more polemical in demanding concessions from the U.S. You might make an opportunity of this mounting crescendo of extremism by noting the traditional FDP role as balance wheel and "party of reason." The implicit message to Genscher would be: Sticking with Kohl on INF makes political sense; is consistent with FDP's traditional image; and is vital for Western security.

In order to enhance the public effect of Chancellor Kohl's visit, I suggest that we incorporate two events into the schedule:

- -- A group of 15 young German workers are in the United States under an exchange program sponsored by German and American businesses. A short encounter between them, the President and the Chancellor as they left the working lunch would provide an excellent photo opportunity which would emphasize fundamental US-German ties.
- -- During the President's visit to Bonn last summer, the President received two young eagles from the German Chancellor. These eagles are now ready to be placed in the national zoo. The President and Mrs. Reagan and Chancellor Kohl could take a few minutes to visit the exhibit and make a few remarks, again emphasizing US-German ties.





We remain united in our commitment to continue on both tracks of the NATO decision of December 12, 1979, including deployment of new weapons if continued Soviet intransigence makes this unavoidable.
