



Dear Mr. Regan:

Since April of this year, the Sudan has been an international and national topic of discussion in various high places. Unfortunately, the economic plight of that country is still plagued by drought, an influx of refugees, threats of widespread famine, and bankruptcy. For these reasons, progressive steps have been initiated to establish a legal entity to advance measures to alleviate hunger in Sudan.

A Committee To Save Sudan (CSS) has been formed to undertake this awesome but surmountable task. The CSS'S board of professional and civic advisers will consist of twenty-five (25) members: twelve well-known and respected black America leaders, twelve Sudanese heads of tribes, and myself — a Sudanese, residing in the United States for the past twenty-three years — bringing the total to 25 members.

The heart of the African continent is Sudan. It command respect and serious attention from eight neighboring states, all connected by arterial boundaries. As you know, the body fails to function without its heart. To protect America's strategic interest in this region, it must not allow a communistic policy of indirect rule in the Sudan. If Sudan falls under communist power, all Africa will fall. This would place America's interest (on the African continent) in grave jeopardy.

I am requesting that you seek the President's authorization for the following:

- ° to approve that a portion of the funds already set aside for the Sudan be endorsed over to the Committee to Save Sudan, and
- ° that a liaison from the National Security Affairs join our board of advisers.

The first duty of the Committee (after receipt of funds from the U.S. Government) will be (1) to end the civil war between the North and South, through an agreement acceptable to both sides; (2) to invite the other Sudanese heads of tribes to join those already here, for the purpose of negotiating an agreement with the United States; and (3) U.S. recognition of the Sudanese heads of chief tribes (as representatives of the Sudanese people) will severely paralyze the country's internal forces in







I am pleased of your acceptance to serve as a key member on the CSS team, and look forward to a fruitful working relationship with you.

This letter is the basis for your task to proceed with Phase I of the project to identify capable personnel who will assist you, and to provide us a description of the medical services you anticipate rendering with an annual budget of \$25 million, the first year, and \$40 million the second year.

To comply with IRS's requirement for tax-exempt status, we would need the description of your operating budget as soon as possible. The outline below will help you to estimate your needs for the project and enable you to project line items for your two-year budget.



Until Hogan and Hartson obtains tax-exempt status for CCS, we cannot raise the money to launch this project. Therefore, whomever you arrange to prepare your budget, must clearly understand that payment for his/her service will be honored after we have received Recognition of Exemption, as it is our means to raising large sums. Hogan and Hartson has agreed, also, to be compensated for their work on this same principle. However, the sooner Hogan & Hartson has the information they have requested from CSS, the quicker we can pursue Phase II, the fund-raising campaign.



Thank you for the time you took at your office, last week, to discuss with me the Committee To Save Sudan and my proposal that you join us; and, thank you also for your suggestion that I work in the International United Black Fund.

As you well know, it is essential to have effective leaders in the forefront to enable an organization to raise enormous sums of money. To meet this demand, we wish to invite to the States, two of Sudan's most prominent tribal leaders; both are well-known and respected by the United States Department of States. They are:

- (1) Mr. Abel Alair, a former vice president of Sudan and present chief of the largest Southern tribe, the Dinka. He worked in local government under the British where he rose from junior judge to senior judge, to become minister of state for southern affairs and charged with coordinating the work of all the other ministries in the south. It was Vice President Alier who called for making the south a single autonomous region, and negotiated and signed the agreement at Addis Ababa in February of 1972. Today, he remains highly esteemed by the southern people as well as the northern.
- (2) Mr. Abdullah Ali Jad-Allah, currently acting chief of the Ja'aliyyin, the largest and one of the most influential tribes of Sudan. He was a notable mamur (a junior local government officer), and worked his way up through the ranks of mudir (governor of the northern province). Presently, he is a nazir (head of the Ja'aliyyin tribe in Northern Sudan.)

In light of the above, I am requesting the International Black Fund (IUBF) to sponsor the cost of bringing these two personalities to the States, because (a) they will be present to sign the Committee's charter, and (2) to rally for support from the U.S. Government and oil-producing company, Chevron; a sizeable sum of money can be raised for our project long before we have acquired tax-exempt status. As you are aware, Hogan & Hartson is working toward this end for our recognition. The Committee to Save Sudan will repay, of course, the International United Black Fund for its sponsorship, following tax-exempt status.



New Sudan-Libya link sounds alarm in U.S.

The Reagan administration said yesterday it viewed with "grave concern" a new military arrangement between Sudan and Libya and warned that it "could only impact adversely on U.S.-Sudanese relations."

"We have shared our views with the Sudanese. We have been assured that no arrangement would be at the expense of relations with the United States," White House spokesman Larry Speakes said.

Washington has been concerned about events in Africa's largest nation since April 6 when the government of President Gaafar

Nimeiri was overthrown in a military coup d'etat.

On Monday, the government in Khartoum announced new links with the revolutionary government of Libya's Col. Muammar Qaddafi, under which Libya would train and supply the Sudanese military.

President Reagan has condemned Libya as one of the nations in an international network of state-sponsored terrorism, united in the goal of expelling America from the world.

The United States has no diplomatic relations with Libya but enjoyed a close relationship with the Sudan until the fall of President Nimeiri.

Robert Smalley said it "was too early to tell" if the development would have an impact on U.S. military and economic aid to Khartoum.

