Dear Dr. Donaldson:

I am replying to your message to President Reagan concerning the disturbances in the West Bank and Gaza and U.S. policy toward Israel.

The United States has watched with profound concern the pattern of violence in the occupied territories which began in early December. We are deeply grieved by the loss of life and by the large number of people who have been wounded. Such events threaten the well-being of both Palestinians and Israelis and harm the prospects for a peaceful resolution of the forty-year-old Arab-Israeli conflict.

The absence of peace and the resulting twenty-one years of Israeli occupation of the West Bank and Gaza have exacted a toll on the 1.5 million Palestinians in the territories and on the citizens of Israel as well. In the absence of a political agreement between the parties, the prevailing atmosphere has been one of mutual tension and mistrust. This environment has contributed to the recent violent protests by Palestinians and has prompted harsh security measures by Israeli authorities to restore order.

The United States has repeatedly urged both sides to adopt practices that avoid unnecessary confrontation and calm tensions. We oppose the use of lethal force and consider beatings and deportation to be counterproductive to the peace process and Arab-Israeli reconciliation. At the same time, we acknowledge the need for the preservation of public safety and believe that the Israelis have the right to seek the restoration of order in the occupied territories. We have taken a stance in the UN Security Council consistent with our overall assessment of the situation, while also noting that we do not believe that the Council should dwell repeatedly on the same issues.

The current unrest underscores the urgent need for movement in the Middle East peace process. In our view, direct negotiations based on UN Security Council Resolutions 242 and 338, entered into and concluded by the parties to the conflict freely and without coercion, offer the best hope of ensuring security and recognition for Israel and realization of the legitimate rights of the Palestinians. We hope that a revitalized peace process will lead soon to a substantial change in conditions in the West Bank and Gaza.

A fundamental aspect of U.S. involvement in the peace process is our historic and moral commitment to the security of Israel. President Reagan emphasized in his September 1982 Middle East initiative that, in order for the peace process to succeed, the security and legitimacy of Israel must be assured. Our military and economic assistance reflects this U.S. commitment to Israel as a free and democratic state and helps to give Israel the confidence to move forward in the search for peace.

We hope that all the parties involved will regard the disturbances as a challenge to work harder on practical steps to bring about reconciliation, negotiations, and peace. We will continue to be involved and do our best to move the peace process forward.

I am sending the enclosed material in the belief that you will find it of interest.

Concerning the recent events in the Middle East, as an American citizen I am compelled to speak out about my government's policy on the Israeli/Palestinian situation.

Having lived now for the past 4% years in the Middle East (Jordan and the United Arab Emirates), and having made many Christian and Muslim arab friends (including Christian and Muslim Palestinians), and having grown up in a predominently Jewish suburb of Washington D.C. with some of my best friends being Jewish and pro-Israel, I believe I am speaking from a relatively well informed point of view.

I am ashamed that my government refuses to condemn publicly the way in which the Israeli government has chosen to try to bring the Palestinian uprising under control. By saying little against their methods and by vetoing U.N. Security Council resolutions condemning what most of the world has seen on their television screens, we are silently agreeing with their methods of brute force, intimidation, and harassment. I along with others watched arms being broken by rocks, olive trees owned by Palestinians and a world symbol of life and peace, being bulldozed down, and houses being blown up in reprisals. And let us not kid ourselves by saying...ahh but these are just isolated instances. They are not! When the Israeli government controls access to areas, not only to the press but to any outsiders, you know there is something to hide!

In the United States our criminal code convicts those that aid and abet others in the commission of a crime. The U.S. government stands to be convicted of the acts of the Israeli government because of our aid and refusal to stand up to the spoiled child. You know as well as I the Israeli government could not exist without U.S. ecomomic and military aid. Thus the U.S. government, as an accomplice, helped commit the murder of Khalil Al Wazir, Abu Jihaad.

No matter what he had done in the past, he was not charged and brought to trial but murdered. The U.S. is further implicated by complicity in the invasion of a sovereign country by a commando force, without due process of law and without cause. The U.S. government, which includes you and I, is guilty by association. And I refuse to accept that guilt and so I must speak out!

We are not living by our own constitution. We do not believe in the preamble of our constitution when it is not politically expedient. Inalienable rights only apply when expedient. We believe in the rights of black South Africans because we are against apartheid. We speak out against the South African government and pass sanctions, but we do not believe in the rights of Palestinians. Review your history on how this mess was created. How would you like it if an international commission decided to give the city of Philadelphia or Pittsburg to an oppressed people and demanded you to leave or get out. Tough luck that you own this or that or your paid-for-house that has been passed down from generation to generation is there.

It amazes me to see that people who experienced some of the worst civil rights abuses are now using some of the same principles and methods of force, intimidation, and expulsion to others who they now control.

