Dear Ms. Horne:

The President and Mrs. Reagan have asked me to convey their delight and pleasure that you are able to perform for the Official Dinner in honor of His Excellency the Prime Minister of Sweden and Mrs. Carlsson on Wednesday, September 9, 1987.

The following points will hopefully clarify some of the details, and I will be happy to go into further detail with you at your convenience.

1. Air Transportation

The White House will reimburse you for your first-class domestic transportation to and from Washington, D.C., and for coach to and from Washington, D.C., for your guest and accompanist.

2. Ground Transportation

The White House will be responsible for ground transportation for you and your accompanying party. This is normally limited to and from airports and to and from the White House.

3. Hotel Accommodations

The White House will be making hotel reservations for September 9 for you, your guest, and your accompanist at the Madison Hotel, which is very convenient to the White House. We will, of course, reserve a suite for you. The cost of the rooms will be the responsibility of the White House. This, unfortunately, does not include any incidentals charged to the room, and party members should be so advised. We will need the full names of your guest and accompanist as well as their dates of birth and Social Security numbers.

4. Rehearsal

We normally rehearse around 2:30 p.m. the day of the dinner.

Bandshell

Your performance will be on a platform with a bandshell on the South Lawn. In the event of rain, the performance will be held in the East Room on a one foot platform.

6. Dress

The dress for the evening is black tie.

7. Dinner

You and your guest should plan on arriving at the White House at 7:30 p.m. for the dinner. (We understand, of course, if you should choose not to eat prior to your performance.)

We can take you to a holding room following the toasts allowing you a chance to freshen up prior to your performance. This allows you approximately twenty minutes. The entertainment portion of the evening normally begins between 10:15 p.m. and 10:30 p.m. and usually lasts 20 minutes. We will, of course, facilitate all of these arrivals and departures with White House vehicles.

8. Perfomance

As we get closer to the date, we will need to discuss your program, as we have printed programs distributed at the dinner. Also, I will need your biographic information for press and speech purposes. If this could be sent to me as soon as possible, I would very much appreciate it.

Please do not hesitate to call as you have questions. We are all greatly looking forward to your performance and want to do everything possible to make it a memorable occasion for you.

President's Welcoming Statement Prime Minister Ingvar Carlsson of Sweden

It is a pleasure to welcome Prime Minister Carlsson and Mrs. Carlsson to the United States. I welcome you with great warmth and respect, as the representative of a magnificent country with which America shares many fundamental values: we are both deeply committed to the ideals of democracy, we are both committed to the vigorous exercise of free-market economics, and we are both committed to pursuing a world that is prosperous, and at peace.

Our shared values reflect something deeper, a historical heritage, for in fact Swedes and Americans have mingled for centuries. Next year will mark the 350th anniversary of the founding by your ancestors of a small colony named New Sweden near what is now Wilmington, Delaware. Those brave settlers helped transform the wilderness into a great nation. Even more, they brought with them the hardy virtues and pioneer spirit that became the foundation of our national character.

They were not the last to come. Over a million more

Swedish settlers came between the 1840s and the 1920s, so that

today some 5 million Americans proudly claim Swedish origins.

When this country was still a very new nation, in 1783, we

signed with Sweden a Treaty of Commerce and Friendship that was

among the very first of our treaties with other countries. And

in one remarkable and shining hour, America adopted a Swede:

Raoul Wallenberg, the Swedish diplomat who in World War II

saved hundreds of Jews from the Nazi terror, is an honorary

U.S. citizen by special act of Congress. Thus Swedes and

Americans have been intertwined for centuries, in a deep-rooted

relationship that at times is more like family than just

friend.

Today our friendship is especially vigorous. Many thousands of Swedes and Americans visit back and forth each year to conduct business, to pursue the arts, to study. Our governments maintain a good and sturdy dialogue on an extremely broad range of mutual interests. The late Secretary of Commerce Malcolm Baldrige visited Sweden in May, where he announced that the United States is eliminating some export license requirements for high technology goods bound for Sweden. This summer Swedish Trade Minister Gradin came to

Washington for discussions on global and bilateral trade issues. And in June my wife Nancy visited Stockholm, where for three days she exchanged views with those who plan and run Sweden's enlightened programs to combat drugs.

