

MEMORANDUM OF CONVERSATION

SUBJECT: Meeting with Volker Ruehe of West Germany

The meeting began with a brief description by Mr. Carlucci of his meetings that afternoon with Congressional leaders on the budget situation. He explained briefly how the procedure was working and expressed optimism that positive results would emerge.

At the request of Mr. Ruehe, Mr. Carlucci also provided a general outline of the discussions that had taken place in Moscow the previous week. Mr. Carlucci explained how the P-la issue had been resolved and outlined the progress made toward a START agreement. He then explained what the Soviets seemed to want with reference to Defense and Space and the ABM Treaty, and why this had led to Soviet reluctance to set a Summit date. Mr. Carlucci and Mr. Ermarth then speculated about why the Soviets may have had second thoughts about a Summit meeting. Political currents that we don't understand were clearly at work in the USSR. Mr. Ermarth compared it to a fight between dogs under a blanket. We see the activity and we hear the noise, but we don't know who is biting whom. Our conclusion, nonetheless, was that Gorbachev remained in charge, and could come to the U.S when and if he so chose.

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In response to a further question by Mr. Ruehe, Mr. Carlucci outlined some of the issues connected with the INF Treaty that had been resolved in Moscow and characterized some other issues, especially in the verification area, that were still open. He characterized these issues as novel and tricky and where new ground had to be broken. These were the issues that had to be resolved properly, if the subsequent ratification process were to proceed smoothly.

Mr. Ruehe expressed his appreciation for this briefing, and said he was certain that there would be an INF agreement and a Summit. What the Alliance had to concentrate on now was developing a concept of what should follow. He knew that there were studies going on in NATO. Doubtless the Pentagon was also looking at what needed to be modernized and altered. A strategy for the forthcoming conventional stability talks also had to be prepared.

With respect to Germany, Mr. Ruehe said he had given the matter a lot of thought. His countrymen were concerned about short-range nuclear forces, but negotiations on this subject could lead to the "third zero" which he and other conservatives in the FRG did not want. Still, no German politician could afford to be seen as justifying a situation in which long- and short-range INF missiles were removed from the FRG but short-range weapons, which could only strike other Germans, were allowed to remain. Worse yet would be a NATO attempt to modernize these short-range weapons. Germans would not spend their money on weapons that could only kill other Germans. Margaret Thatcher's idea of a fire-break had no appeal in the FRG, and critics of nuclear deterrence were growing stronger.

The only answer for Germany, suggested Mr. Ruehe, had to come from within the Alliance. We needed to find a way to tell Germans that if they forego further negotiations with the Soviets, the Alliance will re-examine Western security requirements in such a way that restructuring takes place, the burdens are more equitably shared, and reductions take place along side of modernization. In this way, some weapons can come out of Germany while those remaining could be modernized. Dr. Ruehe said he would outline his views this evening at the German-American Roundtable in Washington. His thinking was personal and preliminary, and did not have the support of his party or the FRG government.

Mr. Carlucci said we would reflect on these new ideas, which on the surface seemed interesting and possibly very useful.

Grant Green tells me that Dr. Waigel can get into the Oval Office for a photo-opportunity with the President during scheduled NSC time on Thursday, October 22, 1987. The Prof Note I saw this morning set five minutes between 9:55 and 10:00 AM.

Thank you for providing this time to Dr. Waigel. I am fully aware that there are too many German visitors. Many are a waste of time. Still, in this case, an extra effort on our part could pay real dividends. So my hope is that you will agree to spend an additional 10-15 minutes in your office with Dr. Waigel following the photo-op.

Being nice to Dr. Waigel is important for many reasons. He is an influential German politician, friendly to the U.S. Perhaps more importantly, Waigel will be the next Minister President in Bavaria, and will follow Franz-Josef Strauss as head of the Christian Socialist Union (CSU). As Frank can tell you, Genscher and the German Chargé both urged Howard Baker to pay a little extra attention to Waigel. This recommendation was seconded by Rick Burt and the German Desk at State. Your extra 10 or 15 minutes will be especially important, because Waigel will not be able to see George Shultz, John Whitehead or Roz Ridgway. If you agree to go ahead, I'll do a briefing paper for you on Monday, October 19, 1987.

THE FEDERAL CHANCELLOR'S MEETING WITH THE CHAIRMAN OF THE AMERICAN COUNCIL ON GERMANY

On June 15, 1987, the Federal Chancellor met with the new Chairman of the American Council on Germany, Senator Charles McC. Mathias. The Chancellor had an hour's discussion with the Senator. He congratulated the Senator on his election as Chairman, a position he assumed at the beginning of the year as the successor to John J. McCloy. The Chancellor expressed particular pleasure that a very experienced American parliamentarian had assumed special responsibility for the strengthening of German-American relations.

In their discussion, the Chancellor stressed the importance of strengthening German-American understanding and fully involving the successor generation. He therefore feels strongly about strengthening exchanges between the younger members of the German Bundestag and the American Congress as well as high school and university students. In connection with student exchanges, the Chancellor and President Reagan agreed during the Chancellor's last visit in Washington in October, 1986, on the establishment of a joint council for German-American youth exchanges.

Senator Mathias thanked the Chancellor for his kind remarks and expressed his determination to strengthen the efforts in those areas the Chancellor had identified and stressed the role which the media ought to play in the context of German-American relations. The media particularly should identify more clearly than they now do the pluralism in both societies.

In concluding the discussion, the Chancellor again expressed his appreciation for the President's great personal success on his June 12 visits in Berlin and Bonn, and particularly for the extended television coverage in which all Germans, both in the East and the West, could share.
