PRESIDENT'S STATEMENT FOLLOWING WHITE HOUSE MEETING WITH FRG CHANCELLOR HELMUT KOHL FEBRUARY 19, 1988

It has been a very great pleasure to meet with Chancellor Kohl again for a friendly and highly useful discussion.

This year marks the 40th anniversary of a series of events that have shaped the destiny of our two countries. In 1948, the United States participated in decisions which sparked the economic recovery of West Germany and Europe, began the constitutional process of creating a West German state, joined in the airlift to save Berlin, and laid the foundation for collective security and economic integration in Western Europe. It was in this crucible of events that the modern relationship between the Federal Republic of Germany and the United States was forged, a relationship which has prospered and many times proven its value to both our countries.

As benefits good friends, the Chancellor and I have met regularly since we assumed office. Our discussions reflect the richness of our relationship and the many interests we share. I especially benefit from hearing the Chancellor's views on world problems.

Among the many subjects we discussed today, we reviewed the state of the NATO Alliance, including our common defense efforts and arms control strategy. I thanked the Chancellor for his

support for the INF Treaty--now and throughout the long INF negotiations. This Treaty represents a major political victory for NATO--a success far beyond what many thought possible. It carries important lessons on how successfully to negotiate arms reductions with the Soviet Union.

We also reviewed progress on the NATO Alliance's next arms control priorities. These include a 50% reduction in strategic arms; a verifiable global ban on chemical weapons; and redressing the serious imbalances in conventional forces in Europe. We agreed that we must deal with the Soviet Union from a position of realism, strength, and Alliance unity. We agreed that if the Alliance maintains both military strength and a readiness for realistic dialogue with the Soviet Union, we could have a positive influence on the way in which the Soviet Union deals with other countries and with its own people. The NATO Summit meeting early next month will provide an opportunity to continue discussion of these important matters within the Alliance as a whole.

The Chancellor and I also discussed economic and trade issues. In particular, I told the Chancellor that I supported the efforts he had taken thus far to stimulate the West German economy, and I expressed the hope that he would do more. The Chancellor in turn welcomed our efforts to reduce the U.S. federal deficit. We both agreed on the need to avoid trade protectionism which could stifle economic growth in both our countries.

In the course of our discussions, we also touched on a subject close to both our hearts, the city of Berlin and its brave people. We both agreed that they <u>must</u> be included in whatever benefits improved East-West relations may bring. We look forward to a positive response to the invitation the Western Powers extended last December to the Soviet Union to join with us in taking steps to improve the lives of Berliners.

The Chancellor's visits to Washington are always welcome. We will be seeing each other again soon at the NATO Summit in Brussels. Until then, we do not say good- bye but auf Wiedersehen. (owf veeder zain)

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

SUBJECT:

"The Germans are Coming"

Rather than sending requests forward one at a time, we thought it best to present the full list of expected German visitors expected in the first quarter of 1988, so that you can make decisions now.

Four very important Germans want to see the President in Washington in early 1988. In rank order, they are: Chancellor Kohl, Foreign Minister Genscher, Bavarian Minister President, Franz Josef Strauss, and opposition leader of the Social Democrats (SPD), Hans Jochen Vogel.

Kohl has written to the President, stating he would like to visit the U.S. between February 17 and 19. This should be an official working visit, with an hour long meeting and a lunch. We can hardly say no to Kohl, so it is important to lock in a date as soon as possible. If the three dates suggested above will not work, we need to find another date in February and communicate it to the German government. To facilitate the process, a Schedule Proposal is at Tab A which we ask you to send to Fred Ryan.

The Genscher visit would come even sooner. The German Foreign Minister has asked to see the President on January 21. The request is endorsed by the State Department (Levitsky memo to you is at Tab B), who tell us that Genscher will meet and be given a lunch by Secretary Shultz that same day. Genscher is coming in his capacity as Foreign Minister of the country with the EC Presidency for the first half of 1988. The President has traditionally met with a leader from the EC Presidency country, and all things being equal, we should not alter our practice when it comes to 1988 and Genscher. We think this meeting can be short -- perhaps twenty minutes to a half hour. This idea has been incorporated in the Schedule Proposal (at Tab C), which we also ask you to send to Fred Ryan.

The other two German visitors are clearly not as vital -- but neither should be considered second-rank. If possible, we should try to accommodate the two of them sometime in March, after the Kohl visit. Strauss will not come unless he can see the

President for a long meeting or perhaps a lunch. Strauss is a senior FRG leader who needs the stroking that only a Presidential meeting can provide. The purpose of having Strauss come is to reenforce the idea that the U.S. remains a steady, reliable ally with whom the conservatives in Germany need to stay in close step.

The SPD Leader Vogel has said he wants to come in March, and need only see the President for 20-30 minutes. Vogel is a SPD moderate who will probably be the party's chancellor candidate in 1990. The American President has traditionally met with German opposition party leaders, and we should grant Vogel the same treatment we have given his predecessors. We have not prepared schedule proposals for Strauss or Vogel, but we shall do so once you have given us a green light.

Subject: Call on the President by FRG Foreign Minister Hans-Dietrich Genscher

Foreign Minister Genscher would like to call on the President on January 21 to discuss US-European Community (EC) relations. The Federal Republic will hold the EC Presidency January 1-June 30 and Genscher will represent the twelve in his EC Presidency capacity. He is scheduled to call on Secretary Shultz at 11:45 January 21 and be the Secretary's luncheon guest immediately thereafter.

The FRG has had an excellent record of cooperation with the United States during its periodic EC Presidencies. This time, the West German Presidency might represent the best chance in the near future for an even closer US-EC relationship because subsequent Presidencies (Greece, Spain) may be more difficult for the US-EC dialogue on key political cooperation issues, including terrorism, and perhaps on trade matters as well.

A close friend of the United States, Genscher has seen the President several times, the last being October 8 when he was passing through Washington en route to Minnesota. A meeting in January would recognize and strengthen our close relationship with the FRG. It would also help assure that Genscher takes our objectives and concerns into account as he shapes his priorities for the FRG's term in the EC Presidency.

Oskar Lafontaine, the Deputy Chairman of the Social Democratic Party of West Germany (SPD) and Minister President of the Saarland, will be in Washington on Wednesday, September 23, and has requested a meeting with you. Lafontaine is being accompanied by Dietrich Stobbe, the former Mayor of Berlin and moderate SPD member, who you met at Ambassador Burt's residence in early August.

Lafontaine himself stands at the left wing of the German SPD, and has made a series of anti-NATO and anti-nuclear speeches over the years. Although not elected leader of the SPD earlier this year following the resignation of Willy Brandt, he is clearly an SPD leader of the 1990s.

We recommend that you meet with Lafontaine for about 1/2 hour and that the European Directorate talk with him at length following your meeting.