Your visit now, Mr. Prime Minister, renews our dialogue at the highest level. Our dialogue has improved and deepened in recent years, and we are determined to insure that it continues to improve. We look forward today to discussing with you the major issues of the world today, and how, as modern industrialized democracies, we can solve the problems we will face in the future. Sweden and the United States face similar challenges, though in many ways we have chosen different solutions. Our renewed dialogue can help us appreciate the value in each other's views, and to devise prudent policies for the future.

In the United States we have in recent years reinvigorated the private sector and given new emphasis to an old American tradition: voluntarism and personal initiative. With renewed vigor, American entrepreneurs have rolled up their shirt sleeves and are helping meet our needs for housing and health care. Their efforts have also created millions of new jobs, and have given the whole nation the gift of reduced inflation.

When private enterprise is not able to provide a decent livelihood, our government is committed to helping, and to making sure that all citizens enjoy an equal opportunity to live dignified and fulfilling lives.

The United States has accepted that a high level of must be maintained at levels necessary to Preserve defense spending is necessary to maintain both our freedom, and the security of the entire community of free democratic nations. At the same time, we have taken a decisive lead in seeking balanced and verifiable arms control agreements that will reduce both the level of nuclear weapons and the threat of their use. We are working hard to sustain a productive dialogue with the Soviet Union. Our strength, and our determined search for peace, go hand in hand.

Sweden is a neutral nation, not our ally, and it does not join us directly in our pursuit of a stable peace. But Sweden provides for its own strong defense by its own means, and works vigorously in its own way to promote peace. Henry Kissinger, speaking in memory of the slain Olof Palme, suggested that the neutral nations "can achieve an influence far beyond the traditional calculations of power." He was, of course, speaking most particularly about Sweden. Sweden and the U.S. are friends sharing a strong determination to make sure we count for something in making our world better.

Our friendship thus has a long history, and a promising future. Your visit here, Mr. Prime Minister, will help us chart the future direction of that friendship. We have much to say to each other about the world we live in, and how we play our parts in that world. Separately and together, our efforts will help foster a world that is more peaceful, humane, and prosperous.

President's Dinner Toast Prime Minister Ingvar Carlsson of Sweden

Ladies and gentlemen, I would like now to offer a toast to Prime Minister and Mrs. Carlsson. Nancy has told me much about the warmth and hospitality she received in Sweden during her June visit, and she and I have looked forward to this opportunity to express our appreciation, and to extend a welcome in return.

I welcome you as long overdue friends of a special kind. Sweden to me has never seemed very far away or exotic, ever since my days as a boy in Illinois, where the neighbors often bore names like Hanson and Lund, and where it was not a very long walk to Bergstrom's Hardware Store. And this morning, in the course of our long conversation, Mr. Prime Minister, I realized anew what I have long known: that Sweden and America share much the same basic values, and much the same hopes for a more peaceful and prosperous world. We often pursue our similar goals through different means, but our democratic traditions have bred in us both an appreciation for diversity, and an understanding that there is often more than one way to achieve a goal.

I welcome you with special warmth because I realize this is not merely a visit in your role as Prime Minister, but also a sentimental journey. In 1960, early in your married life, you went to Northwestern University in Illinois, where the young Mr. Carlsson attended graduate school, and the young Mrs. Carlsson was a librarian at the University library. I am happy to note that the still young Carlssons will next month celebrate their 30th wedding anniversary. Please accept my and Nancy's warm congratulations. You will be visiting

Northwestern University again this Saturday, and I trust the campus will still in some ways look very familiar. While you're in Illinois you may hear a few names that sound a bit Swedish, for they're still there in great numbers, I know.

Our countries have been friends for a long, long time, and today we have had an important chance to talk and realize again how strong that friendship is, and how bright the prospects are for that friendship to grow deeper. That realization gives me great pride. Prime Minister and Mrs. Carlsson, I raise my glass to you in friendship, and with a hearty skol:
