I. WHY and HOW AASNY BECAME INVOLVED WITH SURINAME

As an individual; and in the behalf of the Academy of Armed Security, as its chief executive officer, Carlos Collins has an active interest in making certain proposals to the federal government:

A. Protection of foreign embassies and U.N. missions

1. Reduction of reimbursement expenses to City of New York

A substantial federal cost reduction can be achieved in this matter by the replacement of all outside fixed security assignments now "manned" by city police officers with a qualified contract security force.

AASNI can provide such a force. In fact, regular city police officers will work for the Academy at much lower rates than their civil service salaries. (The New York City Police Department permits its rank-and-file to work up to 20-hours per week in security and other areas).

2. Expanded security considerations beyond fixed assignments

The AASNY-provided contract security force can maintain a reserve contingent for the purpose of handling extra security needed to protect high-risk foreign visitors. This contingent can be maintained "in readiness" in a fashion similar to National Guard operations: They would work two days per week, replacing the regular security force during days off, with the excess of reserves attending weekly training excercises.

3. Special legislation now in effect may need minimal or no amendment

The City of New York, in coordination with the AASNI contract security force, Secret Service, et al, can continue to provide that extra man-power needed on those rare instances where blanket protection of an extra high-risk or ultra-sensitive foreign VIP visits the city.

4. Benefits additional to cost reduction at federal level

- * A specified number of city police would be returned to its primary responsibility of protecting the general public. This would be seen quite favorably by the general citizenry and should provide good public relations all-the-way-around.
- * Additional jobs would be created. Good public relations for Washington.
- * Greater practical control over all security operations would be maintained by Washington.
- * The President of the United States can get the pain in the ass mayor of New York off his back, at least on one score.

B. Physical protection of nuclear-power plants & critical materials

Consultation services

In the Academy's opinion, those portions of lCCFR involved with physical protection of nuclear-power plants and critical materials are in serious need of revision and simplification.

Responsibility and authority of protective operations must be more clearly defined by regulation.

A national nuclear-power plant intelligence system should be developed and all security operations should be required to hook into it.

Minimum national security standards should be developed and compliance should be uniformly required regardless of the size or operating scope of individual nuclear plant systems.

State-of-the-art security training programs should be developed and compliance should be mandated regardless of the scope or size of individual nuclear plant systems.

National standards should be developed and mandated regarding security personnel screening, and compliance therewith required of all operators, whethers maintainers of in-house security forces or users of contract security.

Better liaison, coordination, and cooperation with municipal and state law enforcement agencies must be developed, also by national standards.

AASNI's proposal is that the Academy be commissioned as consultants to the NRC, for the purpose of conducting an exhaustive study and analysis of present regulations, and to recommend improvements thereto.

Because of the active interest in offering a contract security force to the federal government for the purpose of providing -outside- security at foreign missions and embassies, when overtures by the Consulate General of the Republic of Suriname presented the possibility of an opportunity to work -inside- a foreign government's security organization, we entertained the overtures seriously. Neither Carlos Collins, as an individual, nor AASNY (or any member or associate thereof) ever solicited the Republic of Suriname. We simply responded to their overtures.

II. WHAT IS THE ACADEMY OF ARMED SECURITY

The Academy of Armed Security (AAS), originated in the state of New York as the Academy of Armed Security - New York (AASNY). It is a group of individuals composed of active law enforcement officers, retired law enforcement personnel, and superlative security professionals, bound by the common interest of bringing about standardization and greater professionalism of armed security operations and of specialized law enforcement (peace officer operations).

Since its inception in January, 1979, no real personal gain has accrued to any member; rather, in excess of sixteen-thousand dollars has been sustained as a loss. We were not originally formed as a non-profit organization, but from the looks of it, we may as well have done so....

The Academy's future plans include:

- * Lobbying for a change in the specific statutes involved with the licensing and regulation of the security profession, so that more demanding standards are required to be maintained, including mandated training of all individuals working as armed security personnel.
- * Lobbying for a change in those general statutes in one way or another involving themselves with the security industry, so that greater seriousness, professionalism, and attention to public safety is achieved.
- * Expansion of all activities beyond the state of New York
- * Separation of its training activities into two factions:
 - Security Training Activities, as a commercial enterprise
 - Special Police Training Activities, as a not-for-profit institution

The Academy's Statement of Purpose, its Roster of Training Programs & Facilities, details of its administration, chain-of-command, shields and other indicia of status and Rules of Conduct for Armed Agents, etc., are a matter of record with the Supreme Court, State of New York, Superintendent of State Police, State of New York, Municipal Police Training Council, State of New York, License Division and Police Commissioner, City of New York, and the National Rifle Association, Washington, D. C. (The Academy is affiliated with the NRA through the AASNY Tactical Weapons Team, and maintains a one-million dollar liability insurance policy covering all sanctioned activities).

III. WHO IS CARLOS COLLINS

Carlos Collins, inceptor, founder, and chief executive officer of the Academy of Armed Security, is a moderate-conservative individual with no left-leaning tendencies whatever. A licensed private investigator and security agent of the state of New York, he is also a certified firearms instructor and armed combat expert. He was born in Puerto Rico, is fluently bi-lingual, and 53 years of age.

- B. Maintain (develop) the relationship on a strictly domestic basis (state of New York), to remain in consonance with established protocol practice and philosophy.
- C. Pursue the relationship as far as it can be developed, on a local and international level if possible, for the purpose of establishing a direct, confidential communication link separately from conventional diplomatic channels.

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An Invasion of Suriname Is Reportedly Foiled

THE HAGUE, July 18 (Reuters) planned invasion of Suriname with the help of Florida-based mercenaries was called off this month after the Netherlands internal security agency found out about it, the Netherlands News Agency said today.

