RUDOLF HESS IS TODAY AN OLD AND SICK MAN. ACCORDING TO ESTIMATES OF HUMAN LONGEVITY, HIS LIFE WILL NOT LAST MUCH LONGER. THEREFORE, AND IN VIEW OF THE LENGTH OF IMPRISONMENT, WHICH NO LONGER HAS ANY SENSIBLE RELATIONSHIP TO THE GOAL OF PUNISHMENT, A PARDON (BEGRADIGUNG) SHOULD, ON A HUMANITARIAH BASIS, NO LONGER BE REFUSED HIM.

THE PAROLE OF AN OLD MAN AFTER 4-1/2 DECADES IMPRISONMENT DOES NOT MEAN THAT THE MISDEEDS OF NATIONAL SOCIALISM, FOR WHICH RUDOLF HESS BEARS POLITICAL CO-RESPONSIBILITY, ARE FORGOTTEN. A PARDON ON HUMAHITARIAN GROUNDS DOES NOT MEAN FORGIVENESS.

AS YOU KNOW, THE INTERNATIONAL MILITARY TRIBUNAL ACQUITTED RUDDLF HESS IN 1945 OF THE CHARGE OF COMMITTING CRIMES AGAINST HUMANITY AND WAR CRIMES. FOR THE CRIMES OF THE NATIONAL SOCIALIST TYRANNY, GERMANY BEARS THE RESPONSIBILITY BEFORE HISTORY. IN THIS REGARD, THE RELEASE OF RUDOLF HESS CAN CHANGE NOTHING.

I AM OF THE VIEW THAT THE PARDON OF RUDOLF HESS WOULD BE AN ACT OF HUMANITY. A CONTINUATION OF THE MORE

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I WOULD LIKE TO ASK YOU FROM MY HEART TO SUPPORT MY REQUEST AND TO MAKE POSSIBLE THE RELEASE OF RUDOLF HESS SOON. END TEXT.

His Excellency Mr Ronald W. Reagan President of the United States of America Washington, D.C.

Mr President, dear Ron,

A few days ago, 92-year-old Rudolf Hess was transferred to the British military hospital in Berlin-Spandau. This is an occasion for me to make an urgent appeal to you to grant him a pardon so that he may be allowed to join his family.

Rudolf Hess is an old and sick man and as far as one can judge does not have much longer to live. For this reason, and in consideration of the time he has spent in prison, which now can serve no meaningful punitive purpose, he should, on humanitarian grounds, no longer be denied clemency.

Clemency for a very old man after four and a half decades in prison would not imply that the atrocities of National Socialism, part of the political responsibility for which is borne by Rudolf Hess, will be forgotten. Nor would a pardon on humanitarian grounds be synonymous with forgiving.

In 1946, as you know, the International Military Tribunal acquitted Rudolf Hess of the charge of war crimes and crimes against humanity. Germany bears historic responsibility for the crimes of Nazi tyranny. The release of Rudolf Hess would not alter this fact. In my view clemency for Rudolf Hess is a dictate of humanity. To continue the now over 40-year imprisonment of a 92-year-old sick man would be utterly inhumane.

I therefore most sincerely appeal to you, Mr President, to support my request and secure the early release of Rudolf Hess.

SUBJECT: Meeting with Deutsche Bank Board Chairman

Dr. Wilhelm Christians, Chairman of the Board of the Deutsche Bank, will be in Washington for an IMF meeting September 28-30. It might be useful for you to meet with him.

Christians is one of Europe's most influential bankers who, unfortunately, has quite an affinity for the Soviets. He has met with Gorbachev and is usually treated royally when he visits Moscow. Having fought against the Soviets, he may also subconsciously be trying to make amends. This mind-set makes him especially amenable to extending favorable loans to the USSR and to influencing other bankers to follow suit.

It would be helpful for an American in your position to point out, <u>inter alia</u>, how helping, through favorable loans, to relieve the present Soviet financial bind caused by falling oil prices makes it easier for the Soviets to have both guns and butter and decreases their incentive to conclude meaningful arms control agreements.

