

MEMORANDUM

TO: Kenneth Cribb, Assistant Counselor FROM: James R. Meadows, Jr. Ma RE: Ms. Monica Ladd

As you will recall, I made a trip to Jamaica on behalf of the United States Youth Counsel. In Jamaica I met Ms. Monica Ladd, the Assistant Political Affairs Officer for the United States Embassy. Prior to her work at the Embassy, she was a member of Andrew Young's personal staff at the United Nations. In her briefing to us on the situation in Jamaica, Ms. Ladd was insistent that the Youth Council visit the People's National Party Youth Arm. She felt that the PNP Youth were more representative of the Jamaican people than Mr. Seaga's ruling Jamaican Labor Party. It is interesting to note that as we were introduced to the leaders, they prefaced their names with "Comrade". The PNP consider themselves the vanguard of the PNP and a part of the International Socialist struggle. To be a party member in good standing, one must excercise party discipline and attend regularly scheduled classes in Marxist-Leninist philosophies. Enclosed is literature published by the PNP Youth and the PNP so that you might have a better understanding where this party is coming from.

We attended a meeting with Kingsley Sangster, a member of Parliament, and Ms. Daphne Adams, both of whom work with the Youth Ministry of Jamaica. We discussed Jamaica sponsoring a Youth Conference prior to the celebration of the International Year of the Youth in 1985. The Jamaican officials expressed an interest in having a conference for youth from democratic countries. Ms. Ladd informed us, that from her experience with the United Nations, you could not exclude other countries or your conference would not be deemed legitimate by the international community, and wanted to know how we defined democratic communities. Mrs. Adams answered that we all know what Democracy is and in her opinion, it is apparent to the rest of the world also.

One of the Jamaican labor leaders with whom we visited, mentioned an incident at a public meeting where Ms. Ladd privately told one of the Cabinet members that he and his government were not doing the right things for his people and how could they claim to be doing so.

In our private conversations with Ms. Ladd she said she did not hold the Seaga government in very high esteem and did not feel that they could accomplish the goals that they were trying to. She felt that it was just a matter of time before the PNP regained control.

Finally, as a matter of observation: the people we visited both in and out of the government, youth and adults, in Trinadad, Tabago, Jamaica and Barbados all made one point very clear -- if the United States cannot make their program work in Jamaica, it will not work anywhere in the Caribbean. I think this is very important given Seaga's upfront stance against totalitarian regimes and especially wanting them out of the Caribbean. To make our program work, we should be sending our best people who believe in our program to Jamaica.



Attached (Tab I) is a proposed response to Mr. Rockefeller's correspondence to you of December 2, 1983 (Tab II). His letter references:

-- Gratitude for pictures of our meeting with President.

-- Encouragement over developments in Jamaica and his pleasure with having been of service.

-- Recent return from presiding over seventh annual conference on the Caribbean and announcement of his new capacity as Chairman of a new affiliate of the Americas Society, the Caribbean/Central American Action.

-- Praise for the Grenada mission.

Your response addresses the above subjects and highlights the benefits of private/public sector cooperation on mutually held objectives in the region. In a related action coming over today, we have proposed that you schedule a meeting with a group from the Council of the Americas (another affiliate of the Americas Society). We recommend that you build in sufficient lead time for our Directorate to acquire and analyze a new study of the Council on Western Hemisphere debt so that we can prepare substantive talking points. In addition, we propose that you consider "reshaping" the original request for a dinner meeting with some two dozen Council members followed by a short presentation/response by you. This approach may be time consuming and potentially awkward. We, therefore, recommend inviting six Council members to meet with you in the West Wing, perhaps over lunch.

RECOMMENDATION:

That you sign the attached response to Mr. Rockefeller (Tab I).
