



Reverting to my visit with you in the morning of July 11 and my subsequent letter of July 23, I only wish to confirm - as promised in my letter - the dates indicated for the visit of Their Majesties the King and Queen of Sweden to the United States in 1988. The intention is that the King and Queen would arrive in Washington D C on Sunday April 10, 1988. They would spend two days - Monday April 11 and Tuesday April 12 - in Washington. The following points will hopefully clarify some of the details, and I will be happy to go into further detail with you at your convenience.

1. Air Transportation

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The White House will be making hotel reservations for you and your party at the Madison Hotel, which is very convenient to the White House. We will, of course, reserve a suite for you. The cost of the rooms will be the responsibility of the White House. This, unfortunately, does not include any incidentals charged to the room, and party members should be so advised. We will need a list of the persons in your entourage including their full name, date of birth and Social Security number, and room preference.

4. Rehearsal

We normally rehearse around 2:30 p.m. the day of the dinner.

5. Dress

The dress for the evening is black tie.

6. Dinner

You and your guest should plan on arriving at the White House at 7:30 p.m. for the dinner. We can take you to a holding room following the toasts allowing you a chance to freshen up prior to your performance. This allows you approximately twenty minutes. The entertainment portion of the evening normally begins between 10:15 p.m. and 10:30 p.m. and usually lasts 25 minutes. We will, of course, facilitate all of these arrivals and departures with White House vehicles.