The agency, quoting a Suriname group here that was said to have been linked to the plan, said the invasion was scheduled for July 1, when some 30 Many Oct mon ment system special Paramaribo, capital of the former Durch Guiana on the northern tip of South America.

About half of the mercenaries were United States and South American nanationals in Florida, the others Surpame nationals and ex-soldiers, according to the report.

The agency's report said the aim of the mission was to oust Suriname's military strongman, Lieut, Col. Dési Bouterse. The agency said the merce-naries from Florida would have been supported later by Surinamese re cruited in the Netherlands who would

Dutch Discovered Plan

The agency said the invasion was called off because the Netherlands internal security agency had infiltrated Simpamese resistance groups in the Netherlands and had discovered the plan.

Colonel Routerse seized power in coup in 1980. The Netherlands and the United States cut off aid after 15 people were shot by security forces in a reported insurrection in December.

The agency quoted one of the planners of the invasion as saying they felt it impossible to proceed with the invasion arter the Dutch security agency discov. ered the plan because they feared the Netherlands Government would inform the Colonel Bouterse's regime.

The agency quoted the planner as

saying that more than 4.3 million had been raised for the invasion, about one third from Surinamese businessmen in the Netherlands, the rest from Surina-

A Dutch Foreign Ministry spokesman refused to comment on the agency's report. The Government has said it would allow Surinamese resistance move-ments to operate here providing they adhered to Dutch law



As a Dutch-speaking nation with a population of 350,000 of European. African and Asian background and hun dreds of miles of trackless jungle beween its capital and its inland frontiers, Suriname has traditionally been aloor from the rest of South America

On gaining its independence in 1975, it obtained a \$1.5 billion aid program from the Dutch that amounted to \$110 million a year or roughly a fourth of the national budget. It was this program that was suspended by the Netherlands in December. The American suspension halted a \$1.5 million program that was signed in September.

The events in Suriname that proyoked the aid cuts and stood in the way of Venezueian and Colombian assistance did not pose the same problem to Brazii. It is the policy of its Foreign Ministry to view such things as internal problems.

Spurt of Diplomatic Activity

The aid negotiations have produced a lot of activity here since General Ven. turini's April mission. In the last two weeks Prime Minister Errol Alibux of Suriname has paid a visit; the military chief, Capt. Iwan F. Graanoogst, has inspected Brazil's arms industry and Surinamese Cabinet officers have met with Brazilian counterparts.

Last week the Dutch Prime Minister. Ruud Lubbers, came here on a longplanned visit, and Suriname was major topic of conversation. He said the Brazilians had assured him that the aid to Surmame was innured. But he cautioned them to be prudent in their arms

According to sources here, the military assistance, to begin later this month, includes clothing, light equipment, automatic weapons and training both by Brazilian teams sent to Surjname and at academies in Brazil, A military attache is being assigned to the Brazilian Embassy in Paramaribo.

Diplomatic assignments Tix can keep cops out of a 'fix'

Police officers at the E. 51st St. stationhouse have been told they can avoid assignment to certain undesirable posts by being among the top 10% in the unit in giving out traffic summonses for moving violations, the Daily News has learned.

The posts, called "fixed assignments," usually involve standing guard at diplomatic missions of other sensitive areas that require full-time police protection.

"Fixers" in the E 51st St. precinct area include guarding the Cuban Mission to the United Nations at 38th St. and Lexington Ave., and the United States Mission at First Ave. and 48th St.

IN A FEB. 15 MEMO to all members of his precinct, precinct commander Capt. Clarence Pinsent said "members of this command within the top 10% level of signal light."

enforcement will not be scheduled for fixed assignments unless designated by me or if manning levels require it."

Signal light enforcement is a citywide program aimed at cracking down on motorists who ignore red lights and other traffic signals at intersections.

"I'm trying to put the people on patrol assignments who are more patrol oriented." Pinsent said.

He said not all officers view the fixed posts as undesirable, and some volunteer for them.

ONE POLICEMAN in the precinct who asked that his name not be used said officers generally do not like the

fixers and sometimes view them as punishment.

Pinsent said he does not see a problem with officers' giving out tickets when they were not deserved, in order to avoid a fixed assignment.

The Police Department has in the past defended the practice by some precinct commanders of putting their less ambitious or conscientious officers on fixed posts.



It said the NRC also has information on 32 "possibly deliberate damaging acts at 24 operating reactors and reactor construction sites" from 1974 to 1982.

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

Dear ar. President,

We are convinced, Wr. President, that you are familiar with the fact that throughout the years a strong attachment to democracy was one of the main characteristics of Suriname.

The circumstance that the U.S.has been and still is a shining example in the field of democracy, accounts for the optimal relations which, until some years ago, existed between Suriname and the U.S. The strong ties were especially manifested during the Second World War by the way Surinamese workers exerted themselves in the bauxite industry, thus providing for 60 per cent of the American need for this raw material in the aircraft industry, but also by the warm affection the people of Suriname showed to the American troops and the way in which they were admitted into their midst.

Unfortunately, a situation has arisen nowadays which constitutes a threat, both for Suriname and the relations between Suriname and the U.S. Not only has the democratic tradition of people been disturbed, the people of Suriname are also subject to indoctrination with most undesirable ideologies.

We are of the opinion, Mr. President, that this situation is not in accordance with your efforts to avoid a further spread of anti-democratic ideologies, which have taken root in some countries in the Western Hemisphere.

Since its establishment on January the 12-th 1983 the Council for the Liberation of Suriname has made it its object to restore the constitutional state in Suriname and to put an end to the state of lawlessness of the people, thus also putting an end to the violation of fundamental human rights.
