Dear Mr. Hill and Mr. Harris:

Thank you for your letter of June 30, 1988 concerning the closing of the In'Ash El-Usra society in the West Bank. I am responding on behalf of President Reagan.

We understand that the vocational center, heritage center, library, administrative offices, bakery and day care center have been closed. The orphanage is still open and functioning.

The Government of Israel is well aware of our concern over practices which adversely affect the Palestinian population in the West Bank and Gaza. Such practices foster rather than reduce tensions and make reconciliation and compromise more difficult.

We believe that the protection of human rights and the end of violence can best be achieved through a comprehensive settlement of the Arab-Israeli dispute. To this end, Secretary Shultz has proposed a realistic plan to achieve direct negotiations, and has made several trips to the region in an effort to bring the parties to the conflict to the negotiating table. The Secretary's initiative reflects our view that direct negotiations based on United Nations Security Council Resolutions 242 and 338 offer the best hope of ensuring security for Israel and realization of the legitimate rights of the Palestinian people.

SUBJECT: Public's Pro-Israel Tilt Remains Sizeable Despite

West Bank Events

Summary

Four recent polls on the American public's "sympathies" in the Middle East all show pro-Israel "sympathy" remains considerably larger than pro-Arab "sympathy." Pro-Israel sympathy recorded on these polls ranged from 37 percent to 61 percent, due to differences in how the pollsters handled the question. All four polls showed the level of pro-Arab sympathy was between 11 percent and 13 percent.

According to Roper polls, pro-Israel sympathy declined by 18 percentage points between early 1987 and early 1988, after the start of unrest on the West Bank and Gaza. But nearly half of this loss has been recouped, according to Roper's latest poll conducted in April.

End Summary

Pro-Israel Sentiment Still Far Outweighs Pro-Arab Sentiment

All recent polls agree that pro-Israel "sympathy" remains sizeably larger than pro-Arab "sympathy." The polls differ in measuring the level of the predominant pro-Israel sympathy and whether it has declined in recent months. The most sensitive measure of long-term changes in opinion are provided by Roper polls. These show that the percentage who "sympathized more" with Israel fell from 48 percent in February 1987 to a low-point of 30 percent in February 1988, when Palestinian unrest was the leading foreign policy issue in the news. Some of this loss was retrieved by April, when Roper found pro-Israel sympathy stood at 37 percent (see Table 1, attached).

Pro-Arab Sentiment Has Been More Stable Than Pro-Israel Sentiment

Fluctuations in sympathy for the "Arab nations" have been much smaller than changes in pro-Israel sympathy. The percentage who "sympathized more" with the "Arab nations" rose from 8 percent in February 1987 to 13 percent in February 1988, and retreated to a mid-point of 11 percent in April 1988, according to Roper polls.

Decline in Pro-Israel Sentiment Matched by Rise in Non-Committal Views

Although respondents were offered only two response categories ("more with Israel" or "more with the Arab nations"), Roper has also recorded "volunteered" neutral responses of neither side/both sides as well as the familiar "don't know" responses. The "neutral" and "don't know" responses are an indicator of how much of the public (roughly one-half on the average) chooses not to side with either Israel or the Arab nations, or pays no attention to the issue. These non-committal responses increase when sympathy for Israel declines. Respondents who formerly were pro-Israel sympathizers are much more likely to give non-committal responses than convert to pro-Arab sympathizers. Roper found a total of 44 percent gave non-committal responses in February 1987 (30% neither side/both sides and 14% don't know). This rose to a high of 57 percent in February 1988, and then fell slightly to 53 percent last April (37% neither side/both sides and 16% don't know). (See Table 1)

Other Pollsters Record Fewer Non-Committal Responses

Differences between pollsters regarding the level of pro-Israel sympathy depend largely on their attention to the variety of volunteered neutral responses expressing sympathy with "both" Israel and the Arab countries or with "neither side."