In any case, given the attention Christians receives in Moscow, it might not be a bad idea to counterbalance this with a meeting here at your level. He has free periods in the late afternoon of September 29 and between 10:00 and 11:30 a.m. on September 30 and could probably adjust his schedule if those times were not convenient for you.

RECOMMENDATION:

That you meet with Dr. Christians on either September 29 or September 30.

President Reagan has asked me to reply to your letter of September 29 regarding the U.S. Information Agency's financial support to German-American Institutes in Bavaria.

It was gratifying to learn of your positive evaluation of the work of the German-American Institutes and the America Houses. We at USIA have always shared your view that the German-American Institutes are valuable aspects of our public diplomacy efforts in the Federal Republic. These Institutes have long played an important role in promoting contacts between Germans and Americans, particularly among young people in the university cities where they are located.

Our U.S. Information Service in Bonn has provided considerable financial support annually to five German-American Institutes -in Nuremberg, Freiburg, Heidelberg, Saarbruecken, and Tubingen -and to the Kennedy Haus in Kiel. (Our financial support to the German-American Institute in Regensburg terminated in 1970.) Because of the severe budget constraints imposed on us by Gramm-Rudman-Hollings legislation, however, and given the prospects for even greater stringencies in the future, we concluded that we no longer could continue to support those Institutes at the previous level of financial assistance. This decision was made with great reluctance and only after a careful weighing of the stringent financial priorities for all of USIS Germany's public diplomacy programs and activities.

Given the importance of the German-American Institutes, however, we have been seeking alternative ways in which some USIA financial support could be continued, albeit at lower levels. I am pleased to inform you that we have determined that we can continue supplying enough funding to all six of the aforementioned Institutes to assure that American speakers and library materials will be provided to them on a consistent basis. This support, combined with increased German funding, will allow them all to remain strong and viable. In the specific case of the German-American Institute in Nuremberg, I am very grateful to the Bavarian State Government for its generous assistance in this effort.

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Dear Mr. President, dear friend!

Today I would like to bring a matter to your personal attention that touches the common interests of our two countries.

It has recently been brought to my attention that the U.S. Information Agency will withdraw its financial support from the German-American Information Centers in the Bavarian cities of Nuremberg and Regensburg.

I am personally concerned about this development. In both cases U.S. financial withdrawal would endanger the existence of these institutes, which are maintained on a partnership basis.

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I am well aware that the Gramm-Rudman-Act forces the U.S. Government to take economy measures on a broad level. At a time when on both sides of the Atlantic Ocean signs of creeping estrangement cannot be overlooked, with "parochial politics" arising again here and there it would be, in my view, a step in the wrong direction for the United States of America to withdraw from the joint reponsibility for these institutes, thus jeopardizing such a vital instrument of information and mutual understanding within American-German relations.

The friendship between the German and American peoples is rooted in the mutual recognition of moral and political principles as well as in important common interests. Friendship between peoples presupposes an understanding of the possibilities and limits of the other side. For this reason we need face-to-face gettogethers and more extensive exchanges of opinion, we need more personal contacts between Americans and Germans and between young people in particular, not less.

In this connection the German-American Information Centers and the America House in Munich have the function of a cultural and informational catalyst, which cannot be valued highly enough. The Bavarian State Government has acknowledged these important activities by making a substantial financial contribution to the common work. This policy shall also remain effective in the future.

The German-American friendship must not become an empty formula, but must remain a living reality. I consider the German-American Institutes and the America House Munich as a pledge and visible sign of this reality in Bavaria. This is why the overwhelming majority of the citizens in the Free State of Bavaria welcomes the presence of American troops on Bavarian soil. They would find it difficult to understand that the United States of America would not have the political will to maintain its cultural institutions that have worked so successfully for more than 40 years to bring our countries together. Moreover, the withdrawal of American funds would also play into the hands of those political forces which for a long time have been agitating against the US military presence in the Federal Republic of Germany. It is precisely in Bavaria, on the dividing-line between East and West, that the United States of America must not be indifferent to its image in the public.

