1. (LOW) THE FOLLOWING IS THE TEXT OF A LETTER FROM SWAZILAND'S PRIME MINISTER PRINCE BHEKIMPI TO PRESIDENT REAGAN, THE ORIGINAL OF WHICH HAS BEEN DOUGHED TO AF/S FOR TRANSMITTAL TO THE WHITE HOUSE.

BEGIN TEXT. YOUR EXCELLENCY,

I WISH TO BRING TO YOUR ATTENTION A MATTER WHICH IS OF GREAT CONCERN TO MY COUNTRY AND INDEED TO OTHER DEVELOPING COUNTRIES LIKE MINE.

AS YOU ARE AWARE, WE IN SWAZILAND ARE ACUTELY DEPENDENT UPON EXPORTS FOR OUR ECONOMIC SURVIVAL AND FOR SERVICING OUR OVERSEAS DEBTS. EXPORT INDUSTRIES FORM A VITAL PART OF OUR ECONOMY AND THEY CONTRIBUTE IN NO SMALL MEASURE TO OUR INTERNAL STABILITY.

OUR SUGAR INDUSTRY IS THE MOST IMPORTANT OF THESE. IT PROVIDES A LIVELIHOOD, EITHER DIRECTLY OR INDIRECTLY, FOR OVER 50,000 PEOPLE (ABOUT 8 PERCENT OF OUR ENTIRE POPULATION) AND IT CONTRIBUTES ALMOST 40 PERCENT TO OUR FOREIGN EXCHANGE EARNINGS.

THE WORLD MARKET PRICE FOR SUGAR IS NOW AT AN HISTORIC LOW POINT BEING LESS THAN HALF OUR COST OF PRODUCTION. THIS IS DUE TO A NUMBER OF REASONS OF WHICH ONE OF THE MOST SIGNIFICANT IS THAT IMPORTS OF RAW SUGAR INTO THE UNITED STATES HAVE BEEN DRASTICALLY REDUCED. IN 1977 THEY TOTALLED 6.1 MILLION TONNES WHEREAS IN 1964 THEY WERE ONLY 2.5 MILLION TONNES. IN 1981 SWAZILAND SOLD 162,500 TONNES TO THE UNITED STATES BUT IN 1984 WE WERE RESTRICTED TO OUR QUOTA OF 35,000 TONNES.

I AM INFORMED THAT IT IS POSSIBLE FOR RAW SUGAR TO BE USED AS THE RAW MATERIAL FOR SWEETER HIGH FRUCTOSE SYRUP. THIS PRODUCT, WHICH IS CURRENTLY MANUFACTURED FROM U.S. GROWN CORN, REPLACES APPROXIMATELY 1.5 MILLION TONNES OF IMPORTED RAW SUGAR ANNUALLY.

IF THE HIGH FRUCTOSE SYRUP INDUSTRY IN THE UNITED STATES WERE TO BE OPENED TO IMPORTED RAW SUGAR, THERE WOULD BE AN IMMEDIATE IMPACT ON THE WORLD SUGAR MARKET WITH CONSEQUENTIAL BENEFIT TO DEVELOPING SUGAR EXPORTING COUNTRIES. I UNDERSTAND THAT THIS COULD BE DONE WITHOUT ACTION BY CONGRESS AND THAT THE EFFECT ON THE U.S. CORN PRODUCERS OF THE ADDITIONAL COMPETITION WOULD BE VERY SMALL.

I WOULD EARNESTLY REQUEST THAT THIS MATTER BE GIVEN YOUR CLOSEST ATTENTION. YOURS SINCERELY. END TEXT.



This fact seemed to take on special significance during the Coronation Celebration in the National Stadium when, as spokesman for other African heads of state, and in the presence of The Honorable P. W. Botha, State President of The Republic of South Africa, The Honorable Dr. Kenneth Kaunda, president of Zambia, spoke out learily for the removal


of all barriers to individual freedom throughout Africa — and was applauded for his remarks.

He opened the envelope immediately, appeared to glance at the bottom of the letter as if to see if it was actually signed by the President of the United States, and then, with a smile, commented that he looked forward to reading it later in private.

- King Mswati III and his countrymen were clearly moved by the personal attention you afforded their nation. As His Excellency, Peter Helemisi Mtetwa, Swaziland Ambassador to the United States, said, in essence, enroute to Swaziland: "While the Coronation is a formal occasion governed by traditional rituals and much pomp and ceremony, it remains very much a 'family affair.' Therefore, the fact that the President of the United States would send his daughter to represent him and the United States has special significance for us."

Once again, Mr. President, I thank you for the privilege of being designated a Representative for this occasion. In closing, permit me to convey to you my admiration for what a mutual friend, the late Robert A. 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
