Dear Mrs. Lagergren:

I have been asked to reply to your letter of October 13 to President Reagan. Thank you for your kind words about America's effort on behalf of your brother, Raoul Wallenberg. I am sorry it has taken so long for us to respond to you.

As the President stated when he proclaimed your brother an honorary American, the United States is committed to the effort to resolve the mystery of your brother's fate. We shall continue to pursue the question of your brother's disappearance with the Soviets at every appropriate occasion. In so doing, we shall continue to cooperate with and offer support for the initiatives of the Government of Sweden as well as continue our own direct approaches to the Soviets. We shall also solicit the support of all other governments who hold dear the humanitarian principles which Raoul Wallenberg so heroically exemplified and for which he so unjustly suffered at the hands of the Soviet Union.

In the effort to resolve your brother's case, we will investigate every avenue that offers a reasonable chance for success. Unfortunately, as you know, in dealing with the Soviet Union on humanitarian issues such as your brother's case, we cannot be very optimistic that the Soviet Government can be moved to act in accordance with the humanitarian principles to which it is committed by its adherence to the Helsinki Final Act. As you may know, we approached the Soviets again about Raoul's fate shortly after the October 5 ceremony. We still have not received a formal reply from them, and we may not since the Soviets have told us many times that they consider the matter to be closed. We are hopeful, however, that our most recent approach has convinced the Soviets of the seriousness with which we intend to pursue your brother's case. Once the Soviets understand and accept that we will not abandon your brother's cause until they have provided a full and satisfactory accounting, we are hopeful that we will be able to make progress in reaching the objective which we -- and the President and Mrs. Reagan in particular -- share so deeply with you.

TEXT OF NINA LAGERGREN'S LETTER TO PRESIDENT REAGAN

Dear Mr. President:

I wish my parents had shared these unforgettable moments with me, when you proclaimed Raoul an honorary U.S. citizen at the moving ceremony on October 5.

While rereading your speech, I realize how convincing and personal you were, as if you had known my brother.

Am I right when I assume that you do have much more in mind than conventional "talks on the highest level," when you say that you will do everything in your power. It is my firm belief that you and only you can achieve what we have been waiting for all these years - Raoul's release. They might accept an appropriate American offer - exchange of man or service.

I do not agree with those who say that the Soviets would not change their minds and that they cannot admit that Raoul is still alive when they have said the opposite. They can and will find plausible reasons if it is worthwhile to them.

I feel as if a new era had begun, and that the efforts to free Raoul suddenly had taken on a new dimension.

This is in further response to your letter to the President of October 5, cosigned by 30 of your House colleagues, urging the Administration to take all possible steps to locate Raoul Wallenberg and secure his return to freedom.

Along with Congress, the President and his Administration have taken every opportunity to express their strong concern about the fate of Raoul Wallenberg. Following the ceremony at which the President signed the legislation making Raoul Wallenberg an honorary American, the Department of State formally and officially made the Soviet Government aware of the continued dedication of the American people to ascertain the truth about Raoul Wallenberg's fate. To date, the Soviet Government has not provided us with a response, but we are continuing our efforts to resolve the tragic mystery of Wallenberg's fate. We shall not be satisfied until the Soviets provide a full and satisfactory clarification of their actions in this case.

We have pressed this effort both on a bilateral basis and at international forums, such as the CSCE Review Conference in Madrid and the U.N. Human Rights Commission. In this regard, on February 25 our representative to the U.N. Human Rights Commission, Nichael Novak, urged the Soviet Union to make "a humanitarian gesture, which would contribute to universal good-feeling -- namely, a renewed search and full report, which may lay questions to rest; or else, in the best of all possible outcomes, result in the discovery of the whereabouts of a man who stands among the heroes of our time."

