THE VICE PRESIDENT'S LUNCHEON REMARKS

It is a pleasure for me to honor this afternoon an old friend of the United States, a visitor who is no stranger to Washington. It should come as no surprise that President Felix Houphouet-Boigny has previously been received in these halls by Secretaries Rusk and Kissinger, for he is one of Africa's elder statesmen, one who led his country to independence and is the architect of its phenomenal economic success. We are honored by his presence among us.

Ivory Coast stands out as a success story in Africa. For most of its twenty-three years of independence it has enjoyed a record economic growth rate averaging seven per cent per year. It is a country where wealth is distributed more equitably than in almost any other on the African continent. It is a country with a vigorous private sector in which incentive to producers has stimulated growth and in which foreign investors have been welcomed. We are proud that the American private sector, represented by some 70 companies — including six major banks — has played a role in promoting the success for which Ivory Coast is so well known. We have worked together as partners, each bringing his own gifts, each contributing his own labor.

In the African region we have been engaged in dialogue to seek a peaceful and lasting solution for the independence of Namibia. As you know so well, those who have the courage to undertake dialogue are at times the object of criticism. Yet we continue in our efforts because we believe as you do that we must strive to create a peaceful and prosperous world in which all men are free, proud, and equal.

We honor you today as a senior statesman; we welcome you as a friend.

Room.

7:05 p.m. First motorcade of the Official Party departs the Four Seasons Hotel escorted by the Chief of Protocol,

Ambassador Roosevelt.

7:10 p.m. The regular dinner guests are escorted by Social Aides to the East Room where they are announced.

(A Social Aide will also announce each guest to the Press Pool in the Lower Cross Hall.)

The Acting Secretary of State and Mrs. Dam and the Vice President and Mrs. Bush will arrive the North Portico. They should be escorted into the Red Room to await the arrival of Ambassador Roosevelt and the Official Party.

(Harpist is in the Diplomatic Reception Room.)

The second motorcade of the Official Party departs the Four Seasons Hotel.

7:15 p.m. At the arrival of the first motorcade at the North Portico, a Social Aide will escort the Vice President and Mrs. Bush and the Acting Secretary of State and Mrs. Dam from the Red Room to join the arriving party at the foot of the Grand Staircase.

The Chief of Protocol escorts the following to the Yellow Oval Room via the Grand Staircase:

The Vice President and Mrs. Bush

H.E. Simeon Ake and Mrs. Ake, Foreign Minister
H.E. Rene Amany and Mrs. Amany, Ambassador
of the Ivory Coast to the United States
The Honorable Nancy V. Rawls, U.S. Ambassador
to the Ivory Coast

7:20 p.m. Second motorcard of the Official Party arrives White House at the North Portico.

A Social Aide will escort them to the Red Room.

A senior government official will serve as host in the Red Room to the remainder of the Official Party. A Social Aide, with the help of a Protocol Officer, will give out seating cards to the guests.

Four additional Social Aides will then escort the Party, one by one, into the East Room at 7:35.

- 7:20 p.m. President and Madame Houphouet-Boigny depart the Four Seasons Hotel accompanied by Mr. Roosevelt. (Military cordon will line the driveway.)
- 7:29 p.m. THE PRESIDENT AND MRS. REAGAN depart the living quarters by elevator and proceed to the State Floor and outside the North Portico to await the arrival of President and Madame Houphouet-Boigny.

(U.S.M.C. Orchestra in Main Foyer.)

The Chief of Protocol will serve as hostess protem for THE PRESIDENT AND MRS. REAGAN as they greet President and Madame Houphouet-Boigny.

- 7:30 p.m. President and Madame Houphouet-Boigny are greeted by THE PRESIDENT AND MRS. REAGAN and escorted into the Grand Foyer. THE PRINCIPALS will then proceed to the Residence via the elevator.
- 7:35 p.m. The remainder of the Official Party in the Red Room is escorted to the East Room and announced.

Color Guard proceeds up the Grand Staircase to the hallway outside the Yellow Oval Room.

7:40 p.m. Guests (save PRINCIPALS) depart the Yellow Oval room via the elevator for East Room and are announced. The Vice President and Mrs. Bush are announced last.

7:40 p.m. Cont'd

OIC requests permission to secure the Colors. THE PRESIDENT responds, "Permission granted." Color Guard proceeds to secure the Colors and proceeds out of the Yellow Oval Room down the Grand Staircase, led by OIC.

At the foot of the Staircase, Color Guard divides.

7:45 p.m.

THE PRINCIPALS arrive on the State Floor via the Grand Staircase, pause at the foot of the Stairs for press photo session, and proceed directly to the East room to Full Honors.

After the announcement of THE PRINCIPALS, THE PRINCIPALS enter the East Room and form a receiving line which will be in the center of the Cross Hall doors, just inside the East Room. The order of the line from north to south is as follows: THE PRESIDENT, THE PRESIDENT OF THE REPUBLIC OF IVORY COAST, MRS. REAGAN, MADAME HOUPHOUET-BOIGNY.

Note: The Color Guard will precede THE PRINCIPALS into the East Room and take their places on either side of THE PRINCIPALS for the receiving line.

The Chief of Protocol stands to THE PRESIDENT'S left with a Social Aide on her left to make introductions to THE PRESIDENT.

Guests going through the receiving line will move as follows: they will go passed THE PRINCIPALS, continue into the north door into the Green Room, out the Green Room into the Cross Hall and into the State Dining Room for dinner.