A Marttila and Kiley poll conducted in April for the American Jewish Congress obtained a "no opinion" response of 26 percent, but did not record any neutral responses. As a consequence, it found a much larger percentage of pro-Israel sympathy than Roper -- 61 percent vs 37 percent. (There was hardly any difference in their percentages of pro-Arab response -- 13% vs 11%.) Moreover, Marttila/Kiley found no change in pro-Israel sympathy from an identical poll taken in October 1986 (i.e., 61% on both polls), and found a small increase in pro-Arab sympathy (from 10% to 13%). In contrast to Roper's poll, pro-Israel sympathizers critical of recent Israeli actions who might have been disposed to volunteer a neutral response in early 1986 were not given that option on the Marttila/Kiley poll; few were willing to make the larger switch from a pro-Israel to a pro-Arab position. (See Table 2)

Other pollsters who have recorded neutral responses, but to a lesser extent than Roper, have found the percentage of pro-Israel sympathizers somewhere between those obtained by the Roper and Marttila/Kiley polls. For example, a Los Angeles Times poll taken in March-April recorded a neutral response of 18 percent (compared to 37% by Roper and 0% by Marttila/Kiley) and found the level of pro-Israel sympathy was 51 percent -- approximately

Dear Ken,

The community is deeply disturbed by several recent developments. As a predicate, the following facts are to be noted:

- Israel does not occupy a single inch of ground as a result of aggression on its part.
- All occupations are onerous, but occupations can only cease when peace is established.
- The obstacle to peace between Israel and the Middle East continues to be Arab intransigence illustrated by the Palestinian National Covenant and the Khartoum Declaration.
- Under International Law, Israel is charged and obligated to restore order in the territories. None in the Administration have disputed this in the numerous discussions I have had.
- Israel is not faced with protest demonstrations, but with revolt - violent and threatening, not only to Israel but to the inhabitants of the territories.

I believe that Israel is under attack, to a large extent, because it calls to mind American interests and values in the Middle East. Israel and the United States are not only friends, but support each other because of common interests. It is the right of the United States to criticise Israel and of Israel to differ with the United States. However, when the two allied countries differ, it should be done (as with NATO allies) in an atmosphere

of friendship and frankness. I understand that the United States does not agree with certain measures taken by Israel under its obligation to quell the riots and to restore order. But one must not lose sight of the fact that the people deported, the instigators of the riots, are harming the very people they claim to be helping. No one is being deported to life threatening situations or to Siberia or to alien countries. They are being deported to places where they have colleagues and, presumably, freedom - place where they may even continue to harass Israel.

All of us know that in other countries, including those who are instigating the outcry against Israel, the people deported would be in prison, labor camps or shot.

You know that the Jewish community, as Israel, wants to see negotiations leading towards peace. But I know of no one in the Administration who feels that Israel can negotiate under these threats.

Therefore, we are deeply concerned by the following recent developments:

- The tone of the demarche presented to Israel this week which we recognize was not made public by its representatives.
- The tone and text of the resolution which at this moment is before the Security Council of the United Nations.
- The actions of the Trade Representatives of the United States in scheduling hearings at which Israel will be included (at the behest of representatives of intransigent Arab interests).

We recognize, and applaud, the dedication of the United States to the principles of human rights, but the most pristine principles cannot be applied by a state at war with its neighbors and behest by insurrection in areas where it has an international legal obligation to restore order.

We trust these actions do not represent a change in policy or attitude, but nevertheless they are bound to be seen as such.

This is a particularly sensitive time and such actions by the US government (and a friendly and supportive administration) can only encourage Israel's enemies, increase its sense of isolation and impede the prospects for peace.

I have been asked by the White House to respond to your letter to President Reagan of June 20, 1988, concerning the situation in the West Bank and Gaza. We appreciate your bringing to the President's attention your eyewitness account of recent events in the Occupied Territories.

We oppose the use of lethal force, beatings, and deportations against the Palestinian population as counterproductive to efforts to bring about reconciliation.

At the same time, we acknowledge Israel's genuine security concerns and the need for the preservation of order. Fire bombs, rock throwing, and inflammatory rhetoric from the Arab side that calls into question the existence of the State of Israel inevitably fuels Israeli anxieties and adds to tensions between the two sides. We note with concern the use of threats and violence by leaders of the uprising to intimidate the inhabitants of the West Bank and Gaza and prevent them from any discussion with Israeli officials.

We believe that the protection of human rights and the end of violence can best be achieved through a comprehensive settlement of the Arab-Israeli dispute. As you know, Secretary Shultz has traveled several times to the region in recent months in an effort to bring Israel and its Arab neighbors to the negotiating table. To this end, he has put forward a plan to achieve through direct negotiations between Israel and each of its neighbors a comprehensive peace providing for the security of all states in the region and for the legitimate rights of the Palestinian people.

Dear Mr. Secretary:

Recently you received a letter critical of Israeli Prime Minister Shamir for his stated unwillingness to give up "land for peace" and remonstrating with the Prime Minister to yield on that position.