The administration has asked Congress for \$78.7 million in economic aid and \$175.2 million in military aid for Sudan for fiscal 1986.

Mr. Smalley said officials have not seen the formal text of the protocol between Libya and Sudan and that information on the reported pact was "sketchy."

He added that the U.S. Embassy in Khartoum had no advance warning of the pact, under which Libya would supply Sudan with military hardware, training, equipment, transport and logistics for its military forces.

Meanwhile, the official Sudan news agency SUNA reported that Sudan's new rulers have decided to ask Egypt to extradite Mr. Nimeiri to stand trial, according to wire service reports.

Sudan's new ambassador to Egypt, al-Amin Abdel-Latif, told reporters in Cairo that Mr. Nimeiri should leave Egypt to spare it embarrassment. He is to meet Egyptian President Hosni Mubarak tomorrow.

But he said "the relationship with Libya will not be at the expense of the special relationship with Egypt."

However, Egyptian-Sudanese relations have been clouded since the coup. Egypt is becoming increasingly worried by improving relations between Sudan and Libya — Egypt's arch enemy.

Western diplomats in Cairo said that events might bear out Egyptian fears of encirclement by a hostile Libya.

Mr. Qaddafi yesterday said Egypt had become "a bridge between the Arabs and the Zionist enemy. . . . I am working day and night to urge young Arabs to reject humiliation and destroy bridges."

Officials in Cairo said Egypt would not join a war of words, although Mr. Mubarak recently warned Libya that it would be "playing with fire" if it pushed Egypt too far.

The two North African neighbors fought a border war in 1977. Last year Egypt said Libya planned to bomb the Aswan high dam and had laid mines that damaged several ships in the Red Sea. Libya denied the charges.

SUNA said the extradition decision was in response to "growing popular demand" for Mr. Nimeiri to stand trial. It did not say when Sudan would make the request of its neighbor.

Mr. Nimeiri, who ruled Sudan for 16 years and was a close ally of the United States, has lived in Egypt since he was overthrown in a military coup led by Gen. Abdel-Rahman Swareddahab.

Politicians in post-coup Sudan accuse Mr. Nimeiri of abusing his power, corruption and treason because of the transport through Sudan last year of Ethiopian Jews on their way to Israel.

Some 40,000 people marched on the Egyptian Embassy in Khartoum last week to press demands for Mr. Nimeiri's extradition, chanting "Mubarak is a Zionist agent."



SUBJECT: Sudan - Request You Urge Baker Meeting With Awad Abdul Majeed, Sudan Finance Minister

Sudan's new Minister of Finance and Economic Planning, Awad Abdul Majeed, is quietly in town this week for discussions on Sudan's economy, including a possible IMF program. Princeton Lyman called me this morning to express concern that Dave Mulford but not Secretary Baker plans to meet the minister. He believes it important that Baker see him, if only briefly. Princeton is concerned that Mulford will come across as too hard-line, and Baker will take a more velvet-glove approach. Princeton believes that the minister's ability to seal the package upon his return to Khartoum will require more political than economic skill, and the minister's case would be helped significantly by his ability to use a Baker meeting as a springboard to relay highest level U.S. attention and concern. I agree; Princeton has worked very hard on putting together this program, and it would be too bad if it failed simply because we did not go the extra step to play to the typical Arab pride and sensitivity.

RECOMMENDATION: That you mention informally to Secretary Baker the importance the NSC attaches to Sudan's present fragile stability, and express the wish that Baker take a few minutes to see the visiting finance minister.

Issue

To show appreciation from Sudanese people for U.S. relief.

Facts

Peter McPherson has forwarded the synopsis of an article which appeared recently in the Khartoum press which indicates the impact of the U.S. relief effort on the Sudanese populace.

Discussion

After months of minimal media coverage of the famine in Sudan, an important Khartoum newspaper has expressed profuse appreciation for U.S. efforts to avert famine in Western Sudan. As planes carrying U.S. sorghum arrived in El Fasher in Western Sudan, the people cried "Reagan has come, Reagan has arrived," and explained that the American sorghum, the gift of American aid, was President Reagan. Even without communications, the people had learned of your surgery and prayed for your recovery.

The writer pitted the American effort to provide grain against that of the Sudanese government, which was uncaring and allowed the price of transport to rise, in the process "slaughtering Sudanese decency which our passion for wealth killed." He pointed out that not one leader of the revolution had gone to Western Sudan.

Dear Mr. President:

I thought you would be interested in knowing that you are better known to the people of Western Sudan than top Sudanese officials and American Sorghum is commonly called "Reagan".

This was recently reported in a Sudan daily by a left of center journalist. The article went on to say:

"Reagan entered Darfur with a human face at a time when we ignored the fact that children were starving. Reagan offers dishes of food at a time when we waste (money) on weak political concerns and drink coca cola!

Reagan has aborted our slogans on international imperialism and has revealed for us the lost truth of this exhausted country. He enters Sudanese houses with dishes of food and deserves the warm kiss of a child about to die as a result of the past regime's negligence and about to be forgotten by his own countrymen, who fill their mouths with prolonged political statements.

Reagan is better known in Darfur than El Guizouli Dafalla (the Prime Minister), Swareddahab (head of the Transitional Military Council) and even better known than the trade unions' Alliance. In villages where radio, television and the press are unknown, the villagers prayed for President Reagan's recovery."