May we not be guilty of standing by and helping those we could help if only we had the courage to do so. And may we not be guilty of accepting the excuse that we the Israelies suffered so much in the past, that <u>any</u> means justifies the end. <u>Remember the Israeliattack on the USS Liberty?</u>

Do I have a solution? Possibly. The U.S. stands up to the spoiled child and says you either stop abusing the civil rights of your residents, Palestinians and Israelies, or you go it alone economically and militarily.

Do we <u>really</u> want peace in Palistine? If so maybe we could tell the Israeli government to give back the West Bank, Gaza Strip,

and the Golan Heights (a return to the pre-war boundries) and make way for the creation of a Palastinian nation, and then sign a mutual defense pac with Israel and essentially say to all its neighbors if you attack Israel you attack us and we will "knock your block off" if you do such a fool hardy thing. You know it just might work.

Dear Howard:

Thank you for the time Thursday and the request for this note. The Arab-Israeli war is just that ... a war! The main point of my comments to you were that the perceived politics of the current round of diplomacy was confusing to the audiences that I have addressed as recently as the Illinois Primary.

These groups, mostly Jewish War Veterans and the like, stated, over and over, that the administration appears to have abandoned the Camp David process in favor of an international conference. Translated, the Camp David accord was between President Carter and Prime Minister Begin, but not between the Republican party and the Labor Party in Israel. It appears that this Administration favors the Labor Party.

I talked to friends in Israel this morning covering both sides of the political spectrum, and they said that Secretary Shultz was clear, direct and humanistic on Israeli television, and that the intellectuals and upper class in the country respected him. However, the masses hated his going to the public and not through the "chain of command" i.e., the Prime Minister. For the the majority of the Israeli viewing audiences, this is a new ex-They are simply not used to that method. Sunday's New York Times further supports my observations. The article by Abba Eban states that he would have preferred to follow the procedures and composition of the 1973 Geneva Conference with American and Soviet leadership alone. Governor Dukakis, announced he now favors the notion that the United States should support the framework established by the Camp David accords in 1978 for the future of the Westbank and Gaza, after having earlier supported the letter from thirty Senators supporting Secretary Shultz.

I think we both agree that the situation in the area is a grid lock, and coupled with the elections this year in both countries, it is a very hard environment. Here are some suggestions:

Senator Howard Baker April 7, 1988 Page 2.

- Reintroduce, at least for public relations purposes, some recognition of the Camp David Process. You might consider having President Reagan ask the Secretary of State, upon his return, to brief President Carter either privately or publicly.
- Given the extraordinary strength, leadership, and humanity of President Reagan, I think it is possible to invite low level military dialogue, perhaps through the Naval War College and the like. In fact, there is a precedent since General Magdoub of Egypt and General Tamir and others spent an entire year at the Madison Hotel in such dialogue prior to Camp David.
- Of the four key Israeli players, Shamir, Sharon, Peres and Rabin, Rabin and Sharon probably will give the most credibility to any plan, and they voted in favor of Camp David.

I certainly hope and pray that the Secretary of State will get something going.

I have been asked to respond on behalf of the President to your letter of June 24, 1988 concerning Israeli human rights practices on the West Bank. Many of these concerns were addressed in our response to your letter of May 27, 1988 which was addressed to John Whitehead.

Regarding the overall U.S. approach to the Arab-Israeli conflict, between February and June 1988 Secretary Shultz traveled three times to the Middle East to promote a new initiative to reinvigorate the search for peace. Although there have not yet been any major breakthroughs, none of the parties to the conflict has suggested that the U.S. initiative be abandoned or that our efforts should stop; on the contrary, all recognized the dangers inherent in the status quo and urged that we continue to work to bring about negotiations.

In the period ahead, the United States will remain heavily involved and in close touch with the parties. We are willing to help shape opportunities that exist and to discuss the details required to launch a realistic negotiating process. There will be no diminution of the American effort. We are confident of our initiative, confident of the desire of the parties to proceed, and confident that the peace process can be carried forward.

### HUMANITARIAN ORGANIZATIONS SPEAK ON WEST BANK AND GAZA CONDITIONS

We are a group of U.S.-based charitable and development organizations that render humanitarian assistance to Palestinians in the West Bank and Gaza Strip. We are deeply concerned about the deterioration of conditions affecting Palestinians, particularly since the beginning of the popular uprising in December 1987. Lives today are marred by increasingly aggressive Israeli military practices against the civilian population. These brutalize and demean both Palestinians who face such treatment and Israeli soldiers who feel compelled to act in this way. Whatever the provocation, such practices are not acceptable. They are inconsistent with universally recognized norms of behavior and violate principles of international law pertaining to conduct toward civilians under military occupation and the provision of medical and humanitarian assistance.

Specific practices, many of which our personnel have witnessed, include:

- systematic and indiscriminate beatings;
- widespread use of tear gas, rubber bullets, and live ammunition;
- repeated attacks on hospitals, clinics, and medical personnel;
- · administrative detentions and mass arrests;
- protracted curfews, house demolitions, and other forms of collective punishment;
- · and extended closure of schools and universities.

These practices, which will leave enduring physical and psychological scars, must be stopped immediately.