We have worked closely with the Government of Sweden to try to confirm reports that have come to light about Wallenberg. To date, we have been unable to confirm any of the reports suggesting that Wallenberg might still be alive. We continue to cooperate fully with the Government of Sweden and all other interested parties in a persistent effort to obtain information that will clarify the fate of this brave man. As Ambassador Max Kampelman noted at a CSCE plenary session a year ago, the Wallenberg case is one that "will not go away;" the Soviet failure "to appreciate

the human factor which is symbolized by the Wallenberg case" only serves to stimulate further interest. As has been our practice during the year since Raoul Wallenberg became an honorary American citizen, we will continue to raise the Wallenberg case at every appropriate opportunity, both publicly and in our diplomatic communications with the Soviet Union. We plan to press the issue of Raoul Wallenberg again when CSCE reconvenes this November in Madrid.

It is our hope that our continuing efforts to raise this issue publicly, and the resulting opprobrium, will eventually convince the Soviet authorities to provide a satisfactory answer to our questions about the fate of this remarkable man.



Attached at Tab II is a letter to you from our Ambassador to Sweden, Frank Forsberg. He is requesting that the President host a luncheon or dinner for the King and Queen of Sweden on November 10 or 11.

From a substantive foreign policy point of view, there is little justification for such an invitation: the President has already received the King and Queen in the White House. I simply do not agree with the Ambassador's analysis that, "a different treatment for the royal couple is especially important this year." The King and Queen do not have great prestige in Sweden, and Swedish-U.S. relations are in good shape for substantive reasons (we have agreed to provide the engine for their new tactical aircraft; the Russians are still sending submarines into Swedish waters).

Attached at Tab I for your signature is a letter to Forsberg acknowledging his letter but giving him no encouragement.

Subject: Invitation to the King and Queen of Sweden

King Carl XVI Gustaf and Queen Silvia of Sweden will be in the United States on an unofficial visit November 8-19 to participate in portions of the Scandinavia Today activities. Ambassador Franklin Forsberg has written you strongly recommending that the President and Mrs. Reagan invite the royal couple to a luncheon on November 10 or a dinner on November 11. If the President's schedule precludes an invitation on either of those two days, Ambassador Forsberg believes the King and Queen will try to rearrange their itinerary so as to accommodate the President's calendar. The King and Queen were guests of the Reagans in November 1981.

Unless the President would prefer an informal dinner or a luncheon, we recommend that the King and Queen be invited to tea. King Olaf of Norway, who will be here in October, has already received such an invitation and we believe the two royal houses should be treated equally.

Dear Mr. Secretary:

I need your help in getting the Swedish King and Queen invited to dinner or lunch at the White House when they visit the United States in November.

We got a black eye when the President and Mrs. Reagan initially were described as too busy to receive the Swedish royal coupld during their United States visit a year ago. The last minute decision to give them a twenty minute coffee-and-photo session did not entirely change the feeling that Sweden had been slighted.

A different treatment of the royal couple is especially important this year. They have become a most important symbol here in Sweden. Sweden might very well have a Social Democratic government after September 19, and it will be vital to get our relations off to the best possible start. More important still the Swedes -- including Swedish Socialists -- have been taking a very tough line with the Soviet Union on, for instance, Soviet submarines violating Swedish sovereignty, Soviet diplomats conducting intelligence operations in Sweden and in Poland.

We received from the Royal Palace today a copy of the itinerary of the royal couple. They will be in the United States from November 8 until November 19 inclusive. Their schedule for that period is quite crowded. The two best possibilities for them to visit the White House would be for a luncheon on November 10th or a dinner on November 11th. If neither of these dates is possible, please let us know alternative possibilities within the timeframe mentioned. I would like to be able to notify the King and Queen as quickly as possible so that they can either make the necessary arrangements or

change their present schedule. I know that a visit to the White House would be high on their priority list.

I hope you will be able to give this request your support. I feel that an invitation from the White House would be of significant importance here in this sensitive country.

Your appointment has been very well received in Sweden.

Thank you very much for your cooperation.

It is quite possible that I will be in the States at the time of their visit.