The letter was signed by several Senators whose support and concern for Israel is beyond question.

I was invited to add my signature but declined. I declined even though I share the fervent desire of those who did sign for a real and lasting peace in the Middle East, and share the view that the U.S. has an important role in achieving that peace.

But I did not sign because I could not in conscience urge the Israeli Prime Minister to take steps I would not myself take if, like Mr. Shamir, the survival of Israel as a free state within secure boundaries were my responsibility.

It is true that U.S. policy supports the concept expressed in UN Security Council Resolution 242 that Israel should be prepared to relinquish some but not all lands won by Israel from her Arab neighbors in the 1967 war in return for the guarantee of peace.

But even if one accepts that general proposition, there is a necessary order as to which of its two parts must come first: the guarantee of peace must precede the relinquishment of land, and Israel and Shamir are entirely justified in insisting that the precise mechanism for achieving that guarantee come first.

Why? For the obvious reason that relinquishing the land without having insured the guarantee is, or may be, giving away secure boundaries in return for nothing but an empty promise. It could, in short, prove to be a dangerously naive mistake, an act of faith offered to those who, except for Egypt, have done little to warrant faith. What practical recourse has tiny Israel -- after giving up land critical to its survival -- should such an act of faith prove unwarranted once again?

So what is the precise mechanism for assuring that Israel will be guaranteed the right -- and the ability -- to exist as a free nation within the inescapably <u>less</u> secure boundaries which are envisioned in a swap of land for peace?

Having read carefully the letter sent by you, Mr. Secretary, to Prime Minister Shamir, I am little comforted and frankly do not wonder at Shamir's reluctance to sign on until he has received such reassurance from the U.S.

You have proposed that Israel commit to a process of negotiation in an "international conference" which it is said "will not (according to the text of the Shultz proposal printed in the March 8, 1988 Los Angeles Times) be able to impose solutions or veto agreements reached" by Israel in a series of bi-partisan negotiations with "each of its neighbors which is willing to do so."

Query: What peril is posed by a neighbor <u>un</u>willing to negotiate? How will the neighbor who refuses to negotiate with Israel be bound by Israel's negotiations with others?

And how can Prime Minister Shamir be expected to believe that this international conference, which "will not be able to impose solutions," will, in fact, exist for any purpose other than to "impose solutions"? With the proposed conference, consisting of hostile neighbors, except Egypt, and either hostile (the Soviet Union and People's Republic of China) or indifferent (the United Kingdom and France) permanent members of the U.N. Security Council, except for the U.S., how can this international conference be expected not to exhort and pressure and criticize Israel in a very public and calculated propaganda campaign aimed at imposing "solutions" that may undermine Israel's security?

Soviet missiles in the Bakaa Valley of Lebanon threaten Israel today. Why should the Soviets be invited to participate in an international conference? It is in fact the sense of the Senate that they should not be unless and until the Soviet Union has resumed diplomatic recognition of Israel, substantially liberalized emigration of Soviet Jewry from the Soviet Union to Israel, and been invited to participate by Israel as well as Jordan and Egypt. The Senate so voted unanimously only last October 9, 1987, when we passed S. Res. 217 as an amendment to the FY88 Department of State Authorization bill, a copy of which is attached.

I understand fully the sincere and heartfelt desire for peace that prompted my colleagues to compose their letter to you. But I would respectfully suggest that before we pressure Israel to give up land critical to its survival, both the Executive branch and the Congress should pressure Israel's Arab neighbors -- whose interests we are protecting against the threat of Iran by our naval presence in the Persian Gulf -- to give convincing evidence that such land will not become a base for terrorism or an attack upon Israel.

Many times in the recent past, many Senators who signed the letter to Prime Minister Shamir have voted or threatened to vote to withhold arms sales to Arab states which do not find it possible to concede Israel's right to exist within secure boundaries.

We have said in effect, "First peace, then arms." Now we should say, "First peace, then land."

Also, to pressure Mr. Shamir and his government now is ill-timed and ill-advised. It seems to me that it unwisely and unfairly undermines our friend and ally, as have our recent votes in the U.N., at a time of already intense pressure. Rather than gratuitous advice, let us give support of the kind that strengthens Israel's bargaining power to insist on a convincing guarantee of her right to exist in peace, freedom, and security -- so that, with that guarantee, she may be able to <u>safely</u> relinquish land for a peace that will be genuine and lasting.
