Subject: Request for Meeting with the President for the Governing Mayor of Berlin

Richard von Weizsäcker, the Governing Mayor of Berlin, will be in the United States June 24-26 to open an exhibit in New York celebrating the Tricentennial of German Immigration in the United States. We believe a courtesy call with photo opportunity with the President would be very useful in highlighting US-German ties and underscoring our commitment to Berlin. Von Weizsäcker would be accompanied by Assistant Secretary of State Richard Burt and Nelson C. Ledsky, US Minister in Berlin.

Von Weizsäcker is a leading figure in the Christian Democratic party and is a prime candidate to be the next President of the Federal Republic. Governing Mayors of Berlin have traditionally called on the President during visits to the United States. In addition, the dates of von Weizsäcker's visit to the US coincide almost exactly with the 35th anniversary of the Berlin Airlift. A meeting between the President and von Weizsäcker on this occasion would receive wide press coverage in Germany and would provide the opportunity to renew the historic friendship between America and Berlin. Von Weizsäcker was the President's host in Berlin last June.

The Department strongly recommends that the President meet with von Weizsäcker during his June 24-26 visit to the US.

I have been informed by the West German Ambassador, Peter Hermes, of the forthcoming state visit of the President of the Federal Republic of Germany, Karl Carstens, in October. President Carstens will be coming to this country on your invitation to commemorate jointly the Tricentennial Anniversary of the first organized German settlement in America. Ambassador Hermes brought to my attention that the German President would be honored to have the opportunity to address Congress in a joint session during his visit.

It is my understanding that he has discussed this matter with the Speaker of the House of Representatives. Speaker O'Neill advised him that he had ruled out addresses of foreign heads of state with the exception of our neighbors Canada and Mexico. Notwithstanding this policy, on your request, Mr. President, he would be most happy to invite President Carstens to address Congress.

Issue

Whether to send Speaker O'Neill and Senator Thurmond letters in support of the German request for President Carstens to address a joint session of Congress.

Facts

President Carstens would like very much to be invited to address a joint session of Congress during his October State visit. Invitations to foreign leaders to address Congress are extremely rare. However, Speaker O'Neill reportedly told German Ambassador Hermes that he would extend the invitation if you asked him to do so in writing. You should also send your request to Senator Thurmond, President Pro Tempore of the Senate.

Discussion

There are a number of solid reasons for endorsing the German request. Two of Carstens predecessors have addressed joint sessions (in 1958 and 1975). You spoke before the German Parliament last June. His visit commemorates the tricentennial of German immigration to America. More importantly, an address to the joint session would underline the deep relationship between the U.S. and the Federal Republic in this all important year of INF deployment. Germany, as you know, is the key basing country and a warm reception by our Congress would pay domestic political dividends in the Federal Republic.

I received a visit from Ambassador Hermes on your behalf. had two requests:

- A bilateral meeting for Chancellor Kohl with the President at Williamsburg.
- A trip by the President to Philadelphia in October to participate with President Carstens of the FRG in the US-FRG Tricentennial celebration.

I recommend that we tell the Germans that the President and Chancellor Kohl will be able to talk privately between meetings and meals. However we do not have time in the schedule for a separate bilateral.

When Carstens' state visit was originally scheduled, there was to be a Philadelphia event including both the President and Carstens. Working around our office, and through Mike Deaver, the German embassy succeeded in expanding the Washington part of Carstens' stop in return for dropping the Philadelphia events. Now the Germans are trying to pocket their expanded Washington visit and regain a Philadelphia stop. I recommend that we dump this problem back in Mike Deaver's lap. With your permission I will tell Mike to handle it with the German embassy, keeping us informed.

Dear Mr. Paulson:

Your recent letter to the President regarding Germany has been referred to this office for a response.

I am sure you would agree that the Federal Republic of Germany is already a member of the "family of free nations." The German Democratic Republic is of course not a democratic state. I can only assume, therefore, that you are calling for German reunification under a free and pluralistic system.

The division of Germany of course results from the situation created by World War II, and reunification has been thus far precluded by Soviet unwillingness to allow free elections in the eastern part of Germany. German reunification in freedom remains a goal, but its realization will depend on fundamental changes in Soviet policy and therefore may not be possible for quite some time to come.

As regards your concern over the cost of NATO, I would note that, as long as our Western hations continue to face a military threat from the Soviet Union and other members of the Warsaw Pact, NATO will be necessary and the large expenditures for our common defense will be unavoidable. NATO's fundamental aim is of course to deter aggression and ensure the peace, and it has succeeded admirably in this task for almost thirty-five years.

We appreciate your having taken the time to make your views known to us.

Since World War II there is something new which affects the cost of defense; that is, that Germany does not exist as a sovereign nation. Instead, there is NATO costing the U.S. over \$100 billion annually.

Bring Germany back into the family of free nations and the expenditure for NATO can be discontinued.

I suggest, too, on principle the United States should no longer tolerate denial of self-determination to the German people.

The German people were not criminals during the Hitler Era. At Nuremberg the charge of "people's guilt" fell before the facts. The Tribunal exonerated the German people.

What is needed at this time is that you refer the German question to the American people with a view to receiving a mandate from them to restore Germany's sovereignty. With an expression from the American people in evidence you will have no difficulty with the Soviets or Eastern European nations.

Mr. Denk and Ambassador Rush believe that a photograph with the President is essential in establishing their new positions with the Commission. Mr. Bob Wood of Carl Byoir & Associates, which works with the Commission, strongly supports this idea and has undertaken to locate some object denoting the historical significance of the occasion -- such as a model of the type of ship which brought the German immigrants to America -- to be used in the photograph. Mr. Wood believes this would greatly increase the prospects for use of the photograph in the media. The photograph would be used in the media, both in the United States and in Germany, as well as by the Commission in its own publications. The photograph would denote the President's confidence in the two able men who are becoming Commission Co-Chairmen. During his visit to Germany in June 1982 President Reagan invited President Karl Carstens to honor the Tricentennial Commemorations of German Immigration to the United States of America by a state-visit to the United States. The dates and the itinerary have been set in the meantime. President Carstens will arrive in Washington on October 3, 1983.

The visit occurs, with good reasons, in a very special year for German-American relations. In the Senate Joint Resolution 260 Congress has designated this year as the "Tricentennial Anniversary Year of German Settlement in America" which President Reagan proclaimed on January 20th. My Government, for its part, attaches great importance to this visit. Therefore, it would deem it appropriate if President Carstens were given the opportunity to address Congress in a joint meeting, as former Presidents Heuss and Scheel did in 1958 and 1975, respectively. As you may recall, President Reagan addressed the German Bundestag on June 9, 1982.

The Speaker of the House of Representatives to whom I recently submitted this suggestion advised me that, according to the existing rules, he could only extend an invitation to President Carstens to address Congress upon request of the President of the United States. I would therefore like to respectfully ask you on behalf of my Government to lend your support in having President Reagan request the Speaker of the House to extend an invitation to President Carstens to address Congress in a joint meeting.