Having come through the receiving line, the Official Party will go directly into the State Dining Room.

After all the guests have gone through the receiving line, THE PRINCIPALS should hold in the East Room until all guests are in the State Dining Room, then proceed down the Cross Hall to the State Dining Room.

(Appropriate music should be played.)

8:15 p.m. Dinner is served in the State Dining Room.

(The Staff Mess will be used for dinner for attending Aides and protocol officers.)

9:05 p.m. Dessert is served accompanied by the Strolling Strings.

9:20 p.m. Toasts:

PRESIDENT REAGAN

Alternate Dinner guests at Blair House will walk from Blair House through the Northwest Gate and enter the North Portico. They will also proceed to the Color Room.

All guests will be encouraged to mix and mingle in all Color Rooms.

- 9:50 p,m. Cross Hall doors to the East Room are opened to allow quests to be seated if they wish.
- 10:10 p.m. All guests but PRINCIPALS will proceed to the East Room for seating. The south doors from the Green Room to the East Room may be used as well as the Cross Hall doors.
- 10:20 p.m. THE PRINCIPALS enter the East Room via the Cross Hall doors and are seated on specially allocated chairs in the first row.
- 10:25 p.m. Members of the Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center will begin their performance.

PRESIDENT AND MRS. REAGAN proceed to the stage to be photographed with the entertainers, and THE PRESIDENT makes thank-you remarks.

SUBJECT: Proposed State Visit for Ivory Coast President Houphouet-Boigny

Earlier we had proposed Zimbabwean Prime Minister Mugabe for a state visit during the first half of 1983, but withdrew that request in order to invite Mugabe and Zambian President Kaunda to working level visits. Both these leaders play important roles in the Namibian independence negotiations. It would have been inappropriate to have extended the higher status invitation to Mugabe from the viewpoint of elder statesman Kaunda. These invitations, signed by the President, were delivered personally by the Vice President during his recent trip to Africa and both leaders have accepted in principle.

We still believe it is essential for the President soon to extend his first state visit invitation to an appropriate African leader and therefore propose President Felix Houphouet-Boigny of the Ivory Coast.

Unabashedly pro-West and anti-Communist, Ivorian President Houphouet-Boigny has ruled West Africa's most economically successful country since independence from France in 1960. Ivory Coast owes its economic success (it is the world's largest cocoa producer and ranks fourth in coffee production) to Houphouet's encouragement of foreign private (mostly French) investment in the Ivorian economy, and to his adherence to liberal investment and currency convertibility codes. US oil companies are heavily involved in exploiting the country's offshore petroleum reserves. A longtime supporter of US international objectives, Houphouet has been helpful in furthering our southern Africa initiative, has been a staunch supporter of Morocco in the Western Sahara conflict, and strongly opposes Libya in the current OAU crisis. He also maintains close if unofficial ties with Israel. Houphouet, Africa's preeminent elder statesman, has been invited to the US by every American President since John Kennedy, with the exception of former President Carter, a slight he has not forgotten. He welcomed President Reagan's election as a sign the US would take a firm stand against Soviet adventurism. The Ivorian President has welcomed Secretaries Baldrige and Block, as well as numerous Congressional and other important

US visitors to Abidjan within the last year. We believe a state visit would send a strong signal to the Third World that the US supports its proven friends and applauds Ivorian free market policies.

In connection with the state visit of President Felix
Houphouet-Boigny of the Ivory Coast, I thought you would be
interested to know that Ivorian television broadcast an
interview with Assistant Secretary Crocker at prime time on
May 31 as a prelude to the visit. This televised electronic
dialogue was arranged by USIA.

Use of this modern technique, which involves a telephone interview recorded on both sides to produce a videotape for subsequent broadcast, enabled us to reach an estimated three million viewers in the Ivory Coast.

The discussion covered a variety of issues, including U.S./Ivorian relations and progress toward Namibian independence. Highly placed viewers praised the program, commenting that the questions and answers were "frank and direct." A leading Ivorian official felt that Mr. Crocker's analytical approach and explanation of the desirability of pragmatic solutions to the problems of southern Africa were very effective.

This kind of high-level dialogue with opinion leaders, broadcast on television to a wide audience, is one of the most effective communication techniques at our disposal to support U.S. policy objectives. We look forward to other similar opportunities in the future.

I want to report to you on USIA's television support for the visit of Ivory Coast President Houphouet-Boigny to Washington June 7 - 9.

Working with an Ivorian correspondent, a USIA TV crew produced three 20 minute satellite feeds for the visit. According to Ivorian TV, these were the first satellite feeds ever from the U.S. for a visiting African Head of State. Our crews covered the White House arrival ceremony, President Houphouet-Boigny's speech at the National Press Club, and his visit to the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, as well as all photo-ops and receptions.

The overwhelming effect of this coverage has been to reinforce our African policy by underlining the esteem in which the USG holds both the Ivory Coast and its President, as well as the shared values which link our two countries. The message was clear in all ceremonials and official statements. The Ivorian press has cited these as concrete examples of the fact that the United States does indeed have an Africa policy, does indeed acknowledge and respect an African state which exemplifies political stability, and economic progress based on a free market economy and a thriving private sector. Furthermore, the reporting of the visit in the local press reiterated the joint U.S. and Ivorian commitment to peace through strength in the face of Libyan destabilizing efforts in West Africa.
