

PRESIDENT CARSTENS OF GERMANY STATE DINNER TOAST TUESDAY, OCTOBER 4, 1983

Mr. President and Mrs. Carstens, Mr. Minister and Mrs. Genscher, honored guests:

I said this morning, and I would like to say it again, how happy and proud Nancy and I are to welcome you to the United States. Your own ties with our country, including a Master of Laws degree from Yale University, are long-standing and deep. The people of the Federal Republic of Germany have proven that they still possess those traits that helped build America. From the rubble of the Second World War, the industrious German people constructed a strong, healthy, and free democracy. We stand firmly together in the search for peace and freedom. Anniversary celebrations tend to look back, but we should not limit our commemoration to reminiscences of the past. A strength of both our peoples is that we also look to the future. The true meaning of this anniversary week is an enduring partnership that will lead to a more secure peace in the decades ahead.

Many colorful events have been organized throughout the United States to celebrate our ties. I congratulate the sponsors of these undertakings and of the numerous initiatives which have sprung up during this tricentennial year. The Tricentennial reinvigorates the cultural, historical, and political ties between our two peoples. It symbolizes something real, tangible, and enduring: German-American friendship.

Mr. President, we are grateful for your visit; we thank you for all that you have personally done in your distinguished career to support close ties between our two nations.

We raise our glasses to you, President Carstens, and to the friendship your visit represents.

PRESIDENTIAL REMARKS: PRESIDENT CARSTENS OF GERMANY ARRIVAL CEREMONY TUESDAY, OCTOBER 4, 1983

Mr. President and Mrs. Carstens, Mr. Minister and Mrs. Genscher, honored guests:

I am delighted to welcome you and your party to Washington and to the United States. During my inspiring visit to Bonn in June, 1982, we agreed that you would come to this country for an official visit as part of our joint celebration of German-American friendship.

This year has special significance. We celebrate the 300th anniversary of the first German immigration to America. Those first settlers, 13 families from the Rhineland, were followed by millions of their countrymen -- men, women, and children who became a strong thread running through the fabric of America.

German-Americans have meant so much to the development of this Nation and today, German-American friendship is vital to the security and freedom of both our peoples.

Nineteen eighty-three is a landmark year for our two countries and for the NATO Alliance as a whole. We and the rest of our Allies must continue to have the courage and mutual trust to do what is necessary to maintain peace and security in Europe. We decided in December, 1979, that if no agreement with the Soviet Union could be reached, maintaining a balance of force in Europe would require the modernization of NATO's deterrent forces. So far, the Soviet Union has not been willing to negotiate a fair and verifiable arms reduction agreement with us.

Let there be no mistake: An agreement will be far better for all concerned. We seek the elimination of these weapons. And we will continue our unflagging efforts to reach an acceptable agreement. But, if the Soviet intransigence continues, we must begin deployment and ensure NATO's deterrent. We are confident that the Alliance will meet this challenge, and that the strength of the German-American partnership will be a major factor enabling NATO to do so.

For our part we remain convinced that a strong NATO Alliance remains the key to European peace; and German-American cooperation and trust are the linchpin of that Alliance. In meeting today, and in your visit to many parts of the United States, I believe you will see that the reservoir of good will our people hold for the Federal Republic of Germany runs just as deep as ever.

By resolution of both our Congress and the German Bundestag, and by my proclamation of last January, the year 1983 is the tricentennial year of German settlement in America.

Commemoration of this momentous event in the life of our two nations has been and will be vigorous on both sides of the Atlantic. The cities on your itinerary are poised to welcome you, the people of America are waiting to share the high-points of their celebrations with you. Your presence here, marking this anniversary, touches us deeply. We are proud to say, "Wir heissen Sie willkommen." [veer HIGH-sun zee veal-COHM-un]. We greet you, we welcome you, we cherish your friendship. May God bless you and Mrs. Carstens.

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

Thank you for your letter of September 23 to President Reagan. I have been asked to respond to your inquiry.

As you know, it is very difficult for persons in the German Democratic Republic (GDR) to emigrate, especially young people. The Government of the Federal Republic of Germany (FRG) has arranged for persons in the GDR to leave in some instances; and the US Embassy to the GDR makes regular representations on behalf of those who wish to come to the United States, with some success. In virtually all cases, delays of six months to several years are usual.

You may wish to contact the FRG Embassy in Washington, 4645 Reservoir Road, N.W., Washington, DC 20007, concerning the desire of your niece Sonia to emigrate. You may also wish to contact the US Embassy to the GDR at the following address: US Embassy, USBER Box E, APO NY 09742. You should provide the full names, addresses, and if available, telephone numbers of your relatives in the GDR who desire to emigrate.

We sympathize with the problems your family members are facing and hope they will be successful in their effort to emigrate.

Your Meeting with Ambassador Hermes

November 29 at 2:30 p.m.

You are scheduled to meet with Ambassador Peter Hermes at 2:30 p.m. on November 29. Hermes has been seeking this appointment for some time, and though he has not indicated a special topic, we suspect he will wish to focus on INF and where we go from here.

You may wish to elicit Hermes' views on Germany's future political direction. The SDP's formal rejection of INF ends 25 years of German consensus on foreign and defense policy.

As we discussed the other morning, a new German nationalism, which in its current manifestation is both anti-American and neutralist, lies behind this breakdown. Germans born in the post-war period have little knowledge of U.S. aid after WWII. Moreover, this war period is an era most Germans prefer to ignore. Hence our image to many Germans is built around Vietnam and Watergate. I do not know if Hermes has concentrated on Germany's domestic situation, but you may wish to demonstrate our concern by asking for his analysis.

I have detected a preference on your part to meet one-on-one with Ambassadors like Hermes. We are, of course, available should you desire that someone sit in. Please have Wilma let me know your preference. Thank you.