It is important that the present confrontation be placed within the context of the long unresolved Israeli-Palestinian dispute. Ultimately, the protection of human rights and the end of violence can only be assured by a comprehensive settlement.

As concerned U.S. organizations, we call upon our government to protest these practices to the highest levels of the Israeli government, to pursue vigorously efforts to bring an end to violence on the ground, and to press for a solution that will realize security and self-determination for both Palestinians and Israelis.

President Reagan met today with Israeli Defense Minister Yitzhak Rabin. During his visit Defense Minister Rabin also met with Vice President Bush, Secretaries Shultz and Carlucci, and National Security Advisor Powell. In these meetings, the regional environment in the Middle East, US-Israeli defense cooperation, and the peace process were discussed.

The President and Vice President expressed their concern about ominous new military trends in the region. In particular, they called attention to the proliferation of ballistic missiles and chemical capabilities in the area. They observed that such capabilities could change the military situation, making any future war far more costly, difficult to control, and dangerous. Both the President and Vice President emphasized the need for international regional efforts to stop this dangerous trend. They also stressed that this trend puts a premium both on continuing US-Israeli defense cooperation, and energetically working for peace in the area. Given the emerging military trends, the joint US-Israeli effort to develop Anti-Tactical Ballistic Missiles (ATBMs) -- an outgrowth of research on SDI -takes on new and increased importance. In this regard, we are pleased with the signing during the Minister's visit of a MOU that will implement this important joint endeavor.

The President and Vice President paid tribute to what Defense Minister Rabin has done to strengthen Israeli capability for self-defense and its cooperation with the U.S. The Administration was pleased to have been able to support the Minister's request last July for early delivery of additional F-16 aircraft at the best possible price.

Defense Minister Rabin has done much to develop our strategic partnership and give it substance. He has recognized realistically what Israel can afford to develop on its own and in partnership with us. On issues like Lavi, he's made the tough decisions — the real measure of leadership. They are necessary to preserve the long-term health of Israel's defense industries and overall security.

The President and Vice President fully endorse the Minister's efforts to strengthen and support Israeli industry and research and development capabilities and pledged to permit Israel to use a portion of FY 90 U.S. assistance in offshore procurement and directed offsets. In addition, they pledged to continue and intensify our work together on the SDI initiative and in other weapons development.

The President and Vice President reaffirmed America's commitment to Israel's security, noting that Israel could never be fully secure without peace. Realism and a willingness to nurture rather than reject possible opportunities for peace are essential, as is a climate that makes negotiations possible. While Israel should not be expected to make concessions under the threat of violence, the preservation of order in the territories must neither provide a justification for civilian lawlessness nor act as an excuse for avoiding political discourse with the Palestinians of the West Bank and Gaza. Neither should violence nor controls on violence become ends in themselves, making a political solution more difficult. The President and Vice President congratulated Defense Minister Rabin for his long record of dedication to the pursuit of peace.

President Reagan is pleased that shortly we will be signing an MOU on the joint development of Anti-Tactical Ballistic Missiles (ATBMs). Given emerging military trends in the Middle East, the joint US-Israeli effort to develop ATBMs -- an outgrowth of research on SDI -- takes on new and increased importance.

The President expressed his concern about ominous new military developments in the region. In particular, he called attention to the proliferation of ballistic missiles and chemical capabilities. He observed that such capabilities could change the military situation, making any future war far more costly, difficult to control, and dangerous. Both the President and Vice President emphasized in their meetings with Minister Rabin the need for international efforts to stop this proliferation. They also stressed that these trends put a premium both on continuing US-Israeli defense cooperation, and energetically working for peace in the area.

The President paid tribute to what Defense Minister Rabin has done to strengthen Israeli capability for self-defense. Defense Minister Rabin has also done much to develop our strategic partnership and give it substance. He has recognized realistically what Israel can develop on its own and in partnership with the United States.

Defense Minister Rabin will visit Washington June 27-28 at Secretary Carlucci's invitation. You have agreed to meet with Rabin on the afternoon of the 27th. I also recommend that we propose a ten-minute photo opportunity with the President.

As you know, Rabin plays a central role in shaping Israeli policy in the Occupied Territories and in South Lebanon, and is also virtually co-leader of the Labor Party with Peres. He can make meaningful, if not major, decisions on issues relating to these areas, even during this electoral period. Beset by pressures from both ends of the Israeli political spectrum, Rabin has steered a middle course on problems in the Territories and remained committed to a negotiated settlement based upon an exchange of territory for peace. He has publicly called for a dialogue with the Palestinians. Like the Peres visit to the White House earlier this month, Rabin's talks here provide a good opportunity -- without openly playing electoral politics in Israel -- to encourage Israeli moderates and keep the pressure on those whose "vision" for the Territories is not only unworkable but dangerous for the entire region.

Secretary Shultz, who will see Rabin separately on June 27, supports a brief Presidential meeting with the Defense Minister.

Batjer concurs.
