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

For Ambassador to the Federal Republic of Germany I strongly recommend that you nominate the following candidate:

W. TAPLEY BENNETT, 63, currently the United States Permanent Representative to NATO. Bennett is one of the most senior and respected professionals in the Foreign Service, who has most recently served as Chief of Mission in Santo Domingo and Lisbon, Deputy U.S. Representative to the U.N. Security Council with rank of Ambassador, and since 1977 at NATO. Most of his recent service has been in Europe and the Eastern Mediterranean areas (Vienna and Athens, in addition to Lisbon). A superbly qualified and highly experienced diplomat, Ambassador Bennett has provided strong leadership and direction to our NATO mission and won repeated cabinet-level plaudits in the process. He has few equals in terms of understanding and effectively pursuing U.S. objectives or as a leader and coordinator of programs. German Foreign Minister Genscher discussed with me at length the need for an envoy in Bonn who is intimately conversant with the complex and potentially divisive issues facing our two countries. The task will be arduous and Bennett is one of the few people in or out of government who is fully up to it. Ambassador Bennett was tested in German at the 4,4 level in 1960. He has a good working relationship with Schmidt, as well as with most of the cabinet, and has firsthand knowledge of the problems in US-West German relations.

We look increasingly to Germany to complement our defense efforts in NATO and to work closely with us on critical problems in third areas such as the Middle East, Southwest Asia, and Central America. While the U.S.-FRG relationship is basically cooperative, there are a number of contentious issues which require careful management. First among them is the problem of agreeing on what constitutes an equitable "division of labor" in the defense field. A related and extremely important issue arises from differing assessments of the Soviet Union's international role and how the Western countries should best deal with Moscow in the areas of arms control, detente, and trade relations. This has been particularly evident as the Allies struggled to develop a coherent, unified response to the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan. We also have differing perspectives on the Middle East and Central America which require continuing consultations. Economic policies, particularly in the energy area, have also been at issue in recent years.

Chief of Mission Qualifications - As the key point of contact with our most important ally, the U.S. Ambassador in Bonn must have an excellent grasp of all of the major political, military and economic issues facing the two countries. There is rarely, if ever, a major issue today which we do not seek to consult and cooperate with the FRG. Since the Ambassador personally deals with both the Chancellor and the Foreign Minister, his/her grasp of issues must be on a par with theirs if he/she is to gain and retain their confidence. The Ambassador must be of recognized public stature and wide experience, known to be a trusted advisor to the President and Secretary. The Ambassador in Bonn is concurrently the Chief of our Mission in West Berlin and, as such, bears primary responsibility for ensuring the fulfillment of our crucial role in that city. This requires a clear understanding of East-West issues. As the Chief of one of our largest and most complex

missions, the Ambassador must have management skills of a high order. He/she must be particularly adept in dealings with senior U.S. military officials in view of the very large U.S. military presence in the FRG. Finally, the Ambassador should have a good command of the German language to carry out effectively the wide range of substantive and representational responsibilities, including numerous public appearances.







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