In view of the outstanding cultural and political importance of these Institutes we must endeavor to continue the America House in Munich and the two German-American Information Centers in Nuremberg and Regensburg.

It is my concern, Mr. President, to make sure that no harm is done to the good reputation which the United States of America enjoys in Bavaria, and that the German-American friendship is not weakened. Therefore I would like to ask you to give your personal attention to the proposed suspension of U.S. financial support to the German-American Institutes in Nuremberg and Regensburg. You know that I would never wish to meddle in the domestic budget affairs of your country. I only want to prevent any possible ill feelings in the relations between our two countries.

I was very pleased to see your memo of December 30 on the establishment of a German-American Friendship Commission. The strengthening of our relationship with the Federal Republic is one of my primary goals. As U.S. Coordinator of the German-American effort under the Contacts Initiative, I am closely involved in this effort.

The idea of a bilateral Friendship Commission has come up before, and I am glad that you have revived it. Let me say that in principle I find it very much worth exploring as we seek to solidify our ties with the FRG. I think, however, that we need to define carefully what the functions, structure, and funding will look like before giving this proposal a wholehearted embrace. Your request that USIA coordinate with State, OMB, and other concerned Departments is most appropriate, and we are prepared to begin acting on this at once.

I am asking Joseph Klaits, Chief of our U.S.-German Contacts Staff at USIA, to coordinate the exploratory consultations on the Friendship Commission. I will be sending along our views and suggestions as they develop.

SUBJECT:

Establishment of a German-American Friendship Commission

The vital ties that link the U.S. and its cardinal ally, the Federal Republic of Germany, have been greatly strengthened as a result of the very effective work undertaken by the Tricentennial Commission and the Interagency Steering Committee for U.S.-German Contacts. This bi-national effort was greatly assisted by your able guidance over the past three years.

The NSC Staff has had detailed talks with Berndt von Staden, your German counterpart for the bilateral initiative, and with Walter Leisler Kiep, CDU Treasurer and President of the Atlantic-Brucke. Both have underscored their strong desire that the program continue, noting the Bundestag's recent 100 million Deutschmark commitment to the German Marshall Fund as evidence of the Federal Republic's seriousness of purpose.

It is essential that these important efforts continue. I believe we should consider creating a "German-American Bi-National Friendship Commission." Such a commission would be an enduring legacy of the tricentennial celebration and would provide the basis for a long-term fundamental commitment to strong German-American relations. A permanent bi-national commission, established and funded by Congress and the Federal Republic, could encourage and/or coordinate existing programs, such as the Congress Bundestag Youth Exchange. It could also selectively develop and give financial support to programs of scholarly, cultural, and artistic activities between the Federal Republic and the U.S. The Commission should receive private sector funding from the two countries.

The Commission might appear as a separate title or as a line item in the annual Foreign Relations Act. There are several models for such a Commission, such as the Japan-U.S. Friendship Commission (for purpose and program), and the International Joint Commission (U.S.-Canada, for legal structure). I suspect, however, that the German-American entity will have qualities which are unique to it. I do not suggest that long-standing programs, such as your Fulbright program, be melded into this effort. Emphasis would be on coordination, program design, and the development of selected new and special activities. With your valuable experience as coordinator of the German-American effort during the past three years and as a member of the Executive Committee of the Japan-U.S. Friendship Commission, I would like you, in conjunction with State, OMB, and other concerned Departments, to explore the best way of establishing a permanent bi-national commission for U.S.-German friendship. It would be useful to contact von Staden and Kiep too. Given the national budgetary situation at this time, this effort will have to be generated with little, if any, new funds. The effort is designed to provide focus to existing activity, to maintain our current multi-faceted program, and to energize private sector support to the efforts both in the U.S. and the Federal Republic. This vital step could exert significant and lasting influence on the relationship and, properly presented, could generate broad support throughout the American political structure.

When you have had the opportunity to study the suggestion, I would appreciate being advised of your thoughts and proposals.
